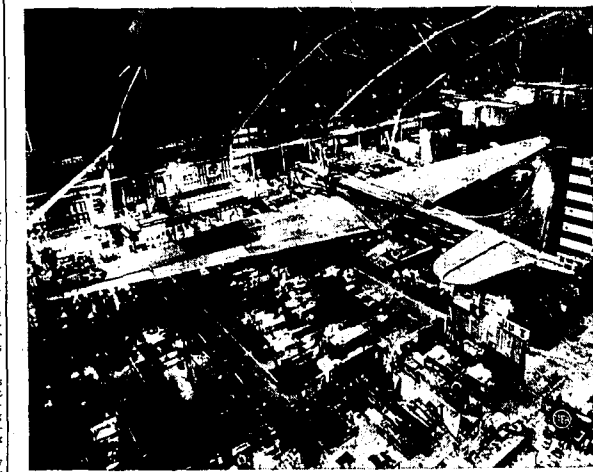

### CLUB WILL HEAR OF OCEAN BASES

Recently returned from a flying visit to the new naval air bases in the Atlantic—America's new outposts of defense—Major Thomas A. B. Ditton, military analyst and flying reporter for Associated Town Hall clubs, will offer first hand report here Jan. 15 on a vital phase of U. S. policy.

Major Ditton will speak at 8 p. m. that day at the high school auditorium to the Twin Falls Town Hall club. He will be introduced by O. A. Keiker, Evening Times reporter.

British-U. S. "Axis" J. A. Cederquist, Town Hall president, said today that Major Ditton will discuss "The New Atlantic Bases and the Growing British-American Axis." Shortly after announcement of the deal by which America acquired these eight new outposts of defense, Major Ditton was commissioned by the Associated Town Hall clubs to bring to affiliated clubs a first hand report on what is being done to develop the bases—and an analysis of the growing British-American cooperation in world affairs.

Major Ditton was given the assignment because it required a man of unusual ability and experience to obtain and analyze military, naval and aviation news with a clarity and accuracy. His background enabled him to obtain information unavailable to other observers, and to obtain permission, despite rigid restrictions, to view the bases from the air.

For a quarter of a century, since he left the Virginia military institute in 1914 to join the British army in which he served 10 years, Major Ditton has had a colorful career which has taken him to the many lands which figure in today's news of war and hemisphere defense. His varied experiences led him to be a soldier, aviator, soldier of fortune, university faculty member, journalist, lecturer, secret service agent, second mate for sea-going vessels, Thames river pilot, student of medicine, student of engineering and Cambridge university doctor of literature.

Major Ditton was born in America with a prominent British political leader as his father. His mother was an American. He was commissioned a king's lieutenant on the Mons battlefield . . . became the youngest captain currently in the British army at 19 . . . was an officer in the royal flying corps . . . in India . . . and with the camel corps in Africa from Somalia to Sierra Leone . . . secret service operative in Soviet Russia . . . barnstormed by air through Central America looking for revolutions . . . joined ports in a Canadian plane to the Arctic . . . special writer for the North American Newspaper Alliance . . . member of University of Hawaii faculty.

### PEA PEST CALLED SERIOUS HAZARD

With the pea weevil becoming "more and more serious each year" because more peas are being grown and mild winters allow the entire population of winter over, topics to be discussed at a pea growers session here Monday are of "utmost importance" at the present time, Glen E. Trail, representative of the seed company sponsoring the session, said this afternoon.

The Monday meeting will be held at the American Legion hall starting at 10 a. m. "Turkey dinner will be served those attending after the session is recessed for luncheon and an afternoon session will follow.

"Pea weevil is becoming more and more serious each year," Trail said this afternoon, pointing out that the mild winters fail to aid the situation.

"About 25 years ago it was necessary to kill growing peas in this section because of the weevil. Because practical methods of control are known such measure is not necessary at the present time."

Trail pointed out that the section is not only open to growers but also to anyone else interested including farmers, supply men, competitors and state and federal men working for the campaign in India he was given the star of India.

Major Ditton is on transcontinental tour during which he will visit many of the clubs affiliated with the Associated Town Halls.

In the field of agriculture, invited speakers are not necessary.

Speakers at the session will include Dr. T. A. Brinley, USDA, division of truck and garden insect investigations; Dr. W. E. Schull, head of the entomology department, University of Idaho; and J. F. Douglas, head of the local bureau of entomology, who will discuss the while fly problem. Dr. Brinley will show slides giving the life cycle of the pea weevil and also motion pictures showing weevil control in actual operation.

Home offices of the Washburn-Wilson Seed company, sponsors of the session, are located at Moscow but all crops grown by them in south Idaho are processed through the Bean Growers Warehouse Corp. at Hazzell.

# British African Troops Press Forward Into Kenya

## ADVANCE ARMIES READY FOR DRIVE AGAINST TOBRUK

**CAIRO, Jan. 10 (UP)**—British African forces, pressing their offensive operations against Italians in East Africa, have occupied Buna, northeastern Kenya, which Italy occupied several months ago after driving the British from Somalia, and a general headquarters communicate said today.

While claiming new successes against Italian forces, British general headquarters said that the concentration of British forces against Tobruk, Libya, was continuing and that units of the army of the Nile which have pressed on west of Tobruk have been reinforced.

On the Sudan frontier, our patrols inflicted a number of casualties on the enemy holding positions in the area of the Nile valley, which we captured," a communication said.

Headquarters said that the British mobile command which advanced into Buna without opposition, confirmed that the Italians had abandoned El Dak (El Wad) as result of a general attack on the night of Jan. 8. In last month's raid on El Dak, British forces operating from Kenya captured and killed 1,000 Italian soldiers and their commander had fled by mule-cart upon learning of the impending British attack.

On the Sudan frontier, our patrols in the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan followed operations yesterday in the area of the Nile valley, which were supported by a force of British troops by royal air force raid, attacked and vanquished the Italian garrison at Gubbah, a town near the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan.

## WATERSHED HAS PLENTY OF SNOW

Snow surveys for the Snake river watershed, made by the forest service, the bureau of reclamation and the national park service and including the period ending Dec. 31, 1940, today were featured in a report received here by the Twin Falls Canal company from Lynn Crandall, watermaster.

The survey shows the greatest depth existing at the present time is at Beecher river station which drains to Fall river. The depth there is 42 inches and the water content is 9.4 inches.

Other depths and water content at the present time include Valley View, 30 inches deep, 2.9 inches water content; Big Springs, 34 inches six inches; Idaho park dam, 28 inches, 4.1 inches; Cotton pass, 41 inches, 9.2 inches; state line, 30 inches, five inches; Camp creek, 29 inches, four inches; Bryan flat, 24 inches, 5.4 inches.

In another table in the report it is shown that the water content is far above the 1939 totals on the corresponding date.

The report received here also shows that Jackson lake and American falls reservoir allowed substantial increases in impounded water during the period Dec. 29 and Jan. 4. Jackson lake is now impounding 238,860 acre feet of water against 232,860 at the last reading, and American falls reservoir now holds 163,920 against the former reading of 164,300.

Likewise, the report shows that the amount of water impounded in the American falls reservoir now is nearly 100,000 acre feet ahead of the same period during 1939.

## SHIPPERS' BOARD HELP REQUESTED

Cooperation of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce in obtaining secure passage of a legislative measure to set up a fresh fruit and vegetable shippers control board was sought today by L. L. Hurst, Nampa secretary-manager of the Growers and Shippers association of Idaho.

Hurst advised President Harry E. Coker that he will be unable to speak before the C. of C. until after the legislative session. But he outlined the work of the association on behalf of farmers and handlers of perishable goods, and requested help in securing approval of a statewide control board.

"The chamber had extended a bid to Hurst to appear here soon to explain the association's program."

**Would Tax Cars**

The bill which the Growers and Shippers association plans to put before state lawmakers would place a tax of 50 cents per car on the state for use to cover the "many activities" of the work on behalf of Idaho's perishable products.

The measure, Hurst advised Mr. Coker, would also set up the Growers and Shippers association of Idaho as a state agency through which the federal government could work to pass on benefits to the perishable industry.

**Unemployment Tax**

Other legislative proposals by the association, Hurst said, include an effort by lawsuit and legislation to obtain exemption for handlers of agricultural products from the state unemployment compensation tax. Such handlers, he pointed out, are already exempt by the government from the social security levy.

Achievements of the organization during the past year as "watch dog" for the fruit and vegetable industry, include several freight reductions.
