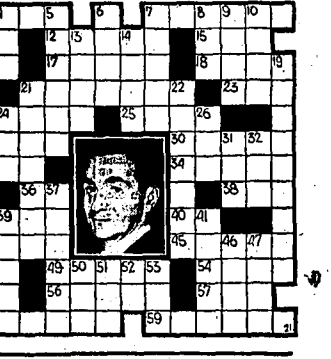

The man who delivers our milk, the boy who follows him with the morning paper, the conductor on the inbound trolley car, the white clad chef at the "coffee aid" counter and the clerk in the cigar store agree — it's Washington this year.

The men who make football their business, men like Coach Bob Hollinger of Washington State and Coach Tex Oliver of Oregon, also agree — it's Washington in 1940.

The few dissenting voices came from those who think Howard Harding Jones will lead his U. S. C. Trojans into the Rose bowl for the third straight time.

And a few — a very few — hold that Len Stinner's heavy, experienced Oregon State team might finally crash through.

Jimmy Pielien's University of Washington team has been the favorite before, but only once in the last decade, but the Huskies made it. Something always seems to happen to the boys from the banks of Lake Washington. Injuries, alumni sniping, dissension, faddosmas of key players.
