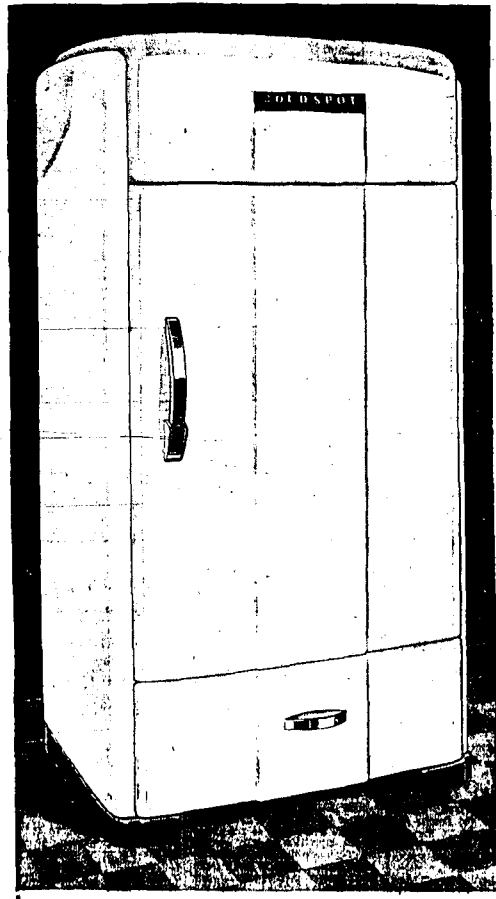

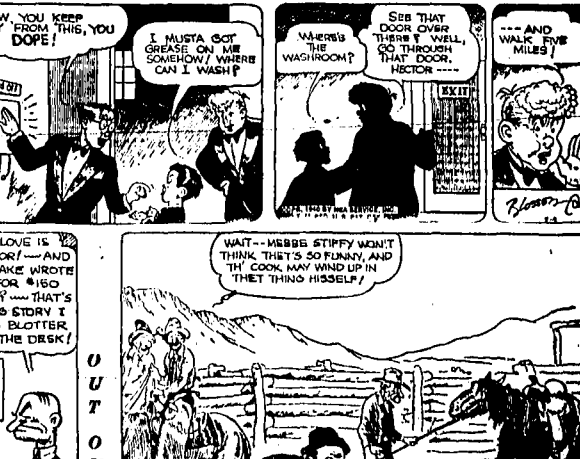

HERE'S OFFICIAL TEXT OF SOVIET-FINN TREATY

MOSCOW, March 14 (AP)—The official text of the Finn-Soviet treaty follows: ARTICLE I Hostilities between the USSR and Finland shall cease with effect from a protocol appended to this treaty.

ARTICLE II The state frontier between the USSR and the Republic of Finland shall be established along a new line in accordance with which the territory of the USSR will include the entire Karelian Isthmus with the town of Viipuri (Vilppuri) and along the coast of the Gulf of Bothnia and the northern shores of Ladoga lake with the towns of Kexholm (Käkisalmi) Sorvala and Suolaxi, a number of islands in the Gulf of Finland, the territory east of Merikari with the town of Kuoivajarvi, part of the peninsula of Rytachy and Siedry, in accordance with a map appended to this treaty.

ARTICLE III Both contracting parties undertake to refrain from any attack upon each other, not to conclude any alliances and not to participate in coalitions directed against the other party.

ARTICLE IV The Republic of Finland consents to lease to the Soviet Union for 30 years, with an annual payment by the Soviet Union of eight million Finnish marks...

ARTICLE V The present peace treaty comes into force immediately upon being signed and is subject to subsequent ratification. The exchange of ratification instruments shall take place within 10 days in Moscow.

ARTICLE VI As provided by the treaty of 1920, the Soviet Union and the citizens are granted the right of free transit across the Peltamo region to Norway and back. The Soviet Union is granted the right to institute a consulate in the Peltamo region.
