WALLACE SEEKS RESTORATION OF FARMERS' FUNDS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (U.P.)—Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace asked the senate today to restore \$240,000,000 cut by the house from President Roosevelt's farm budget for the next fiscal year.

He told the senate agriculture committee which is considering the house-approved agriculture appropriation bill that the reductions would be "false economy" and that "for every dollar saved, several would be lost."

The appropriation bill, as now before the committee, provides for \$87,000,000, a reduction, Wallace said, of \$171,000,000 below the 1940 fiscal year appropriation.

Entitled to Help
Farmers are entitled to adequate government help as a matter of justice, and, furthermore, they are entitled to it in the interest of general welfare, Wallace said.

He defended government subsidies to farmers as necessary to insure the production of any program which would continue to be productive in the future as it has in the past.

"I would like to raise the question whether the government should endeavor a program which has had such striking results as these farm programs have had," Wallace said.

"Can the nation afford to cripple the purchasing power which has contributed so largely to improved living standards and an increase in per capita income from \$40,000,000,000 to \$68,000,000,000?"

Aids Retail Sales
Wallace told the committee that every \$100 increase in income meant an increase of 474 in retail sales to farmers by city merchants. He said he believed city businessmen would oppose any program which would curtail their farm market.

Finns Hold off Reds Near City of Viipuri

WITH FINNISH ARMIES, AT VIIPURI, Feb. 26 (U.P.)—The ancient gateway city of Viipuri is a dead city today but the battle flag of Finland still flies from its old castle tower and Finns said that guns of the Kolivisto fortress still defied the Red army.

A tired but determined army is fighting within ten miles of Viipuri, after 25 days of battle against the Russian offensive up the Karelian isthmus.

Suit Against Hosiery Union In High Court

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (U.P.)—The supreme court today agreed to review the action in which the Apex Hosiery company of Philadelphia seeks \$111,932 for damages allegedly committed by the American Federation of Full-Fashioned Hosiery Workers (CIO) during a 1937 slowdown strike.

The case was carried to the supreme court by the Apex company, which was a federal district court damage verdict under the Sherman anti-trust act. The verdict was then set aside by the U. S. circuit court of appeals.

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Outdoor Play Spot Planned For Hatchery

An extensive improvement program, pointing toward a miniature recreational area for use of the general public, will be carried out at the state fish-hatchery grounds in Rock creek canyon. It was announced here this afternoon by Robert Whitel, member of the activity committee of the Southern Idaho Fish and Game association.

The plan, and three acres of land, is leased by the association which maintains active ownership.

The improvement program, Whitel said, will see installation of archery ranges as well as small bore and pistol ranges. Fly and bait casting layouts will also be provided.

Work on these improvements will start as soon as weather permits, probably during March. Features of the plan is that the general public will be welcome to use the various ranges and layouts at no cost, regardless of whether individuals are members of the association.

Two archery targets have been ordered by the association. Plans of the near future, Whitel pointed out, those using the ranges must furnish their own bows and arrows and also their own guns and ammunition. Targets will be available on the grounds.

In addition to this project by club members, plans are also being drawn for construction of a club house on the property. It is expected that the new sportsmen's home will be built this summer.

Nomads Can't Be Ignored

Ever since the first colonists had a chance to get their bearings, there has been migration over the American continent. The United States was built and welded together by restless pioneers who hated to see grass growing under their feet. They kept moving until they reached the Pacific ocean and couldn't go west any farther; so they settled around a while and finally settled down.

Even after the general tide of westward migration subsided, there were always substantial numbers of people who pulled up roots because opportunities at the old places had run out, and they set off to find greener pastures. There were jobs to go around almost everywhere and there was plenty of arable land, so no one cared when migrants came into a section to settle. For a teeming nation like the United States, a certain amount of population shifting was even desirable to balance normal industrial fluctuations and declines in certain areas.

When depression hit, it spread all over the country. Drought in the west and middle west further jeopardized the livelihoods of people in those sections. Americans had always been used to moving away when there was nothing left to do in the old place, and so they moved—millions of them.

What they didn't count on was that everyone else was moving, too, and that conditions in other parts of the land weren't any better than they were at home. People were no longer hospitable to migrants. Every newcomer was another competitor for the few jobs available. Certain states, more heavily invaded by the depression pioneers than others, found it necessary to pass laws, restricting the privileges of the newcomers.

Soon, the nomads found themselves worse off than they had been in their own homes. Not only had they lost their rights in the states they left, but they were unable to acquire new rights until they had lived in new states for long periods of time—in some cases, for five years. There was no work for them, and they were unable to get relief. Forced to keep moving, they became social outcasts—citizens without citizenship. Their children were deprived of educations, brought up with an unwholesome outlook on life in general.

According to Philip E. Ryan, who has just completed a study for the Russell Sage Foundation of New York, seeking population movements are likely to continue long after employment conditions improve. Natural conditions in several sections of the country make it impossible for all the people there to make a living. It has been estimated that between 1,500,000 and 6,000,000 persons will be forced to move from the old cotton belt if the rest are to earn their livelihoods.

Better welfare conditions for migrants, removal of some state barriers may eventually become necessary. Under any circumstances, some attention will have to be given this problem soon. It will not take care of itself. The matter requires some thoughtful planning.

BOOK TELLS OF WAR PREDICTION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (UP)—Bob Robert Lansing, secretary of state in Woodrow Wilson's war cabinet, and Gen. John J. Pershing predicted in 1918 that totalitarianism could be revived in Europe and that the world war might have to be fought again.

They opposed compromise "with the ruffian who brought on this horror and advocated complete annihilation of the German army. Only by crushing 'Prussianism' so completely that it can never rise again and by ending 'autocracy in every other nation as well' did Lansing believe future world peace would be assured.

These predictions were made today in publication by the state department of the second volume of Lansing's confidential papers covering the years between 1914 and 1922.

Throughout the correspondence was mention of incidents closely paralleling current day problems in the present war.

Heart Ailments Lead in Causes Of Idaho Deaths

BOISE, Feb. 26 (UP)—Heart ailments took a greater toll of life in Idaho last month than any other cause, the bureau of vital statistics reported today.

January figures showed 110 Idahoans died of heart disease, compared to 44 whose death resulted from accidents of all types. The report noted 39 deaths from cancer, 28 from influenza and pneumonia, and 32 from cerebral hemorrhage.

S. 21, Utah line to Pocatello; U. S. 20, Pocatello west to Hansen; U. S. 21, Hansen via Twin Falls to Bellevue, state 24 and 25, Rupert via Gooding to Bliss.
