5,757 Register in Twin Falls County

Twin Falls county enrolled 5,757 young men in the selective service draft registration and several more registrants were being accepted today on presentation of valid records, County Clerk Walter C. Musgrave, Twin Falls draft board chairman, announced this afternoon with completion of the check-up on cards filed out Wednesday.

The total for the Twin Falls county area No. 1, centered in Twin Falls, was 3,704 and the figure for area No. 2, headquartered at Bluff, was 2,053.

Two This Morning
Two additional registrants signed this morning. Several others—including such cases as that of a truck driver whose vehicle broke down on the road—will be registered late.

Any writful refusal to register in the Oct. 18 nationwide enrollment, however, will face prosecution.

No such instances have been brought to light thus far. Chairman Musgrave said today.

"We have been advised of no deliberate evasion," he declared, "although it is unofficially reported that one man voted conscientious objection to registering. However, he did register."

That case was said to have occurred at Hollister.

Jail Inmate Forgiven
One of the men permitted to register this morning was a city jail inmate who was apparently forgotten in yesterday's rush.

One registrant enrolled on schedule but lacked this notation at the bottom: "I will not serve in a conscripted army."

No Evasions Listed After Registration

BOISE, Oct. 17 (AP)—An extremely heavy registration boosted Idaho's potential conscript forces to between 90,000 and 100,000 men, state selective service headquarters reported today.

Lieut. Col. Norman B. Adkison, supervisor of registration, said reports from most counties indicated an increase of about 15 per cent over the number expected. Original war department estimates gave Idaho a potential total of about 78,000 men.

Adkison credited the increase to the large number of transient laborers now working sugar beet fields and increasing live crops.

"There was no resistance, no unpatriotic demonstrations and no evasions to registration in Idaho," Adkison declared.

The unexpected rush to registration booths strained facilities for handling the potential conscripts. In agricultural centers of the southern part of the state and in lumbering and mining districts of the north, county clerks called throughout the day requesting additional forms.

State police and representatives of selective service headquarters were rushed to various points to distribute additional supplies.

Adkison reported registration was unusually high in Canyon, Twin Falls and Shoshone counties. Latah county registration, including 1,000 men, was 1,200 more than expected; Twin Falls county district No. 1 registered 3,704 men and district No. 2, 2,053 men for a total of 5,757 men.

Reports from remaining counties were expected to be received late today.

Late FLASHES

ABRAHAM WILKIE TRAINED IN ROTARY TO BE LOYAL, Oct. 17 (AP)—Republican Presidential Nominee Wendell L. Willkie today called upon President Roosevelt to add further material aid to Great Britain immediately.

"The New Deal record of delay and procrastination in the building of our own defense is a formidable obstacle to aid to Britain that we must hope to see in the immediate future," he said.

"If there is substance to these stories—and I have seen no denial from the administration—then I should like to ask what is holding up any effective aid to us now possible to give immediately."

Bloodied Pitchfork, Missing Man Bring Search Near Hansen

A blood-stained pitchfork, patches of clotted blood near a haystack and the unexplained absence of a Hansen farm worker combined today to place before Twin Falls county officers what might prove to be a murder mystery.

The missing man is Al Hyder, about 46. Wide search for the man last night and early this morning failed to produce any sign of his whereabouts—or of his body—Sheriff I. W. Hawkins said this afternoon.

"The pitchfork, its long handle covered with a thick coating of blood, was held at the sheriff's office pending analysis to determine whether the blood is human. Analysis will also extend to the blood clots found near the haystack on the Frank Trunkey ranch, where Hyder was employed."

Officers said they could make no announcement "as yet" concerning the type of blood.

The pitchfork was found at about 5:30 p. m. yesterday by Mr. Trunkey on his farm one mile south of Hansen.

In Hay Field
Trunkey found the fork in a hay field with Hyder had been handling hay from a stack on the ranch. The farmer told officers he had noticed the pitchfork and its handle stuck in the hay. When the team started to trot up the road, however, he ran over and stopped the horse.

The bloodstained pitchfork was stuck into the hay on the end of the stack.

Hyder was last seen about 1 p. m. yesterday, Sheriff Hawkins said. The officer's only comment, pending blood analysis and full investigation, was "The circumstances are decidedly mysterious."

The blood clots near the haystack were found from where the hay stack and pitchfork were found. The blood was described as being of "considerable size."

Wide Search
Extensive search for Hyder was mounted immediately by officers. The sheriff and his wife, state police patrolmen and many neighbors living near the Trunkey ranch joined in the concentrated hunt. Although the search went on until about 1 a. m., today, no trace could be found of Hyder dead or alive.

No signs were discovered of any slaughtered livestock whose blood might have been used in making the handle of the pitchfork.

WISE TO QUIT AS CAA INSTRUCTOR

Jack Wise, aviator who has been instructing CAA flight school students here as well as handling ground school classes, will withdraw from that work with completion of the present flight class. It was announced here this afternoon by Milton L. Powell, Chamber of Commerce aviation committee chairman. Powell communicated that fact to L. W. Lawrence, chief of the purchasing and traffic section of the civil aeronautics administration at Washington. He also forwarded to Mr. Lawrence a letter from Wise in which the Twin Falls aviator advised CAA that "I contemplate accepting either airline flying or aviator instructor work."

The pilot said he has had several offers in both fields.

Wise recommended as his successor in the post-office aviation program here Frank Giesler, Twin Falls businessman and flier. The Chamber of Commerce advised its approval to the recommendation and it was dispatched to Mr. Lawrence at Washington.

Giesler is now in Boise taking a "refresher" course. If approved as instructor here by CAA, he will take the post-office aviation program here. "Contract between Mr. Wise and the present flight school class will be terminated," Powell said.

Wise is resigning, new contracts will be drawn by CAA for signature by the flight school and the new instructor.

BRITISH PLANES FIGHT OFF NAZI DAYLIGHT RAIDS

LONDON, Oct. 17 (AP)—British fighter planes ranging a wifly through the clouds over southeast England fought off strong German aerial squadrons today in many short, fierce aerial battles.

Only a few Nazi bombers blazed a path through the strengthened British defenses as Hurricane and Spitfire fighter planes coordinated their counter-attack with heavy anti-aircraft fire from the ground.

One German squadron dived through the clouds and attacked a southeast town's shopping district with a score of bombs, causing damage to buildings and about 10 casualties, but the main enemy formations were driven away from London during morning air raid alarms.

Seek Shelter
Many Londoners were forced to seek shelter while standing in the streets, waiting police permission to pass through zones in which time-bombs lay, in order to get to their offices.

During the night German bombs struck two southeast England hospitals, killing one nurse and wounding many persons in one hospital. Bombs continued dropping as doctors and nurses worked to remove patients from debris. In the other hospital, one for mental cases, two patients were wounded.

Dig for Bodies
After 38 hours, rescue workers still dig for bodies in the ruins of London schools, including one in which an unknown number of people had been buried. About 40 bodies were rescued alive yesterday, but it was feared that all still in the ruins were dead.

Thick, low-hanging clouds, mist and rain during the night kept Londoners from seeing the German planes were heard frequently over the city during the night. Bombs were dropped, and most of these were dropped in the outskirts.

Number Draw Slated Week of Oct 26. to Nov. 2

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—Selective service officials today directed the nation's 6,300 local draft boards to speed preparations for the next big draft step—the national lottery.

The lottery for the draft will be called to be classified and possibly inducted into the armed services for a year's compulsory military training.

Time and place of the lottery—except that it will be held in Washington—have not been fixed definitely. Present guesses are that it most likely will come between Oct. 26 and Nov. 2.

The drawing will be colorful, accompanied by much fanfare. Notables, headed by President Roosevelt and his cabinet, are expected to attend.

UTAHN HELD FOR SLAYING BROTHER

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 17 (AP)—Police today arrested J. Keith Anderson, 31, Salt Lake City, for first degree murder in the death of his brother, Glade E. Anderson, 28, near Jackson, Wyo., Oct. 8, and said the older man had contracted obtaining six fraudulent insurance policies on the victim's life.

The younger brother was killed in a fall from a precipice in the Tetons mountains while on a photographic expedition. He was revealed to be carrying insurance policies with a cash value of \$40,000.

Sherman Palkenrath, Salt Lake City chief of detectives, said the older Anderson's arrest culminated an investigation begun nearly two months ago when a local insurance firm wrote a \$2,000 policy carrying a special double indemnity clause.

Ready for Appeal
Palkenrath said detectives traced the activities of both men, and were nearly ready to make an arrest when the younger Anderson was killed.

He said that in all instances Keith Anderson had obtained insurance by posing as his brother. The younger man had no knowledge that he was insured.

Babies Face Milk Shortage in France, Belgium This Winter

Paris, Oct. 17 (AP)—French and Belgian babies face death this winter because of a milk shortage which registers nearly 100 deaths of infants in Belgium and 100 in France.

Lack of milk, obtained by the United States from Europe, will strike about 100,000 people, with a high percentage of them in the northern part of the region of direct supply. 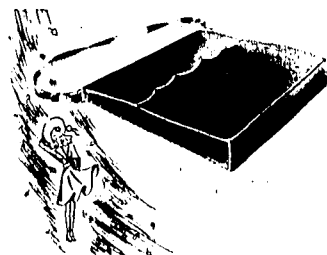

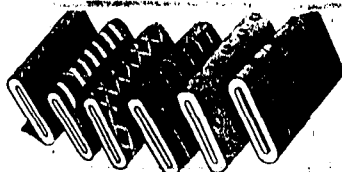

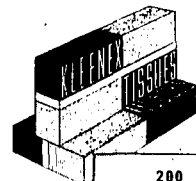
