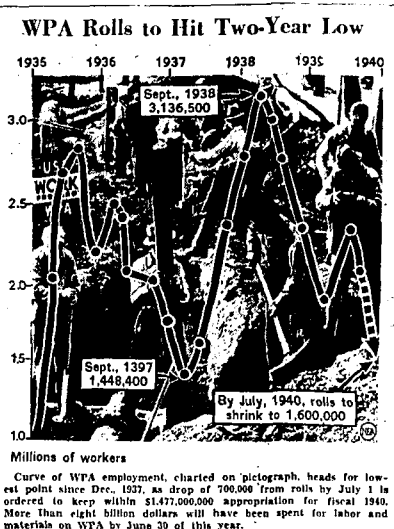

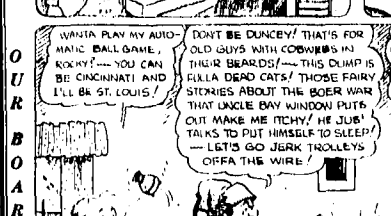

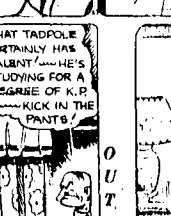

### COUNCILMEN ACT ON NEW RULINGS

Blain pointed out that this was being suggested in anticipation of the Eds. state convention to be staged here June 6, 7, and 8. He said that out of "cheering" by outside decorators.

### HANSEN RECEIVES GRANT ON WATER

Approval of a WPA project which will assist the village of Hansen having an adequate water supply was announced here this afternoon in a telegram received by the Evening Times from Senator D. Worth Clark.

Senator Clark telegraphed that the project was approved in the amount of \$3,239, the approval being given by President Roosevelt.

This afternoon, at Hansen, George Truett, a village official, said work on the new domestic system will get underway in the immediate future. The community's share of the improvement, or \$12,000, will be raised by a bond issue already approved.
