Three Plead Not Guilty in Torture Death of Father

SHOSHONE, Nov. 20 (Special)—Three of four prisoners, charged with the desert torture slaying of Charles Sanders, 48, Cassia county dry farmer and father of three of the defendants, this morning entered pleas of not guilty when given a hearing before District Judge Doren H. Sutphen.

The fourth defendant, now in the Blackfoot state hospital, was not present this morning. He is Chester Phillips, 22.

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Can this be **THANKSGIVING?**



Thanksgiving is a day of rejoicing — a festival through which we give thanks. But in the light of five traffic fatalities in our Magic Valley since September 21, can tomorrow truly be called Thanksgiving? In at least five homes sorrow has shrouded the real spirit in which we give thanks.

How much more a holiday of thankfulness it would be if we of Magic Valley could look back one month — two months — or longer — and realize that our homes had been protected from death on the highway. It can't be that such protection is too large a responsibility for us — and it can't be that we as a group of people willingly and knowingly are shirking this responsibility. And yet, the record shows that since September 21, the Black Flag has flown five times.

Isn't it time to do something about it? Isn't it time that we as individuals promise ourselves and those with whom we share our highways that we will practice a greater degree of safety? Of course, the long stretches of road that abound in our valley are an invitation to high speeds — they look so innocently safe. And the low, level lands which border them somehow seem to shadow the tragedy of impending danger. But reality proves that long, level and wide roads are no certain guarantee to complete safety. Instead, reality proves that not for one moment should any driver on any road — highway or byway — relax his or her watchfulness for a moment. For in that moment of relaxation sudden death may strike — and the Black Flag must fly again.

What to do about this mounting toll of death on our highways? There is little more to do than to realize — as individuals — that driving a car is a serious responsibility. A thousand and one contingencies may arise upon which we may not count — a tire may blow to hurtle our car into the oncoming traffic; a driver less careful than we might disregard a traffic stop and come plunging onto the arterial highway we are traveling — all in complete unexpectedness; an icy spot on the road may



cause us to lose control of our car at even a normal speed; or just as unexpectedly, those deep shadows just ahead may loom up in a horrifying reality as loose stock. These and a thousand other situations may easily arise in an average driver's experience. And each one of them proves the unexpected.

And so the seemingly simple precaution of expecting the unexpected can be the remedy for most of our troubles. But stop! Expecting the unexpected is a full time job and may include such particular safety measures as: don't drive "beyond your lights"; don't drive at a rate of speed which does not assure you complete control of your car at all times; observe traffic courtesies — and, of course, be sure your car is in a mechanically safe condition. Too, we should practice degrees of safety and be very generous in their applications. One corner — more dangerous than another — calls for a greater degree of safety; the most dangerously blind corner becomes perfectly safe when approached with the proper degree of safety. It may be worth the extra precaution.

The most horrible part of traffic accidents is that a majority of our drivers and passengers may suffer at the hands of a small minority of drivers whose tactics are fraught with carelessness. Our responsibility then is to stay definitely out of that minority.

And, too, let us realize that our five fatal accidents have not happened in the slow moving traffic of our cities — and we may be thankful they have not involved precious cargoes of kiddies in our school busses. Instead they have occurred

on the open highways where watchfulness may not seem so apparently important. And so without letting down in our measures of safety in traffic, it is evident that our greatest care should come on the open road. Five fatalities since the twenty-first of September is a distinct challenge to us. Can we meet it and say, "there shall be no more"? If we can, then Thanksgiving can have a more complete meaning for Magic Valley.

Because these Twin Falls merchants have honest convictions about safety in driving for motorists and pedestrians on our thoroughfares, they have sponsored this campaign for safety. But, such a campaign, after all, depends upon you. Will you take the responsibility to see that the car you are driving is handled safely? If you will then safety will become more ordinary. And when the White Flag flies every day, then we can more sincerely give thanks.

GREEKS ASSERT ITALIAN TROOPS IN FULL RETREAT

EARLY FALL OF KORITZA TERMED TO BE CERTAINTY

By LEON KAY BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Nov. 20 (Special)—Italian troops today were in full retreat on two fronts of the Albanian-Greek frontier, border dis-patches reported and Greek forces were said to be pursuing the retreating enemy after having captured considerable booty. Official dispatches said along the Ionian sea coast the Italian withdrawal had become a rout and that Greek troops which had pursued the enemy across the Kalmas river were driving the Italians toward Albanian villages near Konitopolis.

VICTORY

ROME, Nov. 20 (AP)—Italian general headquarters said today Greek troops had been driven back with heavy losses near Koritza, that British planes had been chased from Italy's east coast, and that British columns had suffered severe losses in north Africa. The communique admitted Greek attacks had been "heavy and successful" in the hills southeast of Koritza and along the Kailbaki road but claimed hard fighting Italian forces had repulsed the attacks, driving them back with heavy losses.

wrecked Italian base. The Greeks were said to have resumed their bombardment of Koritza before dawn and to have brought all Italian lines of retreat under artillery fire. Greek sources persisted in predicting the early fall of Koritza and said their lines around the falling base were being drawn tighter every hour. Greek artillery positions in the Morova mountains, on the Cangon road behind Koritza and on the slopes of Mt. Ivan were reported plugging a steady rain of shells into Koritza. It was reported that 37 Italians were killed and 70 wounded in an early morning Greek attack. The main street of Koritza was described as impassable because of shell holes and the debris of demolished houses. All of Koritza was reported aflame with a red glow in the sky reflected by clouds and visible for many miles. Albanian Aid Reports of Albanian disaffection continued and it was reported from Ohrid that at El Bassan 18 sleeping Italian soldiers were killed and about 40 wounded when two time bombs placed in their barracks by Albanians exploded. Displaced reporting fighting in the Ionian sea sector said that the Greeks, in addition to capturing guns, tanks and machine guns, had taken numerous Italian prisoners.

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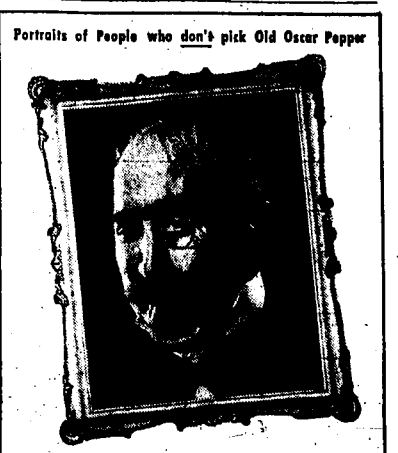
LAST RITES PAY RANCHER HONOR

Winning class will receive points towards the citizenship cup.

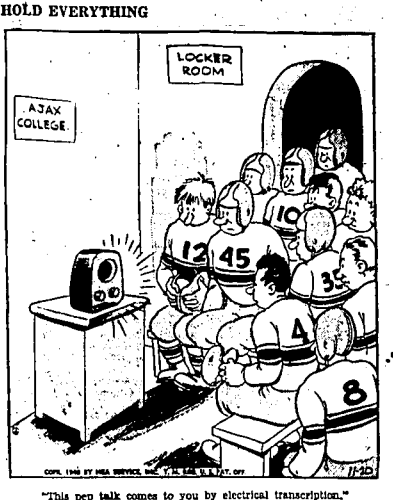
