GREEKS SMASH DEER IN ALBANIA

FOG, MIST, ICE CLOG MAGIC VALLEY HIGHWAYS

Slippery Roads Send Cars in Ditches; One Dead, Dozens Injured

A low hanging fog and mist, which turned to ice as it settled on highways and streets, today had spread death, injury and destruction over the Magic Valley and had caused state policemen and officers in various sections to urge that motorists stay off the highways "unless the trips are absolutely necessary."

Dangerously slippery roads were general over the entire valley this morning and in one two-mile stretch near Burley yesterday afternoon at least nine automobiles were in the ditch at one time. The area was still termed "dangerous" this afternoon.

Death struck down Mrs. William F. Mason, about 40, a resident of Kimberly who yesterday afternoon died instantly when the car in which she was riding and which was being operated by her husband, left the highway after crossing a bridge near Hazelton, hurled a 27-foot canal and then dropped into the water after smashing against the opposite bank. A four-year-old son, Billy, suffered exposure and is in the Falls county general hospital along with his father who suffered possible internal injuries and also a broken leg and several broken ribs. Mr. Mason was said to be in "fair" condition at the hospital this afternoon.

School Day Returns The wars of misadventure ranged from the death crash to cars merely leaving the road with little or no damage. A spectacular one was carried out yesterday afternoon at a point 20 miles east of Burley at the Henry Nelson corner in the Jackson district when a school bus carrying 12 pupils, skidded from the road and turned over on its side.

All 12 of the children, and also the driver whose name was not given, were uninjured.

THE BLACK FLAG FLEES

The seventh fatal traffic accident in the Magic Valley since Sept. 21 occurred Nov. 25 in Jerome county.

Injured, were slightly injured, most of them suffering cuts and lacerations. Casual county officials reported today.

The mishaps continued "black and blue" this morning after last night's wave, officers contacted by telephone in the various counties reported. Traffic in the only nearby county without a reportable mishap was Blaine where a state policeman reported that a car was involved yesterday or today. He said, however, that the road after it left Blaine and continued over the mountains was "open but slippery."

AUTO IN COULEE

Eldon G. Bracken, 43, Twin Falls, was seriously injured about 8:30 a. m. yesterday when his automobile was operating, and in which Miss Elaine Allen, Twin Falls, was a passenger, skidded from Highway 20 west of Dead Man's curve and tumbled upside down in a coulee.

Bracken is occupational classification superintendent at the Idaho State WPA office at Bull and Miss Allen is a secretary at the same point. They were returning to Twin Falls after completion of their work there. Miss Allen was not injured.

CAR KILLS

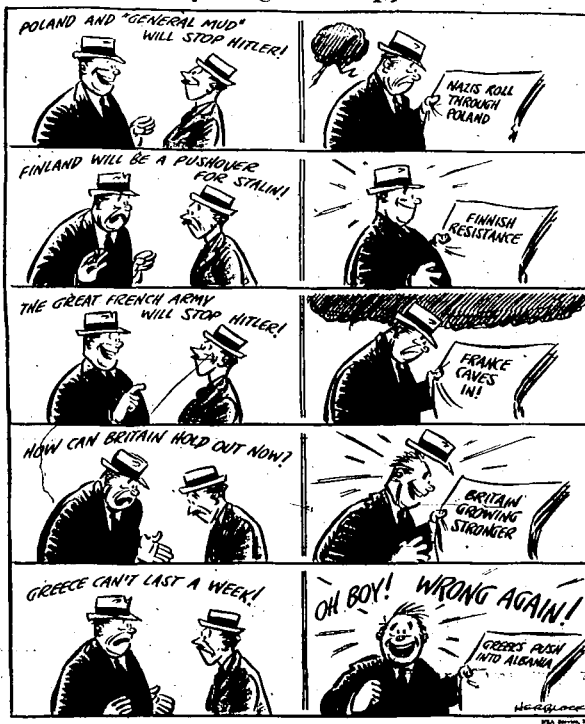
Bracken, a state policeman reported, had attempted to slow down after sighting a car ahead of him. The car skidded on the pavement and left the road. Homer Cantrell, a rancher living nearby, pulled the couple from the car. Both Bracken and Miss Allen were killed.

They were taken to the rancher's home until the ambulance arrived to remove Bracken to the county hospital. The ambulance driver in a dispatch said that his condition was "fair."

TAYLOR DEMANDS SWEEPING SHIFT FOR LEGISLATURE

BOISE, Nov. 26 (UP)—Sweeping changes in Idaho legislative procedure were proposed today by Attorney General J. W. Taylor in his biennial report to Gov. C. A. Bottoliver.

Taylor urged the 1941 legislature to consider revision which would strengthen Idaho laws "by giving legislators greater opportunity to consider proposed legislation prior to passage."

This might be accomplished, Taylor stated, "by an interim drafting committee, established for the purpose of considering mechanical problems encountered in preparation of a bill for passage. The committee would clarify the meaning of a bill before the legislature opened."

He suggested as an alternative that the legislature meet in special sessions—the first for preparation and introduction of bills, and the second for argument and passage after a four-day or five-day or week for committees to study the proposed laws.

GROUP ASKS NEW AID FOR BRITAIN

Soldiers Landed From Island for Drive on Italians

Gets French Post

Reports of the Greek threat to Porto Edda, seacoast town west of the Greek border which the Italians re-named in honor of Benito Mussolini's mother, were conflicting. London said the Greeks had made a coastal landing opposite Corfu, south of Porto Edda, and had managed to cut the road running roughly northeast from Porto Edda to Argyrokastron.

The Italian report of the Greek action was at sharp divergence from the British account. The Romans communicated a Greek landing party of 400 men, which they did not admit, in the general geographic designation for the coastal region of "Western Greece and southern Albania."

Land in Small Boats The Italians said the Greeks landed in small boats under cover of dark and protected by British aircraft and Greek British warships. The Greek troops were said to have come from Corfu, only four miles distant from Porto Edda, the closest point. Part of the Greek force was wiped out and the remainder captured, the Italians claimed.

Both British and Jugoslav border sources reported the Greek occupation of the town. In addition to the threat to Porto Edda and Argyrokastron from the Greek landing party, the Greeks were said to have landed at a point 12 miles west of Voskopoj which is 17 miles west of Koritza.

The British said the Italians were bringing reinforcements from Albania, estimated to number two divisions or about 30,000 men. The Italians admitted air attacks upon the coast. Italian air forces had attacked the island and their own air units attacked Corfu and Greek troops in the Kalamas river valley.

On the central front the British said the Greeks were mopping up rapidly and finding little Italian opposition. They were reported to have cleared the coast from Koritza as far as a point 12 miles west of Voskopoj which is 17 miles west of Koritza.

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AIR ALARM ENDS QUIET IN BRITAIN

LONDON, Nov. 26 (UP)—An air raid alarm in London after noon today marked the first time German planes had appeared over the coast of Great Britain since the outbreak of the war.

The alerting of Dover continued for about two hours, the Germans apparently firing at random in hope of hitting a ship.

BLAST KILLS ONE OAKLAND, Calif., Nov. 26 (UP)—A steam explosion aboard the McCook, a tugboat, today killed one man and injured another.

Unidentified fisherman was reported swept from his boat in the ocean last night by a storm. His body had not been found.

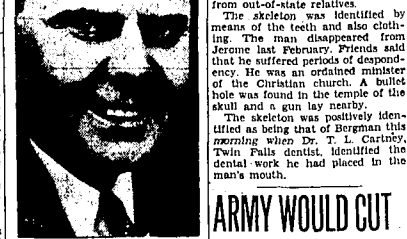

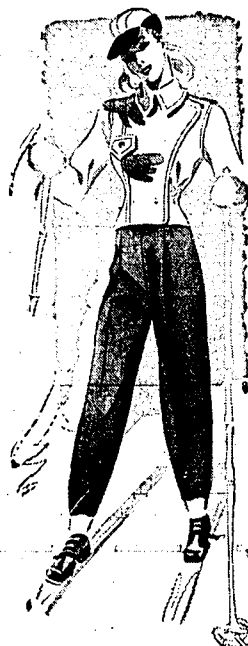

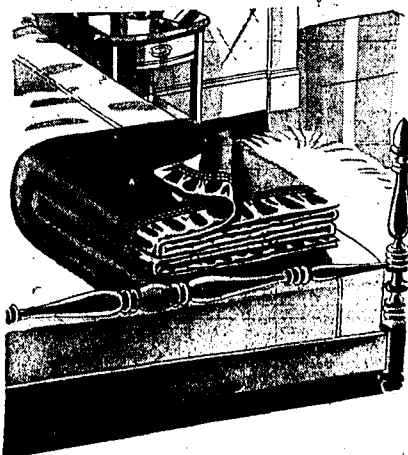
