Santa Claus is "coming to town" Thursday night and with him will come the "astering in" program of the Christmas season in Twin Falls.

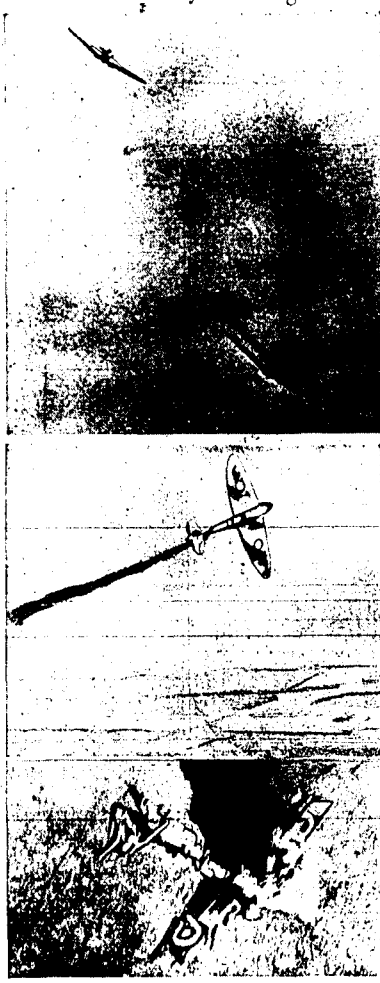
The downtown observance will start promptly at 7:15 p. m. when a high school chorus of 50 voices presents carols under the direction of Miss Marjorie Albertson.

FORMER PREMIER REPORTED AMONG THOSE MURDERED

BERLIN, Nov. 27 (UP)—The official German news agency reported from Bucharest that Iron Guard members shot 64 political prisoners at the fortress at Jilava today, among them George Argescu, former premier, and other leading supporters of abdicated King Carol's regime.

(At Budapest, the semi-official Hungarian news agency circulated the same report.) Those shots were said to have been responsible for slaying two years ago next Saturday of Corneliu Zelea Codreanu, the Romanian "fuehrer," the Iron Guard leader during the pre-Nazi organization's long and bloody feud with Carol.

Other arrests. The agency said the shootings took place at 1:30 a. m. at the prison. Later, it said, Iron Guards and policemen appeared at the homes of numerous supporters of Carol's regime and arrested them.

The Rumanian purge indicated the country was being turned over to the Iron Guards to have their long-sought revenge against the so-called "back-sliding" Carol.

The Iron Guard's cause celebre was the execution on Nov. 30, 1938, of its "fuehrer," Corneliu Zelea Codreanu, along with his associates. It was announced by Carol's government they had "tried" Codreanu, but he being married on the prison at Jilava and had been shot by his guards. Iron Guard spokesmen charged the 14 prisoners were dumped into an unmarked grave.

Assassinated Premier. In retaliation for the Codreanu slaying, Iron Guards assassinated Premier Armand Calinescu, Sept. 21, 1939. The retaliation of the Iron Guards against Calinescu, Sept. 21, 1939, and 10 convicted Iron Guards were executed summarily all over the country.

George Argescu had been premier when Codreanu and his 13 followers were shot. Argescu, a member of Calinescu's cabinet, had been one of those reported purged at Jilava today. His arrest had been announced at Bucharest Nov. 15. The announcement said he was accused of the "commission of a crime."

Greeks Blast Key Italian Base

BATTLE STARTS FOR CAPTURE OF CITY IN ALBANIA

By LEON KAY. BELGRADE, Jugoslavia, Nov. 27 (UP)—Frontier dispatches said today a battle for Argyrokastron, most important Italian base in southwestern Albania, was imminent and it was reported Italian troops in Porto Edda, southwest of Argyrokastron, were retreating.

Retreating from Struga said the town were within two miles of Argyrokastron and Struga district reported also that the Italians were fleeing northward along a coastal road, southwest by Albanian rebel forces.

Size of the battle cut communications at Porto Edda and Argyrokastron. Frontiers of Lendani and Kastaniani. In this advance, dispatches said, the Greeks occupied the village of Koritza and continued to advance along a secondary road in an operation which resulted in capture yesterday afternoon of the village of Jidgor, a strategically important road junction. It was the occupation of Jidgor that Struga was cut off. Italian troops resulted in cutting Porto Edda off from Italians in Argyrokastron.

Order Defense. Reports at Struga said Gen. Ubaldo Soddu, Italian under-secretary for war and commander-in-chief of Italian forces in Albania, had ordered Argyrokastron "defended to the last man." Following this report, however, there were other dispatches asserting the Italians already were evacuating Argyrokastron and were concentrating in new positions northwest of the town in the valley of Jidgor, a tributary of the Argyrokastron river.

Frontier dispatches renewed their offensive operations today from Jidgor along the main road to Argyrokastron and occupied the village of Trinit with out fighting. Italians were said to have withdrawn from Trinit only last night.

The Greeks were reported continuing to advance from Trinit and had reported their men near the village of Votiva, about three miles from Argyrokastron.

Italian resistance at Jidgor was described as "strong and hard." It was reported, the Italians lost three officers and 40 soldiers killed and more than 80 wounded. Greek losses were reported heavy.

Any Italian forces left in Porto Edda after Greek severance of the port communications with Argyrokastron were considered in a precarious position and frontier observers believed they had no alternative but to flee northward.

AFL Asks Safeguarding For U. S. Social Gains

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 27 (UP)—The American Federation of Labor today demanded safeguarding of social gains and the right of continued collective bargaining as part of the program under which its unions will cooperate with the government in the total preparedness drive.

The action was taken after the federation convention had approved a resolution backing the administration in its policy of giving Great Britain all aid short of war in its battle with the axis powers.

It is essential we should give every possible active aid to the defense of our borders, including the western hemisphere, so that a free trade union movement may continue to flourish within our boundaries," the resolution said.

The convention, without a dissenting vote, also adopted a resolution reaffirming the federation's boycott against Japanese goods and declaring it was rightly followed "without materially weaken Japanese economic resources, to that extent it would place Japan in a weakened position to continue its murderous assault and aggression against the peoples of China."

Winter Storm Blows From Gulf of Mexico

By United Press. A wintry snow storm that blew out of the gulf of Mexico spread in fan shape over the nation today, blanketing northern states with the first general snowfall of the season and drenching southern states with rain.

Cold gripped the states from the shores of the Pacific to the Atlantic seaboard adding to perils of travel and the suffering of refugees. Off Maine, gales lashed the seas and four ships set out into the storm to the assistance of a sinking freighter. Storm warnings were hoisted on the Great Lakes.

In Texas, thousands of refugees huddled on high ground awaiting recession of swirling, dust-filled rivers that had driven them from their bottom-lands homes. The heavy rains had driven them from the south and east Texas rivers with flood waters had crested and flood crests were spilling into the gulf of Mexico. Deprived of their communications and power lines wrecked by an ice storm in the Texas Panhandle and brought communities back into communication with the rest of the state.

The rain, general through the lower Mississippi river valley and Ohio heavy rains fell on the Ohio river valley. Snow fell over the western states as far as the Rocky Mountains and light frosts were expected in the central valley. Snow fall was heaviest in the Great Lakes and northwestern states and a white Thanksgiving was assured New England.

New York state was blanketed with snow which was particularly deep in the upstate region where temperatures dropped to 20 degrees below zero in some sections.

Michigan's GOP LEADER INDICTED. DETROIT, Nov. 27 (UP)—Frank D. McKay, Michigan Republican party leader, today was indicted on two federal indictments, one of which charged he defrauded Edsel Ford of \$9,918.

In the second indictment, McKay was charged with defrauding the Ford in state liquor purchases by which tribute of half a million dollars was exacted from 16 nationally prominent distillers in the last five years.

The true bill alleged McKay obtained a political campaign contribution from Ford to pay off his wife's debt. The alleged fraud occurred, the grand jury said, after the production of the company's books by the Republican party in Michigan, today was named in two federal indictments, one of which charged he defrauded Edsel Ford of \$9,918.

Attorney Seeks Pay for Service. HOUSTON, Tex., Nov. 27 (UP)—The state attorney general today heard arguments for and against the pay of a state department to seek legal advice from sources other than the attorney general's office.

Financial Help for Britain Is Delayed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (UP)—The senate foreign relations committee decided today to postpone until next year consideration of legislation to permit American financial aid to Britain.

The decision was unanimous and came on a motion by Sen. Bennett Champ Clark, D. Mo., after Sen. William H. King, D. Utah, had urged quick action on his bill to repeal the Johnson act and neutrality act laws on loans and credits to Britain.

Sen. Gerald P. Nye, R. N. D., author of a proposal to investigate British empire holdings in the United States, had reported in the senate that no legislation pertaining to the British financial situation could be considered in the remaining days of this session.

Under King's proposal congress would have been asked to rescind the Johnson act prohibition against loans to nations in default on their World War debts to this country, and the neutrality act ban on credits to belligerent countries.

FIR Asserts Executive Department Controls Battle Against Spies

COOPERATION OF TWO BRANCHES URGED ON DIES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—President Roosevelt has informed Chairman Martin Dies of the house committee investigating un-American activities that ultimate responsibility for administrative operations against fifth columnists lies with the executive department.

The White House disclosed today Mr. Roosevelt had dispatched a telegram to Dies at his Orange, Tex., home, replying to one which the congressman had sent him. Dies had appealed to Mr. Roosevelt to coordinate anti-fifth column activities of his committee and the state and justice departments.

In his telegram, Mr. Roosevelt admitted the house committee is well within its rights in conducting an investigation and presenting recommendations. But he insisted the executive department rather than congress or any of its committees must finally assume responsibility for administrative action against illegal subversive activities.

Carefully Laid Plans

"I know you will also see the point when I suggest that in regular conduct of administrative work of this nature," Mr. Roosevelt said, "carefully laid plans for the obtaining of further information which may lead to the breaking-up of subversive activities may be severely handicapped or completely destroyed by premature disclosure of facts or of suspicions to the public, or by hasty seizure of evidence which might with little more patience be obtained in a manner to be admissible in court or by giving of immunities to witnesses before congressional committees on matters revealed by their own testimony. Such action may defeat the ends of justice.

"You are correct in saying there should be the closest harmony between your committee of the house and all administrative departments in the investigation of fifth column activities in this country."

No Constitutional Objection

"There can be no constitutional objection to the investigation of such activities and a report thereon and recommendations thereon to a committee of the house of representatives.

"It is, however, clear the constitution of the United States lodges the executive responsibility in the hands of the President and that, therefore, continuing administrative duties in relation to illegal activities, lie in the executive branch of the government and not in the legislative branch.

"As soon as this distinction is clearly recognized there is no reason why there should not be complete harmony between your committee and the executive branch of the government."

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP)—If the proposed military air route between Spokane and Fairbanks is established, it may be the groundwork for a United States-Alaskan highway, some observers believe.

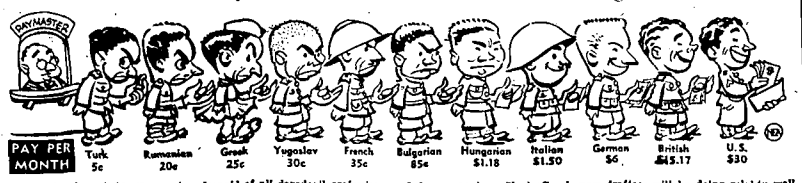
If the fields are installed, observers declare, it is only logical that link them, and also to link the major military airbase now under construction here.

AROUND the WORLD

BERLIN—British planes caused an alarm in Berlin last night. A communication said they had been turned back by anti-aircraft fire before reaching the center of the capital, but had caused "slight damage" to an airfield and houses in the outskirts.

ATHENS, Greece—The ministry of public safety has forbidden public funerals, to keep down traffic congestion. It ordered "the dead be taken to the cemeteries with a minimum of fuss."

BERNE, Switzerland—The Swiss federal council today issued a decree dissolving the Communist party in Switzerland.

BERLIN—The high command said unfavorable weather restricted aerial operations yesterday and last night but planes nevertheless continued armed reconnaissance over Britain. Its communique said the planes caused several fires at Avonmouth.

ROME—Greedily intensified Italian aviation activity was reported in a general headquarters communique today, indicating that Italy's reinforced army in Albania was being geared for offensive action soon.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden—German sea and air forces have troops and armored trucks into western and southern Norway today where martial law had been declared to combat sabotage to vital communications with Nazi naval and air bases along the north Atlantic coast.

SANTIAGO, Chile—The Spanish government, through its charge d'affaires here, Senor Guner Ferrer, has expressed its satisfaction with Defense Minister Juvenal Hernandez's opposition to lending Chilean sites to the United States for defense bases.

HANOI—French government officials today denied Japanese reports the Indo-China government was considering expulsion of Viet Nam, U. S. consul, Bernard Jacoby, a staff correspondent of United Press, were arrested by Japanese gendarmes last week for photographing a Japanese sentry on American property at Hanoi.

BOOM PREDICTED FOR U. S. INCOME

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—National defense experts estimated today a national income of \$85,000,000,000 for 1941 and, possibly, \$90,000,000,000 or \$95,000,000,000 for 1942.

They conditioned their estimate on assumption industrial capacity will expand sufficiently to eliminate potential bottlenecks in defense production.

National income for 1940 will exceed \$70,000,000,000. The all-time high was \$81,100,000,000 in 1929. But economists point out prices are about 10 per cent below the 1929 level, making it possible to purchase that much more with each dollar.

Three factors will have an important bearing on the size of the national income next year, defense experts said:

1. The extent of industrial plant expansion to fulfill defense requirements.
2. Volume of government expenditures for rearmament.
3. The degree to which taxes will be applied against consumers and savings.

PROBE OPENS ON CAMPAIGN COSTS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—Selection of a special grand jury to investigate campaign contributions and expenditures of all national political parties began today in the federal district court for the District of Columbia.

The investigation, announced yesterday by Attorney General Robert H. Jackson, is expected to show for the first time a coordinated picture of all spending by the Republican and Democratic national committees and all independent organizations supporting either party's presidential candidate.

The program has not been completely arranged, but it was indicated Mr. Roosevelt would see Dies as soon as possible on Friday, after which he would arrange conferences for him with justice and state department officials who also have been concerned with the fifth column inquiry.

PRESIDENT PLOTS CURTAILMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS PROGRAM

DEFENSE COSTS FORCE REDUCING OF ALL PROJECTS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—The first major curtailment of public works spending since 1937 when the nation experienced the most precipitous business decline in its history is planned today by President Roosevelt.

He is expected to inform congress early in January that public works spending must be reduced drastically, and for time being national defense spending should be a substitute for it as a producer of employment.

Defense Costs
The United Press was informed national defense spending would aggregate \$5,000,000,000 in this fiscal year and might reach \$10,000,000,000 in the fiscal year 1942.

Spending on so large a scale would more than offset curtailment of public works spending, even though the latter ceased altogether. Biggest public works cuts are expected to come in roads and recreational projects which together accounted for \$1,100,000,000 in 1939 and approximately \$700,000,000 in 1940.

Not Abandoned
But big public works spending has not been abandoned as a New Deal policy. Mr. Roosevelt explained in his message that the government would continue to carry out existing congressional commitments and, further, prepare plans for engineering reports on roads, bridges and similar projects for the future.

Outlining his plan yesterday, Mr. Roosevelt said congress will be discouraged from appropriating for new major public works but WPA will carry out existing congressional commitments and, further, prepare plans for engineering reports on roads, bridges and similar projects for the future.

"Cavalcade" Scores Hit at Dinner Dance

Kiwanians, their wives and guests took a history lesson "the pleasant way" last evening at the annual Ladies' night dinner dance at Radioland. They're still chuckling today over some of the information gleaned, historical facts they never learned in school.

A. S. Gilbert, president of the club, presided as toastmaster, and Tom Alworth, as program chairman, presented "Kiwanian Cavalcade," assisted by members of the Twin Falls Community Theater association and dancers from the M. I. A.

Single red rosebuds were the favors for the women guests, and red, pink and coral carnations combined with greenery decorated the several tables at which the guests were seated.

Effective Staging
High spots of the parade of passing events in the United States between 1840 and 1940 were presented on a specially constructed stage designed for the occasion by Earl Edgemoore, and bearing inscriptions of the Kiwanian wheel, in the club colors, on either side.

Script, written by Tom Alworth, combined the significant and the trivial in American history. "Chieftain" was the narrator. J. E. Miller played background music and a specialty, and Mrs. O. P. Duvall accompanied the quartet. Extracts follow:

1840: The people of eastern America began to turn to the vast wilderness of the west, such men as John C. Fremont and Kit Carson made expeditions to the country of California, little realizing that they were really the vanguards of a nation that was moving west.

1860: That year brought the pony express. South Carolina was first of the southern states to secede from the Union and war followed in the next few years, brother fighting brother.

1871: Mrs. O'Leary's cow stopped chewing her cud long enough to start a fire which burned its way to the ground, to be built anew.

A Hiale Is Born
1890: The civilized east began to put on silk stockings costing \$3 a pair; the people of America had the fountain pen, the electric trolley, Buffalo Bill's Wild West show, the status of liberty and John L. Sullivan. In the far west an irregular band of land left over from the Oregon territory after the states of Washington and Oregon had been formed, felt the breath of a new quarter within it, and Idaho became a state.

1900: We had held our first golf championship match and our automobile endurance contest had been won in 10 hours and 23 minutes over 12 1/2 mile course; the bicycle had replaced the old high top and a common sight to greet the brave new century was the bicycle built for two.

1907: The shirt waist was revamped, perforations embroidered at the edges and it was now called the "peek-a-boo" shirt, vastly daring.

1917: The tramp of booted feet had trampled over most of the defenseless countries of the old world, America turned her eyes to the hand beyond the Atlantic. A saddened world faced the succeeding years and we found that many of our boys had been left "over there."

"Hamm Row" Created
1920: That was the year the 18th amendment ushered in the boot-legal, and "Hamm Row" became an American institution. Will Rogers left the motion pictures for vaudeville and was cracked that he was the only film actor that came out of Hollywood with the same wife. The flapper appeared on the American scene and the torch song was born.

1929: With the slump of 1929 we became so engrossed in our own affairs that the clouds gathering in Europe were not noticed. A small dyspeptic house painter began a movement that soon would have the weak and infirmness growing under the feet of the Tyrant.

1940: The election of Roosevelt for the third term was an unprecedented event to the American political scene, but the liberties of our constitution still flourish and keep us the one country under the stars to value the individual above the government. Freedom under the flag is the status of liberty.

Reds Check German Plans for Middle East Offensive

BULGARIA TO REJECT NAZIS TERMS IN VICTORY

By J. W. T. MASON
 Unless Russia was expected for a military offensive through the middle east, at least for the time being, reports today from Moscow state great prominence is being given in Russian newspapers to Bulgaria's refusal to join the triple alliance and to the presence in Sofia of a Soviet diplomatic mission. This journalistic emphasis is indicative of a "knowing" Slav victory to the Russian people.

In Bulgaria, blackouts are to be discontinued and there is a public display of deep satisfaction that the nation has not been forced into the war in beyond reasonable doubt that Russia has gained Bulgaria's policy in recent weeks, when the Germans were struggling to force their adhesion to the tripartite pact.

Difficulties increase if the Germans were to force their way through Bulgaria in order to attack Turkey and so try to reach Suez, their difficulties would be increased seriously. Without cooperation of Bulgaria, the German general staff would have to face possibility of a Russian offensive, which might become active if the Turkish campaign became bogged. Too, an offensive in the middle east, even under the most advantageous conditions, would open the vital Rumanian oil fields to bombardment. With Bulgaria antagonistic to a German thrust, this danger would increase, making the wells a hostage to fortune.

By any standard of realistic strategy, therefore, it would seem safe to conclude Hitler must abandon at this time whatever tentative arrangements have been made to move against Suez through the middle east. The Germans may try another diplomatic maneuver later to change the Slav attitude, but only some development in the war menacing to Russia can ever cause Stalin to consent to further German expansion further threatening Russia's southern front.

Danger to Russia
 Already Rumania's signature to the triple treaty allows Germany a position on the Black sea which can only mean potential danger to Russia. It is incredible Stalin would voluntarily agree to Bulgaria's Black sea coast passing under German control, giving the Nazis overwhelming mastery of the western area of that waterway.

However much the Fuehrer may dream of reconquering Russia to his ambition of dominating the Balkans and controlling the middle east, it is unrealistic to suppose he can succeed by soft words and cooling argument. Only force can make Russia obedient and Germany is not prepared to deal harshly with Russia while the British empire continues the war.

PNEUMONIA WAVE HITS IN COUNTY

Twenty-one patients, an unprecedented number, are being treated for pneumonia at the present time at the county general hospital, records of that institution show.

Past records show that the usual number of pneumonia patients being treated at one time at the hospital falls "around six" at a time during the winter.

Patient treatment are being released daily but new cases are being admitted which keep the daily figure at the high level. The number of deaths has been unusually high for the past two weeks. In addition, several pneumonia patients are being treated at their residences.

Of the 21 in the hospital today for pneumonia treatment, it has been reported to place only three or four under the oxygen tent.

Officials of the district health unit this afternoon warned that "what appears to be minor colds should be treated at once." They added that if the cold fails to yield to treatment immediately, a physician should be consulted.

SCHOOL AT CAMP CLOSING FRIDAY

Schools will be "all over" for 50 grade school students at the farm labor camp south of the city come Friday afternoon. It was announced this afternoon by Roy C. Lane, camp manager.

The transient quarters at the camp officially close for the season on Friday, Dec. 1. Lane explained, and the grade school, which has been under the direction of the Twin Falls school board and Supt. Homer M. Davis, ends two days before.

Records show that the school during the peak had no less than 175 students, coming from the camps all over the state. The children residing in the permanent labor homes are attending city schools and will continue their studies until the summer shutdown.

Lane pointed out that although the shelters will be closed up Dec. 1, several families will remain several days longer because of illness which makes it impossible for them to move at this time. A large percentage of the persons in the transient farm labor portion of the camp at the present time will return to the field next week, others will go to Arizona for the cotton picking season and still others to California and other Pacific states. DIM YOUR LIGHTS—USE CARE IN PASSING

 The following letter appears to me to be vital. Any use to which you put it in the Public Forum will be appreciated and I, I think, serve the purpose of safety.

Dear Sir:

I note that your body meets tomorrow morning to consider recommendations to state, county and city traffic agencies, touching increased motorist safety on our highways. I wish to respectfully submit for your consideration two matters that seem to me vital, and responsible for many of our deaths and accidents within the state:

(1) Drivers generally are tardy in dimming their lights in night driving. I note repeatedly that drivers do not dim lights until within a comparatively short distance of an approaching car. Some drivers are blinded by approaching headlights at a distance as great as a half-mile while the result that pedestrians, cattle, or stalled cars are not visible to the blinded drivers. The rule of the road should therefore be: Dim your lights as soon as the other fellow requests you to do so by dimming his. This is only common courtesy and his observance should lead to the avoidance of many existing catastrophes.

(2) Many drivers approach within as little as 15 feet a car or truck which they have overtaken and intend to pass. On turning out to pass they not only form an angle with their general direction of travel great enough to bring on skids in slippery going, but they are utterly unable to see any approaching vehicle. This practice is resulting in many of our head-on collisions. The rule of the road should be: Do not approach closer than one hundred feet on the open highway any vehicle which you intend to pass; draw to left-hand lane while you still have the advantage of unobstructed view, then overtake and pass rapidly.

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COURT REPEALS ANTI-LABOR ACT
PORTLAND, Ore., (AP)—One of the most restrictive anti-picketing labor statutes in national history has been found invalid with little possible effect on this Pacific northwest state labor situation.

COURT REPEALS ANTI-LABOR ACT
The law, passed by a majority of 50,000 votes two years ago, was found invalid by the Oregon supreme court. It had never been enforced since its passage and the picketing it forbade has been carried on since without intrusion of police officers.

COURT REPEALS ANTI-LABOR ACT
The law also prohibited picketing in inter-union quarrels over jurisdiction. It provided for free access by any union member to the books of the union and strict supervision of collection of dues and assessments, the only provisions not held unconstitutional.

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After the law was enacted, no concerted effort was made to enforce it. Picketing during strikes and labor disputes leading up to 1938. It prohibited picketing or striking of an employer unless more than half of national history has been found invalid with little possible effect on this Pacific northwest state labor situation.

The commissioners meet Dec. 8 and County Superintendent of Schools O. C. Sullivan has placed the matter before the board and it appeared a date will be set for election to decide the formulation of independent school district No. 6. Seven teachers are now employed in the Ketchum school.

\$50,000,000 SET FOR NAVY BASES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP) — Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox announced today President Roosevelt has allocated \$50,000,000 for construction of necessary facilities for U. S. air and naval bases sites leased from Britain in this hemisphere.

The allocation came from a presidential "blank-check" fund appropriated by congress. Knox said the facilities to be constructed include storehouses, barracks, such things as fuel oil storages, and other facilities.

Knox also announced the United States and the local government at Trinidad had agreed upon a site for a base on the British island, subject to approval in London. Trinidad was the only one of the eight sites acquired in a trade with Britain that was not fully agreed upon.

Knox said it probably would be "some time" before any of the bases are completed, but reiterated the bases can be used immediately if necessary.

SURVEY WILL FIX DRAFT "CREDITS"

BOISE, Nov. 27 (Special) — Adjutant General M. G. McConnell, state director of selective service, announced today word had been received from national headquarters that it is conducting a nation-wide inventory of the present armed forces by "home addresses" in order to give proper credit for military service to local boys before June 30, 1941.

A net quota, which is the number of trainees to be supplied by a particular area, is the gross quota of men a community must furnish to the armed forces of the United States by a specified date, less credits. Each community, therefore, is given credit for its enlistments in the regular armed forces when its net quota of trainees is determined.

Estimated net quotas were received by the states last week and to local board areas several weeks ago, General McConnell said. However, he pointed out, in order to give proper credit from time to time against gross quotas, a careful check must be made of the armed forces to determine that they are being increased according to the estimated schedule.

With the help of the army, navy, marine corps and other defense agencies of similar character, "home address cards" for every man included into the armed forces, other than selective service trainees, are being catalogued at draft headquarters, General McConnell said. Credits for trainees are given as the men are accepted.

In this manner national headquarters can maintain a record of how the states are approximating their gross quotas and readjust net quotas accordingly. As the cards will be distributed to states on the basis of addresses, the states can check actual credits against local board net quotas and adjust them accordingly.

BRITISH BOMBARD ITALIAN ARSENAL

LONDON, Nov. 27 (AP) — British bombers striking at Berlin and the north Italy war industries blasted the royal arsenal at Turin, the air ministry said today, and greatly increased damage previously inflicted.

"Our bombers came over in quick succession and found no cloud over the city (Turin) and were able to pick out their objectives by various landmarks," the ministry said.

"The first aircraft arrived just before 11 p. m. and dropped high explosive and incendiary bombs which immediately started a number of fires."

"Talkative little fellow, isn't he?" was the caption.

Chained to the desk was a staved dog labeled "news-irony" and behind the desk was a row of cylinders marked, "smoke screens," "eye wash," "soft soap."

On the wall were several signs including this one: "To American Journalists: Whatever you are writing, don't. Whose war is this anyway?"

A refrigerator was labeled "cold storage for hot news."
