English Capture Italian Deposit Of War Material

LONDON, Dec. 12 (UP)—A huge stock of Italian war materials was the trophy British forces got in the capture of Sidi Barrani yesterday. It was believed here today. The admiralty announced the British Mediterranean fleet was shelling fleeing Italians from Egypt into Libya and that Mussolini's forces had failed to take their supplies with them in their hurried exit.

President, Hull Pay Tribute to Lothian's Work

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (UP)—President Roosevelt and Secretary of State Cordell Hull today paid tribute to Lord Lothian for his services to the British nation and to humanity at large. Mr. Roosevelt wireless a message to King George VI, direct from the cruiser Tuscaloosa on which he is touring defense bases in the Caribbean. Hull called Prime Minister Winston Churchill.

Lord Lothian, British Envoy to U. S., Dies

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (UP)—The marquis of Lothian, British ambassador to the United States who had helped negotiate American "short-of-war" aid for his homeland, died here today after a brief illness. He was 58.

Death came at 2 a. m. and was attributed to a uremic infection. He had been indisposed for almost a week and was taken seriously ill Sunday night. News of his illness was suppressed, although yesterday, at the time of his scheduled address before the American Farm Bureau federation convention in Baltimore, he was reported as ill.

He was an indefatigable worker for the British cause and took a leading role in British purchases of American planes and munitions, often paving the way for the official British missions which attended to the details of buying. A Christian Scientist, Lothian declined medical attention during his final illness. He continued to work long hours in the room at the embassy where he had confined himself, and directed as far as practicable the work of his colleagues.

SEATTLE, Dec. 12 (UP)—Peace seemed near today in the Pacific northwest's lumber strikes as workers conditionally accepted proposals advanced by Federal Conciliator Ernest P. Marsh.

Eleven Tacoma sawmills, struck last Sept. 30, and 10 Tacoma plywood and "rework" plants, employing nearly 4,400 men were reopened when pickets were withdrawn by the Lumber and Sawmill Workers union (AFL). Workers in the Tacoma sawmills voted last night to accept Marsh's peace proposal but conditioned final approval upon extension of the proposal to four strike-bound logging operations at Morton and Mineral. Marsh turned his attentions to those operations today.

Rout Puts Halt To Axis Plan of Drive on Canal

British reclassified troops, planes and warships today pounded Italian armies retreating westward across the Egyptian desert toward Libya, captured or destroyed perhaps 34,000 Fascist soldiers and ended immediate danger of axis seizure of the Suez canal.

The recapture of the Mediterranean coastal base of Sidi Barrani and the drive of British forces along the coast, "with the greatest vigor" was described by Prime Minister Winston Churchill in the house of commons at a victory "of the first order" in the African theater of war. More than 20,000 Italians already have been captured, it was estimated.



Churchill's statement and supplementary statements from British military sources indicated most of one army corps of three Italian divisions (totaling about 45,000 men) had been captured or destroyed, that the British were fighting hard to push the Fascists back on Blue-Flag 30 miles from Libya and that British air and naval units were continually bombarding the Italians.

HEARING SET FOR BEET WAGE RATE

BURLEY, Dec. 12 (Special)—Wage rates to be paid for producing, cultivating, and harvesting 1941 sugar beet crop, and fair prices to be paid by processors who wish to receive benefit payments, will be the subjects of a hearing Monday, Dec. 16, at Salt Lake City, Roland Critchfield, member of the county AAA committee in charge of sugar beets has announced.

The hearing, required each year by the sugar act of 1937 which has been extended to cover the 1941 crop, will begin at 10 a. m. in the Newhouse hotel. Growers, workers and processors in Idaho, Utah, Oregon and Washington will present their evidence at the Salt Lake meeting. Similar meetings are planned for other major sugar-producing areas.

Payment of "fair and reasonable" wages to workers is one of the provisions of the sugar growers' contract in qualifying for sugar beet benefit payments. Critchfield explained, while processors are required to pay other growers at least the established "fair" prices to qualify for benefit payments on their own beets.

Critchfield pointed out that "fair" prices established for processor-growers last year were based on the most price contracts finally signed between processors and Idaho growers.

Landis Stops Dodgers, Phillies Deal

CHICAGO, Dec. 12 (AP)—Kenesaw Mountain Landis, forced by official action to yield one major point in his fight against chain store baseball, removed all doubts today that he is the sole judge of baseball law by refusing to permit a questionable player deal between the Philadelphia Phillies and Brooklyn Dodgers.

Within half hour after the major leagues had passed a long-drafted amendment enabling major league clubs to sign players for minor league affiliates, one of the commissioner's pet hates, Landis cracked down yesterday on the Phillies and Dodgers in the case of pitcher Reuben Melton.

Violates Spirit of Rule—It was much of a deal, but the 78-year-old czar apparently believed the spirit of the draft law was being violated and he blocked the transfer of Melton to Brooklyn.

Melton had been drafted by the Phillies from the Columbus club of the American association, member of the St. Louis Cardinal organization. Brooklyn reportedly had suggested the Phillies draft another player, that player to go to Brooklyn for \$15,000. The Phillies chose Melton, however, and Brooklyn agreed to take him for the same price.

It was this agreement Landis dissolved after a conference with Larry MacPhail, president of the Dodgers; Gerald P. Nugent, president of the Phillies; and Clarence Rowland, Chicago Cubs scout. The Cubs also had been interested in Melton.

Pearson to Dodgers?—There was a single rumor alive at the meeting broke up the deal. Lane Monte Pearson, one-time pitching coach of the New York Yankees, was reported to have left the Yankees and headed for the Dodgers.

In the joint session yesterday, the major leagues voted to extend the commissioner's power to 1941, created a disability list not to exceed two, and limited all clubs to seven batters on their roster.

In regard to military draft, the two leagues decided to create a national defense service list, similar to the voluntary retirement list, on which all ball players accepted for military service would be placed until their release from the U. S. armed force.

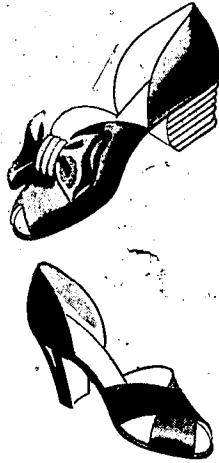

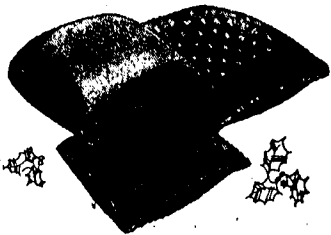
