WPA CONSIDERS RING OF FLYING FIELDS AROUND U. S.

53 PROJECTS IN BORDER STATES GIVEN APPROVAL

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4 (AP)—The works projects administration is considering today plans for a ring of flying fields to "ring" the United States.

The relief agency is pledged to give priority to defense projects and a ring of airports in seaboard and border states is being studied. It was understood.

From July 1 to Aug. 24, 72 WPA airport projects were certified by the army and navy as having defense value. Of these, 53 are in seaboard states or states on the Canadian and Mexican borders.

In line with the WPA program to bring up preparedness drive by expediting defense projects, President Roosevelt approved 38 airport projects in same period. Thirty-one of these likewise are in more exposed states.

Military Approval

Five of the 38 were included in the 72 projects by the army and navy. Although the majority are new airports, some comprise work on established air fields.

Thirty-three additional airport projects, costing a total of \$18,055,571, have been approved by Mr. Roosevelt's construction by the army and navy with funds transferred to them by the relief agency.

Ask Certification

Local sponsors—states, counties, municipalities—have asked the WPA and the armed services to certify another 72 projects as having national defense value.

Plans to construct airports at strategic locations where planes could be based to repel any threatened invasion of the United States was seen in the list of 38 projects approved by Mr. Roosevelt.

SIGNS SHOW WAY TO FLYING FIELD

Motorists will no longer have to stop and ask "where is the airport" officials of the Twin Falls unit of the Idaho Pilot's Association said today.

Reason is that directional road signs have been placed on both sides of the highway leading to a field about six miles south of the city. The signs, similar to those used by the highway department, have been placed at advantageous points through cooperation of the state highway department, the Twin Falls Highway district and city officials.

LUKE AND PINK NAMED TRUSTEES FOR TWIN FALLS

Dr. O. T. Luke and Ralph Pink were elected to the Twin Falls school board in an election conducted here yesterday, reports showed today.

Dr. Luke polled 116 votes to succeed George Ward on the board while Pink received 150 votes in the election. A write-in candidate, Harry W. Barry, Twin Falls insurance man, collected a total of 106 votes after he had been nominated as a candidate in the election and had announced his withdrawal.

Both of the newly elected trustees will assume their duties at the next regular meeting of the school board scheduled for next Monday night. Pink succeeds himself on the school board.

Bickel school voting for the precinct south of Shoshone at Bickel, the heaviest in the election. A total vote of 122 was recorded at Bickel. Distribution of the ballots was as follows: Pink 87, Luke 63, Barry 52, and A. J. Peavy 1.

A total of 94 votes was cast at Lincoln school in the precinct north of Shoshone street. Pink received 63 votes, Luke 51, Barry 43. Total vote recorded in the election was 216 ballots.

In addition to the election conducted in Twin Falls, school board elections were held yesterday at Jerome, Rupert, Monticello, Buhl, Burley, Gooding, Hollister, Filer and Hansen. Results of the elections are listed below.

Jerome
Two write-in candidates were elected to positions on the Jerome school board here yesterday over another pair of candidates on the ballot for trustee positions.

Elected were Ethel Phoenix and F. E. Peterson, both write-in candidates.

William Meiser, seeking reelection, was defeated as was John Hoaman. A total of 329 votes was cast yesterday what is believed to be a new record in Jerome school board elections.

Results of the election included Ethel Phoenix 188, Peterson 183, Meiser 111, and Hoaman, 105.

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JAPANESE PILOT INDO-CHINA RAID

SHANGHAI, Sept. 4 (UP)—Chinese quarters believed today Japanese troops would invade French Indo-China this week, transferring Chinese-Japanese hostilities to that rich French colony. China has warned formally Chinese troops immediately would counter a Japanese invasion of Indo-China with an invasion of their own.

Reliable quarters said Gen. Kauli Nishanah chief of the Japanese million in French Indo-China, had advised the Indo-China colonial government Japanese troops would enter the French colony on Friday.

Reduce Garrison

Authoritative quarters said that during the last two weeks the Japanese had reduced drastically their north and central China garrisons apparently were sending the troops to Hainan Island, off the southeast coast of China, in readiness to invade the French colony.

As a result of the reduced north China garrisons guerrilla warfare has broken out on a greatly increased scale.

The China Mail of Hong Kong reported a Japanese fleet was cruising off French Indo-China, blockading the entire northeast coast and halting all vessels in the area.

No Arrests

China believed even if the Japanese established a foothold in Indo-China, it would take them several months to create effective air bases on the Yunnan frontier because much clearing and blasting of tropical forests would be necessary.

The reported decision of the Japanese command was understood to be the result of a rejection by the French government of a demand of a Japanese ultimatum which Indo-China authorities had referred to it.

There was a threat of grave trouble not only in Indo-China but in the international situation here as the result of France's collapse and Japan's increasing interest in its new expansionist policy, in French and Netherlands colonial territory.

Dominican Republic Boss Bans War Talk

By THOMAS J. B. WENNER (NEA Special Correspondent)

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic—Citizens of the Dominican Republic incur the displeasure of their 10-year benefactor and virtual dictator Dr. Rafael Leonidas Trujillo Molina, if they even discuss the European war.

This surprising decree has been issued at Ciudad Trujillo, capital of the Caribbean doorstep neighbor of Uncle Sam. It applies to members of the Generalissimo's party, only legal political group in the nation, enrolling 374,000 of the 400,000 eligible voters.

I asked the director of Public Relations for an explanation of this decree. He replied:

"My immediate chief and our great benefactor, the Generalissimo, is an ardent advocate of Pan-Americanism and a friend of the United States. He does not wish to have his job made more difficult at this time by those who hold sentiments at variance with the declared policy and interests of the country. The Dominican Republic will follow the lead of Washington in its foreign policy."

No Law

"It is not true that a law has been passed forbidding everybody to discuss the war, but an agreement has been reached by the party to this effect:

"Generalissimo Trujillo calls the times here and his party direct policy with a high hand.

Now Dr. Trujillo advanced through the army became president of the republic in 1930.

He was re-elected in 1934 and two years later the national congress changed the name of the capital from Santo Domingo to Ciudad Trujillo in his honor.

He is no longer president, but he still holds a hard power and an able administrator, he believes in suppressing opposition severely.

Like certain other modern dictators he prides himself on eating and drinking sparingly. He does not smoke. He describes himself as a soldier by profession, a farmer by nature and a breeder of fine cattle by avocation.

A lover of peace, the Generalissimo nevertheless believes in the virtues of a military discipline for youth and the wisdom of long range preparedness.

Small Army

The Dominican Republic has a standing army of about 4,000 men, reasonably well equipped and modernized since its organization in 1920.

The navy is made up of one-military transport of 2,600 tons and several coast guard vessels with anti-aircraft equipment.

The air force comprises about 25 planes—training and pursuit ships, together with several Curtiss and Douglas transports.

It isn't a very formidable contribution to hemisphere defense, but Dominicans say their government is perfecting the armed forces.

"If each small country in this hemisphere does its part," they say, "the whole may add up to security. The Dominican Republic expects to do its bit."

"Secretary of State Hull in his annual message to Congress (Hull is Prime Minister Winston Churchill) declared he greeted this move with pleasure. For us that is only natural in view of the well known unselfish solidarity of the two democracies."
