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# BROTHERS SEEK DIRECT TEST OF SELECTIVE SERVICE ACT

## ADDITIONAL TIME GRANTED TO PAIR TO DECIDE PLEA

**BOISE, Ida., Nov. 28 (AP)—**Clark and Boyd Cornell, Middleton brothers, charged with attempting to evade conscription, today sought a direct method of testing the constitutionality of the federal selective service act.

Appearing for arraignment in federal court, the brothers were granted extra time in presenting their plea and to prepare for procedure whereby constitutionality of the act may be tested without trial.

Attorney Vern Smith, Boise, represented the brothers and was granted until Friday to prepare a motion against the indictments. Smith pointed out if the brothers entered a plea it was not likely they would go to trial before the February term of federal court. To avoid this they may seek dismissal of the charges or be willing to register on the conditional phase.

Indictments against the pair were read charging them with violation of federal law on two counts—fully violating the selective service act by failure to register and violating the peace and dignity of the United States by refusal to register.

Other survivors include a sister, Mrs. Zelma Craig, Phoenix, Ariz., who has arrived to attend the services. In addition to this, Mrs. Mason listed the condition of William Mason, the woman's husband, as being "fair." He was driving the machine at the time of the mishap.

### Keep a Cool Nose and You Won't Catch Colds, This Study Indicates

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., (Special)—With thousands of ailments and ailments remedies for the common cold presenting themselves on every shelf and page, it's a relief—in more ways than one—to find a simple statement of the malarial from a scientist on the staff of the University of Illinois college of medicine in Champaign.

Dr. Lloyd Arnold, head of the department of bacteriology, says that anyone who can subject his body to that he can keep his nose-cool in a cold-slower can just about thumb his nose to colds.

For five years Dr. Arnold and his associates have been studying the causes of colds. They believe their discovery of the relationship between temperatures of the mucous membranes and cold susceptibility will be an important step in developing immunity to colds.

And Here's a Key

The temperature of the nose is the key to the whole problem. What to do about it is so simple that Dr. Arnold is frankly skeptical of how his findings will be received.

First, he and his associates found that most people can be classified in three groups with respect to immunity: (1) those who never contract colds; (2) those who get only two or three times a year, most often in the winter, and (3) those who have colds most of the time.

Experiments then showed that the noses of those who were immune cooled off a degree or two in a cold bath and became warm in a warm bath. Those who had occasional colds showed the same characteristics, but the reaction was delayed. Their noses took a long time to come back to normal.

Those of those who have colds persistently behave in an astonishing manner. They become warm in cooling baths and cool in hot baths.

How to Cool the Nose

It was found that in many cases patients could develop normal noses and acquire partial immunity by taking cold showers night and morning.

The beneficial effects of returning noses to normal, he said, can be increased by diet and mental tranquility. Depletion of carbohydrates was found to result in an increased immunity to colds.

**BRUCE CATTON in Washington**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—While the general public thinks in terms of battleships and cruisers when it comes to building up the navy, the most important parts of the navy's defense program involves much less spectacular units. The former mainstay of the navy's defense program, the navy is energetically pushing the purchase of privately-owned vessels for its auxiliary fleet. Since July 1 it has bought 130 ships, ranging all the way from big merchant vessels to diminutive tugboats and harbor tugs. All of these craft are considered as essential to the navy's proper operation as are the big fighting ships themselves.

For the merchant ships there is a variety of uses.

Some of the bigger vessels—like the "President" liners, for instance—are put into service as transports. Others are converted into seaplane tenders, submarine tenders or destroyer tenders. The former mainstay commission cargo—carrier Shooting Star, as a sample, is about to go into navy service as a ammunition carrier. A large number of tankers will serve the fleet as oilers.

Former yachts, meanwhile, are being converted into patrol vessels. Harold Vanderbilt's "Vasa" is becoming a submarine chaser. Col. Edward A. Deets' "Lotusland" is being converted into a minesweeper. The sleek "Orion," bought from the J. Foranman estate, is being commissioned as a gunboat.

Sender of the fourth class matter is required to sign an affidavit transferring interest in the goods to a foreign agent, thus relieving the U. S. government of responsibility after the package leaves federal jurisdiction.

# ITALIANS CLAIM GREATEST NAVAL VICTORY OF WAR

## TWO OF BRITISH CRUISERS HIT BY ENEMY ATTACKS

ROME, Nov. 28 (AP)—Italy claimed her greatest naval victory today when she today in an engagement with the British fleet off Sardinia. Two British cruisers were damaged by shell fire and a battleship and a British carrier and a cruiser were hit by heavy aerial bombs, the high command asserted.

The communication said the Italian cruiser, Plume, had been struck by a shell which did not explode and the crack new destroyer Leclere was damaged so seriously it had to be towed to port.

In the surface engagement, which occurred yesterday afternoon, Italian warships scored direct hits on two British cruisers, one of the Kent class, the other of the Birmingham class, the communication said. The British fleet then ceased fire and a heavy bomber force of aircraft carrier, a battleship and a cruiser and the battleship was left afloat, the Italians asserted.

During the air attack it was said, five British chasers from the aircraft carrier were shot down while Italian planes, a bomber and a chaser, were lost.

## U. S. Threatens Arrests on 'Michels Grass' Shipments

BOISE, Nov. 28 (AP)—Controversy over identity of a new grain developed by a University of Idaho professor today brought a warning from the U. S. department of agriculture that growers would be subject to arrest if they shipped so-called "michels grass" out of the state without labeling it "rye."

The federal agency said the grass is "regarded as rye and must be so labeled when shipped in interstate commerce" to avoid violation of the federal seed act.

The state department of agriculture contended the michels grass is a new type plant, a cross between rye and wheat, and is particularly adaptable to growth in dry soil. Agriculture Commissioner E. M. Kelly gave said Idaho farmers lost "thousands of dollars" when the federal government failed to recognize the seed.

Two planes, one piloted by Bob Johnson and another by Penn Stott, were sent out from Missoula, Mont., but were forced to turn back because of the snow storm.

Lavalley was brought to the cabin in about 10 miles from the nearest road, on a stretcher slung between horses. He had been working in the Golden Dragon mine on the middle fork of the Salmon river when he became ill.

SHOSHONE, Nov. 28 (Special)—With warmer weather returning, everything was in readiness for the "big" game of the year here on Friday when Shoshone and Albion high schools tangle on the local field for the south central Idaho Class B championship.

The game is slated to get under way at 2 p. m. and expected capacity crowd is anticipated to be on hand for the final event of the year.

Both clubs enter the fray with undefeated records. In Class B competition, Shoshone won the right to represent the north side in the title conflict by turning back Hagerman at Gooding by a 21-0 count, while Albion sewed up the north side crown by downing Declo in its last game.

Great Records While Shoshone has lost in Class A competition, Coach L. T. Dolph's boys have not been greatly pressed in Class B play. The only game the Albion record all season is a scoreless tie played with the Kimberly Bulldogs under floodlights on the Kimberly field.

Coach Dolph announces that his boys will again be in fine shape for the championship contest and the regular lineup that has started in nearly all the games this season will be on the field when the opening whistle blows for the title battle.

While Shoshone has outwheeled all its Class B opponents this year by a wide margin, it may not hold such an edge over the Albion youngsters. The Indians will have the advantage—but only by a few points.

Test of Tackling Skill In meeting the Blue Devils, the Indians will get a chance to test their tackling skill against two of the outstanding backs in Class B ball this year—Glen Engking and Coach Dolph's tackle, Guy Newman.

Local fans are looking for a thriller that would equal the Jerome-Shoshone contest earlier in the season—and they'll probably get it.

Harmon's total of 1,303 points, just like the 33 touchdowns he tallied to better by two the record of Red Grange, was unprecedented and topped by 462 the aggregate of John Kimbrough of Texas A. & M.

Reporting that 20,000,000 fish were planted in Idaho waters during the last year and 30,000 birds released during the same period from the Jerome and Layton game farms, John Boyle, Boise, state game warden, presided at the Pittman-Robertson sportsmen's highlighted the semi-annual banquet of the Southern Idaho Fish and Game association at the Park hotel here last night.

As about 125 sportsmen from throughout the county listened, Boyle pointed to the exceptionally fine work being done in this state on wildlife conservation.

He stated that under the program to remove beaver from agricultural sections, where they may be causing damage, and to place them where their work will be beneficial, 1,211 of the beaver have been trapped and transplanted. He also pointed to the fact that 22,900 acres of land have been planted in northern Idaho as a deer refuge.

Showing the work being done in this state, Mr. Boyle pointed to convictions for game violations during the past year, compared with other years. During the period from 1933-39 there were 1,823 convictions—compared with 671 for the first 11 months of 1940 alone.

In attendance at the meeting were other notables from state offices, including George Booth, Boise, chairman of the state game warden's commission, who commended clubs of the state for cooperation with the commission—pointing to the fact that the aid of these clubs was helping make the conservation program effective.

Mr. Booth praised the work of Owen Morris, state fish and game director, as being one of the major points in the advancement of game conservation in this state.

Hagerman Work Speeds Told of operations of his department and associated work was speeding ahead on the Hagerman valley project, claiming that conservation activities in the state were reaching a new high.

Short talks were also given by Curtis Price, Minidoka forest supervisor, who explained his stand against increasing the deer slaughter in the open hunt for that sector; and James Gerow, federal conservation officer, who stated that Idaho ranks high among the western states in conservation of wildlife.

The program was presided over by Sam Stewart, who acted as toastmaster.

Harmon ran wild against Ohio State for 309 yards and hung up his makings with an eight-game total of 1,368 yards, 12 better than last year. This was the best performance in an eight-game schedule since Wintzer White starred for Colorado.

Leaps to First By virtue of an amazing display, Harmon leaped from eighth to first place in total offense among the nation's top 100 yards. He had 1940 appeared likely to go to Creighton's Johnny Knolia who, with one game left, had 1,293 yards to his credit.

Knolia was in third place, behind Paul Christman of Missouri, who carried with 1,212 yards. Bill Sewell of Washington State college, in fifth and one game to go, also had a slight chance to overtake Harmon.

Rushing Honors At Oshkosh, Detroit university's heavy-duty back, clinched rushing honors with 957 yards, best since White. Sewell topped the passing department again with 30 completions for 1,131 yards, the best since Davey O'Brien played for Texas.
