WASHING STATE PLANS REBUILDING AFTER GIGANTIC 4-MONTHS-OLD SUSPENSION SPAN CRASHES INTO SOUND

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 8 (UP)—The Washington toll bridge authority today proceeded with plans to rebuild the four-month-old \$6,400,000 Tacoma narrows suspension bridge, the remains of which were lying in the mud in the bottom of Puget sound.

The bridge, third longest suspension span in the world, was whipped in place yesterday in a 3-mile gale. It linked the Pacific northwest's three major defense hubs—Fort Lewis and McCord field near Tacoma, and the Puget sound navy yard at Bremerton. Hastily reconitioned ferries were put into service today between

Point Defiance and Gig Harbor. While bridge experts argued about what had caused the span to disintegrate, engineers at the University of Washington tinkered with a \$14,500 model to eliminate the "bugs" from the new design.

Charles E. Andrew, former assistant chief engineer on the San Francisco-Oakland bay bridge, who built the Tacoma narrows span, said he originally had planned for open truss construction, which would offer less wind resistance. Another engineer, he said, had substituted flat girders. Another theory was the wind against

Canvass Upholds Assessor Reelection; Changes Minor

The Twin Falls county assessor definitely retained his office as result of the official canvass of votes in Tuesday's general election, it was shown today as the board of commissioners announced outcome of the canvass.

Only minor changes are shown in total figures for each county, state and county office. But in the closest county race—Assessor George A. Childs against J. D. Barnhart, Democratic former assessor who sought to regain the office—the canvass showed that the preliminary 42-vote margin held by Mr. Childs is actually 52 ballots.

Childs received 5,140 votes and Barnhart 5,088. There were six ballots for write-in candidates. The canvass confirms the Republican "swing" which saw only two Democratic candidates, Warren W. Lowrey, for sheriff, and Mrs. Cora E. Stevens, incumbent treasurer.

Formal check-up of poll books revealed today for the first time the county results on the two liquor intemperance measures, which were defeated, and on the three constitutional amendments, which were approved. The "county vote" tally lost by this county is: Yes, 5,649; No, 6,649. The Idaho sobriety act showed: Yes, 5,534; No, 6,172.

The amendment to endowment of state school endowment funds in real estate mortgages and other securities, which was voted 3,122 No. The amendment which will allow the legislature to purchase for highways by public funds necessary to secure benefit of federal laws in "matching" programs was by 5,146 yes to 2,975 no.

The third amendment, providing gasoline and motor fuel tax money and auto registration fees must be used for highways, which was approved by 3,253 No. The official compilation shown by the canvass:

British Antiaircraft Guns Assist Greeks

BELGRADE, Nov. 8 (UP)—British airplane and antiaircraft gun reinforcement—vital weapons against an axis blitzkrieg—were reported bolstering Greek armies today in a sea-saw battle with Italians along the rain-soaked Albanian frontier zone.

Intensified aerial operations were reported by both sides, with the Greeks attacking the big Italian base at Porto Edda and setting an Italian ship afire. Other reports said Italian planes were bombing Larissa, Janina and other Greek targets.

Unconfirmed reports said the Greeks had resumed their advance on the Koriza or northern front, taken the Albanian village of Four, where an Italian major, four other officers and 60 men were captured.

Diplomatics to the frontier town of Ohrid reported civilians had been ordered to evacuate Koriza because of constant fire from artillery in the Morova mountains.

Diplomatics to the Yugoslav town of Hitali this afternoon said that after a week of good weather, rain had fallen again on the Koriza front.

British anti-aircraft guns were reported to have reached the Greek troops fighting on the Koriza sector, also to have been set up in towns in the rear lines, such as Florina, which have been heavily bombed by the Italians.

The numerous British anti-aircraft guns toward the front indicated the extensive preparations by the British to meet the possibility of an air attack.

LONDON—The Tower of London and the St. Clement Danes church in the Strand have been damaged in recent German air raids, it was disclosed today.

Italians Aim at Encircling Northern Half of Greece

INVADERS' PRESS ON JANINA SEEN STRATEGIC MOVE

BY J. W. T. MASON
United Press War Expert

Intensifying Italian air raids on Janina in the Pindus mountains east of Janina and Larissa on the important railway junction near the southern border of the Gulf of Salonica gave some indication of the strategic purpose of Mussolini's Greek campaign. An attempt to encircle the northern half of Greece from the front had become the primary move of this plan. If Janina falls to the Italians, they will then be in a position to swing eastward along the only good road crossing the Pindus mountains, separating northwestern Greece from the less rugged northwestern terrain.

Next Objective

Metsov guards the road from the eastern Pindus approach, and after Janina should become the next Italian objective. Once across the Pindus range, the Italians would have a fairly level route to Kalabaka, terminus of the only east-west railway in northern Greece, which is not yet wholly completed.

Must Be Protected

For this plan of campaign to succeed, the Italian right flank would first have to be protected along the western seacoast. This seems to be one of the purposes of the Italian operations in the Kalabris river area near Corfu. To interrupt Greek reinforcements and supplies being transported to Salonica through the Aegean sea.

Ancient Schooner, Scuttled, Refuses to Go to Ocean Front

SANDY HOOK, N. J., Nov. 8 (AP)—The Bluebird, reduced to a cinder, but refusing to die, lay anchored near the Ambrose channel today, bobbing defiance to every passing ship.

She had been scuttled once and had come up the wrong way, her wooden bottom facing the sky and her deck under water.

She had her own way, temporarily, while army engineers and tug crews, divided what to do next. They had left her to spend the night alone, surrounded by warning lights.

The Bluebird is, or was, a 250-foot wooden schooner. Her history is shrouded in the mists of time. When she last left port in tow, bound for Davy Jones' locker, her masts were gone and her deck was burned away.

Plugs Knocked Out

of her bottom to let the sea in, and she went down ignobly.

The Dauntless was just getting under way again when the waves parted and the Bluebird's bottom emerged. The tug crew waited hopefully but the Bluebird stayed up. She evidently had turned over in descent, and dumped her ballast through the open deck space.

The tug stood by all night. Tuesday morning the Bluebird was still there. The tug took her in tow again, hauled her 20 miles to Sandy Hook bay, notified Van Frank that the Bluebird wouldn't go down, and went to other business.

Tears Loose Again

Wednesday night, the Bluebird tore loose from her anchorage in a wind and put to sea. Still bottom-side up, she hit straight for the main channel. 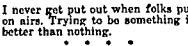
