Britain Accepts Hitler Challenge With Raids in Berlin Area

GERMANY SENDS BIG AIR ARMADA TO BLAST ISLES

Great Britain defiantly accepted Adolf Hitler's challenge to meet aerial war today when Prime Minister Winston Churchill promised increasing British power would crumble the Nazi empire.

Addressing a session of the house of commons that was interrupted by aerial battles over London area, Churchill warned heavy lightning would be expected in the middle east and that German bombardment of Britain would be greatly increased this month.

Headlines of the papers' threats to "raise" British cities royal air force planes again swarmed over Germany, causing a two-hour air raid in London, blasting an army storehouse and dropping a bomb in the famous "Terrace" in the city.

More than 50 British bombers and fighters had been shot down in the hours before daylight. London district region 100 bombs fell. In another section of the Metropolitan defense area 50 bombs were dropped in 10 minutes.

So many German planes were shot down that defense leaders went into action near secret anti-aircraft batteries.

British planes, which were counter-attacked by Italian planes which were reported to have shot down a British bomber.

In addition to the Dodecanese fighting, which brought the war closer to nervous Greece, the high command reported violent aerial bombing of three British cruisers and two destroyers off Algeria.

CHURCHILL SEES INCREASED FURY IN NAZI ATTACKS

LONDON, Sept. 5 (AP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill warned Britons that the German air raids would be "magnified and multiplied" in a bid for victory this month, but that Adolf Hitler's empire would stay away perhaps more swiftly than did Napoleon's.

The Nazi leader, Churchill declared, suffered a setback when the United States traded 50 over-age destroyers for leases on British naval bases in the Atlantic ocean and will "no doubt" pay the United States off if he gets a chance.

Churchill, taking up Hitler's challenge, said that he had confidence that Britain would beat Germany in a contest of nerves, will power and endurance because Britain was becoming stronger daily.

Speech Delayed The prime minister addressed the house of commons on the prospect of intensified air attacks when London was under an air alarm that delayed the beginning of Churchill's speech.

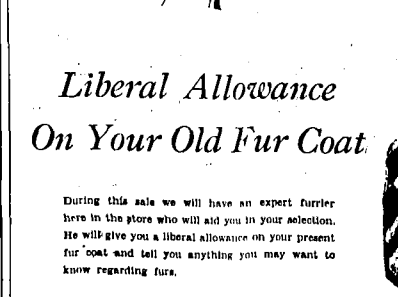

GERMANS BOMB 50 BRITISH TOWNS IN NIGHT RAIDS

DEFENSE PLANES DRIVE BACK BIG NAZI AIR HORDES

LONDON, Sept. 5 (Special).—German planes were driven back from an attack on London today by anti-aircraft fire and fighter planes after a night during which they had bombed 50 English towns and rural areas with unprecedented fury.

Splitting into small formations in an attempt to break through the anti-aircraft barrage, the German planes came up the Thames estuary. An air raid alarm was sounded in the London area at 10 a. m., first since the "all clear" had been given at 10:45 last night at the end of eight days.

A blast of gun fire was heard on the outskirts of London, and reports came of raiders over the Midlands and southwestern England.

The "all clear" came in London at 10:48 a. m. Within a few minutes of the alarm British fighter planes were up and in action.

Firing Heard
The staccato of machine gun fire was heard as the planes engaged, far above a river haze. Firing continued for a few minutes and the British planes, coming down, could be seen lazily resuming their patrol. The Germans had gone home.

During the night people along the southeast coast were startled from sleep by explosions from the French side of the English channel as royal air force planes blasted German objectives. So great were the explosions that houses were rocked in a southeast town. Bursting bombs, anti-aircraft fire and searchlights lighted up the channel, strong fumes of oil blew across the channel, causing belief the British planes had blown up a big German oil depot.

German planes in the night had followed through on Adolf Hitler's threat to "utterly erase" British cities.

100 Bombs Dropped
More than 100 bombs were dropped on greater London area alone and a United Press correspondent heard 50 bombs strike within 10 minutes in a southeast inland town within the greater London defense area.

But the German raiders, as they suddenly intensified their attacks, met a suddenly intensified defense. Hundreds of anti-aircraft guns in the London area alone, long held immobile in concealed emplacements, sent up a blast of fire which witnesses asserted formed a wall of flame in the sky.

Official reports were that six raiding planes were shot down over greater London, to make a 24-hour total of German planes destroyed 50 against 11 British fighter planes. The pilots of five of which landed safely.

Furious Activity
There was furious activity by planes, anti-aircraft guns and searchlights through the night over all the southeastern area of England.

Nazi planes singly and in flocks ranged the entire country, however, dropping bombs on towns and farm-lands and country villages.

For days past the Germans had used incendiary bombs expensively. In the new raids, however, they used mostly high explosive bombs.

Official reports were that damage was remarkably slight.

Achievements of the club's beautification program included not only the placement of the waste containers, but inauguration of the movement against business houses sweeping debris from stores and gutters into the streets and gutters and the development of the public consciousness to the need of a well kept city.

The club will support a move to enforce the city ordinance requiring the covering of all loosely piled debris in trucks to prevent it from falling on the streets. The ordinance also calls for all refuse to be placed in sealed containers, which point will also be stressed by the club as a measure to insure beautification and health.

I. G. Prescott, city garbage collector, asks all householders not to throw cans and other material in containers to be picked up so as to be more accessible.

George R. Hunter, Deadwood, S. D. Rotary club president, spoke briefly on the program. Other guests included Bill Smith, Rotarian from Bushman, and G. W. Sandler, Salt Lake City.

FLOOD RECEDES IN MIDDLE WEST

TULSA, Okla., Sept. 5 (Special).—The Arkansas river was slightly above flood stage on a 100-mile stretch in eastern Oklahoma today, but engineers said a serious inundation would be averted unless further rain falls.

The downpours that yesterday choked tributaries, blocked highways and forced farm families from the lowlands had ceased. Showers were predicted, however, and 40 national guardsmen were ready for rescue work.

The river crest was rolling downstream rapidly as small streams began to recede. Damage from the cloudbursts and floods was estimated tentatively at \$500,000. The figure included a \$50,000 loss at Cleveland, where the pump station at City Lake and a portion of the dam were swept away.

Hundreds of refugees still were quartered at Sapulpa, Bristol and Tulsa. Many spent the night in stalled railway trains. Officials said it would take several days before normal tides and bus service could be restored.
