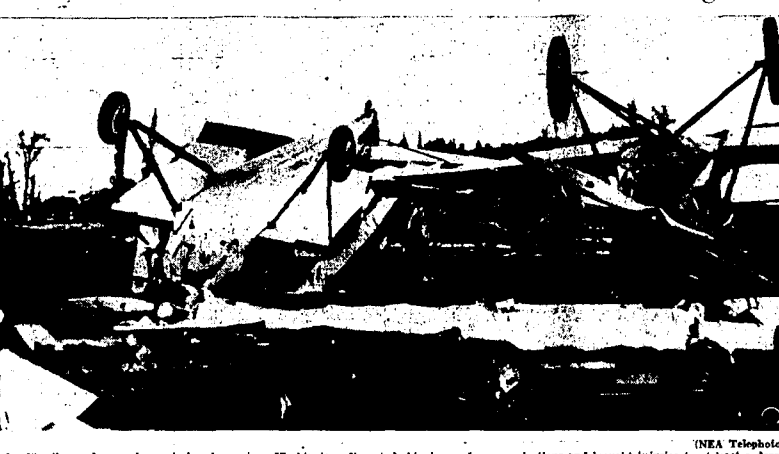

COMMUNISTS 'TROUBLE MAKERS' UNDER WATCH IN ENGLAND

SCOTLAND YARD KEEPS TRACK OF RED 'NUISANCES'

By REUEL B. MOORE LONDON, Dec. 26 (AP)—The government was said today to be watching closely the efforts of the Communist party which thus far are regarded as more of a nuisance than a menace.

Scotland Yard is watching Communist activity in London, and keeping the home office informed of secret meetings, propaganda efforts and Communist infiltration into workers' organizations.

Communists were said by Home Secretary Herbert Morrison to have organized a "peace" conference to be held at Manchester, Jan. 12, although the Communist Daily Worker, which is edited by Morrison, has announced that the Communist-sponsored meeting is Communist-sponsored.

Greta Red Support The Communist party is being actively supported by the Daily Worker. Replying to parliamentary demands that the meeting be suppressed, Morrison said he believed the Communists hoped to utilize the conference to gain the support of loyal persons who had no intention of joining the war effort.

Guard Units To Be Streamlined WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—The war department today announced that it will streamline its 18 national guard divisions into the pattern of the regular army's 10 divisions.

The new regiments will have a war strength of 3,900 men. The peace-strength of national guard regiments has been 1,823 men.

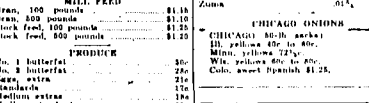

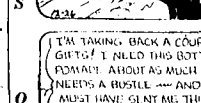

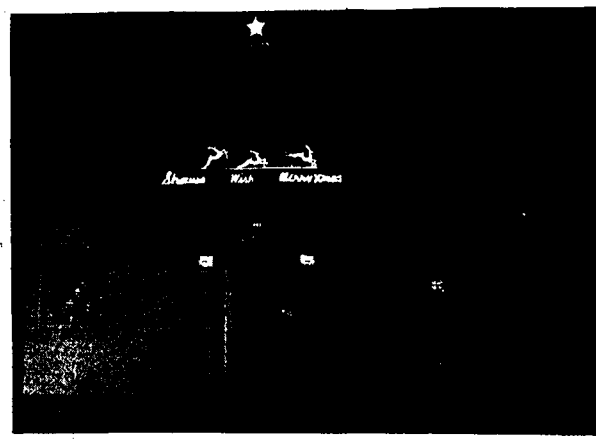

Pre-Christmas snowfall in the Hatley-Ketchum-Sun Valley area brought the "ski blanket" to higher levels than one year ago, according to the inaugural report received here today from Charles Daugherty, Sawtooth national forest supervisor.

All reporting stations in the Sawtooth region showed more snow as of Dec. 23 than at the same period one year ago.

Ketchum Gains
Supervisor Daugherty reported that Hatley had four inches, compared with an inch and a half in 1939; Ketchum showed six inches compared with four; Galena registered 22 inches, three more than last year, and the Old Baldy stations had nine, 14 and 19 inches of snow compared with six, 12 and 12 one year ago.

Other sectors also have more snow at present, the forest supervisor reported. On the Malad watershed, tributary of the Big Wood river, Soldier ranger station listed nine inches and Fairfield six.

Salmon River Area
In the Salmon river country, Williams ranch listed eight inches, compared with four year ago, and Stanley also listed eight inches.

Cumulative snowfall at Hatley since Oct. 1 is now 83 inches, well above the 73 inches shown a year ago. Average, however, is 23.99 inches.

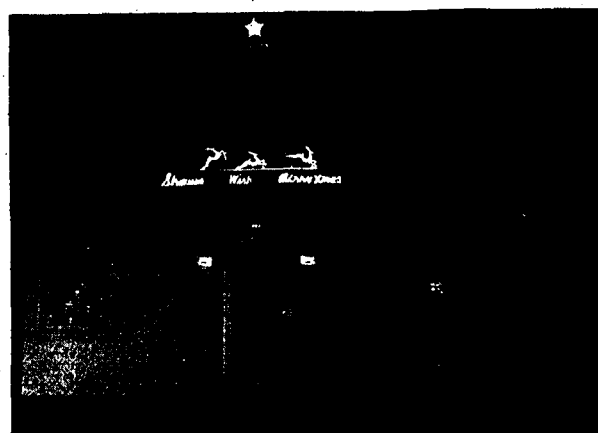
