Citizens View Iron Lung On Display at Court House

Twin Falls and the east end peered at and into two "iron lungs" today to find out just what the county hospital and southern Idaho has acquired through the gift of the lamb club of Buhl. A steady stream of spectators went through the first floor lobby of the courthouse this morning and during early afternoon to inspect the iron lung devices displayed near the offices of the board of county commissioners. All visitors were registering but numbers were not being counted after conclusion of the display at 9 p. m. today. Several hundred persons had examined the adult and baby lungs by 1 p. m. and total through expected closing time may reach 2,000 or more. These in Charge: Miss Martin Hansen, superintendent of nurses at the county hospital, and Mrs. Helen Garret, the lamb club's contact representative in Twin Falls, were in charge of demonstrating the respirators. Mrs. J. H. Harris was directing the registration of visitors and volunteer clubwomen from throughout the county were assisting. The refreshments, provided through the generosity of the board of county commissioners, were prepared by the hospital staff. No less than 2,000 of the frosted cakes were piled in the commissioner's office awaiting the visitors. Fifty pounds of coffee stood alongside to take care of the beverage needs. Hansen explained that the "baby lung" will be most frequently used of the two devices. "The smaller respirator," she said, "will be in almost constant use, especially the incubator portion." Often Needed. The respirator part of the "baby lung" will be utilized when required by the superintendent, and practically all infants born by Ceresian operations need artificial respiration. A life-size doll in the smaller respirator was used to demonstrate the breathing process as the "lung" expanded and contracted. BOISE, Feb. 17 (AP)—Complaints against rail rates affecting two-thirds of Idaho's potato, onion and other vegetable production were on file with the Idaho public utilities commission today. BROAD FEDERAL STATE FORESTRY PROGRAM URGED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 (AP)—Agriculture Chief Earl Clegg, of the U. S. forest service has proposed a broad, federal-state forestry program to improve and protect forest resources. Clegg told a senate agriculture subcommittee that formulating an intelligent, carefully-conceived forestry program is of tremendous importance to national economy. He said a nationwide forestry program will help solve problems of rural poverty and unemployment, in addition to creating jobs and security and ability for families, communities, industries and labor. He recommended: Amendment of the Clark-McNary act to increase authorized federal expenditures in cooperation with states and private owners from \$2,000,000 annually. Cooperative protection against forest insects and diseases. A national forest reforestation to be financed on a 50-50 basis with states. Benefits payments to farmers for improved forest practices. Distribution of forest tree seed and planting stock at not more than cost to industrial forest land owners and to farmers. Establishment of cooperatives for small farm and other forest land owners to stimulate better management and higher timber prices. Extension of public credits to owners of forest lands, to prevent their falling into the hands of private liquidators.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 (AP)—Vice-President John N. Garner entered the California primary in San Francisco today. The announcement was contained in an exchange of messages between Garner and the governor, Earl Warren, and William R. Wallace, Jr., co-chairman of the Garner-for-President committee in Los Angeles. Garner's name was entered and which is merely advisory, the California primary is binding. Both men also are entered in the Wisconsin primary. Garner has announced he will enter the Ohio primary. Snow Keeps 200 Pupils Isolated At Farm Houses

LUBBOCK, Tex., Feb. 17 (AP)—The 200 school children who failed to reach their homes when school buses were blocked by snowdrifted highways in yesterday afternoon's blizzard, found shelter in farm houses and are safe, it was reported today. S. G. Anthony, superintendent of schools, said he was informed about the children and the drivers of the six buses found shelter and that none had suffered from the storm. Snow plows of the state highway department pushed through deep drifts on highways and civilian conservation corps enlists and volunteers are working in an effort to open roads.

NEW SNOWSTORM FEARED IN EAST

Augmented crews rushed snow removal throughout the east today to free highways threatened with fresh snowfalls. The storm caused more than 70 deaths in New England and the middle Atlantic states and approximately \$2,000,000 in property damage. Transportation nearly normal, but thousands of persons were unable to reach work because they had abandoned on side roads and at the edges of main highways. LaGuardia field in New York and Newark airport in New Jersey resumed normal operations. Bus and train service throughout the section was reported to be normal except in minor instances. A threatened milk shortage in New York City was averted when trucks resumed work.

FDR CRUISES IN WARM WATERS

ABOARD THE DESTROYER LANS, Feb. 17 (AP)—President Roosevelt sailed into warm Caribbean waters today aboard the cruiser Tuscaloosa, still giving no indication as to his destination or plans. The mercury climbed all day as the cruiser and two accompanying destroyers moved into the tropics. Crews at the warships in the Gulf of Mexico wore summer white uniforms. Mr. Roosevelt beamed an order from the sun-kissed cruiser that federal aid to be extended the blizzard-stricken areas of Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island. The aid will serve as a designate immediate work program to assist those New England areas. Last night again, the ship's searchlights played continually on their American flags, identifying themselves for the benefit of any belligerent warcraft that might be in the vicinity.

Washington to Cooperate With Idaho on Fishing

BOISE, Feb. 17 (AP)—The state of Washington will cooperate with Idaho on fishing conservation action taken by the Idaho authorities, Idaho Director Owen Morris announced today. Morris also disclosed questionnaires have been sent out to conservation officers asking cooperation in a Pittman-Robertson wildlife survey which he described as "the first step in intelligent management of wild fowl and small game." Morris will also propose a basis for protection of waterfowl, fur-bearing animals and small game.

Between 300 and 400 Are Taken From Craft After Battle in North Harbor

LONDON, Feb. 17 (AP)—British destroyers, deliberately entering neutral waters, drove the German naval auxiliary ship Altmark ashore on the Norwegian coast, killed four of its crew and wounded five and rescued between 300 and 400 British merchant seamen whom they found battened down under its decks, the admiralty announced today. News of the audacious naval action was disclosed in an admiralty communique which said the British warships acted upon admiralty orders to enter Norwegian waters and rescue the prisoners.

GERMAN DEAD 15 AFTER FIGHT ON NORWAY'S COAST

OSLO, Norway, Feb. 17 (AP)—German dead aboard the steamer Altmark may reach 15, it was learned today. The British destroyer HMS Cossack, which was ordered to attack the German steamer ship Altmark, announced today that it had killed 15 German crew members.

Nazis Protest To Norway on Ship Selling

BERLIN, Feb. 17 (AP)—Germany sharply protested to Norway today over the British attack on the German ship Altmark. Authorized sources said the incident would have serious consequences. The protest, an authorized source said, "complained most sharply" against British infringement of Norwegian territorial waters and demanded that the Altmark be returned to the German government.

SOLON ATTORNEY CLASH IN DEBATE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 (AP)—Rep. Clare Hoffman, R. Mich., angrily told the Presman, CIO general secretary, to "keep your tongue in your head" during a heated exchange at a house labor committee session. Hoffman was testifying before the committee in opposition to proposals to amend the national labor relations act, known as the Wagner act. Hoffman said the CIO attorney had failed to answer a question by Rep. Albert Thomas, D. Pa. "I'll answer the question all right," Mr. Hoffman. Presman sharply retorted, "You can take care of business."

FINN TROOPS IN STEADY RETREAT

HELSINKI, Feb. 17 (AP)—Finnish troops have withdrawn from some points in the area of Kallio, between the gulf of Finland and Vuoksi under heavy Red army pressure. Heavy fighting continued, the communique said. While making a retirement on the Karelian Isthmus under heavy Russian pressure yesterday, the Finns claimed that northeast of Lake Ladoga several columns of Russians comprising about 100 armored sledges had been dispersed. Russian attacks across the ice of the gulf of Finland were broken up by guns in the Finnish fort at Koyvika, the communique said, and Red army detachments there were prevented from reaching an objective at Muurila.

Good Crowd
Another good crowd turned out to witness last night's games in which four teams chalked up victories in the four-hour session.

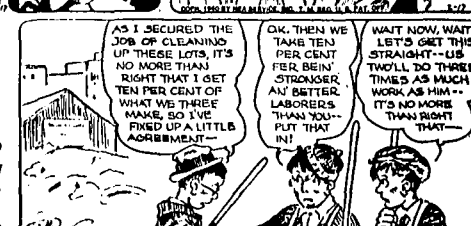
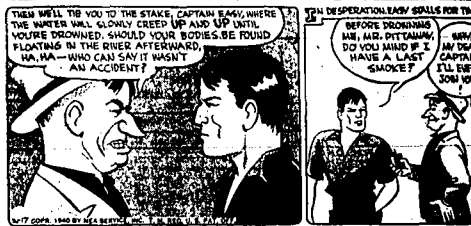

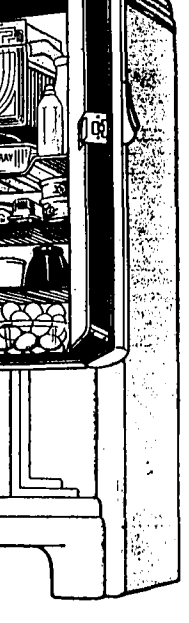
