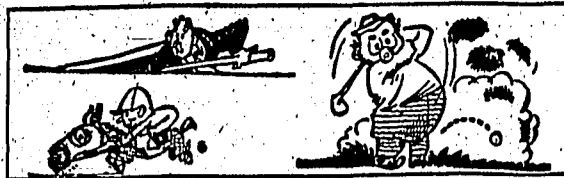

Yankees Fade Fast; Feller Allows Champs Only 3 Hits, Wins 4-0

NEW YORK, May 10 (AP)—The smart money hasn't entirely deserted the Yankees yet but it's getting off them mighty fast. Jack Doyle, Broadway betting commissioner, who quotes the official baseball odds, said today when he announced a revision in his pre-season prices.

The Yanks, despite their six straight losses and their present occupancy of the American league cellar, still are favorites to win the pennant, but the price has been trimmed in half. The Yanks opened at 7-20, the shortest-priced favorite in baseball history. Doyle today quoted them at 7-10.

Heavy wagers have poured in on the Red Sox and Indians and the prices on those two clubs have dropped sharply. Opening at 8-1, the Red Sox are now 12-5 while the Indians, opening at 10-1, have dropped to 4-1.

The Cincinnati Reds have moved into the favorite's position in the National league race. They opened the season joint favorites with the Cardinals at 11-5 each. The Reds have dropped to 8-5 while the Cards have gone up to 3-1. Brooklyn, third choice in the opening betting at 5-1, is now second choice at 2 1/2 to 1.

The Red Sox kept up their strident victory march yesterday by knocking off the Tigers for their fourth straight win, 6-5.

The Yanks plunged deeper into despair when they lost their sixth straight—4-0 shutout by Bob Feller, Cleveland's prize righthander. They didn't make a hit until the seventh when Joe DiMaggio scratched a single off Shortstop Bourdeau's glove.

Homers by Bloodworth and Pofahl paced Washington to an 8-3 win over the Chicago White Sox. The St. Louis Browns beat the Philadelphia Athletics, 4-2.

Brooklyn closed its western invasion with a 4-1 triumph over the Chicago Cubs in 10 innings. Tex Carleton, making his first start since his no-hitter, held the Cubs to four hits in eight innings but Newell Kimball, another ex-Cub, received credit for the win.

Bucky Walters scored his fifth straight triumph in pitching the Reds to a 4-1 triumph over the Boston Bees.

The Cards slugged an 8-4 victory over the Phillies and the Giants plastered a 17-6 disgrace on the Pirates.

COUNCIL REJECTS BURLEY PROTEST

BURLEY, May 10 (Special)—A committee of approximately 150 citizens met with the Burley city council Monday evening and presented petitions requesting the reinstatement of Ross Burkley, who had been discharged from the superintendent of the electrical department after working in that department for 18 years. Keen, construct residence, \$2,000; Sterling Bray, construct residence, \$900; Carlos brothers, remodel tourist cabins, \$3,000; Ralph Burt, construct residence, \$4,200; G. R. Boren, remodel residence, \$1,300; Roy Dunlap, remodel residence, \$1,000; Union Oil company, construct business building, \$500; Cassia Lumber and Seed company, remodel business building, \$1,000. Burley Herald was designated as the official newspaper.
