WILLKIE RAPS ROOSEVELT "BLANK CHECK" CAMPAIGN

GOP NOMINEE TO GIVE EASTERNERS REPORT ON TOUR

ABOARD WILLKIE TRAIN, EN ROUTE TO NEW YORK CITY... headed east today to report to the Republican party on his efforts to win support of Democrats and independent voters in 18 western states which twice have cast their electoral votes for President Roosevelt.

He ended his western stump tour at Madison, Wis., last night with a charge Mr. Roosevelt's administration was attempting to reject itself for a third term with "blank check" appointments. The President observed the forms, but disregarded the substance of democratic and constitutional government.

Willkie will stay in New York less than 24 hours before turning west again beginning Tuesday with an appearance at South Bend, Ind., early Monday and continuing east across Michigan to Detroit where he speaks Monday night before the National Federation of Women's Republican Clubs.
