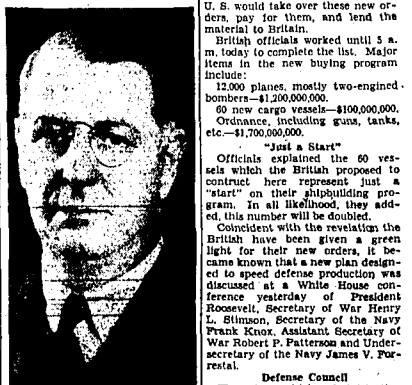

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SURVIVORS TELL OF SHIP'S HERO

A WEST COAST PORT, England, Dec. 19 (AP)—Fifty-three passengers and 19 crew members survived the torpedoed liner Western Prince, arrived with the story of her masthead, Capt. John Reed, who blew three whistle blasts to departing lifeboats before going down with his ship, and a heroic steward who "went down with the old man."

Among the survivors were C. D. Howe, Canadian minister of munitions and supply; E. P. Taylor of Toronto, director of Canadian purchasing commission in the United States.

Among the six passengers and nine crew members believed missing were Gordon Scott, Montreal financier, who was lost when a lifeboat overturned.

The Western Prince was torpedoed last week-end off the northern tip of Ireland. All passengers took to lifeboats as the ship was hit by a German U-boat on deck and shouted to the circling lifeboats: "Goodbye . . . give my respects to all at home."

Then he blew three blasts of the ship's whistle. The sound was like the ship's siren to the circling lifeboats. A moment later the ship sank.

Standings by the master's side when the ship went down was Cookney steward named Franks. Survivors said he had helped fill the lifeboats; then stayed aboard.

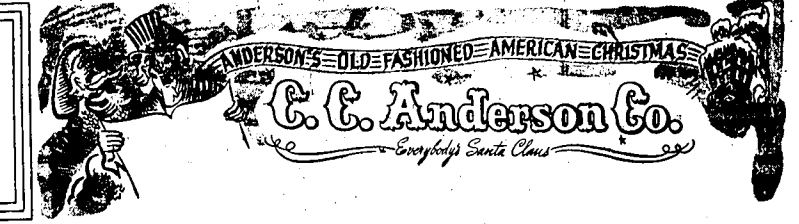
Primary Play

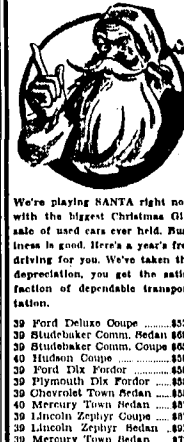

AMERICA UPHOLDS RIGHTS, GREW TELLS JAPAN THROG

FACT AND ACTION WILL BE JUDGED, SAYS U. S. ENVOY

TOKYO, Dec. 19 (Special)—Joseph Clark, U. S. ambassador, told a distinguished Japanese luncheon audience today that America was firm in its determination to fulfill its obligations and uphold its rights and that they would judge Japan by its acts, not by the persuasive garb in which its acts were clad.

Grew spoke at a luncheon of the Japan-America Friendship Society, which was held at the Hotel New York. He was accompanied by Admiral Kichiburo Nomura, new Japanese ambassador to the United States.

Both Nomura and Foreign Minister Yosuke Matsuoka, in speeches preceding Grew's, had emphasized the present status in Japanese-American relations, and attributed the strain to American misunderstanding of Japanese policy. They hoped better relations would be possible.

Warns Americans

Matsuoka warned Americans that Japan would be faithful to its new allies, Germany and Italy, and that its foreign policy would revolve around the alliance.

Grew thanked Matsuoka for his "enlightening" speech.

"On some points we are all in accord—a desire for peace and calm judgment, and Admiral Nomura's mission to improve relations," he continued. "Other points are open to controversy. I shall not deal with those in particular. However, I think I must reiterate the minister's statement that in Japan's program 'we shut the door nowhere and to none,' and that Japan will not countenance conquest or oppression.

U. S. Peace Minded

"Mr. Matsuoka lived long enough in the United States to know that the American people are fundamentally peace minded. But they are firmly determined on certain matters—their obligations and rights. He also knows that with the American people the only thing that counts is facts of action regardless of the persuasive garb in which they may be dressed.

"Let us say of nations as well as individuals 'by their fruits ye shall know them.'"

DROP NOTED FOR CORN PRODUCTION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19 (Special)—The agriculture department today estimated 1940 corn production as of Dec. 1 at 2,449,200,000 bushels. The harvest last year was 2,601,320,000 bushels and the 1929-30 average was 2,299,342,000 bushels.

Wheat production for 1940 was 816,688,000 bushels, the department said. The 1929 yield was 731,435,000 bushels. The oat crop was estimated at 1,235,628,000 bushels compared with 1,255,942,000 bushels last year.

Barley production totaled 309,235,000 bushels. The 1929 production was 274,367,000 bushels.

The agricultural marketing service said production of many crops exceeded earlier estimates. Yields per acre have averaged higher than in any previous year and total production from a relatively smaller acreage has been larger than in any year except 1927.

Practically all of the principal crops, except grain sorghums, show better yields than in either the ten-year period ending with 1929 or the 10 years before the drought of 1933, the department reported.

Production of other crops was estimated as follows:

Rye, 40,501,500 bushels; buckwheat 8,230,000 bushels; clovered 33,217,900 bushels; rice 52,734,000 bushels; grain sorghums 121,271,000 bushels; popcorn 57,181,000 bushels; potatoes 237,225,000 bushels; sugar cane 4,551,000 tons; sugar beets 11,969,000 tons; hops 41,771,000 pounds.

Apples 115,456,000 bushels; peaches 52,772,000 bushels; pears 32,138,000 bushels; grapes 2,482,000 tons.

The British also raided Mannheim, Rhine port and railroad and commercial center in Germany and the third successive night despite unfavorable weather conditions which kept most of the German air force grounded.

Fires in Milan, bombed frequently by the British during the past six months, covered a large area, the ministry said.

The British also continued their raids on the German submarine base at Locret, France.

All the planes participating in the raids returned to their bases.

Failure of Gas Supply Blamed for Crash of Bomber

SIX ARMY MEN DIE WHEN SHIP HITS MOUNTAIN

By ROBERT MILLER
MARCH FIELD, Calif., Dec. 19 (AP)—The crash of a four-engine army flying fortress which killed six air corps officers and enlisted men was attributed today to failure of the gasoline supply.

The plane, a 22-ton Boeing bomber, plowed into the heavily timbered slope of Marlon mountain, near Idyllwild, Calif., and burst into flames. The bodies of all crew members but the pilot were badly burned and the big plane was a heap of mangled metal.

March field officials believed the crash occurred while the pilot was attempting to switch his gasoline supply, but ordered a thorough investigation by a board of inquiry.

 The crash was the first accident involving the new Boeing bomber since its adoption by the army air corps as standard bombardment equipment, although its prototype, known as the Duxton, O. in 1935, killed seven.

 All occupants stayed with the ship and apparently had made no attempt to bale out, indicating they had not believed themselves in danger. A cloud bank presumably had concealed the mountain.

The wing of the plane struck a tree and turned the big ship into the ground, near the snow line, dropping it into a rocky crevice where it burned. Bodies were recovered shortly before nightfall and were carried in baskets a quarter of a mile to the Banning-Idyllwild highway.

Fate of Alien Basques Rests In Hands of Federal Officials

BOISE, Ida., Dec. 19 (AP)—The fate of 75 aliens living in Idaho today rested with federal immigration authorities.

The aliens, most of them Basques employed as sheepherders on remote ranges, admitted to immigration officials that they entered the country illegally but they have asked to be allowed to remain here.

M. F. Lence, regional immigration director, said a special dispensation from Washington, D. C., officials would be needed to grant the request. Most the aliens have entered the country during the last decade, and some are refugees from war-torn countries.

From Concentration Camps
 One Basque told Lence he had escaped from a German-Spanish concentration camp during the Spanish civil war and argued that return to his native country would probably lead to life imprisonment, if not death.

The aliens' pleas to remain in this country and become citizens are being supported by the Independent Order of Basque-Spanish Speaking People, an Idaho organization. The president of the group, William K. Hart, has taken up the question with federal authorities.

The alien registration law, requiring non-citizens to register and be fingerprinted by Dec. 20, was responsible for bringing most of the Basques out of the Idaho hill country. Immigration authorities said most of them related how they came to this country by joining a ship's crew and then jumped ship when an American port was reached.

Travel to Idaho
 Then they traveled inland because many of them had friends or relatives among Idaho's Basque population.

During the course of interviews with immigration authorities the Basques unraveled a story that indicated many of them had been "overcharged" by persons who claim-

BOISE'S BUILDING PROGRAM STARTS

BOISE, Dec. 19 (AP)—Boise's biggest building project in history was headed toward construction today after federal agencies approved preliminary plans for a \$2,000,000 program for construction of an army base for bombers and for improvement of the Boise air terminal.

Additional funds for the bomber base are expected to be allocated as plans for construction progress.

A \$40,000 WPA project for surfacing sections of the air field already has started. The army has allocated \$1,293,700 for temporary buildings and other facilities at the base, the civil aeronautics authority has approved \$250,000 for communications and landing facilities, and the U. S. public building administration is considering a \$500,000 project for construction of homes for officers, and their families.

Population Gain
 Besides bringing a huge construction job to Idaho's capital city, the army air will increase Boise's population by about 3,500 persons.

Units to be stationed here will include the 42nd bombardment headquarters and headquarters squadron which is made up of the 75th, 76th, and 77th squadrons. The 16th reconnaissance, the 30th air base group, service troops, weather, communications and other aviation personnel.

150 Buildings
 Army plans call for construction of 150 buildings on the 258 acres of land at the airport which the city has granted to the government. The base will be a small city when completed. It will include barracks for enlisted men, quarters for bachelor officers, hospitals, fire station, guard house, recreation buildings, a theater, a school, radio station, warehouses, mess quarters, hangars, a telephone exchange, an administration building and various buildings for storing plane equipment and repairing it.

Nearly 100 bombers and several scout planes will be placed on the field.

Facilities Expanded
 Only part of the field, now comprising 960 acres, will be used for the army air base. Other portions of the field will be used for commercial aviation establishments.

Landing facilities will be greatly expanded to care for the increased use brought on by the army group. Parallel runways and taxi strips will add to efficiency of the terminal. A control tower also will be built from which plane landings can be controlled.

The new base is expected to bring a monthly payroll of about \$300,000 to the Boise valley. Supplies will be purchased locally for feeding the men.

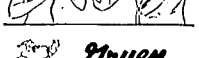

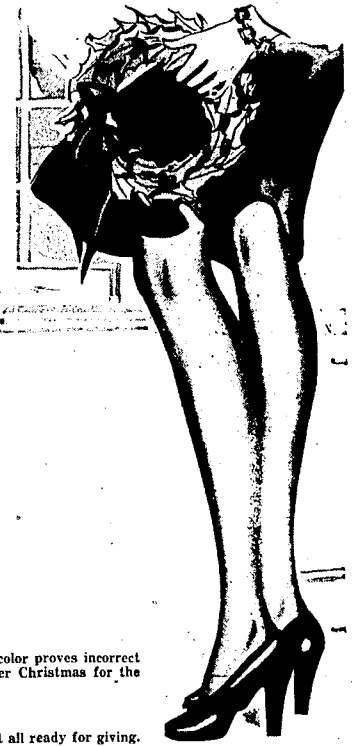

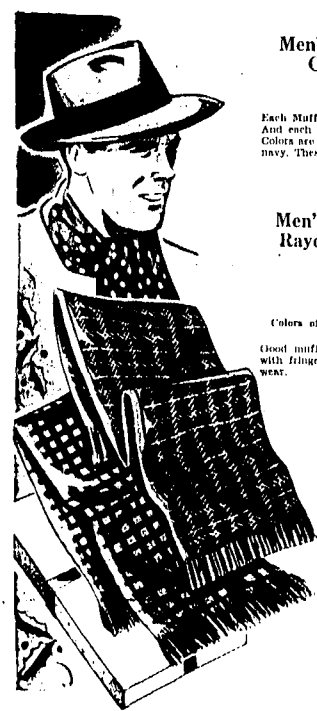
