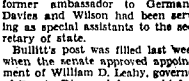

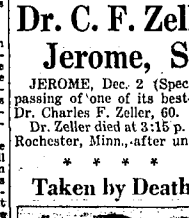

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NEW MEXICAN CHIEF PLEDGES HEMISPHERE DEFENSE

WALLACE GIVEN PLACE OF HONOR AT INAUGURATION

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 2 (AP)—The government of President Manuel Avila Camacho was pledged today to a policy of democratic cooperation in the defense of the western hemisphere.

Avila Camacho was inaugurated in a 26-minute ceremony Sunday, succeeding President Lazaro Cardenas.

The day passed peacefully. There were no reverberations of an alleged plot to assassinate the new president which police claimed to have thwarted. Nor were there any anti-United States demonstrations such as greeted Vice-President-elect Henry A. Wallace when he arrived last week as President Roosevelt's ambassador extraordinary and plenipotentiary to the inauguration.

Favorable to U. S. The enthusiastic official greeting given Wallace, the appointment of pro-United States ministers to the new cabinet, the raising of the navy department to the status of a full cabinet ministry and Avila Camacho's speech were interpreted as favorable indications of closer United States-Mexican relations.

Accompanied by Ambassador Joseph Daniels and 24 other official United States representatives, Wallace occupied a place of honor at the ceremonies. He said Avila Camacho's pledge to lead Mexico in hemispheric cooperation "is one of the strongest ever made by any Mexican statesman."

Union of Strength "President Avila Camacho appears to vision the strengthening of the economic power of the hemisphere and the day when the whole hemisphere shall cooperate economically so as to be able to meet any challenge which might come from the old world," he said.

To me the outstanding point he made was his strong statement on Pan-Americanism. Apparently he believes that differences which may exist between the various nations of this hemisphere can be subordinated to a doctrine of peaceful cooperation. He asserted the defense of the Americas is a common cause to which all nations of this hemisphere should owe their allegiance.

The movies were both educational and entertaining. Funds derived from the small amount of money after paying cost of films, will be added to the loan fund.

County Agent C. L. Mink, who was in charge of the program, gave some interesting data from his annual report on 4-H club work. He summarized the 4-H club work of the year from its beginning in the spring of 1940 and told of the progress of organization of the clubs.

The 212 projects were valued at \$5,508.27 cents and as shown by their records they involved an expense of \$3,687.88 and returned a net profit to the 201 club members \$18,008.

27 BODIES TAKEN FROM OHIO MINE

CADIZ, O., Dec. 2 (AP)—The bodies of four more of the 31 miners killed by an explosion in the depths of the Nelms mine of the Ohio and Pennsylvania Coal company Friday were removed from the workings today.

The total number of bodies thus far recovered stood at 27 with four more yet to be found. Twenty-two were reached yesterday and one body was recovered Saturday. All were brought up the mine shaft and taken to the company's blacksmith shop where they were identified by relatives. In some cases the bodies were so disfigured identification was difficult.

The diggers had been working steadily since the explosion Friday evening. They had dug through nearly 1,400 feet of debris which blocked the mine passages, but still were unable to determine what caused the explosion.

Officials of the United Mine Workers union, CIO affiliate, charged the explosion could have been avoided if the mine had had adequate inspection. Company officials made no comment.

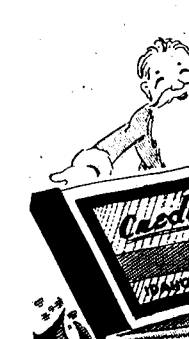

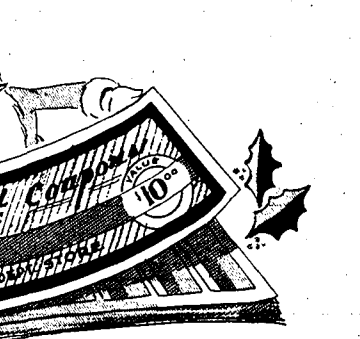

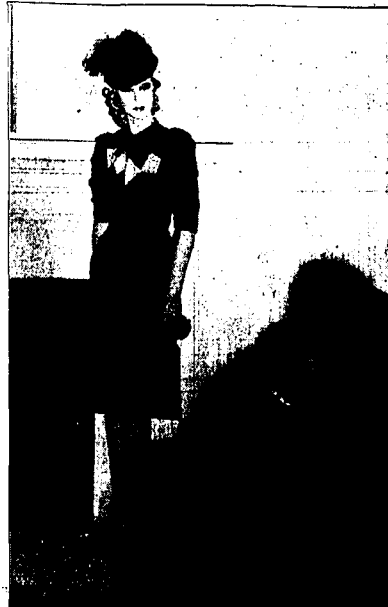

Germans Fail to Weaken British by Night Raiding

Intensified of indiscriminate terror bombings of British cities is causing considerable financial loss to Britain, but is not weakening the British war effort to any major extent. No demoralization is apparent in strength of the royal air force, whose ammunition always has been the main objective of the German air offensive.
Indeed, by confining their attacks so largely to night visitations, the Germans may be said to have abandoned, at least for the present, their attempts to gain mastery of the air by destroying Britain's aviation defenses. Only by daylight attacks, when targets are visible, would it be theoretically possible to overwhelm British air power.
This is more important than the damage being done by night raids on British cities, night bombings, at worst, demoralizing in effect, but not affecting the industrial plants, which are the essential contributing factor to the increasing strength of Britain in the air is the speed with which American factories can produce planes.
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EXPLOSION ROCKS TACOMA FACTORY

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 2 (AP)—An explosion rocked the Columbia Powder Co. plant at Frederickson, 10 miles south of here today, and Dr. T. H. Long, Pierce county coroner, said he had been informed two men and possibly four, were dead.
Officials of the powder company roped off the entire area and refused entrance even to state patrolmen.
The company makes blasting powder and was not engaged in work on national defense orders.
The explosion occurred 45 minutes before the day shift reported for work.
Company officials refused to comment on the explosion.
Windows were broken at nearby McCord field, giant, U. S. army air base, and in homes at Sparway and Parkland, Tacoma suburbs.
The blast followed for four days an explosion at the du Pont Powder company works at du Pont near Fort Lewis.

ITALIANS REPORT SHIPS UNINJURED

ITALIAN NAVAL BASE "X," Dec. 2 (AP)—Two battleships and three cruisers said to have participated in a naval battle with British warships off the coast of Sardinia, lay apparently undamaged here today.
Foreign correspondents were invited here by the press ministry to inspect the ships to disprove British claims that they had been damaged and made unfit for use. The naval battle occurred Nov. 27. The ships inspected were the battleships Vittorio Veneto and Giulio Cesare and the 10,500-ton cruisers Fiume, Pola and Gorizia. So far as the correspondents could see the ships had not been damaged and their officers said they had not received a single hit. Other 10,000-ton cruisers which were in the same squadron in the battle were at another base. Authorities said they were in the rear of the squadron formation and did not arrive at the scene until the battle was nearly over.
Naval officers who took part in the battle said it lasted 48 minutes and that only one Italian destroyer had been damaged.

MAGICIAN GETS BERTH AS ASSISTANT PASTOR

CHICAGO, Dec. 2 (AP)—Handsome John Booth, who forsook the nightclubs for a pulpit to make his single program for "Sunday" today accepted the title of assistant pastor of St. Paul's Congregational church. Women wept and others said, "Thrilled" Sunday as he preached his first professional sermon with slight-of-hand.
Booth stepped to the pulpit before an astonished congregation and produced an empty cylinder—"your life," he called it and placed in it ribbons of multi-colored silk. He played his wrist. A bit of gentleness rose toward from the vessel.
"As you saw your good deeds, so shall they blossom," he said.

STANFORD MEETS NEBRASKA IN ROSE BOWL

Shaughnessy Team Selects Big Six Champions for New Year's Day Encounter

West Gets 2nd Choice of "Bow" Clubs
By JAMES A. SULLIVAN

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 2 (UP)—Stanford university's football team, which couldn't win a Pacific Coast conference game last season, will play University of Nebraska in the Rose bowl at Pasadena Jan. 1.

Nebraska was invited last night by Al Masters, Stanford graduate manager.

Maj. Lawrence T. (Bill) Jones, athletic director for the Cornhuskers, "grateful and delighted," conferred with Dr. H. D. Bergman of Iowa State, head of the Big Six faculty committee, who contacted the other members. Within a short time, they agreed to waive the conference rule against post-season games.

Stanford became the Rose bowl host by defeating California 13 to 7 Saturday, its ninth of the season and tenth in a row. Stanford's only victory in 1939 was over Dartmouth in the final game.

After the Pacific Coast conference faculty representatives went through formality of making the Indiana conference bowl team, Stanford's three-man committee sat down to pick an opponent.

Boston College, Tennessee and Mississippi State had made their arrangements. Pennsylvania had declined a "feeler," Cornell, Michigan and Minnesota couldn't accept because of conference rules which couldn't be waived.

Texas A. & M. and Nebraska both with imperfect records remained. It was reported there was pressure from Los Angeles against another southern team again; so Nebraska was invited.

The choice was made by Fullback Norman Blandie, representing the team; Prof. William B. Owens, faculty representative; and Masters.

Nebraska, defeated only once by Minnesota—will be the first representative of the Big Six conference in the Rose bowl.

Started Rolling
The Cornhuskers, after their initial setback by Minnesota, defeated Indiana, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Iowa, Pittsburgh, Iowa State and Kansas State, rolling up 170 points to their opponents.

Stanford, with a new coach at the helm—Clark D. Shaughnessy, who came from the University of Chicago when it de-emphasized football—had an inspired season. With comparative ease, it turned back University of San Francisco, University of Oregon, Santa Clara, Washington State, Southern California, University of California, Los Angeles, Washington, Oregon State and California.

It was announced Stanford would give its alumni first chance to buy Rose bowl tickets at \$4.00 each. An allotment will be set aside for Nebraska and its supporters, and 15,000 general admission tickets will be placed on sale at Pasadena.

In the last 12 classic bowl games, Stanford turned back Tennessee, 14-0.

Break-up Danger in Big Six Passes as Teams Set '41 Play

The danger of a break-up in the Southern Idaho conference was a thing of the past today and members of the big-town loop in the state went about their work in preparation for the 1941 season following the annual winter meeting held here on Saturday.

The threat to break up the loop was ended when directors, in session at the Rogerson hotel, voted to help share the expenses of all schools toward traveling out of a \$600 expense fund that will be paid in by the six schools.

Idaho Falls, at the north end of the conference, had threatened to withdraw if there wasn't some stabilization made toward the sharing of traveling expenses—but the matter was quickly settled by the members from the state schools' attendance. Representatives were present from Caldwell, Boise, Nampa, Pocatello, Idaho Falls and Twin Falls.

Rapel Is Secretary
The season re-elected George Rapel, 1940 president, as a member on the board of directors, with L. A. Williams, Caldwell, moving up automatically to the presidency. Ed Rapel, Twin Falls high school principal, gets the secretaryship, which gives him the presidency in 1942.

To settle the trouble over officials handling conference games George Fields, Boise, was named chairman of a committee to devise a master list of officials—which must be submitted by each coach before Feb. 1.

At the spring meeting of the coaches in Boise during the state basketball tournament, the official list will be drawn up. Arguments in recent years between Pocatello and Nampa brought about the new system.

Mel Hein, the Giants' 31-year-old veteran, was again the league's best center, an honor he's held almost continually for 10 years.

Steve Silivinski, Washington Redskins' back, changing lineman, was named as running mate with Fortmann at guard. The two tackles are Jim Barber, the Redskins' 230-pounder, the Brusar Kinard, Brooklyn's outstanding lineman.

Jim Foote, New York Giants, and Don Hutson, Green Bay Packers, were picked as ends.

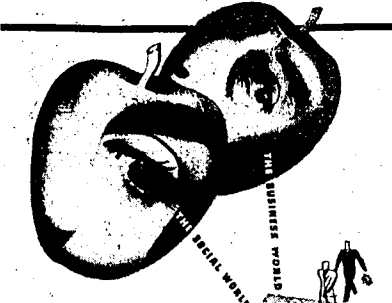

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PRESIDENT TO LEAVE ON CARIBBEAN INSPECTION TOUR

EXECUTIVE GOES SOUTH BY TRAIN TO BOARD CRAFT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (AP)—President Roosevelt will last-minute preparations for his departure today for a week-long inspection of Panama canal defenses in the Caribbean where he will board the U. S. S. Tuscaloosa which will take him to sea from Norfolk, Va., last Friday.

The cruiser, used by Mr. Roosevelt on previous Presidential tours, was expected to take him to the scene of scheduled fleet maneuvers off Cuba's island, some 30 miles northeast of Puerto Rico.

In the President's party were former Secretary of Commerce Harry L. Hopkins, Maj. Gen. Edwin M. Watson, military aide, Capt. Daniel J. Callahan, naval aide, and Rear Admiral Ross T. McIntire, surgeon general of the navy and Mr. Roosevelt's personal physician.

Prior to his departure Mr. Roosevelt conferred with Admiral William D. Leahy, newly-appointed American ambassador to France, who will leave soon for his Vichy assignments.

Americanism, Charity Are Vital, Elks Speaker Says

Declaring that in times such as these there is a demand for the more general acceptance and the more universal application of the charity and the Americanism which Elksdom "would have us learn and apply," Judge Hugh A. Baker, Elks speaker, Sunday, stressed the importance of the annual memorial service of the local Elks lodge, held in the Venetian room.

Judge Baker's address was given during the memorial service (featuring officers of the lodge in leading roles). A tea, with wives of Elks members in charge, followed the services.

"The character of the occasion and the cherished memories of the specific virtues of the departed bring to our hearts a tenderness which we too infrequently know. It is compassion that now feel can, for even a short time, cause us to treat the living with a small portion of the same tenderness with which we instinctively treat the dead, we shall truly memorialize. Our deceased brothers would not ask that we attempt to do more," Judge Baker said.

Critical Period

He continued by declaring that the teachings of Elksdom are now facing a most critical period. "In these days of untold strife, of bitterness and of hate, of land and greed for power, when class is aligned against class and race against race, when more blood of progress brings us to the very threshold of the active hostility of another, when tolerance and the charity which it produces are the more universal application of the charity and the Americanism which Elksdom teaches is facing its most critical period, when the principles which gave it birth are tottering under the attacks made against them, there is a demand for the more general acceptance of the more universal application of the charity and the Americanism which Elksdom would have us learn and apply."

"We could not more appropriately honor the memory of our departed brothers than by determining more thoroughly to know and more diligently to apply the truths we should learn here."

"The thought may be selfish, but services of this character bring to us with definite force the realization that we all of us, are moving steadily and unescapably toward the same inevitable end and that in time, perhaps brief, our voices will be still, our hopes and our ambitions will be shattered and crushed, our work will be done and our names will appear on the roll of the dead."

"May this service bring us a clearer understanding of the necessity of the utmost diligence in our efforts to realize our hopes, attain our ambitions and do the work we set out to do while there may be time so that our names will be somewhat in order when that unfiled guest comes. They whose names now appear on the scroll bound in black would be happy in the knowledge that this service had contributed to that end," Judge Baker asserted.

UNIONS JOIN FOR LUMBER STRIKE

CENTRALIA, Wash., Dec. 2 (AP)—Delegates from CIO and AFL lumber unions gave the principal address today and voted to effect "as broad a leup as possible" in the northwest lumber mills unless their wage demands are met.

Almost every local of the Lumber and Sawmill Workers union (AFL) and the International Woodworkers of America (CIO) was represented at the meeting where unification of wage and working standards was discussed.

It was feared a mass shutdown faced every mill from the Canadian border to the California line unless the present wage scale of 62 1/2 cents an hour was boosted to 70 cents, and a week's vacation with pay is provided annually.

BLACKFOOT, Dec. 2 (AP)—Dr. W. S. Hoge, Blackfoot dentist, died yesterday of loss of blood after an accidental discharge of a shot gun while hunting near Springfield, 23 miles west of here.

BRITISH PLANES BLAST AT FOES

LONDON, Dec. 2 (AP)—The air ministry reported today royal air force planes in the last 24 hours smashed again at Nazi naval ship-building yards at Wilhelmshaven in the course of widespread raids that included attacks on objectives in Norway, Denmark and occupied France.

The ministry said all planes engaged in the attack upon Wilhelmshaven returned safely.

Coastal command planes bombed the German submarine base at Lorient and the docks at Brest. American-bull Hudson Lockheed attacked the harbor works at Kristiansund, Norway, and other British aircraft blasted the gas works at Esbjerg, Denmark, causing a big explosion.

BRITISH REPORT DESTROYER LOSS

LONDON, Dec. 2 (AP)—The admiralty today reported loss of the destroyer Sturdy, 806-ton, the 33rd British destroyer admitted lost since start of the war.

The Sturdy is a small destroyer built under the World War 1918-19 program. It carried a normal complement of 98 men.

LONDON, Dec. 2 (AP)—The submarine Triton, which sank a 4,000-ton German supply ship and torpedoed two vessels in a Nazi convoy during the Norwegian invasion, is overdue and must be presumed lost, the admiralty said.

The Triton is the 20th submarine Britain has lost.

The Triton was a "patrol type" and normally carried a complement of 53 men.

AIR CHAIN BANS MUSIC BY ASCAP

NEW YORK, Dec. 2 (AP)—The Columbia Broadcasting system has banned the music of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, after a long battle with ASCAP.

ASCAP music has been prohibited by CBS on all its sustaining programs although commercial programs may use it until Jan. 1 when the contract between ASCAP and radio stations expires.

The radio chains charge ASCAP with excessive demands in a proposed new contract and have set up a rival firm, Broadcast Music, Inc., to replace ASCAP music.

ASCAP contends the increase asked in the new contract is justified by the fact that radio chains will be taxed as such for the first time.

ASCAP controls most of the familiar music written since the turn of the century and has in its catalogue the music of Victor Herbert, Jerome Kern, Irving Berlin and Cole Porter. BMI is sponsoring new song writers and has purchased the catalogues of firms unaffiliated with ASCAP.
