MARKET SET UP

NO OPPOSITION FOUND HERE FOR SPLINTERING MARKET

Potato Growers for Area Give Approval To Proposed Set-up

With no opposition developing and with growers showing a strong interest in the proposed setup, hearing on the planned potato marketing agreement was held today at the American Legion hall here before U. S. department of agriculture officials.

An estimated 150 growers and shippers attended the session which started at 9:30 a. m. and concluded this afternoon. Active interest was shown during the explanatory program and also during the taking of testimony from various growers who took advantage of the opportunity to present their own and group ideas as to developments needed to aid the potato industry.

Neil Brooks, solicitor's office, USDA, Washington, D. C. presided at the session. He represented the surplus marketing administration. Other officials present included A. E. Merker, senior marketing specialist in charge of the USDA potato program; S. L. Post, marketing specialist, Denver, Colo.; C. O. Gustafson, Idaho state extension economist and marketing specialist; L. H. Hurst, Nampa, secretary of the Idaho Growers and Shippers association.

The hearing was for the proposed marketing agreement for Idaho and neighboring Oregon, and the initial session was held at Idaho Falls. The meeting here marked close of the hearing.

During today's session eight men were nominated for positions on the administrative committee which will administer the act if it is placed into effect. These names will be added to the list from other sections and the secretary of agriculture will select the members and the alternates from the list submitted.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 (UP)—President Roosevelt has scheduled his new supreme national defense agency to be operative within 10 days, and probably will inaugurate it before congress meets with a re-arrangement of the cabinet.

NAVY EQUIPMENT ORDERS STOLEN FROM ENGINEER

DUNESBURG, N. Y., Dec. 21 (UP)—State police searched today for a portfolio of naval equipment orders stolen from the automobile of a shipbuilding official, but insisted it did not contain plans for warships.

The company built the destroyer Prairie and the seaplane tender Curtis, launched Dec. 9, 1939, and Dec. 20, 1940, respectively.

The scene of the theft is in Schoenectady county, not far from the General Electric plant, where searchlights and other electrical appliances are manufactured for naval warships.

May Have Been Photographed Police thought the plant might have attracted a foreign spy in the area but they had no evidence indicating whether someone interested in warship designs or some spying thief had taken the portfolio.

The New York Daily News said in a copyrighted dispatch that the stolen portfolio contained blueprints and a complete list of all types of United States naval vessels now under construction or scheduled to be built before 1947.

Government Asks American Recall Of Staff in Paris

BERLIN, Dec. 21 (UP)—A German foreign office spokesman said today that a United States policy of "challenges, insults and moral aggression" toward Germany had "reached the point of insupportability."

It was announced at the same time that the German government had asked the United States to recall several members of its Paris embassy staff.

British Bomb Berlin in Big Night Attack LONDON, Dec. 21 (UP)—Snow-covered Berlin last night suffered probably the longest and one of the most destructive of 37 raids by British air raid bombers, the official news agency said today, and smashing attacks were delivered from planes flying no higher than the housetops of the city.

Chief objectives of the RAF last night were factories, gas works and railway stations in Berlin, the ministry said. It asserted an air raid which set off a fire in the city for "well over an hour" caused very satisfactory list-of-fires and casualties, they reported.

Despite a particularly heavy anti-aircraft barrage, the ministry said, it reported the state department would fight all additional materials under the export licensing system.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 (UP)—President Roosevelt today issued a proclamation placing 15 additional materials under the export licensing system, including plants and equipment for the production of aviation lubricating oil.

The President's move boosted to 23 the number of crucial materials placed under the right licensing system.

The materials added to the list were: aluminum, ethylene, carbide; plastic molding machines and presses; rollers, measuring machines; testing machines; hydraulic pumps; gas incorporating industrial diamantines; equipment and plans for the production of aviation lubricating oil, ethylene glycol; methylamine; aluminum metals and alloys; and aluminum products containing or made of aluminum, as well as abrasive paper and cloth, and ball-bearing machines.

Already under the export license system are aviation gasoline, machine tools, tin, rubber and other strategic and critical materials needed for the national defense.

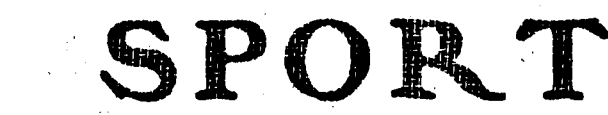
