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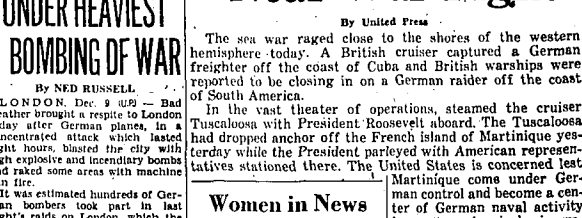

The mine, nestled high in the Rocky mountain Pine county 15 miles east of historic Leadville, is being sold specifically for non-powder use in the 1930's. It is being sold with interest and penalties totaling \$294,938. The 1940 taxes total \$14,000, and the 1941 assessment is expected to be even higher.

DRAFT TRAINING GOAL EXPLAINED

BOISE, Dec. 9 (Special) — Although draft trainees will be fitted as far as possible into the spots for which their civilian skills qualify them, the basic purpose of the selective service system is to train an American army capable of coping with the best troops of any nation and that purpose will control its operation.

This concisely does Lieut.-Col. Norman B. Adkinson explain the matter of specialists under the draft program.

Military Nature
"Many educators have raised the question of vocational training during the 18 months' training period. The army, of course, will train many specialists during this period but the training will be primarily of a military nature rather than training designed to give the trainee a vocation or training useful to him in civilian life. Much of this training, as for example airplane or automotive mechanics, will be useful and the trainee should return to civilian life better fitted to resume his civilian occupation."

All trainees, Col. Adkinson said, will be given an aptitude test and will be classified according to their skills or occupations at the time of intake. This classification has been carefully worked out in order that the army may make immediate use of such skills as are adaptable for military operations.

"No effort has been spared on the part of the army to work out a system which will put each man in a job where his civilian experience and capabilities will be used to the best advantage," the executive officer said.

Determine Aptitudes
After arrival at the reception center each trainee will be personally interviewed and a soldier's qualifications card made out for him. The results of his aptitude test and any information obtained by the interviewing officer will be entered on the card. This card will follow him through the army and any change in status, promotions or assignments will be recorded, giving a permanent record for each man.

The classification officer will be charged with the responsibility of matching the various skills of the men at the reception center to the requirements for specialists and other types of men received from army commanders.

Regardless of previous specialized training all men will receive 13 weeks' basic military training. Col. Adkinson declared, "but it should not be forgotten that the army is primarily a combat organization. As such it is not composed entirely of specialists but, to a large extent, of men who carry rifles."

The military schedules will not be light and many men will not be too enthusiastic about vocational education. Men looking for an extensive specialized training should consult their local recruiting office of the army, navy or marine corps for opportunities for such training in the armed forces of the United States.

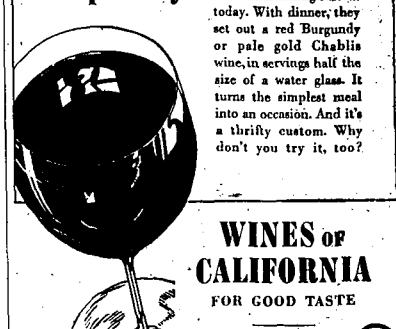

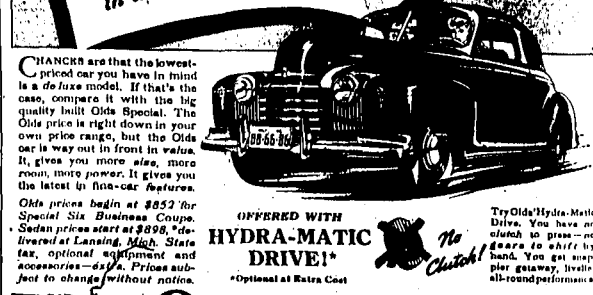

INCREASE NOTED IN JOB BENEFITS

Benefit payments under the unemployment compensation and employment service divisions of the industrial accident board in Idaho during last November exceeded by \$39,879 the amount paid in November, 1939. It was announced here this afternoon by H. A. Sallisbury, unemployment official.

Sallisbury made the announcement after receipt of a communication from Samuel D. Hays, executive director. In the communication, Mr. Hays wrote: "This year, during November, \$55,626 was distributed to unemployed workers throughout the state as compared with \$25,747 during November of 1939."

"Last month a total of 2,150 workers were thrown out of employment and filed claims for benefits. A majority of the benefit claims filed came from the northern part of the state and principally from workers employed in the lumbering industry. Wet, stormy weather in the forests of northern Idaho has made it difficult to continue logging operations and several logging camps have closed, at least temporarily."

"Several orders have been received during the past few weeks for skilled workers in construction and aircraft industries in connection with the national defense projects on the Pacific coast and at army camps. There appears to be a shortage of labor in some of the skills required in these industries. Persons interested in employment in national defense projects should file their applications for employment with the nearest Idaho State Employment service office at the earliest possible time."

AROUND the WORLD

BANGKOK, Thailand—The high command said today there had been numerous incidents on the Indo-Chinese frontier Friday and Saturday, and alleged French forces had fired on Thai troops on the Aranya, Mongkut and Prachinburi sectors.

HANOI, French Indo-China—Serious fighting has broken out on the Laos province frontier between French Indo-Chinese and Thai (Siamese) forces, dispatches said today. An exchange of machine gun fire and airplane bombing is in progress, it was reported.

HONOLULU—Missionaries reaching here from Korea said today Miss Edna Lawrence of Riverside, Calif., an American nurse, has been released by Japanese authorities at Yokohama after having been held for nearly a month on a charge she was a "communist."

SAVANNAKHET, Indo-Chinese-Thailand Frontier—French 75-millimeter field guns, blasting into action near Savanna, hurled more than 30 shells across the Mekong river into Thailand today and brought a blast of machine gun and small caliber artillery fire in return.

HANOI, Indo-China—Five crack Chinese army divisions have been concentrated in Kwangsi province of the Indo-China front and more are arriving, authoritative neutral and Chinese sources said today.

WASHINGTON—The war department announced today that Pen-dleton Ore., will be the site for one of its new air corps stations. The 10th air base group, the 89th reconnaissance squadron and the 11th bombardment group medium will be based at Pendleton.

Gooding Schools' Herd Ranks High

GOODING, Dec. 9 (Special)—Eleven registered Holsteins owned by Idaho State School for Deaf and Blind produced enough milk during the past test-year to provide 43 families of four with four quarts of milk daily for the entire year. The average production per cow was 3833 pounds butterfat from 12,223 pounds milk, according to test records received here from the Holstein-Friesian association.

The average cow in the herd produced more than twice as much butterfat as the country's average dairy cow, using U. S. department of agriculture statistics as the basis of comparison. The herd was on a two-times-daily milking schedule. The highest producer in the herd was the six-year-old cow, Crissy, by Gooding that produced 12,208 pounds milk with 465.1 pounds butterfat in 322 days.

The most intelligent player I talked to during the season was Bill de Corvoletti, I couldn't write what he said but please believe me. Bill knows all the answers and he spits all the publicity he had received—good and bad—will come out of football a swell kid.

The two finest backs I saw all year were Juwuk of Notre Dame and Luther of Nebraska. Of the two, Juwuk is the better.

The best end I saw was Isom of Georgia Tech.

BOWLING Made Easy

By NED DAX
(This is the fifth of a series of bowling lessons by Ned Day of Milwaukee, Wis., national league champion and recognized as an outstanding bowling authority.)

Early arrivals had little to offer but warmed over rumors. Almost all of them wanted something and had something to give but staid at the asking price.

The use of the wrong angle for spares is probably the one thing that ruins more individual bowling games than any other factor. Here's a simple rule to remember: "Move away from every spare and use as much of the width of the alley as possible." In other words, use plenty of angle on every spare.

Suppose, for example, you have thrown your strike ball and left up the No. 7 pin. Do not attempt to roll at the No. 7 from your regular strike spot or move toward it to the left. Rather, move away from it, thus bringing your body position on approach close to the right gutter, and then angle your shot across the entire width of the alley. You will find by moving toward the right, there will be a natural tendency to throw across your body at the 7 pin corner. Use this same angle in bowling at the 4, 8 or 2 pin or any combination of them.

This procedure is reversed when the No. 10 pin is left standing, that is, the bowler moves to the left of the alley to obtain the maximum angle. This angle is used also in rolling at the 3, 6 or 9 pin or any combination of the three.

The No. 5 pin angle is obtained with the body position in the middle of the alley in line with the 5 pin. It is used also on combinations of 5-9 or 5-8. Combinations of spares with the head pin standing are shot from the side of the alley opposite to which the greater number of pins are standing.
