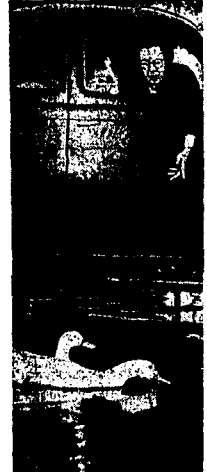

WASHINGTON, April 2 (UP)—A force of 120,000 enumerators began counting noses today for the 1940 census which is expected to show a population of 132,000,000 persons—an increase of about 10,000,000 since the last census in 1930.

TECHNOCRACY VS. COMMUNISM
Editor, Times:
In order to clear up some of the misapprehension in the average mind regarding the purpose of the founding of Technocracy, and why it cannot by its very nature have anything in common with Communism as is so often hinted, we herewith give you a short analysis.

Technocracy was founded in Columbia University and was originally known as the Technical Alliance of America, and later incorporated under the laws of the state of New York under the name of "Technocracy—Technical Rule," or "Rule by Technology." It was founded by some of our foremost scientific research engineers, for the express purpose of working out a solution for our present-day economic and social problems which Technocracy predicted 30 years ago would be experienced at this time and what would be the outcome.

Technocracy is not a product of the Communist or Utopian mind, dreaming, trying to appeal to emotions. There is a warning to all who will take the trouble to think in terms of Technocracy, and he claims, giving the facts and figures to prove them, showing why America has come to the crossroads, and what can be done about it.

Since Communism prescribes a leveling down to a standard level of wealth and intellectual attainment on the principles that all must labor for meager existence, signified by their symbolic emblem, the "hammer and sickle," it can be totally understood that it is the direct opposite to Technocracy's plans, which is as far superior to Communism as the automobile to the wheel barrow.

Technocracy finds, through the application of science and technology to hand labor, is becoming outdated, along with the price-system as an abundance of goods can now be produced in such volume that their value for monetary profit, which can only be derived from scarcity. Abundant production is over-ruling scarcity.

Technology displacing man-hour labor in turn destroys purchasing power, even though purchasing power is the oil for the wheels of industry under a price-system. When the oil runs dry the wheels cease turning.

When the purchasing support of buying-power is weakened, surpluses pile up, causing discharge of labor, and so around the vicious circle it goes, while politics keeps hiding away, trying to dig up some old time to pacify poverty and distress.

Technocracy's research staff found that 29 billion man-hours were employed in the year 1919, which dropped to 20 billion in 1929, and in February of 1939 with production at an all-time high, seven per cent above the high of 1929 were only employing about 11 billion man-hours, only one-third of the year 1919. A profound answer to the question why we have unemployment.

Labor, purchasing-power, interest profit and private ownership keep dropping with exhilarating speed, while the government keeps trying to keep the skyward route. I ask you, can such a policy bespeak sane and intelligent government, which we have a right to expect of such a modern nation as ours?

With an out-dated horse-and-buggy price system no longer able to function efficiently as a medium of exchange and distribution, Technocracy's plan would install a system of distribution by non-profit, non-hoarding credit certificates, distributing goods and services in line with a balanced load, doing away with poverty, crime, disease and criminal wastefulness. Such a system will have to be installed in the near future, to preserve mankind on this continent.

Zelka, think it over sensibly. We are not advocating an out-dated wheelbarrow system, for a modern, flying America.

MONEY POWER CRUSHING LIBERTY, JUSTICE

Editor, Times:
National defense is not a sword or a gun, but patriotism that will organize all political parties and justice, the stumbling block of all national problems, the greatest of which today is liberty and justice to the letting loose of the producers of wealth. I mean Wall street, the international bankers. Large associations of capitalists, the wealthy President Hoover and President Roosevelt referred to as a crisis more serious than war, because liberty and justice are not safe in the hands of usury or those skilled in grabbing dollars.

You can crowd the most peaceful man until he will fight and kill and starve the most righteous until he will steal and plunder. By the power of money monopoly, through the instruments of hunger, deprivation and starvation, man can be made to sell his soul for a crust of bread. If we were to forcibly enter a home and carry away groceries, clothes, cash and everything we could expect dire punishment but if a corrupt banking system decided to control the money market creating \$10,000,000,000 as they did in 1920, creating a depression which would deprive people of their jobs, causing them to lose all and be turned out into the cold, this would be lawful.

How can we account for the fact that in spite of our constitutional voting power we are supposedly free people, through our work in field, mine, workshop and office having created a wealth of over \$250,000,000,000 have allowed two-thirds of it to go into the hands of a small group of people whom President Roosevelt calls economic royalists who have powers to create depressions and by aid of the federal army can enforce their decrees?

The answer is that we live under political freedom but economic dictatorship. If you have had the distressing experience of being a father, skilled in his trade, of good health and moral standing, who has knocked at doors of employers for weeks and still is unable to find work, you will understand his lack of enthusiasm for freedom, liberty and a constitution. Would you blame 20,000,000 of these men whose political voting power for 150 years had failed to give them social security if they were to think they were taking nothing in giving any new political offer a tryout? Do you really believe that what happened in two other great countries, Italy and Germany, can't happen here? Do you think that human beings are creatures of a different make-up from those beyond the sea?

If you believe that the fundamental feelings of civilized men and women of nations are a yearning for love, friendship and security, then let us join together to analyze the reasons for the disastrous fact that 40,000,000 people in America are ill fed, ill clad, and ill housed. When we have found the cause, let us remove it and make an end of the terrible misery prevailing.

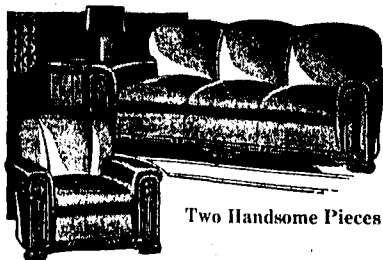

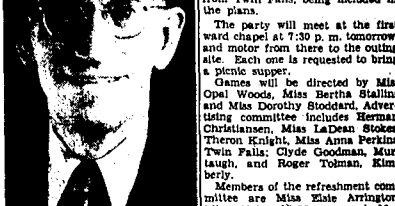
