GREEK SIGNS AXIS PACT

Greeks Rout 105,000 Italians in Drive on Koritza Capture Equipment For 2 Divisions in Albanian Campaign

ATHENS, Greece, Nov. 23 (UP)—Greek troops routed almost seven Italian divisions (105,000 men) in capturing the Koritza sector and seized enough guns, ammunition and vehicles to equip two divisions, reports from the front said today. The fighting on this northern front was moving toward the Yugoslav border. A large section of the Italian force routed from its Koritza base had moved to Pograde, 25 miles north on Lake Ochrid, which forms a section of the Albanian-Yugoslav border, and the Greeks were driving that direction in pursuit. While the Greek northern forces were mopping up around Koritza, the southern army was pushing into Albania and threatening to cut off the Italians from their coastal supply base, Porto Edda.

As they approached the Argrokastri plains, however, the Greeks were advancing more cautiously, to prevent falling into traps. Greek marching formations of Italian mechanized units, which had been of little value in the mountainous country to the east. The victory at Koritza, from where the Italians had launched their drive for Salonika, eastern Greece port, was growing in scope as new reports of captures came from that area. It was reported that the Italians had attempted to destroy the immense stores of gasoline and munitions assembled there before retreating, but the Greeks arrived in time to seize most of them.

In the Argrokastri valley on the south, Greek forces were reported moving along the river while the Italians rushed reinforcements by airplane and Lorry from the port of Valona and Berat, 60 miles north, to oppose them. The Italians were pouring into Talepni, at the junction of the roads to Argrokastri from the north and south, and were advancing. The Italians had cannons and anti-aircraft in the heights surrounding that town.

BULGARS AWAIT REDS' APPROVAL ON GERMAN PACT

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Nov. 23 (UP)—Well informed sources believed today that King Boris, at his conference with Adolf Hitler last Sunday, had declared Bulgaria's unwillingness to sign a pact with the axis powers or to enter the war unless Russia also enters or specifically approves Bulgaria's entry. It was believed, however, that the signal for some new diplomatic effort to military activity in southeast Europe had been given by the return to Ankara, Turkey, of the German ambassador, Franz von Papen.

Well-informed persons doubted that Hitler had persuaded Molotov to put pressure on Turkey or had reached any agreement with Russia relative to the Dardanelles, control of which would be necessary to Germany in any purely land campaign against the Soviet Union. It was said that while German probably could break Turkish resistance, before this could be done the British fleet would be in the Black sea harassing shipments of Russian oil to Germany.

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Nov. 23 (UP)—Turks were on the alert today for signs that Bulgaria, encouraged by the axis powers, intended to attack Greece and throw the southern corner of Europe into a war that would involve Turkey immediately.

Operation of automobiles, motorcycles and motorbikes by private persons was suspended as far as Turkey, after a visit in Berlin and a stop-over at Sofia, Bulgaria, on his way back to Turkey to play in the current diplomatic drive into southeast Europe by the axis powers. Von Papen declined to say whether he had brought any word. He said, "Diplomats always have proposals to make but I cannot tell you secrets."

U.S. Bombers Added Beet Payment Take Place of Traded Ships

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (UP)—Navy sources said today that long-range patrol bombers operating from two of the eight bases obtained in the recent deal with Great Britain are doing the work that would have been assigned to the 50 coverage destroyers traded by the United States.

Simultaneously the navy disclosed that President Roosevelt has allocated \$2,000,000 from his defense "black check" fund for additional survey and start construction of the base sites stretching from Newfoundland to the northeastern shore of South America.

Neutral patrol planes in North and Central American waters which would have been assigned to the 50 destroyers—now are being covered in the extended range of the navy's big patrol bombers working out of Bermuda and St. Leger as well as Atlantic coast stations.

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Added Beet Payment \$461,510; Aggregate Nearing Two Million

Checks totaling nearly half a million dollars will go to sugar beet growers of the Twin Falls, Burley, and Rupert areas next week, being payment for beets delivered during the period Nov. 1 to 15, Harry Kloock, Idaho manager of the Amalgamated Sugar company, said this afternoon.

The exact aggregate which will be mailed Monday, a total which they will receive "this day, amounts to \$208,157 in the Twin Falls district and \$166,353 in the Burley-Rupert area, Kloock said.

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Balkan Nation Joins Alliance At Berlin Meet

BERLIN, Nov. 23 (UP)—Rumanian officials signed a protocol binding their country to the German-Italian-Japanese alliance today. The protocol was signed by Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop for Germany; Gen. Ion Antonescu, head of state, for Rumania; Gino Butti for Italy and Ambassador Saburo Kurusu for Japan.

The signing followed by three days the signature of Hungary to a similar protocol, accepting the place assigned to her in the "new European order" of the axis powers. Although the protocol signed by Hungary made no mention of military aid, Nazi informants said later that it bound Hungary to take up arms for the axis powers if any other nation, "such as the United States," joined the war on Great Britain's side.

It was understood that Slovak officials were coming here during the week-end to sign a protocol. Rumanian officials would come to sign early next week. An alliance with all four of the countries would open the whole southeast Europe corridor to Germany as far as the Turkish border.

Antonescu conferred with Adolf Hitler for three and a half hours yesterday and was guest at a reception given by Ribbentrop last night. After signing today, Antonescu said: "I am conscious here that we today conclude an act of state which has an historical meaning not only for the life development of the Rumanian people but also for Europe, emerging from the sacrifices of the present war."
