WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The Vultee Aircraft plant in Downey, Calif., has given the labor people in the defense commission something pretty close to think about, in that the labor settlement has unquestionably furthered the idea of legalized, compulsory arbitration for labor disputes in defense industries, on a no-strikes-allowed basis.

In Washington, it was apparent that there were wheels within wheels in every phase of the Vultee scrap. One of the latest of these wheels revolved around the Communists' desire to take Sidney Hillman, labor's man on the national defense commission, and put him in a hole at the Atlantic City C. I. O. convention, running at the same time that Hillman has long been recognized leader of the "moderate group" which fights to lessen Communist party influence in the C. I. O. 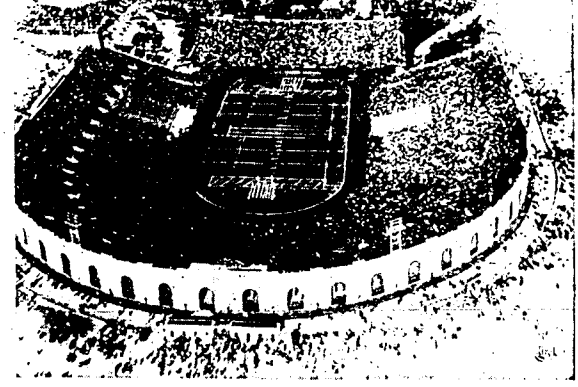

NEW YORK — The Glens landing in Orengo from the Cardinals leaves New York cold.

That is quite natural on the heels of Brooks giving the Phillies \$100,000 for a fast-ball pitcher like Kirby Higbe.

But Orengo may be of more use to the Polo Grounds than some of the folks suspect.

For one thing, the San Francisco Italian will get to play one post-season game long enough to get acquainted with it.

Orengo demonstrated his versatility last season by handling every infield job except first base for the Red Birds.

A home run hitter and a brilliant performer in the Pacific Coast league in 1939, Orengo, who has just turned 24, although he has been in the Cardinal chain since 1935, easily may have been the victim of the hit-and-miss St. Louis management of more recent years.

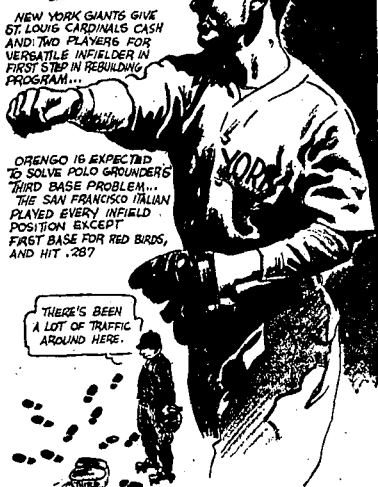
Because he was superior to competitors and because other clubs would have claimed him at the water price, the Cardinals retained Orengo throughout last season.

# NEW LEGISLATION LOOMS ON CAMPAIGN EXPENDITURES

## SENATOR CLAIMS 1940 ELECTIONS HIT MORAL LOW

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (UP)—The senate campaign expenditures committee will recommend to the next congress revision of federal election laws which its chairman, Sen. Roy M. Cullen, D. Mo., believes essential to prevent further debauchery of the ballot box.

Sen. Cullen, in a radio address last night, charged that never in American history has there been a "more patent, potent and potential attempt" to influence an election through expenditure of huge sums of money than this year.

He said that while the federal Hatch acts and the corrupt practices law had been amended steps toward clean elections "recent experience" indicate instead need for amendment.

Sen. Cullen emphasized he did not speak for the committee but said "it is my hope and belief our committee will have something tangible to suggest to the senate in its report next month."

The proposed clarification of the \$10,000 ceiling on a political committee's expenditures and the \$5,000 maximum individual contribution to provide a check on expenditures and contributions to state, local and independent committees working in behalf of the candidate.

"To Last Degree"

He also would prohibit the use and "chastise" circulation of securities, obscene or subversive campaign literature which he said was carried to the last degree in the 1940 campaign.

Other suggested reforms included prevention of coercion of employees by private employers and misuse of the farm program by federal employees or local committees for political purposes. He urged states adopt little Hatch acts and take every step to purge registration rolls of fraudulent names.

Following the services, refreshments were served in the church basement to a large number of the congregation.

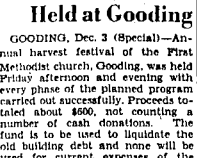

## Burley Develops Airport to One of Four Finest in Idaho

BURLEY, Dec. 3 (Special)—Development of Burley municipal airport to a status as one of the four best airports in Idaho has been made possible by the federal works agency, Mayor Fred J. Hill, stated in summarizing achievements of the WPA and city of Burley in local airport improvement during the past year.

In a joint summary of developments at the local field the mayor and Art Solomon, chairman of the city council airport committee, point out that during the past two years the WPA and city have expended \$37,600 for airport modernization, and earlier projects by WPA in former years have brought to the city a permanent improvement valued at more than \$100,000.

Newest phase of the development, which has undergone considerable revision to meet CAA requirements and national defense needs, has been the relocation of the major beam runway to the eastern edge of the field, leveling thousands of yards of dirt with heavy equipment to bring the field down to grade and construction and surfacing of two new runways 150 feet wide and 3,700 and 4200 feet in length.

Consequently, the officials point out, with the completion of a small hangar for two training planes, the field is now serviceable for local pilot training use and for emergency landings of larger craft such as airliners and bombers.

The improvements entailed moving a vast amount of dirt with steam shovels and bulldozers, lowering the eastern edge of the field by several feet to make possible construction of the new runway designated by the A.A. as taxiway on the prevailing wind direction.

Gravel Surfacing

Three inches of gravel surfacing have been laid on the two new runways and the old major runway running east and west is being corrected to proper grade with the use of the same heavy equipment. Previously the east and west runway was believed to be in line with the prevailing wind.

Unexpended WPA funds plus a limited amount of aid from the state bureau of aeronautics will enable completion of the third runway with three inches of gravel surfacing before the present project is exhausted.

Newest step in the airport expansion has been the securing of an additional tract of land bordering the airport on the northeast and extending to Snake river which will mean extension of the beam runway to 4,200 feet. The city has asked the Burley highway district to close a road separating the two tracts so that the airport may be enlarged to meet government CAA specifications.

Approval of the Burley airport as a national-defense project has been obtained although allotment of \$223,000 in funds to the project is still pending action in Washington, D. C. on a new estimate submitted by City Engineer Edward P. Eardley.

This work includes increasing gravel on runways to nine inches, widening of the beam runway to 200 feet, hard surfacing of all three runways, installation of complete drainage and construction of boundary lights.

CAA Specifications

These improvements are in compliance with CAA requirements and have been submitted to Paul Morris, Seattle, regional airport engineer, who is now in Washington seeking final approval and allotment of funds.

Broken down, these costs are: Extension of beam runway, \$4,150; runway drainage, \$34,686; hard-surfacing of runways, \$109,267; finishing grading of remainder of airport, \$6,680; completion of border,
