

HOUSE STUDIES AID BILL CHANGES

3 NEW STRIKES ADD DELAYS TO DEFENSE SET-UP

By United Press. Strikes at plants engaged in work on national defense projects were reported today from Philadelphia and Fairmont, W. Va., today. About 3,400 employees were affected.

The CIO United Automobile Workers called a strike at the Midland Steel Products Co. in Detroit, delaying work on automobile and army truck frames for three auto firms. The strike involved 1,700 workers and resulted from a union demand for elimination of a scale.

At Philadelphia, 1,500 workers of the J. O. Brill Co. struck to enforce a demand of the CIO steel workers' union for a new contract providing higher wages.

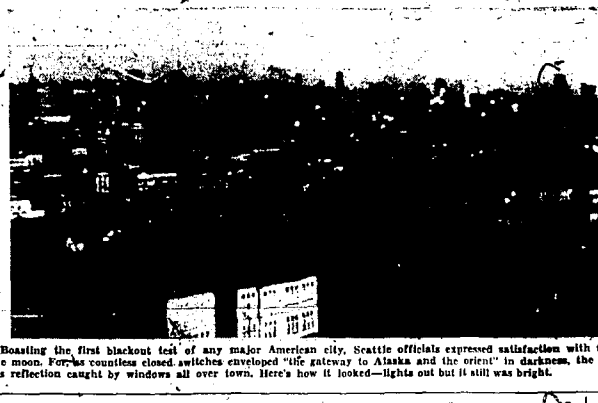
The Fairmont Aluminum Co. was closed by a strike of 200 members of the CIO Aluminum Workers' union. The union charged the company refused to discuss grievances.

Employees of the Best Foundry and Machine Co. of Fort Wayne, Ind., returned to work today under an agreement calling for a national labor relation board election March 14.

A strike at the plant, which makes aerial bombs, had been called last Thursday by the SWOC which charged the firm with using superstitious workers in preparation for a collective bargaining election.

Labor disputes also threatened more than \$2,000,000 worth of defense contracts at plants of the Bethlehem and United States Steel companies in Lackawanna, Pa.

# FEW CHANGES MADE IN STRUCTURE OF IDAHO STATE LAWS

## AD VALOREM TAX CUT AS EXPENSE IS GIVEN BOOST

BOISE, March 10 (U.S.)—Few changes were made in Idaho's governmental structure as scores of new laws were placed on the state books after the Idaho legislature adjourned its 26th session.

On the financial side, the record of the 26th legislative session was good—the ad valorem tax levy was reduced despite increased appropriations for state government functions and only one new tax measure was enacted. It was the bill increasing state tax on liquor 40 per cent and the package provided revenue for balancing of the 1941-42 budget for state departments. It was expected to raise more than \$1,000,000 during the next two years and retire outstanding warrants left by the last administration.

On the strictly governmental side, the house and senate passed legislation which will lead to reform of the state's fiscal and penal systems.

Appropriation Measures  
Appropriation measures tied up the final days of the session, but when the senate had cleared the total was \$12,274,485—about \$2,123,000 less than the amount of appropriations which had been approved by the governor.

During the last hours of the session, Rep. Reed Adkins, D. Bonneville, chairman of the house appropriations committee, pointed out to members that the session had accomplished a good deal. Said Adkins: "We have no reason to go home depressed. Appropriations have been increased nearly \$1,000,000 over the preceding administration, yet we have reduced the ad valorem levy \$500,000. We have balanced the budget and if business conditions remain good during the remainder of the biennium the general fund should show a surplus when the next session of the legislature meets."

House of Legislation  
Gov. Chase A. Clark did not obtain extra money for relief during the session, but he obtained creation of the state liquor dispensary, state insurance fund and taxing agencies. His "pep" bill, which would give a portion of the laws which were enacted during the session from a mass of legislation.

The compact senate joint resolutions provided the Idaho electorate with three constitutional amendments to be voted on November, 1941. If the voters approve the result will be complete remodeling of Idaho's penal system. Jointly, the bill calls for amending the constitution to abolish the present state board of prison commissioners and permit the state legislature to establish a non-partisan board known as the board of correction. The three-man board, appointed by the governor, would have complete authority over prison operations. At least the change can not go into effect until 1943.

A fourth constitutional amendment was contained in a resolution to permit sale of state-owned land. Some of the most important governmental changes enacted last year concerning state bookkeeping and fiscal procedures. Governor Clark signed a series of bills sponsored by State Auditor Calvin E. Wright, which will start the fiscal year on July 1, instead of Jan. 1. This was regarded as important because it puts the state in line with the federal government, and simplifies the process of appropriating funds for state departments. Under the old fiscal year system, the legislature had to make emergency appropriations to carry the departments through the 60 days of the session, or until regular allocations were made.

State Inventory  
Also approved was a \$500,000 fund to conduct a state inventory and set up a "general ledger." The latter will provide the state with a day to day check on expenditures and income—helping prevent over-drawings. To supplement the general ledger, laws were passed to make it compulsory for state departments heads to prepare requests for funds needed to carry them through quarterly periods. By making it necessary to ask for funds in advance, the legislature hoped to prevent over-drawing of appropriations.

Under new laws, each appropriation must be "budgeted" for a specific use. This was done to prevent use of certain funds for purposes which the legislature did not intend. The auditor must also issue quarterly reports on expenditures and disbursements.

## French Resistance Increases In Colonial African Sectors

Hitler's threats in southeastern Europe are not changing the recently developed tendency in France to visualize hopes of an eventual German defeat and France's release from Nazi control. That fact is evident from the announcement at Vichy, following last week's conference with General Weingand, that the French colonial army in Africa will repulse any act of aggression.

Added importance is given to the statement by the assertion that the French army alone will defend colonial Africa. Recent reports have indicated the presence in French Africa of German technicians but the new Vichy declaration shows that Marshal Petain is not allowing any serious Nazi infiltration into the colonies.

Directed at Rome  
There is an added significance in this declaration of policy which seems to be directed at Rome. It concerns the eventual position of the remnants of Marshal Graziani's defeated army, now concentrated about Tripoli, near the French Tunisian border.

For the time being, General Wavell is resting his Libyan offensive at Benghazi, undoubtedly because of the trend of events in the Balkans. Later, however, there is every probability that a drive against Tripoli will begin.

In this event, the remaining Graziani divisions, so largely bereft of munitions, tanks and planes, can retreat only into Tunisia. Since Vichy has declared that only French troops will be allowed to conduct operations in French Africa, it seems obvious that the Italians will not help the Germans to get north African bases but also he is not prepared to extend a helping hand to the Italians.

There can be no doubt the entire subject of France's relations with the axis was closely examined during General Weingand's stay in Vichy. Events in the Balkans must have been examined with the possible extension of the war into Asia minor, for General Weingand is France's leading middle east military specialist.

## FIELD EMPLOYEES GET EXEMPTIONS

All employees who work exclusively in the fields are exempt from wage and hour provisions of the fair labor standards act, according to a bulletin received by the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce today in connection with the fresh vegetable packing industry.

Chile Preston, western regional director of the department of labor's wage-hour division, said: "The bulletin exempts both the wage and hour provisions any employee employed within the 'area of production' as defined by the administrator and engaged in the handling, packing, storing, and preparing in their raw or natural state of fresh vegetables. The definition of 'area of production' as applied to fresh vegetables requires that an establishment employ not more than 10 persons in the handling and packing operations, and receive all its raw materials from farms in the general vicinity of the establishment."

Magie Valley employees in the fresh fruit industry were advised that all employees working exclusively in the fields are exempt from the act. Children under 16 are not permitted to work when they are legally required to be in school. In processing and packing operations of fresh vegetables certain similar exemptions exist as, for instance, managers, superintendents, foremen and outside salesmen, provided certain additional requirements are met.

Another group of employees in the industry is exempt from the hours provision in the act for a period of 14 weeks in the calendar year, the C. of C. was told. Where the activities of a seasonal nature as found by the administrator, then for an additional 14 weeks they may be employed up to 12 hours a day and 66 hours a week without payment of overtime. This group includes truck drivers hauling unpacked vegetables from field to packing house, as well as packing house receiving clerks, timekeepers, floor laborers, dumpers, washers, graders, packers, stackers, car loaders, checkers, laborers, tally clerks, shipping clerks, warehouse attendants, and maintenance mechanics and electricians. Box makers and lifters are similarly exempted, provided they are employees and not independent contractors.

Also exempt  
Assistant crew foremen who actually are independent contractors are exempt from both wage and hour provisions while working on a farm. Where the activity is found to be of a seasonal nature by the administrator, then another group in the industry may be employed up to 12 hours a day and 56 hours a week for fourteen weeks in the calendar year without payment of overtime. These include garage mechanics—foremen and helpers—and watchmen and janitors. Under certain conditions, the same rules may apply to truck drivers hauling packed vegetables between branch houses, and to signographers, bookkeepers, telephone operators, and clerks—if their hours of work vary directly with the

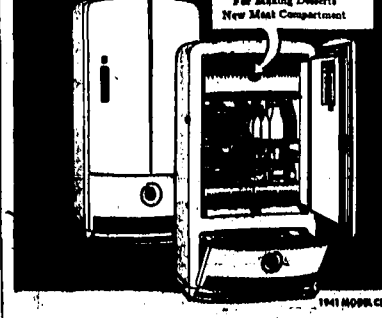

# UTAH, IDAHO SUGAR GROWERS SIGN PACT FOR 1941

## PROCESSORS AND PLANTERS REACH NEW AGREEMENT

**SALT LAKE CITY, March 10 (UP)**—Utah and Idaho sugar beet farmers today began preparations to plant their 1941 crops—an agreement with processors finally reached.

The agreement was signed by representatives of the growers and processors late yesterday after three weeks of negotiations.

The exact wording of the agreement was not disclosed by spokesman but it was indicated that the pact was about the same as the 1940 contract, except for price increases in the higher sugar-content brackets.

This was indicated in a statement by J. R. Hawkins, president of the Utah Beet Growers' association, and Preston Ellsworth, president of the Idaho Beet Growers' association. Eastern Oregon is also covered by the agreement.

**Favorable to Growers**

"The new contract is more favorable to growers in the higher brackets," Hawkins and Ellsworth said, "and the use of sugar to plant their full acreage allotment."

He said that "the price of sugar now on the market is every indication points to better returns to the farmer than during the past year."

**Real Job**

The processors, represented by General Manager Douglas Scailley of the Utah-Idaho Beet Sugar Company, agreed "sugar prices are better today than for some time and the improved moisture conditions in the areas point to a successful crop."

"The real job ahead of all parties interested in the domestic beet sugar industry is to see that legislation affecting the industry now pending in congress is equitably drawn," Scailley added.

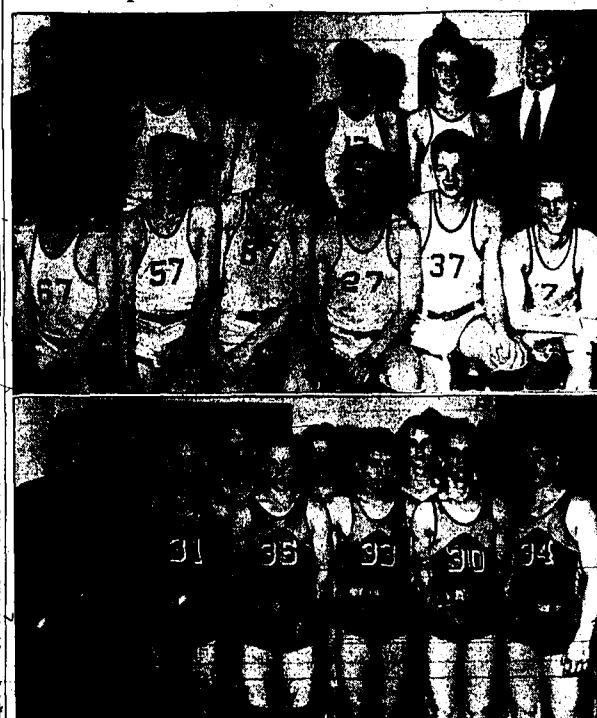

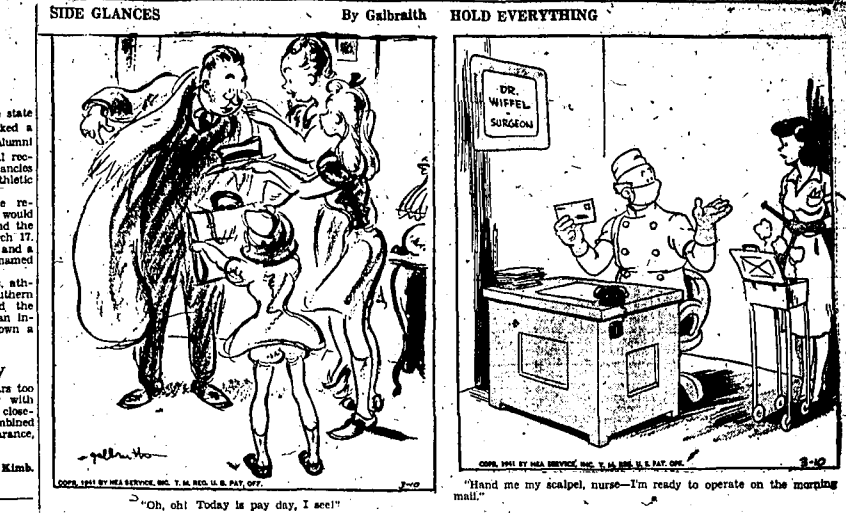

### AIR CADET TESTS AT ARMY OFFICE

The traveling flying cadet examining board, which will visit Twin Falls March 31 and April 1 for the purpose of meeting applicants for appointment as flying cadets in the United States army air corps, will headquarter at the army recruiting station, 119 1/2 Main avenue east, it was announced this afternoon by Major Harold W. Peterson, officer in charge of the regular recruiting station.

Lieutenant Peterson pointed out that only men between the ages of 20 and 26 years, who are in excellent health, unmarried and of good moral character, and who have completed at least two years of college work, need apply to the board for examination. Men who meet all other requirements, and who will be graduated from their second year in college this May or June, also may be interviewed. The board will be here March 31 and April 1 between the hours of 8:30 a. m. and 4 p. m.

Must Have Three  
Youths interviewed must have with them at the time of their examination (1) a birth certificate, (2) three letters of recommendation from reputable citizens, not relatives; (3) transcript of college credits, or certificates of registration bearing college seal, to the effect that one-half or more credits toward a degree have been earned; (4) letter of recommendation from PMS and T I currently enrolled as ROTC cadet.

Physical examinations, which take about three hours, will be given by the board during its two-day stop here. Because of the length of time required for the examinations, candidates are urged to report in the morning.

30-Week Period  
Flight and ground training courses are given concurrently over a 30-week period without interruption. Ten weeks each are spent at primary, basic and advanced flying schools. CAA courses do not exempt from primary course.

Flying cadets are paid \$75 a month, and in addition there is a ration allowance of \$1 a day. Living quarters, medical attention and hospital care are provided at no extra cost. Clothing and equipment also are furnished.

Candidates, successfully completing this training are commissioned as second lieutenants in the air corps service with a salary increase to \$203.50 a month and living quarters. Where living quarters are unavailable, the sum received is \$245.50.

Special Courses  
The board which will be here March 31 and April 1 has the authority to recommend graduates of engineering colleges, or seniors therein for a special course in New York University or Purdue university, and other training, graduates of which will be commissioned as second lieutenants and assigned as engineering officers.

The examination here will be the physical examination of mentally qualified men who desire to become flying cadets. Only those for "pilots," "engineering officers," or "communications officers" are examined by this board.

### HIGHLIGHTS FROM LATEST BOOKS

#### NAZI HEEL CLICKING AND 'STICKER CRISH' BOTHIER BRITISH

There is a deluge of books on Britain; few will say more than the vivid, straight-from-the-shoulder account by Harvey Klemmer, "They'll Never Quit" (Whitford, \$2.50). Klemmer, just returned from his post with the U. S. embassy in London, writes the complete unexpurgated story of the battle of Britain. He was in more than 400 bombings, was machine-gunned by a German plane. You can still mail a letter in London in the afternoon, have it delivered the next morning, he reports, but he warns, "though Britain stands, whether or not she continues to stand depends largely on the United States." Samples of Klemmer's stories are excerpted here: The Nazis, from all accounts, are inclined to be surly. They usually click their heels and give the Heil Hitler salute.

When I left London, people were telling a delightful story about the experience of a British officer in the southeast. This officer got tired of watching the Nazis click their heels. He accordingly told his men to take the Nazis' boots off before bringing them in. The result is said to be very funny.

People are always asking me what life is like in England today. The only answer I can make is that, although the outward forms have been greatly changed, the basic activities continue more or less as usual. The majority of the people, while they may sleep elsewhere, still live in their own homes. They still go to work, read their papers, attend the movies, listen to the radio and enjoy their favorite sports.

Footballers still strive for a goal. They may have to run for shelter before the match is over but the important thing is that they continue to play.

There is still racing in England. I have a copy of the Daily Sketch before me as I write. The headline on the sports page is, "League Chiefs Called to Deal With Soccer Crisis."

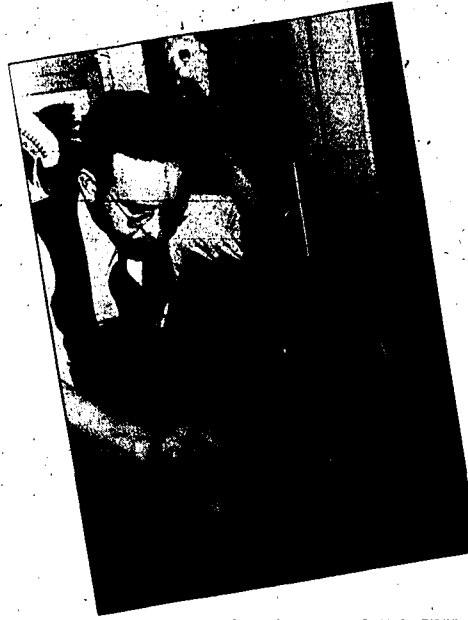

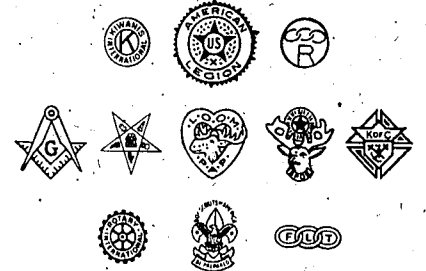
