Heart Attack Fatal To R. E. Leighton, 52

Unable to rally after a severe heart attack, Ralph E. Leighton, 52, Twin Falls county state representative in the 1939 legislature and former chief of police here, died at the U. S. veterans' hospital in Boise this morning.

Word of Mr. Leighton's death came from his wife, who was at the bedside when the former lawmaker succumbed. Leighton resigned his legislative post last July after Gov. C. A. Bottolesen urged him to accept appointment as special investigator for the state department of law enforcement. In that capacity he worked on an unsolved murder mystery in the Boise valley area.

The former representative had entered the veterans' hospital a week ago today, Feb. 15, for treatment of a cardiac ailment. He went to Boise after a short stay and his condition became worse despite treatment.

Mrs. Leighton said the body would be brought to Twin Falls for funeral services Saturday or Sunday. Arrangements for the services, she said, will be handled by Twin Falls mortuary.



Taken by Death

Leighton, a second lieutenant in the Second Idaho regiment, headed the Twin Falls police department from 1925 to 1933. At one time he was assistant postmaster in Twin Falls, resigning that position for Mexican border patrol service prior to outbreak of the World war.

Born in Idaho, Feb. 25, 1887, he came to Idaho in 1906. After the World war, Mr. Leighton worked for several years in the Idaho-Hazleton vicinity, and also engaged as one time in road construction work.

Since 1935 he had been in charge of the real estate department of the J. E. White realty and insurance agency.

One of the latest civic projects on which Mr. Leighton had been engaged was the proposed national guard armory in Twin Falls.

Survivors

Surviving him are the widow, Mrs. R. E. Leighton, his daughters, Mrs. Muriel Scott, federal employee at Boise; Mrs. Carrie Perosette and Miss Hazel Leighton, both of Twin Falls; Mrs. Lucille Leighton, a nursing student at Cornell university, Ithaca, N. Y.

ALLIES TO 'AID' NEUTRAL NATIONS

PARIS, Feb. 22 (UP)—A semi-official statement today warned that the allied powers would take the same measures whenever neutrals failed to uphold their neutral rights.

Discussing the position of Norway in the Altmork incident, the statement said that the allies take the view that Norway and other neutrals have no right to alter their territorial waters as a result of her inability to defend her own neutrality.

This, it was asserted, was shown not only in the Altmork incident but in other territorial and incidents resulting from the failure of neutrals to defend their own neutrality.

GERMANS REPAIR BATTERED CRAFT FOR DASH HOME

OSLO, Norway, Feb. 22 (UP)—German aircraft engineers started to repair the steamer Altmork today, under guard of three Norwegian torpedo boats, in preparation for a dash down the coast to Germany.

Possibilities of a fight at sea, or of a diplomatic dispute involving Norway, Great Britain and Germany, were seen in Paris reports that the allies had lightened their watch along the Scandinavian coast by withdrawing German ships movements in Norwegian waters.

The German steamer Wiegand arrived yesterday from the Altmork and to pull it off the rocks of Jossingen fjord where it grounded Friday night when British warships rescued 329 British seamen from it.

Refuge information from German sources and other authorities refused all information and for many hours there were conflicting reports. "Reliable" sources even said the Wiegand had no connection with the Altmork but took refuge in fjord because of fog.

Later it was asserted definitely the Wiegand had been seen in repairing and refloating the Altmork, and both vessels intended to make a dash for Germany within the next few days.

As soon as the Wiegand arrived, it was understood, a special crew prepared to repair the Altmork's damaged propeller and attend to other minor damage it suffered when it went aground.

WEIR NAMED GOP FINANCIAL HEAD

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (UP)—Roosevelt indicated today that he named D. M. Hamilton today, appointed Dr. W. E. Weir, steel executive and leading opponent of the New Deal, as the party's financial committee.

Weir, chairman of the board of the National Steel corporation and president of the Iron and steel institute, was a member of a special financial committee whose final report was submitted in 1939 and which Weir established his headquarters at Pittsburgh.

A heavy contributor to Republican war chests, he has taken a leading place among industrial foes of the Roosevelt administration.

Maybe It's a Washerwoman in Boat Crossing Delaware, But All U. S. Citizens Like Picture

NEW YORK, Feb. 22 (UP)—Duesseldorf Washerwoman Crossing the Delaware. This picture has never been definitely verified. Conventually, too, near Duesseldorf is a model river—the Rhine. And the local folks were willing to air, for Leitze, as is all too apparent from the unmistakably German faces on the boat.

War Closes in On Tiny Nations in Scandinavia

Europe's wars swirled closer ever today to Scandinavia. British warships and German U-boats were reported in or near Norwegian waters. One dispatch told of an air battle between unidentified planes off Norway, while across the North sea, royal air force planes shot down two more German aerial raiders.

A semi-official statement issued in Paris denounced Norway's failure to protect her own neutrality in the Altmork incident and said the allies would take the necessary steps whenever neutrals failed to uphold their rights. This, it was indicated, would mean halting of German iron ore ships off Norway.

Sweden ordered strengthening of her defenses as a result of the Soviet bombing of pajala and instructions were given for the shoring down of any possible danger to cross the border in the future. The Stockholm press demanded punishment of the Soviet bombers of Pajala.

SWEDES ASK FOR FULL PAY AFTER BOMBING HAVOC

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Feb. 22 (UP)—Asserting that a Russian airplane bombing of Pajala was "one of the greatest violations of neutrality ever seen," the newspaper Stockholm-Tidningen said today that the government in a protest to Russia had asked full compensation for damage done to Swedish property.

It was generally believed that Russian aviators flew down the Torne river and along the nearby railroad by mistake, believing they were over a Finnish river and railroad.

The Copenhagen newspaper Berlingske-Tidende, in a Stockholm dispatch, asserted that 13 hours before the raid an unidentified airplane plan to be Russian, flew over the town recognizing as claimed of Belgian planes flying over their territory.

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FINNS CALL OLDER MEN TO COLORS TO HELP DEFENSE

LINE CONTINUES TO HOLD; SOVIETS FIRE ON VIIPURI

HELSINKI, Finland, Feb. 22 (AP)—Finnish men of 45 and 46 years old were called to the colors today to prepare to join younger ones in holding off the Russian army.

Notices were posted in all streets ordering the men of the classes of 1894 and 1895, to report for training and duty at once.

The men called are part of the second—and final—reserve, which includes men up to 60.

Join Sons in Defense

They will join their sons who are among the 25 army classes now incorporated in the defense forces, ranging from 22 years up. In addition men of classes already called up who had been exempted for reasons of health had now been ordered to report for a new examination.

Plans awaited word from the Mannerheim line on the extent to which more had showed the Russian "unpleasant" offensive.

Timed for Celebration

It had been forecast since the attack started three weeks ago that it was timed so that, if it succeeded, the Russians would enter Viipuri, Finland's second city, tomorrow, which is the anniversary of the establishment of the Red army and navy.

At last reports the Russians continued to attack, but it was asserted all attacks had been repulsed and the Mannerheim line held fast. Fighting at some points had been continuing into the night before the snow started yesterday. The Russian attack along the Taipale river, at the Lake Ladoga end of the line, was reported to be even heavier than that on the west side near Viipuri.

BIDS CALLED ON COUNTY'S AUDIT

Bid call for the annual audit of Twin Falls county had been issued today by the board of commissioners, which set March 1 as the deadline for receiving proposals from qualified accountants.

The audit, according to the call for bids, is to include county offices as such, the hospital, the poor farm and indigent fund, and the county fair account. The annual audit report has been handled for the past several years by Middleton, McCarty and company, Boise. That firm is now concluding work on the final half of 1939 operations.

Three Phases

Call for the 1940 audit stipulates that the successful bidder must include one and may include all of the following:

1. For the period from Jan. 8 to July 9, audit to be completed and reported filed by next Nov. 1.
2. For the period from July 9, 1940, to Jan. 13, 1941, to be completed and report filed by March 10, 1941.
3. For the entire period Jan. 8, 1940 to Jan. 13, 1941, completed and report filed by March 10, 1941.

The board advised prospective bidders that audits will be required to be made in accordance with the uniform specifications governing audits of county accounts, as adopted by the bureau of public accounts of the state of Idaho, and in effect at the time of such audit.

Bids must include all accountant's expenses. No claim for expenses or extra service will be allowed unless authorized in advance by the commissioners.

As is customary, the board reserves the privilege of rejecting "any and all bids" if it deems them unsatisfactory.

Man Surrenders On 20-Year Old Forgery Charge

Suspect More Checks

In addition to the forgeries here and in Hazelton, the sheriff said, fraudulent checks at Buhl and at Burley may also prove to be the work of the same man. Two checks were cashed Feb. 17 at Hazelton, payable to A. J. Thompson and signed "E. A. Eastman" and "W. A. Baines." One was for \$12.40 and one for \$14.00.

A check for \$24.16 was cashed Feb. 18 at the Potter service station in Jerome, signed "W. A. Nebeker."

The man's checks were written on counter-blanks against the First Security bank, Jerome.

"Be extremely careful in cashing checks for strangers," Sheriff Johnson warned. "If a stranger presents one—and if his description tallies with that of this man question, communicate with my office or with the nearest officers immediately."

Description

The description as given by Chief Brownie Harmon, Jerome, is as follows: About 25 years old; blond; five feet seven inches tall; 140 to 145 pounds in weight; slightly bushy hair. When last seen the man was wearing a brown overcoat, was reasonably well dressed but wore no hat. He claims to be a university man.

Notation on one of the bogus checks, the sheriff said, contained a notation 88-376, purportedly the license number of the car the man was said to be driving. Check-up found this license from Washington county.

Watering System Nears Completion

JEROME, Feb. 22 (Special)—According to an announcement made today by Chairman Melvin A. Bishop of the Jerome county commissioners, the project of improvement of the courthouse grounds, including a modern underground watering system, attractive plantings of shrubbery and trees and a through driveway running from Second to Third avenue, situated in the rear of the courthouse, will be completed by the middle of April.

Approximately \$1,700 has been expended by the county in improvement of the grounds, while the WPA has furnished approximately \$2,700.

POLL SHOWS SOLONS FAVOR RECIPROCAL TRADE TREATY

CLOSE CONTEST FOOMS ON PLAN OF RATIFICATION

By RONALD G. VAN TINE
WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—A poll of the senate by administration leaders indicated today that Secretary of State Cordell Hull's reciprocal trade program would be continued another three years by a majority of eight senate votes.

The poll, conducted by prominent senate Democrats, was based on what is expected to be a major test in the senate—a move by opponents of the program to force senate ratification of each agreement. Only the President's signature is required now.

On that question, it was said, the senate is divided, 49 to 41, against ratification. Six senators were listed as doubtful, but administration leaders said they could obtain the support of four of them if necessary.

Hull Defeated

The bill to continue the trade program three years beyond the June 12 expiration date is being debated in the house which also is expected to pass it after defeating ratification moves. A vote on that issue will come tomorrow with final action scheduled for late that day or Saturday.

Although the trade agreements program had been highlighted as a major issue of the current session and still promises to be a key point in the presidential campaign, house debate was being carried on in an atmosphere of frivolity. Tuesday the house had to adjourn because of a lack of speakers, but in a usual situation among 435 politicians. Only a handful of members carried on yesterday—one Democrat and eight Republicans being all that remained when it came time to adjourn.

For some time it has been known that the final vote in both the house and senate would be along partisan lines. The poll by senate Democrats, which has been conducted secretly for more than two weeks, listed all Republicans, the two Farmer-Laborites, and the one Progressive in favor of senate ratification of trade agreements. Hull contends such procedure would wreck the program and be tantamount to returning to the old tariff procedure on tariff problems.

Ready to Push Bill

Forty-eight Democrats and one Independent, Sen. George W. Norris of Nebraska, were regarded against ratification.

The senate is ready to rush its work on the bill to continue the program as soon as final action in the house is taken. Chairman Pat Harrison, of the senate commerce committee will begin hearings next Monday with Hull and Secretary of State Cordell Hull as witnesses.

Despite the efforts of house leaders, Rep. Kent E. Keller, D., Ill., and Sen. Charles McNary, Democrat on the floor. He was opposed by only eight Republicans, but outvoted them to carry his own motion to adjourn.

2 GERMAN CRAFT ARE SHOT DOWN

LONDON, Feb. 22 (Special)—The air ministry announced today two German planes had been shot down in the raid along the east coast.

The first victim of the royal air force lightning craft was a German reconnaissance plane off the northwest coast.

Later, a Heinkel bombing plane was attacked by British fighters and crashed on land near St. Abb's head.

The Heinkel was one of the few planes brought down on the British Isles since the war started. St. Abb's head is on the border of England and Scotland, near Berwick-on-Tweed and south of the big naval base at the Firth of Forth.

The German planes bombed a trawler within half a mile of the Norfolk coast during the morning, but fled when the trawler fought back with a blast of machine gun fire.

The trawler proceeded on its way without suffering damage.

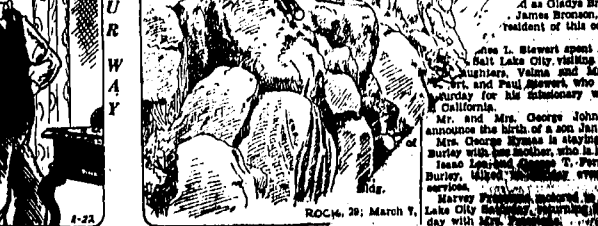

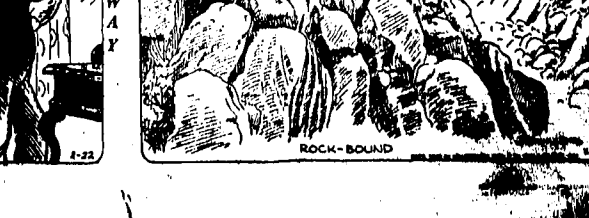
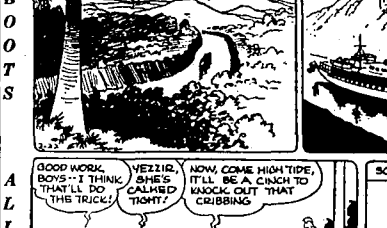

Citizens Own Only Quarter Of Idaho Land

MOSCOW, Feb. 22.—Publicly owned land in Idaho comprises 74.3 per cent of the state's area, leaving only 25.7 per cent under private ownership.

Farm lands in Idaho make up only seven per cent of the state's area, three per cent irrigated and four per cent dry land. Other privately owned lands in Idaho are divided in the following percentages: Grazing, 23.6 per cent; timber, 1.6; cut-over, 1.8, and miscellaneous, 5.3.

The federal government holds title to 66.6 per cent of all land in Idaho. National forests account for 37.2 per cent and public domain for 24.9 per cent. The state of Idaho owns 6.3 per cent of the state's acreage, counties, 1.4 per cent; municipalities, .03 per cent, and other governmental units, .01 per cent.

These figures, and enough more to make an ordinary person dizzy, are from "Basic Data for Land Classification," bulletin No. 222 of the University of Idaho agricultural experiment station series, recently summarized by Dr. P. A. Eke, station economist.

The statistical material presented in the bulletin accounts for the ownership of practically every acre of the 53,219,679 within the state of Idaho. The study originally was made in 44 separate county pamphlets as a WPA project primarily for data on tax delinquency, which Dr. Eke has included in his bulletin summary.

And it was Thomas Jefferson who said, "If the American people ever allow private banks to control the issue of their money, first by inflation and then by deflation, the banks and the corporations that will grow up around them will deprive the people of their property until their children will wake up homeless on the continent their fathers conquered."
