Governor-Elect Says He Will 'Clean House'

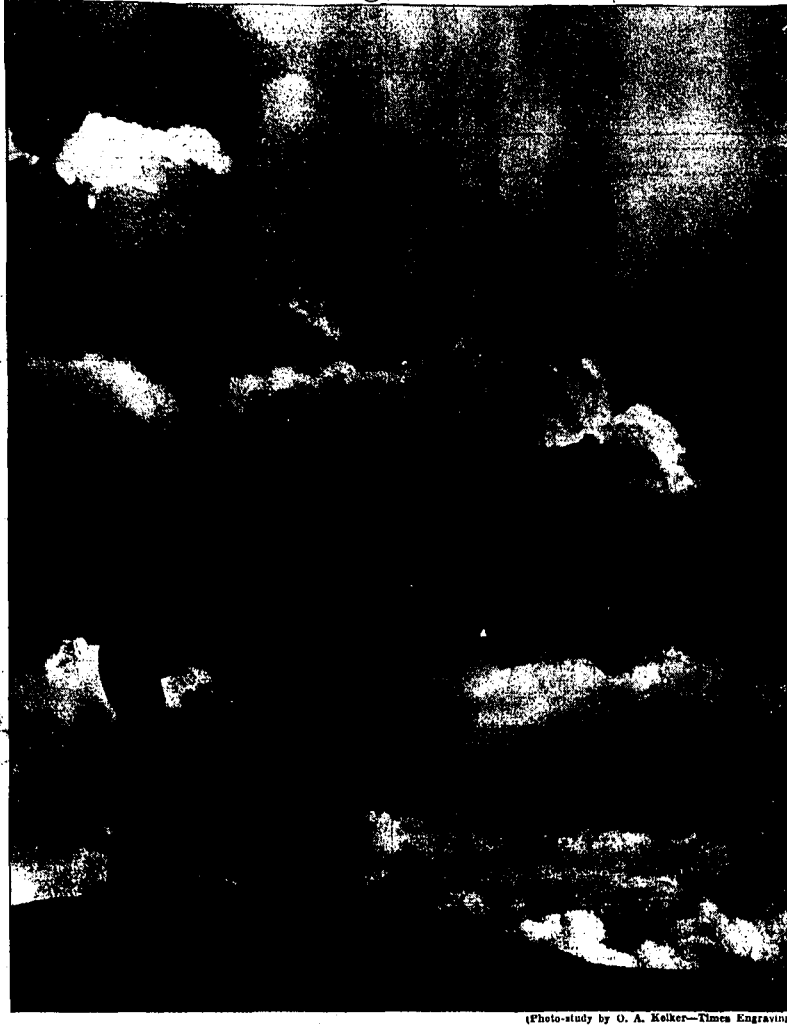

GIANT TASK ENDS ON CAREY'S DAM

CAREY, Nov. 21 (Special)—Gone are the roar and tremble of heavy motors, the bluish smoke and steam, the suffocating dust from heavy wheels, the clank and clatter of the mighty-jawed diesel engines in place of the still, quiet and confusion is now a silence as deep as the sky above and the barren hills beneath it.

Last Wednesday and Thursday the Cavanaugh Construction company of Twin Falls removed all its machinery from the Little Wood river irrigation project. The dam is built—and will be entirely finished as soon as the WPA can rip-rap the face of the structure.

Began in 1935

In 1935 the construction of the Little Wood river dam was started under the direction of the WPA and in the last five years the tunnel and concrete work of the dam was completed, and part of the cement work on the spillway was completed as was also 31,000 cubic yards of clay fill put into place.

About the first of October of this year the construction company moved onto the scene and from then on things moved—fast. Duffy Reed was the superintendent and he had 85 men working for him. There were three power shovels, each of which could load one truck each minute. The concrete trucks were chafed up every two hours and worked 21 hours each day. The 85 men were divided into three shifts and each shift worked 7 hours each day. To run the motors of the machines it took at least 1200 gallons of gasoline and fuel oil.

Big Job

A few days and nights were lost because of bad weather but in the six weeks' time this construction company was working there it moved 310,000 cubic yards of clay, 26,000 cubic yards of rock and several thousand cubic yards of gravel. The dam is 77 feet high and is 900 feet wide and about 900 feet thick. To date it has cost \$527,000. Of this amount the government has paid \$400,000 and the sponsors here have put up \$127,000.

This dam will irrigate about 8,500 acres of land on a total of 94 farms in the Little Wood river valley.

Much credit is due the Little Wood river irrigation project officials for the completion of the dam. They are W. D. Richards, secretary-treasurer; O. J. McCarter, president; and William Alken, Mr. McCarter and James Turnbull, directors.

C. of I. Feminine Pilot Looks Ahead to Flight Instruction

CALDWELL, Ida., Nov. 21 (SP)— Joyce Whitmore, College of Idaho senior who was "grounded" for about two weeks, today looked forward to graduation day when she will become a full-fledged flying instructor. The only Idaho woman to take advanced civilian pilot training instruction, Miss Whitmore received word from headquarters in Washington, D. C. her application for advanced training has been approved. The course is open to women in "a very few instances," federal officials declared.

Miss Whitmore was also the first woman in southern Idaho to take the primary flying course last year. She received her pilot's license after completion of the course at College of Idaho. She has checked up nearly 90 hours of flying time—22 of them on a cross-country flight when she and two other Caldwell girls brought three planes west from Kansas City.

'U' LEADER RAPS SLASH IN FUNDS

MOSCOW, Nov. 21 (Special)—"Survival of the University of Idaho as you have known it depends not on expanded but simply on restored appropriations," President H. C. Dale frankly reports in an annual bulletin mailed to 7,000 Idaho graduates.

"Look at the facts," his message to alumni continues. "Back in 1927 the university's general appropriation was \$718,000 (half of \$1,436,000 for the biennium); our enrollment was 1,917. Twelve years later, in 1939, we had over 3,000 students but an appropriation of only \$531,000 for the year (half of \$1,062,000 for the biennium). See what that means."

"The University of Idaho has actually added a student body larger than the present total enrollment of the southern branch but has \$37,000 per year less with which to run the institution."

"And when we say 'run the institution' we do not mean merely the instruction of students on the campus at Moscow," President Dale explains. "This general appropriation of \$1,062,165 for the current biennium had to support also the experiment station here at Moscow and also pay the entire state's share of the salaries of county agents, agricultural specialists and the rest of the staff of the agricultural extension division."

"How did we do it? In part, we did not do it. We simply closed out or greatly reduced many of our activities. . . . An appropriation for 1941-42 such as that received in the current biennium and the whole set-up will have to be slashed and reorganized."

GRANGE CHARTS HEAVY PROGRAM

BOISE, Ida., Nov. 21 (AP)—Idaho Grange legislative representatives today planned to push a sweeping 1941 legislative program based on some of the 81 resolutions adopted at the recent annual convention of Grangers.

Highway development and rural electrification are expected to play a large part in the program. Taxation, labor policies and a variety of other types of legislation will be sought.

At their convention, Grangers approved a resolution that the state petition concerns for larger appropriations for secondary roads "to speed up the farm-to-market road program in Idaho to relieve the transportation difficulties in rural sections."

Fund Equalization
The Grangers want a record as favoring complete equalization in the state school fund by a graduate tax on all property, or by direct appropriation from the general fund to the equalization fund to the amount that would equalize the costs for a minimum education program.

They also proposed tax exemptions for the homestead farmer or resident operator on a basis of income. This, they claimed, would shift the heavy burden of the ad valorem tax in the farming industry onto higher income property.

Approve Federal Power
A Grange resolution approved federal development and control of hydro-electric power and the suggestion was adopted to carry out the approval with a district power bill wherein only the federal and power revenue is bonded similar to systems being used in Oregon and Washington.

A bill is also expected to be sought for the enactment of a program for cooperative distribution of electric power.
The group is also expected to call for legislation which would put into operation a survey of potential sources of electric power on the Snake river and would exempt from taxation the rural electrification and other lines built and maintained by farmers.
