GERMANS RETREAT IN SEAFIGHT

Murder Trial Goes to Jury's Hands

FATE OF FORMER MAYOR PONDERED BY 12 MEN HERE

When residents of the Magic Valley are seated around the dinner table this evening, 12 men will be determining whether they believe Duncan McD. Johnston did or did not murder George L. Olson, a Salt Lake City jewelry salesman.

They will be pondering the state's strong plea for conviction and death penalty, and the defense's equally vigorous call for acquittal to right an "injustice."

In all probability the jury—unless it fails to agree one way or another—will return a verdict shortly after midnight.

Long Defense Plea W. L. Dunn, chief defense attorney, ended an impassioned three-hour and 25-minute plea to the jury at noon. At 1:30 p. m. Robert Beckwith, assistant attorney-general for the state of Idaho, and the man who has sided Special Prosecutor Edward Babcock since the trial started 15 days ago, began his state argument. The initial portion was given yesterday by Mr. Babcock.

Beckwith spoke less than an hour and following this, Judge James W. Porter started the reading of the instructions to the jury.

With the reading of these instructions expected to take anywhere from 30 minutes to an hour, the case was expected to be given to the jury by 3:30.

During his arguments to the jury this morning, which he started at 1:30 a. m., Beckwith made the argument that was presented yesterday afternoon. Dunn declared:

Guilt of Innocence "I am not here to take you into anything. I am not here to talk you out of anything. We are not asking you to decide that anyone in this case is a murderer. It is a question entirely of the guilt or innocence of Duncan McD. Johnston."

At one time he said that "the person who put these things in that basement may not have been the murderer at all."

Regarding the circumstantial evidence which the state has presented in the case, Dunn declared:

"Are you going to say guilty on a state of mind which has brought in here?" and added:

"There isn't a single thing in all those articles of exhibits which was ever found in the personal possession of the defendant."

In closing, he said:

"By your verdict of not guilty an injustice will be righted. Thank you from the bottom of my heart for your kind attention to this case."

Beckwith, at conclusion of his portion of the state's argument, called on the jurors to "do your duty as to the evidence here. He called to their minds that Idaho has a death penalty statute and asked that they find the defendant guilty under that provision.

LATE FLASHES

STOCKHOLM, April 10 (U.P.)—A high Swedish authority said today that allied forces had recaptured the Norwegian ports of Bergen and Trondheim.

STOCKHOLM, April 10 (U.P.)—Telephoned messages from Malmoe said today that a major naval battle now was in progress in the Skagerrak between at least 10 German warships and troop transports and an undisclosed number of British warships and royal air force planes.

It was reported that two German warships already had been sunk in the battle.

LONDON, April 10 (U.P.)—Radio Stockholm tonight broadcast dispatches from Christiansburg, east of Oslo, saying heavy fighting was raging between German and Norwegian infantry.

The Norwegians were reported to be advancing near Eivertsen, north-east of Hamar, the provisional capital to which the Norwegian government fled yesterday.

The message said the Norwegians claimed successes near Kongsberg, south of Eivertsen.

LONDON, April 10 (U.P.)—The British admiralty in a statement, issued tonight declared operations off the Norwegian coast are still in progress.

Woman Lives After Bullet Enters Head

NEW YORK, April 10 (U.P.)—Mrs. Elaine Edralin, 18, picked up a pistol a boarder left in her home. Somehow it was discharged and the bullet ripped through her chest, puncturing her heart.

An ambulance surgeon, amazed to find the bullet still lodged in the Knickerbocker hospital. A hurry call brought Dr. William A. Fraser, one of the city's best-known surgeons, on the run.

Works With Speed Working with incredible speed, Dr. Fraser made an incision around the bullet wound. He cut four ribs away from the breast bone, severing the muscles so that he had a sort of trap door. He took the quivering heart in his hand.

A puncture of the left ventricle sent blood spurting with every beat. Dr. Fraser mounded for needle and suture, then he took a stab. Then he waited for another moment of quiet and took a second stitch. A third stitch closed the wound.

Blood Donated The loss of blood seriously weakened Mrs. Edralin. Her blood type had been determined the moment she entered the hospital. Dr. Morris Kleinberg, an intern standing by, knew his blood was the same. He climbed on a table beside the operating table, and a quart of blood was pumped from his arm into Mrs. Edralin's veins.

The hospital said Mrs. Edralin would recover completely.

JEALOUSY CAUSES DOUBLE SLAYING

PORTLAND, Ore., April 10 (U.P.)—Police said today George Woolver, 29, shot and killed Wilson Shaver, 29, and his brother, Russell, 18, both of Vancouver, Wash., today by cause of attentions paid by them to his former wife, Healee, 31.

The brothers called last night on the home of Claude Shaver, where Mrs. Woolver had lived since her divorce, to take Shaver's invalid mother to a hospital here. Woolver argued out of his car and fired a .22 caliber bullet into Wilson's chest.

Police said Woolver then plunged into the house, where he shot the younger brother.

200 Norwegians Killed in Battle

STOCKHOLM, April 10 (U.P.)—The newspaper Aftonbladet said in an undated dispatch today that 200 Norwegian troops were killed or wounded in heavy fighting against the Germans at Eivertsen, north-east of Hamar, the last reported Norwegian capital. The dispatch said the German casualties were heavy.

GERMANS ADMIT LOSS IN BATTLE OF TWO CRUISERS

BERLIN, April 10 (U.P.)—The high command announced today the German 10,000-ton cruiser Bluecher and the 5,000-ton cruiser Karlsruhe had been sunk in action off Norway.

It was announced most of the crew of both ships had been saved.

"Late yesterday afternoon," the communique said, "the German air force attacked and beat to destruction the two British cruisers which were intended to be used in landing troops in Norway."

It was announced the Bluecher first had been seriously damaged in combat with Norwegian batteries, and later she struck a mine field and sank after the explosion of several mines.

Karlsruhe Sinks The Karlsruhe was severely damaged "after overcoming strong enemy resistance and covering the landing of German troops at Kristiansund," the communique said, adding the Karlsruhe later sank.

It was announced four British battleships had been hit by two or three bombs each in the course of the general air fighting which was Norway's coast, and that two British battle cruisers had been hit by one bomb each and that two British cruisers had been hit, one by one bomb, the other by two.

German naval forces successfully protected operations in Norway against the British fleet, the communique said, adding the British flying boats of the Sunderland type was shot down, the high command said.

Operations in progress "Further formations are securing operations by patrolling the west coast of Denmark and Norway as well as in the Heligoland strait," it was announced.

"Further occupation of Norway is proceeding quickly and according to the plan," it was announced.

The Bluecher was the heaviest type of German cruiser, equal in tonnage to the British battleships. It carried eight, eight-inch guns; 12 four-inch and many smaller guns; and three airplanes. Naval records said it was the usual size of the class.

The Karlsruhe carried a complement of 371 men in total operations. It was armed with nine 5.9-inch, several smaller guns and two aircraft.

CRASH OF STOLEN CAR KILLS DRIVER

SHOSHONE, April 10 (Special)—Hunting over southern Idaho highways—sometimes at a speed of 80 miles an hour—an unidentified man, about 25, believed to be Carl Jensen, yesterday terminated a wild episode of speed and stolen automobiles in a crash on a desert lava bed, resulting in his death at 4 p. m. at the Haley clinical hospital.

The car, belonging to Richard Mahon, and stolen by the crash driver, was identified as a 1937 Chevrolet model when it was blew out on the road to the Craters of the Moon about 14 miles from Carey.

Deputy Sheriff Everett Quary, who was trailing the car after being notified of the theft by Mitchell and Havelly sheriff's forces, was a witness to the smash-up. He estimated that the car was being driven about 80 miles an hour.

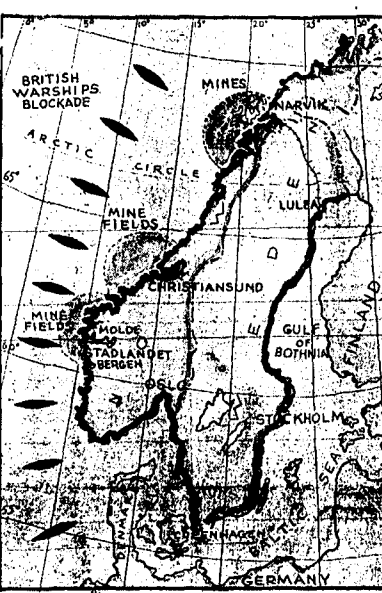

Biggest battle of the war to date was fought at Narvik, on the north tip of Norway, where allied craft were forced to withdraw after both sides had inflicted heavy damage to ship sinking.

Carey Farmers Plot Armed Resistance to Keep WPA Dam Work

HAILEY, Ida., April 10 (U.P.)—Carey valley farmers and land owners mobilized and planned armed resistance today if the works project administration attempts to remove equipment and machinery from the Little Wood river dam project near here.

At a meeting, the farmers voted to appeal directly to President Roosevelt to reopen the dam project ordered closed April 4 because sponsorship was below WPA requirements.

The farmers said failure to complete the dam this spring would cause complete crop failure.

Lewis Hoberia, project supervisor, and other WPA officials had assured farmer-sponsors April 2 that the project would continue on the same scale for 50 days, allowing ample time to complete the WPA action.

However, the dam project construction was halted two days later when state WPA officials announced suspension of the project.

Resistance to the WPA action was decided when farmers discovered that a 60-day period would be required before assistance would be obtained from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. They said that the project was too long and that the dam would not be completed in time to fill during the spring run-off, and projected crops would be the only result.

Forecast on Wheat Crop Shows Climb WASHINGTON, April 10 (U.P.)—The agriculture department today estimated 1940 winter wheat production at 428,215,000 bushels, reflecting an improvement in growing conditions since the Dec. 1 estimate of 399,000,000 bushels.

LONDON, April 10 (U.P.)—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain announced today two British destroyers had been lost and three damaged in a battle with six German warships at Narvik, where the British sank six merchant ships and probably one Nazi destroyer.

The English ships were forced to withdraw after their dash into the northern Norway harbor and their engagement with the German ships, which did not pursue them.

Three other German destroyers of the largest and latest type were "heavily hit and burning" and a seventh merchant ship believed to be carrying supplies for the German expeditionary forces in Norway was sunk by the British warships, Chamberlain said. The seventh merchant ship, the Ravensfeldt, was encountered as the British warships left Narvik. It was carrying ammunition.

The prime minister told the house of commons the five British destroyers were faced by six of Germany's most modern destroyers in addition to powerful fire from shore-batteries.

The prime minister announced that first lord of the admiralty, Winston Churchill, probably would make a statement in commons tomorrow on the general allied naval operations against German forces in Norway. He said he hoped by then to have "more information."

The British losses at Narvik were: Destroyer Humber, 1,240 tons with normal complement of 148 men, sunk; Flotilla leader Hardy, 1,500 tons, 175 men, run aground and wrecked; Destroyer Hotspur, (name as Hunter) seriously damaged; Destroyer Havock (name as Hunter) seriously damaged.

He said that a 1,600-ton German destroyer was torpedoed and believed sunk. The destroyers remaining were forced to withdraw.

"British destroyers attacked enemy forces in Narvik at dawn today and encountered strong opposition."

No Details of Casualties "His Majesty's ship Flotilla Leader Hardy, 1,500 tons, was sunk today at Narvik. The remainder withdrew. No details of casualties in these ships are available."

The admiralty also announced that a British submarine torpedoed a German cruiser off southern Norway last night, and was believed to have sunk it; royal air force bombers struck a German cruiser off Bergen last night and fleet bombers struck a German cruiser three times in Bergen harbor.

"Aircraft of the royal air force carried out a series of attacks yesterday evening against enemy cruisers in Bergen fjord," an air ministry communique said. "In spite of heavy anti-aircraft fire the attacks were pressed home. One cruiser was hit and seriously damaged. All our aircraft have returned."

This was said in notification British planes were flying from British bases to attack the German fleet off the Norwegian coast. Planes with the battle fleet are under admiralty administration, constituting the fleet air arm.

Dewey Defeats Vandenberg in Nebraska Vote; Burke Trails

OMAHA, Neb., April 10 (U.P.)—Nebraska Republican Sen. Thomas E. Dewey to Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg as a presidential candidate, returned from yesterday's preselection primary indicated today.

However, President Roosevelt, returning from a week's vacation in the Democratic primary, had polled 6,000 more votes than Dewey.

Mr. Roosevelt was apparently favored by the state's 41 delegates to the Democratic national convention, which carry out the presidential election, which is to be held in Philadelphia on June 4.

FDR WILL SCAN FOREIGN CREDITS

WASHINGTON, April 10 (U.P.)—President Roosevelt today adopted a policy of "rating" local industry on the status of federal credits that have been extended to Scandinavian countries.

# PRESIDENT HOLDS UP BAN ON NORTH COMBAT WATERS

## AWAITS CLEARING OF STATEMENTS IN SCANDINAVIA

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—President Roosevelt, taking charge of American problems created by Germany's invasion of Scandinavia, waited for later official reports from Europe today before extending provisions of the neutrality act to Norway and the "combat areas" to northern Norwegian waters. The President and the state department were hampered in making decisions by paucity of official dispatches from Norway, Sweden and Denmark.

**Delay Announced**  
Mr. Roosevelt had indicated he would issue the necessary proclamations last night. The delay was announced after he conferred with his foreign affairs advisers upon his arrival from Hyde Park. Secretary of State Cordell Hull revealed several high state department officials were devoting most of their time to considering the safety of more than 3,000 Americans in Scandinavia. Press reports of air raids in Norway increased official anxiety. Officials of the state and navy departments, and the maritime commission are studying ways of evacuating those who want to leave.

**Confer in Railway Car**  
Hull, Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles and Assistant Secretary of War Louis Johnson were at Union station when the President's special train pulled in last night. They hurried into the President's private car with last minute reports from Europe and conferred there for 15 minutes before accompanying the President to the White House.

While en route here, the President said the Scandinavian developments will cause many Americans to think about potentialities of this war in relation to the United States. He did not expect that statement and cautioned reporters not to attempt to read more than the obvious meaning into it.

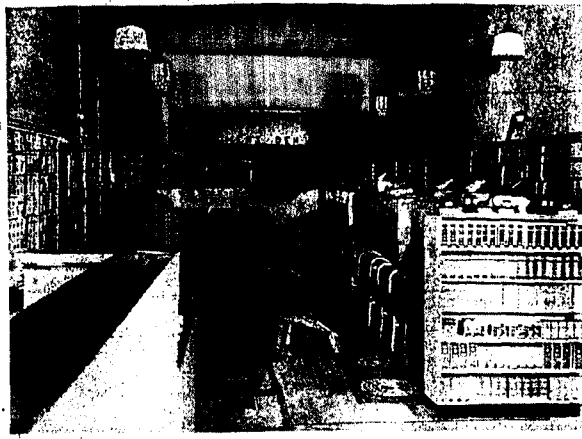

Lundten was joined by Sen. Robert R. Reynolds, D., N. C., who said that he would introduce in the senate today a resolution proposing that the United States purchase two French islands off the coast of Newfoundland.

The proposals of Lundten and Reynolds came amidst a chorus of demands from other congressmen that the United States keep a "cool head" and "hold off" the latest European crisis. The general reaction at the capital was that yesterday's events were regrettable, but that they emphasized more than ever that this country should stay out of the war.

## MEXICO RESENTS HULL STATEMENT

"These long-standing matters must of necessity be adjusted if the relations between our two countries are to be conducted on a sound and mutually cooperative basis of respect and helpfulness."

He proposed an "honorable" procedure of arbitration, suggesting all questions involved in the oil controversy be submitted to impartial arbitration, and all unadjusted

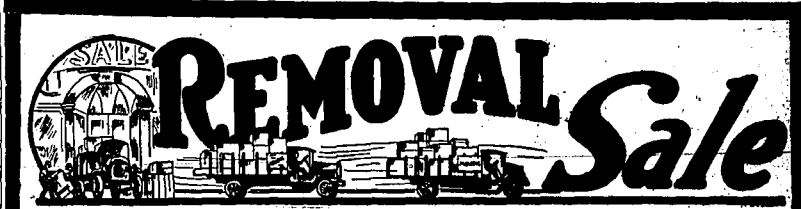
## Youth Pays Fine In Speeding Case

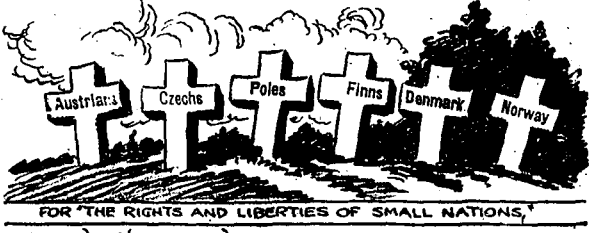

When Vander Meer turned in successive no-hit no-run performances two summers ago, McKechnie believed the Jersey youngster would take his place with the great left-handers.

Warren Giles, the Rhineland's general manager, had to take time off to personally manage Vander Meer's affairs. Now Vander Meer is practically forgotten. The last bit of confidence he had apparently has disappeared.

Writing along with a duff-bag in his duffle on the training trip the other day, he remarked, as though resigned to it all, "I still got a uniform, but that's about all."

"If they could get him out of the league," commented one of the Redlegs, "and send him to some minor league club where he could win consistently it might restore his mental equilibrium. But the way he is now, he swears over every pitch, he works himself into such a lather his eyeballs fairly pop out of his head with the exertion of a throw."

"It's too bad. He's a fine boy. But I doubt he has the stuff he had in 1938. He didn't have all of it last year."

**Needs More Than Arm**

Vander Meer's headaches developed at the Tampa conditioning camp a year ago. First it was old appendicitis trouble, then he was afflicted with flu. Next he complained of a sore arm... real or fancied... consulted specialists.

The answer to Vander Meer is that a pitcher has to have more than a strong arm to remain in the headlines. In addition to being wild, Vander Meer has not been a close enough observer of hitters and the game in general.

So in place of being a prospective 30-game winner, which he should be with his blazing speed and terrifying delivery, Vander Meer is worse off than he was when he broke in.

Speaking of prospective 30-game winners, the lone sure pop in the amazing Redlegs' line-up. Only a misstep of some kind will stop the Iowa farm boy this side of 20.

Right-handed, Bob Feller has all the left-handed Vander Meer had at his peak moments in 1938, and then some, not the least of which is poise and ambition. He pitches, talks, sleeps and eats baseball. He's a student from way back.

Red Ruffing was 10 for 10 for the fifth consecutive game, but also is two weeks on the one-time mine strike. He is the only pitcher in the league in a row with both clubs and works often enough to do it again despite Detroit's lead-footed Dutch batters. 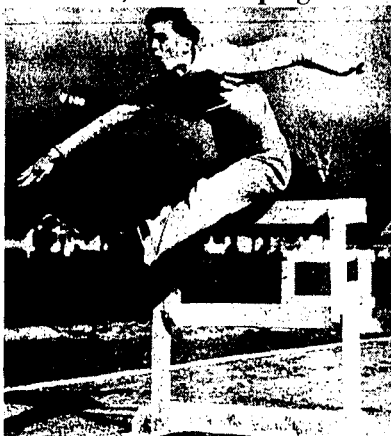

"Other work

"There is a numerous other work to be done as one good turn deserves another, and as the work goes on it becomes evident that other things should be done, and it all goes to complete the program that has been so nicely started, and it would be very poor policy to discontinue in the present unfinished stage.

"We feel that this camp cannot possibly complete the work it has started, and leave it in a condition that will remain short of one year.

"We therefore wish to register our remonstrance, and solicit your aid to this end."

### ARIZONA MINES HOLD WAR ORES

PHOENIX, Ariz., (AP)—Arizona contains supplies of almost all seven essential war metals and two war minerals which, according to the U. S. bureau of mines, are deficient in this country.

The bureau said a recent mineral survey conducted by the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers found a shortage of tin, nickel, manganese, chromium, tungsten, mercury, antimony and of such minerals as mica and quartz.

Although a shortage of these metals was reported for the nation as a whole, quantities of most of the substances are mined in Arizona, the bureau said.

Engineers who made the survey reported:

"That the United States produces only 1 per cent of its tin and that the country has to turn to the Far East for its source; that the nation produces only one-half of 1 per cent of its needed nickel, depending on Canada for the greatest share; that it imports all but 5 to 10 per cent of its manganese from Russia, Cuba and Brazil.

The engineers said the United States produces only about 50 per cent of its necessary tungsten, used in making tools for munitions, and that it imports the remainder from China. In the production of mercury, this country was able to supply 50 to 60 per cent of its demand and turned to Spain and Italy for the rest.

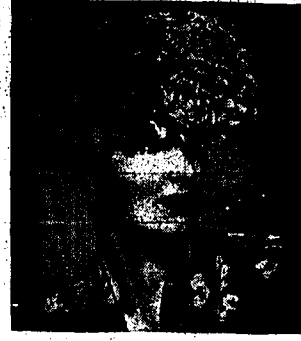
Only 15 per cent of the antimony needed for making crystals for radio and for alloy in bullets is domestically produced, with imports from China making up the deficit.

The report showed this country had virtually no quartz suitable for making crystals for radios and had to turn to Brazil for that important mineral. The domestic manganese supply takes care of only 20 per cent of the nation's needs, and imports from Brazil make up the deficiency.
