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### Twin Falls Shops Offer Full Apparel Lines for Outdoor Sports Playing

Good snow, good skiing and good luck! Just follow the suggestions of Twin Falls merchants, specializing in ski apparel and equipment, and you will be as correctly outfitted as the most seasonal expert that visits Sun Valley this season.

It has been said of skiing that speed is the thrill—control, the art—and colorful clothes, the natural accompaniment of skiing. When put together they spell "perfect."

In contrast to the lumpy and absorbent snow-bunny suits of a few years ago, ski ensembles are now made almost exclusively of gaberdine, poplin and heat-treated woads, that are warm and water-repellent despite their light weight, and which tailor beautifully.

**Good Christmas Gift**  
To the person whose favorite sport is skiing, there is nothing so acceptable for a Christmas gift as a replenishment of apparel, or an accessory to complement the outfit already acquired. And local stores have the "just rights," you can be sure.

Here's the essentials of any ski outfit, a hat, a pair of goggles, long warm underwear, socks, poles, trousers, climbers, shirt or sweater, warm jacket, necktie or neckerchief and cap.

Since skiing is a vigorous sport in which nearly every part of the body plays a role, it is wise, in trying on prospective purchases, to bend and twist to make certain the garments don't bind at the knees and shoulders.

**Should Fit Well**  
A jacket should fit snugly at the wrists, should overlap at the waist of the trousers tightly so there will be no gaps in which to scoop snow, and the collar should close up around the neck if the day is windy and snowy.

In selecting the instructor type of downhill trousers, the skier should be smart enough to do that—be sure the elastic band under the ankle does not dig into the ankle when the boot is put on.

A wool shirt of the pearl-buttoned frontman type in wool gaberdine, or nifty cashmere-clin plaid, assures the greatest comfort and warmth, under your ski outfit. And don't forget to help the "back to business" route of the long underwear companies, because it's an absolute necessity.

Sweaters are available in all colors and patterns, though most skiers wear their sweaters for after-skiing, since they prefer shirts to the more bulky sweaters under their poplin or gaberdine jackets.

**Jackets Longer**  
Incidentally, the ski jackets are longer this season, hip length being preferred in parkas, drawing types, "Barnook of the North" models and what-have-you.

A hood pair of poplin mitts equipped with leather palms, gauntlet sleeves which will flex naturally and lightly over the cuffs of your jacket, and large enough to permit your working wool mitts or "liners" inside them on particularly cold days, are to be given first consideration.

Since much of a person's skiing ability depends on how well you can turn your skis, your boots and harnesses must fit perfectly. It is false economy to "save on boots" to add to some other part of your outfit. In buying the square, box toe type of boot be sure that it is roomy enough, as is the rest of the boot, to permit wearing at least two pairs of socks, one preferably untreated wool, since that retains much of the natural oil and is consequently warmer.

### SKIING LOGIC

- 1—Exercise and strengthen the muscles most subject to strain before the first snowfall. It's a strenuous sport.
- 2—Get the proper equipment as far as boots and bindings are concerned.
- 3—Begin the season with lessons under competent instructors. The expert's grace and ability didn't come without hard work. Be sure your instructor teaches you how to fall correctly.
- 4—Learn control and use it, for it is the hallmark of the good skier. A controlled fall is a safeguard.
- 5—Don't ski difficult terrain until you can ski any practice hill under control.
- 6—Don't ski alone.

To increase the pleasure of skiing for all:  
1—Give the other skier a fair break by filling your own skizmaks and footprints.  
2—Climb sking surfaces only on skis and don't linger in the middle of the trail on blind corners.  
3—Heed the cry "truck." The other skier may be out of control and need all the room he can get.  
4—Cooperate with all ski patrolmen. They are only volunteers ready to help you if you need them.  
Remember: Safety in skiing seems to be only a combination of common sense and normal good sportsmanship.

### CLIP-ON SKATE THING OF PAST

The day of the clip-on skates has passed. This is revealed during a survey of Twin Falls stores dealing in ice skates for men, women, boys and girls.

Rather than the clip-on variety the shoe style has come to stay and this year a great majority of them—even in the lower price ranges—feature one thing which will tend to make skating more enjoyable, especially for those persons with the "weak ankles."

The feature is a built-in ankle support which tends to hold the ankle firm without injuring it. Likewise, for comfort as well as for the warm angle of it, a majority of the skates are wool lined.

Ice skates come in two main styles, namely hockey and figure. Figure skates are more popular with those well along in their teens and above while the hockey variety, built for speed—are popular with "the kids."

As was the case last year, the shoe skates will mostly be white for the women and black for the men.

Numerous skating places are to be found around Twin Falls this year with the most popular probably being Cedar draw which is reached by

taking highway 30 west to the intersection of 83, then going south on 83 to the first road beyond the main canal then turning west for about two miles.

Wilson lake on the north side is another popular area which attracts hundreds of skaters each season. The lake is reached by going to Hazelton and then turning north at the lumberyard corner, located on the east side of town.

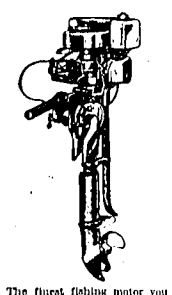

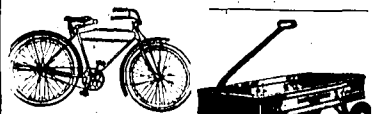

# THOUSANDS TO ENJOY WINTER SPORT AT ROCK CREEK SITE

## Three Improvements Increase Popularity Of Nearby Ski Runs

The snow covered area of upper Rock creek, less than 40 miles from Twin Falls, is fast becoming a haven for those skiers who want to ski for the pleasure of the sport and who don't care to lounge around with their feet doing it.

Thanks to the forest service, the CCC and a small group of local citizens, thousands will enjoy the sport in that area this winter.

Right now the CCC is making preparations to keep the road to the ski area open throughout the season and, because the road (which is relatively new) has had time to harden, and the gravel to "set."

Another improvement is the construction of a ski lift which will be nearing completion when this article is read. The lift will be power driven and will haul 18 skiers to the top at one time, these 18 being seated on one sled which is going uphill while another sled—this one being empty—comes back down the hill to assist the "load" up.

Third improvement is the availability of a building which was formerly a warehouse at the Shoshone ranger station in the basin. It was taken, section at a time, to the new ski run location and has been put together again. Skis will be installed and it will be open for use of skiers—a sort of "roughing it" place where they can get warm when the going gets a little too tough, cold or tiresome.

Next year a log building is planned for the site, CCC and forest service officials have announced. This "club house" will be open to all skiers visiting the area and will have the forest service announce "come on, you're welcome."

It is only for the past two or three years that Rock creek has been a ski area and it is making it such a "once again" be shared by the forest service and the CCC. Before the CCC moved in only a trail led through which had not even been looked upon as a site. Today a road leads right to the section where the ski is being run.

The Rock creek ski site is easily accessible. From Twin Falls to the right the motorist turns to the right at the first road upon entering the basin and just keeps going. From the east the motorist turns to the left on the road at the west side of Hansen and from the north the road taken is the first cross road after coming across the Hansen bridge or the first one going toward the bridge. The road into the area is old and a good portion of the way—much farther than last year.

The "planners" are there now and after the trail has been broken, an effort to speak, the "settlers" will follow. That day is fast approaching and as a result Twin Falls and the communities of this section are within easy reach of one of the most favored—and natural—skiing areas to be found anywhere.

You may purchase a hatting corduroy "top" that tucks in at the waist, buttons across, the shoulder seam and has long sleeves. If you'd rather, you might buy a "vest sweater" in a subdued pattern and wear it over a brilliant blouse or shirt with long sleeves.

To crown your costume with something new and "different" ask for "Hitter Mitts" and "Gitter Hoops." Up-to-the minute in fashion detail, the set of mittens and cany is two-fold value, for they were designed for evening wear or sports wear and equally as smart in either case.

Taking their cue from the practicalities that mark a ski wardrobe, designers of winter sportswear are adhering to lines of simplicity, plus suitable colors for the winter landscape, and Twin Falls stores are well stocked with the reasonable merchandise.

Follow-ups for the lounge hours after skating or skiing are the clever, comfy-looking fur-like slippers, lined with felt and which will keep your feet warm, and there are also "chase" slippers and velvet-finished wool with wedge heels.

Top-flight among the outdoor sweaters are those of a nationally known manufacturer, knitted the Scandinavian way, with hand-made effects in gay pastel colors.

Wide Usage  
Although primarily designed for skiing, they are equally good for skating, bobbedling, snowballing and just holding hands in the snow. They can be found in "companion" sweaters, the "Christiana" for example. There's also suggestion in the Christmas-giving of these young women.

# British Fund Request Confronts President

## MOVE UNDERWAY FOR FULL GIFTS TO AID ENGLAND

By LYLE C. WILSON  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—Formal British request for American financial assistance today confronted President Roosevelt with a problem suddenly and newly complicated by the question whether there should be loans or outright gifts.

A movement for outright gifts is developing some momentum in contrast with bills of dramatic action to step up national rearmament.

Delegation of war teaching powers, among persons responsible for national defense is being discussed by administration advisors along with increasing evidence of interest in a new and unlimited national emergency proclamation.

— Needs Congress Action

Statements by Mr. Roosevelt's aides indicate no such move can be made on British credits without congressional authorization. But the British press carried in New York indicated last night that Britain's formal application for financial assistance "would not necessarily take the form of a loan."

Attributing its explanation to "British official circles," it said the question of aid was one of dollar exchange — not independent but flowing directly from Britain's need for American airplanes, ships, munitions and other materials.

Dollar exchange maneuvers might involve purchase by the United States of British-owned American securities. Another method of furnishing Britain with dollars might involve use of the \$2,000,000,000 stabilization and to purchase goods if Congress approved.

The proposal for outright gifts to Britain was made here over the week-end by Alf M. Landon, 1930 Republican presidential candidate. It was endorsed yesterday by Mrs. Roosevelt, Sen. Robert A. Taft, R. O., proposed secured loans, instead, explaining Britain has sufficient assets here to provide satisfactory collateral. But he said outright gifts would be preferable to unsecured loans.

In Default Now

Britain borrowed without security during the World war and now is in default of more than \$5,000,000,000 owed to the United States treasury. Although there is active agitation for repeal of the Johnson act, which prohibits individuals or corporations to lend to a foreign government, no real evidence anyone expects private investors or banks would be willing to advance large sums to Britain. It is money that probably will be government money.

The British request for financial aid was made yesterday in the form of a semi-annual installment of the British World War debt was due. The installment remained due last night that Britain could not afford to meet that payment of more than \$25,000,000.

BOISE, Dec. 17 (AP)—The Idaho board of public welfare today had the resignation of Henry A. Johnson, state welfare commissioner, to become effective when a successor has been appointed.

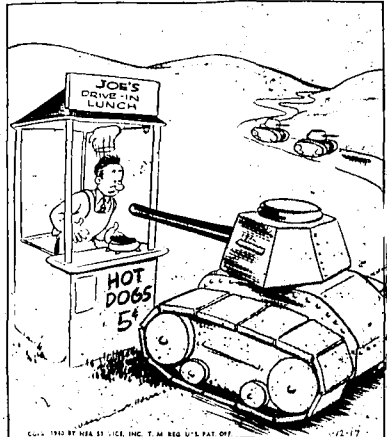

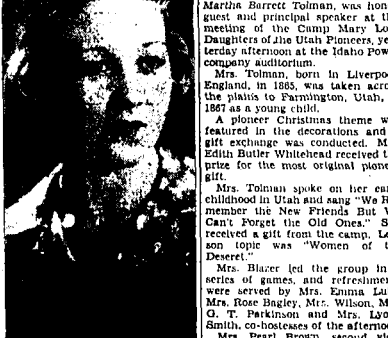

**Rate Expert Shows Need For Freight Reductions**

HAZELTON, Dec. 17 (Special)—Frequent a thorough discussion of freight rates on farm commodities from members of the American Legion, Hazelton, Dec. 17. Carl DeLong, Boise, rate expert of the public utilities commission, outlined the need for reductions as he addressed the members of the Hazelton Chapter of the American Legion.

Dinner was served last evening by members of the Hazelton Legion auxiliary and the session was held at the Presbyterian church. In addition to Mr. DeLong, the other speakers were D. H. White, rate supervisor of information and public relations of the unemployment commission, Hazelton, and the Hazelton rate talks a general discussion was held.

During his talk, Mr. DeLong pointed out that during the last war, while the carriers were under the administration of the federal government, rates had dropped 25 per cent in June, 1918 and 35 per cent in August, 1920. This step practically eliminated Idaho from all the carriers.

He continued by saying: "Only One Wide Reduction

"There has been only one flat 10 per cent decrease made in our rates since the war, and that was in 1922. Since that time there have been piecemeal reductions. As an example, our present rate from Idaho Falls to Gagego, Idaho, 100 miles is 74 cents a hundred pounds and Missouri river points, 85 cents per hundred pounds.

"While these rates are materially lower than the original war-time rates, they are still in excess of the rates on our farm commodities that were in effect when the carriers were doing all in their power to develop large additional acreage and have gradually increased our production of potatoes to the point that it is impossible to market them at a price that will bring to pay the cost of production.

Board Seeks Relief

He pointed out that the public utilities commission of Idaho, during the past few years, has taken active steps to secure material freight reductions for all the territory of the Missouri river and including the states of Oklahoma, Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas and Missouri.

"The same rates and privileges are not sought for onions," DeLong said.

He cited the fact that records show that movement of fruits and vegetables from Idaho is "increasing rapidly." He added that records show that during October and November of this year the produce carried by truck costs the railroads 200 carloads.

Compensation Figures

During his talk, Mr. White said that since the year 1938 less than \$7,000,000 has been paid into the fund for unemployment compensation and \$4,500,000 has been paid out in benefits. Idaho has the largest benefit ratio of all the states in the union, he said. He added that some benefit must be found to offset this proportionately large amount being paid out. Suggestions included the raising of the tax assessed against employers or requiring employees to pay.

During the discussion which followed the two talks, it was decided that an effort would be made to have L. T. Wilcox, U. P. freight manager, as speaker at the next session set for Gooding in January.

Other business transacted included appointment of a special committee to recommend the attitude which the regional chamber should take on the matter of teacher certification proposals. Named to the committee were C. A. Simonson, Albert C. O'Brien, and J. H. Thomas, chairman; L. A. Thomas, Embury, and George Denman, Burley.

Nine communities were represented at last night's session.

# Skiing Now Fashion Parade of Colorful And Tested Clothing

It used to be—back in the old days—that a snow covered hill and a pair of skis were all that was needed to slide for dear life. But that's all passed now.

The sight of a man coming down the slope dressed in overalls or simply a couple of old pair of pants, one on over the other, a throwaway sweater and a cap, is about as unique as would be the sight of seeing Orville Wright's initial airplane flying over Twin Falls.

## ASCAP ASKS FOR GOVERNMENT AID

NEW YORK, Dec. 17 (AP)—Ten prominent music educators charged today broadcasters with trying to deny the public its own property and force it to accept "ersatz" music.

They formed a committee, which will circulate 2,000 educational tracts to demand revision of the federal communications commission, before Jan. 1, when all of the major networks and stations will be controlled by the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, and substitute the tunes and arrangements of Broadcast Music, Inc., a radio-subsidized organization.

EMI manville gathered another ally in Harry Brandt, president of the Independent Theater Owners of America, who denounced the ASCAP system of licensing motion picture houses. He said exhibitors had to pay an extra fee to producers when ASCAP was used with pictures, in addition to monthly royalties to ASCAP. Since many producers control publishing houses affiliated with ASCAP, they receive fees "coming and going," he said.

The educators' committee charged the national association of broadcasters with "scrap the experience and achievement of a generation of artists is a penalty to music itself and a deprivation to the public amounting to musical starvation."

It named 163 composers of standard music whose works would be barred.

Neville Miller, president of the NAB, said ASCAP wanted to "enslave the radio industry."

Construction for the most part will be of whipcord, gabardine and poplin.

As one dealer put it: "We can dress you up but you'll have to do your own skiing."

Hardware and other dealers stock up on their reports that they are available for all "size and weight" persons. There are many styles and they fit any purse. The same is true of ski poles, and like accessories.

America's fastest growing sport—skiing—is fast producing one of America's greatest businesses—that of making clothing and equipment for those who partake.

The resolution for sale of the property was passed at the recent board meeting, but approval must also be obtained from the stock holder.

The I. O. O. F. building is one of the few three-story structures in Buhl and is substantially built of stone and brick. It was erected 20 years ago.

The lower floor will lease the third floor for I. O. O. F. meetings and for rental to the Modern Woodman of the World, as well as the Moose organizations and numerous private tenants for instruction in music and dancing.

The lower floor is occupied at the present by the G. P. Henge store and M. H. King company.
