

GET fun out of your newspaper.
Read it for sheer enjoyment and entertainment. It brings you a regular parade of what goes on in the world about you. It gives you the good and the bad news. It reports success and failure, rain and sunshine, happiness and sorrow.

But when next you start to read a copy of your paper, say this sentence over to yourself:

"Here in my hands is the recipe for freedom; from it I will learn what I can and must do, if I am to keep my freedom."

keep my freedom."

Probably you haven't thought of it that way, but from some source you must learn to distinguish right from wrong, good from bad, worth from worthleasness. Your hotse or your dog or even your small son does not need to concern himself. much with those things because most of his decisions are made for him.

However, you, a free citizen, responsible for your own safety, your own money, your own government, must keep abreast of what's going on You must make hundreds of definite decisions

Is the proposed new traffic law a Is the proposed new traffic law a good thing; is that shirt worth two dollars; shall I buy life insurance or government bonds; should medical service be paid for by taxes or by the individual?

How good is our national defense? How dependable is our local police force? The list is almost endless in this complicated, modern life we live.

Unless you want to give up democracy and turn all such vexing questions over to a king, or a dic-tator, or a master, you must have all the evidence in order to make your share of right decisions.

You know, of course, that your newspaper gives you the news, the accurate information which enables you to find your answers.

Take the "wave" of kidnaping which struck us a few years ago. Public opinion, roused by the news, led to stiffening of laws, to efficient law enforcement and finally to the virtual stamping out of this kind of crime. Except for your newspapers or some news-reporting service you could hardly have known of a single kidnaping case.

Or take an example from the advertising col-umns of the newspapers. There'll be news of the development of a new kind of fabric in a laboratory. It is, perhaps, one that will stretch two ways



instead of one. Next you'll see stores featuring the new fabril in their advertisements of a bathing suit. And with memories of straps that cut into your shoulders, you quickly decide this new thing

### One Man's Tragedy

When a whole continent is bathed in tragedy, and whole peoples are overwhelmed in grief, it seems almost impertinent to pick out one man's tragedy for comment. And yet sometimes in all this welter of misery, an incident does stand out, illuminating the

misery, an incident does stand out, illuminating the whole.

Derek Jan de Geer, an old man, had been prime minister of the Netherlands. When his country fell to the conquerion stands when his country fell to the conquerion hordes could not do to break his spirit, was done by a simple human relationship. His wife, left behind in Holland, became ill. The Germans would not let her go, harmless though an old and alling woman must necessarily be. So de Geer surrendered to his devotion to his wife the spirit that cannon could not break. He boarded a German plane at Lisbon to return to occupied Holland, and the woman he could not bear to think of as alone, sick, and helpless, among her enemies.

How many million such tragedies are occurring daily in Europe, do you think, among quite humble people whose suffering is not, can never be, known?

### **Another Opportunity**

There is not the faintest reason why a single American youth should return from his year of military service without taking home with him a sound and workable knowledge of the English language.

During the World war, thousands of drafted men were found to have either no knowledge, or a completely inadequate knowledge, of English. Some of them even had to be trained by officers speaking their own languages.

them even had to be trained by omcers speaking their own languages.

The problem is not as acute this time. There will be fewer such cases. But Camp Dix is pioneering the way in starting classes in English for foreign-born or foreign-speaking recruits. Every man of them who thus learns his country's language while in service will have derived an extra benefit from his service which will fit him for late life.

Here again we come to a thing that has been said before: We've got universal military service; let's get every benefit out of it that can be had.

### Do We Progress?

Shall we ever return; think you, to the sort of conditions, described by Dr. Walter N. Polakov in a recent United Mine Workers' Journal, which once prevalled in Scotch coal mines? "One girl... began work at age 10, is now 17, and works 12 to 14 hours a day; her father gets 12 shillings every fortnight for her work ... another girl began at the age of 8 to work from 2 a. m. until 1 p. m... I have had the strap when I didna do my bidding.'... This girl had to travel the height of St. Paul's cathedral with 1½ hundradweight on her back."


