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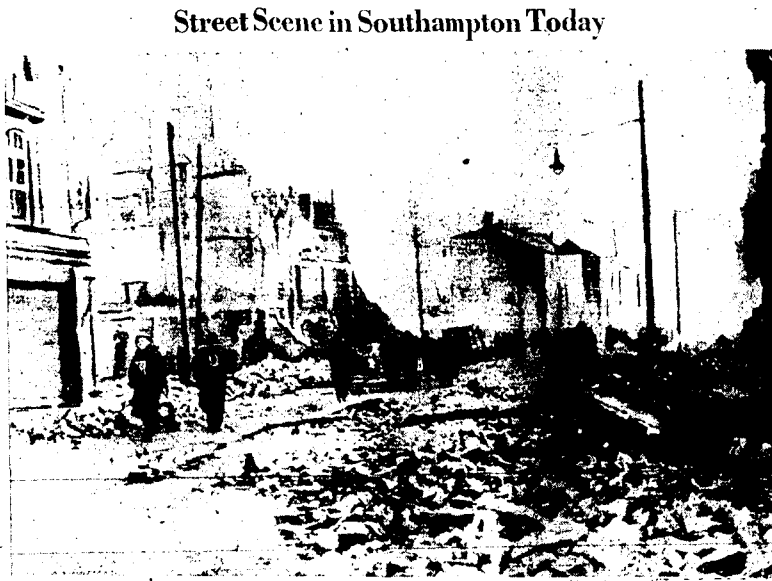

PARTY LEADERS LAY GROUNDWORK FOR IDAHO SESSION

THREE IN LEAD FOR POSITION AS HOUSE SPEAKER

BOISE, Dec. 5 (UP)—A prelude to the opening of Idaho's 1941 legislative session was sounded this week as party leaders and party officials started gathering in Boise to lay groundwork for the coming session.

Democrats set up headquarters in the Hotel Boise. State Chairman Robert Coulter opened the office in preparation for the arrival of Governor-Elect Chase A. Clark.

Republicans rallied around Thomas A. Keith, GOP state chairman and state senator from Franklin county. Discussion at the two camps centered around tentative plans for new legislation and leadership of the two houses.

Alan Newman, representative from Nez Perce county, and Frank M. Distline, Bannock county representative, and Arnold Williams, Madison county legislator, are most prominently mentioned for the house speakership.

Takes New Post

Hope to Avoid Fights

Any factional fights within the parties could carry almost any of the more experienced members into the senate position. However, such disputes were believed unlikely to develop to prevent unsetting of any "apple cart."

A trial balloon sent up by Rep. H. C. O'Leary of Pocatello regarding revision of the state liquor system drew the fire of Idaho dry leaders. O'Leary suggested retail sale of liquor by bottle.

The proposal was branded by Harry Kessler, leader of the Allied Forces which sponsored the recent dry initiative, as a "return of the licensed saloon." Kessler said the system "would not lessen the lure of our wet friends who will flock their base for arid days."

See Prohibition Return

Others joined Kessler in stating that a "secular" liquor law might speed up return of prohibition.

A proposal that caused considerable discussion was disclosed by a member of the legislature. A bill might be introduced to set up a unicameral legislature in Idaho. The one-house system, its proponents contend, would speed up the legislative process and eliminates the time absorbed by committee study of proposed bills.

Two other proposals shared press attention. Attorney General J. W. Taylor's recommendation that the legislature meet in two sessions with a recess between for study of bills may be carried to the floor as a concrete plan. Taylor suggested the lawmakers meet for 30 days to introduce bills and then recess. Later they would meet again to discuss the measures.

The other plan is for a constitutional amendment granting four year terms to county and state elective officials. Its proponents claim the state would save election costs and that officers would get an opportunity to become acquainted with duties of their offices before another election rolled around.

"FLU" EPIDEMIC SWEEPS TO EAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 5 (UP)—An epidemic of mild influenza which affected thousands in California today moved east—into Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

In Phoenix, Ariz., Dr. J. D. Danaher, acting head of the state health board, noted "an alarming increase" in the number of influenza cases—359 new cases last week, 125 the week before.

Boise, Ida., physicians also reported "an alarming increase." A "mild epidemic" was noted in Seattle by Dr. Frank M. Carroll, city health commissioner. Oregon officials said there were a "number" of cases there but did not call the outbreak an "epidemic."

Dr. Bertram Brown, California state health director, said the epidemic there apparently had reached its peak and was subsiding.

"There were no exact figures on the number of cases but they totaled into the hundreds of thousands," Dr. Brown said. "Deaths were striking in Los Angeles alone."

Army to Receive 268 Acres From Boise for Base

BOISE, Dec. 5 (UP)—City officials will offer the U. S. army a total of 268 acres of land for the new air base to be established here, Mayor James L. Straight announced today.

The original grant was 60 acres, but the mayor said possibility of future growth made it advisable to increase the allotment.

Pictures Feature At Model Session

Natural color motion pictures of events at the intermountain gas model airplane meet, held recently at Salt Lake City, were shown here last night at the Idaho Power company auditorium with an estimated 180 youths present.

Among the spectators was Lionel A. Dean, local commercial aviator. Dean said the number attending the session "certainly shows the direction of their thinking along these lines."

Dale Clark, Twin Falls, was instrumental in obtaining the color pictures. He is also instrumental in the organization of the Magic Valley Gas Buss, a regional association of model plane builders.

LDS CHURCHMEN EN ROUTE HOME

HONOLULU, Dec. 5 (UP)—Fourteen Mormon missionaries reached Honolulu today on the yacht Benita from the South sea, marking withdrawal of the last representatives of the church's (the Latter Day Saints from south of Hawaii).

The missionaries, led by Eugene M. Cannon, have been recalled to Salt Lake City by their church. They left native elders in charge of the work they first undertook in 1844.

Cannon said they did not know the reason for their recall, although they thought it likely was due to the far eastern situation.

SCHONER TIE-UP ENDED ON COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 5 (UP)—A 35-day tieup of the Pacific coast steamer schooner fleet ended today when the sailors union of the Pacific and the Masters, Mates and Pilot Association, both AFL, signed a contract covering wage scale and working conditions with the shipping association of the Pacific coast.

Within a few hours it was expected the 42 vessels tied up in port from Seattle to San Diego would have steamed up and sea to resume their job of carrying cargoes, principally lumber, vital to defense programs.

The masters and mates gave approval to a tentative agreement late yesterday by a 223 to 18 vote taken in the various ports, the sixth and last union to reach a contract agreement. All unions won modified pay increases.

Seven Migratory Camps Scheduled To Open in Idaho

BOISE, Dec. 5 (UP)—Louis Nuffer, California migratory labor camp manager, announced yesterday seven more mobile camps will be established in Idaho next year.

The camps will be located at Nampa, Lake Lowell, Weiser, Emmett, Donnelly, Cascade and New Meadows, he said. The camps will bring to 11 the number operated in the state.

BRITISH COMMONS REJECTS PROPOSAL TO SEEK PEACE

LABOR MEMBER IN HOUSE WOULD ASK COMPROMISE

LONDON, Dec. 5 (UP)—The house of commons by a vote of 341 to 4 today rejected a "peace appeal" proposal by the Independent Labor Party after Lord Privy Seal Clement R. Attlee had expressed government opposition.

A demand for a peace conference to "bring this tragic, devastating conflict to an end" was made by J. McGovern, independent labor party member of commons.

Attlee rejected the proposal and said "the alternatives before the country are not war and peace but war and what kind of peace."

After asked who would attend a peace conference if one were called now.

"Would Hitler, who already had rejected a peace conference proposal before invading Poland, now represent all the countries he has overrun?" Attlee asked.

He said the greatest tragedy of today was in the heart of Europe. There, he said, a great race of young men has been trained to go back to barbarism.

Asks Early End

"It is no good blinding that fact and there is no good in suggesting that all the German people are simple, kindly folk," he said.

McGovern deplored the government's failure to propose a peace conference and called upon it to bring the war to an early conclusion on the basis of restoration of freedom in all countries.

He quoted an extract from Prime Minister Winston Churchill's book, "The World Crisis," and said it was a statement showing the danger of continuing struggle "to bring the people of the world were prostrate with grief and poverty."

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 4 (UP)—The federal surplus marketing administration today announced public hearings would definitely be held in Idaho and in Malheur county, Ore.

The PSMA set Dec. 19 for a hearing at Idaho Falls and Dec. 21 for a second and final hearing at Twin Falls.

The proposed program, requested by growers, would regulate interstate shipments of Irish potatoes, establish an administrative committee of five producers and three handlers, assess handlers to defray expenses, and provide for handler reports on shipments.

If favored by two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum, by number or by volume, and signed by handlers of at least 50 percent of the potatoes shipped in interstate commerce from the areas, it can be made effective on approval of the secretary of agriculture.

U. of I. Seeks Restoration of Funds, Not 'Boost,' Dale Says

University of Idaho does not seek funds for expansion but is aiming simply to secure appropriations at the level prior to the slash made for the last biennium, President Harrison C. Dale told alumni and former students last night at a banquet session in the Park hotel.

The return to the former appropriation level, he emphasized, is vital to the university's program.

The educator was guest of honor at a gathering which drew former students and university friends from many south central counties. Discussion of U. of I. problems formed the keynote of the meeting, and President Dale spoke in straightforward fashion on topics ranging from appropriations to football.

Shah Was Handicap Concerning the financial aspect, important now because the new legislature meets one month from tomorrow, he pointed out that the appropriation was slightly in excess of \$1,400,000 for many bienniums. The last legislature, however, cut this to \$1,282,185—just enough "to necessitate rather serious readjustments," Mr. Dale said.

Mr. Dale asserted that the university ranks with the best western schools in many phases of work, including pre-medical, forestry, agriculture and engineering. The Association of American Agricultural Schools, he said, has issued a report showing that Idaho's pre-medical school ranks next to Oregon, the leader, on the basis of records its students make in their later medical training.

Co-op Housing The cooperative housing program at Idaho peaks the university second in the U. S. in number of co-op dormitories, the Moscow executive said. First in the nation is Texas A. and M.

The cooperative dormitory plan at Idaho, he explained, permits students to live for a monthly cost as low as \$17.50. The co-op housing move, too, is one phase of the efforts to increase the enrollment of women students at Idaho. Other steps are addition of courses on selling, teaching, home-economics, and other subjects of interest to girls.

Counselors for men and women, President Dale said, are proving im-

portant in widening a high moral tone on the campus. 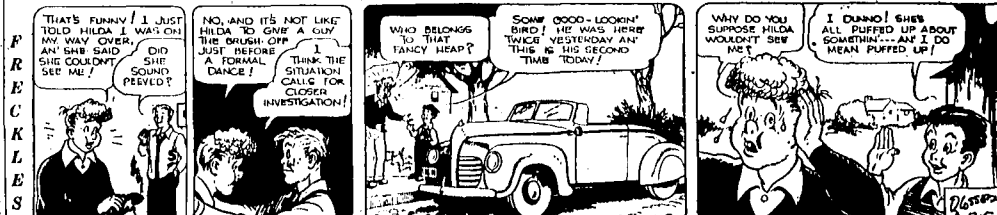

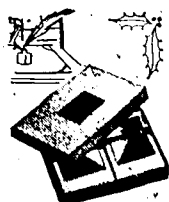

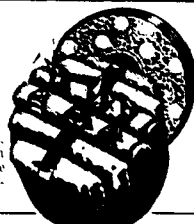
