GERMAN VESSELS BEING ARMED IN JAPAN FOR RAIDS

By ROBERT F. MARTIN. MANILA, Dec. 28 (AP) - Usually reliable informants alleged without definite confirmation today that at least 12 German vessels were being armed in Japanese and Japanese-controlled Chinese harbors...

The reports were not confirmed. Informants asserted, however, that United States naval authorities here were cognizant of them as reports and were watching developments closely...

They said that two German vessels, Ragenburg and Kimberland, left Japan late in October and had returned...

They said that the German vessels were now in Singapore, on the Chinese coast, and that three others in Chinese ports were being armed.

They were especially interested in the reports because of Japan's alliance with Germany and Italy and its own program for expansion toward the southern seas.

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Solon Demands Parity Payments for Farmers

By FRED O. BAILEY. WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 (AP) - Government reports reflecting increased prosperity for agriculture as well as industry because of defense expenditures coincided today with a demand by Sen. John H. Bankhead, D., Ala., for substantial farm parity payments next year.

Reports by Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins and Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard showed an unseasonal increase in non-agricultural employment...

Wickard's report, compiled by the bureau of agricultural economics, said cash farm income during the first 11 months of this year amounted to \$425,000,000, an increase of \$54,000,000 over the same months of 1939.

Bankhead, a leader in the successful fight for inclusion of a \$212,000,000 parity fund in last year's agriculture appropriation bill, asserted that the principle of parity payments is "just as necessary now" as he called on both Demo-

crats and Republicans to make good their campaign pledges favoring farm products, he said, make it particularly necessary that farm income be bolstered.

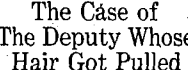

# REFUGEES NEAR STARVATION IN CONCENTRATION CAMP

## FRENCH SUPPORT THOUSANDS SENT OUT OF GERMANY

By STEVE FULTON  
 NEW YORK, Dec. 28 (AP)—Some 12,000 refugees, including 6,000 Jews, arrested on one hour's notice from their German homes, are existing on rations sufficient for only 2,000 or 3,000 people in the French concentration camp at Gurs, in the Pyrenees mountains, near the Spanish border.

"That is the information given me on my way back to America by a Portuguese Red Cross official, F. Sahlin, who had just made an inspection of the camp.

"I went to the Gurs camp," Sahlin said, "to see for myself how conditions were, and I was shocked at the housing problem. In one small shack without windows, crowded with 150 people without ventilation I found 150 people.

"500 Children to Die  
 "The food situation far from satisfactory is indefinable, but it is undeniable that the French cannot do any more for these people than for their own. But there could be some improvement.

"When 6,000 German Jewish refugees arrived from the palatinate, Baden and Wurtemberg, the remainder of the camp received no increase in his food allowance. If this situation continues many of the older refugees as well as the sick and some 500 children will die for lack of nourishment."

Sahlin had obtained a letter, smuggled out of the camp, telling of the plight of the Jewish refugees.

"On the morning of Oct. 22, Jews from the Saar palatinate, the palatinate, the grand duchy of Baden, and the Wurtemberg provinces were awakened by the Gestapo and warned to leave Germany within one hour.

Take Bare Necessities  
 "They were informed they would be allowed to carry with them 100 pounds and 100 francs in luggage. The great majority took with them the bare necessities, fearing they would have to carry their own luggage.

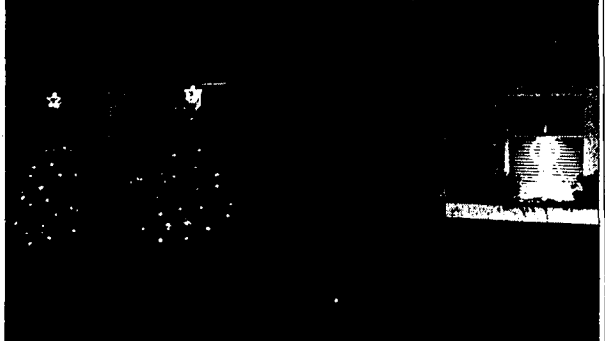
"Aged persons, some 80 and 90 years old as well as sick and feeble men and women were among those deported.

"Due to the great number of exiles it took many trains which left at short intervals between the 22nd and 23rd of October. After crossing the Rhine bridge there was no possible doubt that our first destination would be French soil. After a 54-hour train ride, during which soup was given us only once, we arrived at Oloron, in the Basques Pyrenees department. From there we were taken to the Gurs camp in trucks which also took our meager luggage.

Taken by Surprise  
 "Owing to the fact that the French commander of the Gurs camp had not been advised as to our number and was taken by surprise by our mass arrival it is not astonishing that he lacked food at the beginning. Despite the fact that the French administration is doing all it can to help the inmates, it is understandable that old people and the sick cannot resist the hardships of camp life.

"During the few weeks of our stay here at Gurs, the camp cemetery has grown in an astonishing proportion."

## FBI Agent Reveals Plants Unprotected

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 (AP)—A special agent of the federal bureau of investigation approached the gate of an important plant engaged in national defense production and entered without a challenge.

He repeated this performance at second and then a third gate. No one questioned him. He wore no identifying badge.

The agent then toured the entire factory, mingling with skilled laborers and technicians. He poked around among highly confidential activities, asking curious questions and receiving courteous answers.

Still no one asked his identity or purpose.

Fortunately, this person was an agent of the United States government and not of some foreign power which might be interested in impending national defense preparations or learning the secrets which were spread before the agent as he toured the plant.

Plant Survey  
 The agent had been assigned to the plant by Director J. Edgar Hoover of the FBI to determine laxities in protective measures against saboteurs and spies.

The plant survey, an integral part of the FBI counter-espionage system, was started in September, 1939, at the request of the army and navy departments.

A cursory check by these agencies had disclosed a laxity in certain vital areas of industrial production which, if not eliminated, might constitute a damaging breach of internal security in a time of crisis.

## Hitler Visit in France Points To Activity on English Channel

 Adolf Hitler's Christmas holiday spent in northern France would seem to indicate that reports of German troop concentrations in Roumania are not associated with any impending major offensive in that area. If a new military effort of major significance were to be made in the Balkans or the middle east, the Fuehrer would scarcely be in the other end of Europe. He would be conspicuously much nearer the center of action.

The Fuehrer's presence at Chateau Point in occupied France has given him an opportunity of inspecting the difficulties of a winter attempt to invade Great Britain. The channel was windy and rough over Christmas and there was a blinding snow storm.

Invasion in Mind  
 Invasion must have been present in his mind for he spoke about Germany's future being in the hands of the assembled troops. Germany's future, as Herr Hitler conceives it, in Nazi terms, depends on the conquest of Great Britain, but there could be little encouragement for him in present channel conditions.

Hitler, at Boulogne, peering toward England, across the narrow moat, in remembrance of Napoleon who made similar journeys to London, to inspect the channel. Military mechanics are different now, but the problem of successfully transporting troops over the channel is just as baffling.

Channel Rough  
 It would seem incredible, from a military standpoint, that the German high command would authorize a winter effort to get into England. The look winter might give some advantage for embarking troops, but the roughness of the channel would play havoc with the small German invasion barges; and a creaking army of no help to plan for efficient landings on an enemy coast, probably encased in fog.

If Herr Hitler is resolved to risk everything in an invasion effort, against military advice, it is more probable he will do so when the weather is less antagonistic. Next spring would be the more appropriate time.

But, so long as the British are on the alert, constantly strengthening their defenses, outside the need of a final desperate gamble could justify an invasion offensive this late in the war. The Fuehrer lost his chance last June, when the British were unprepared.

Various local citizens, returning this morning from the Sun Valley-Halley region, declared that the snow in that country at the present time is "probably the best since Sun Valley came into being."

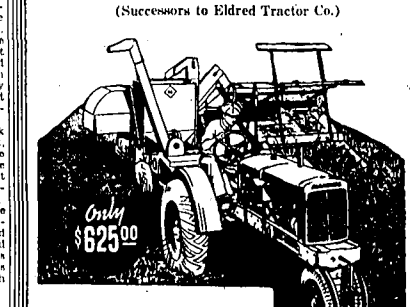
A heavy fall was recorded night before last and to show the extent of the snow the visitors point out that the south slopes at the back of the village, usually mostly bare, are now entirely covered.

Another visitor declared that with deep snow on the roofs and icicles hanging from the eaves the community of Halley gives the appearance of a fairyland.

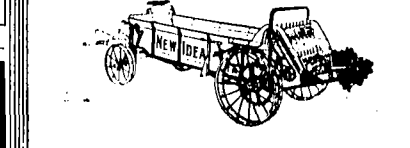
Official records show that at the present time four feet of snow in Baldy, two feet on the valley floor and two and one-half feet on Dollar mountain.
