GANDHI DEMANDS INDIAN TREATMENT AS FREE NATION

WOULD WAIT FOR END OF CONFLICT FOR DECLARATION

TAMMARA HILLS, Ind., March 15 (AP)—Mohandas K. Gandhi, Indian nationalist congress leader, told the United Press today he is willing to postpone a declaration of independence for India until after the end of the European war.

He said, however, the fight for Indian independence would continue unless he expressed his definite post-war settlement. Britain would treat India as a free nation.

In this picturesque village, built especially for the current congress session, the Mahatma made one of the most important political speeches of his career.

Facing Tough Fight
Millions of Indians in the congress are arrayed against him in demands for immediate independence for India.

Wearing only a loin cloth and carrying a walking stick, Gandhi is seen to join him on an early morning walk.

ITALIAN EDITORIAL TERMS PEACE "STILL POSSIBLE"

WELLES SPENDS 45 MINUTES AT TALK WITH KING

 ROME, March 16 (AP)—The newspaper Corriere Padano, owned by Marshal Italo Balbo, owned by Balbo, said today in connection with Benito Mussolini's visit to Rome that peace in Europe is possible since the war has not yet entered a decisive phase. Special importance was attached to the editorial by authoritative Italian circles. It was handed to foreign correspondents immediately after Welles had conferred separately with King Victor Emmanuel and Foreign Minister Count Galeazzo Ciano. Welles will see Premier Benito Mussolini later today and it was probable he would talk with Ciano at the Vatican tomorrow. Balbo's newspaper said Welles' present visit to Rome was of much more importance than his previous visit only a fortnight ago, in view of recent developments in Europe and the settlement of the Russo-Finnish conflict. The United States has great authority in Europe and should play an important role in European peace, the editorial said. It described Welles as an "impartial, authoritative observer," reversing the former attitude of the Italian press, which called him a "Col. House." Welles' talks with Ciano and Mussolini and the projected conference at the Vatican were described by Balbo's newspaper as "diplomatic acts of international importance." Great importance was attached to Welles' conference with the king, because of its unusual length of 45 minutes. Because of his long talk with the king Welles was given minutes late for his appointment with Ciano, and also was believed to have indicated that his talk with the king had been unexpectedly important. American Ambassador William Phillips accompanied Welles at his conferences with the king and Ciano.
