

L. D. S. TO OFFER GREAT ORATORIO

The tabernacle choir and 250 other performers will present the oratorio "St. Paul" at the L. D. S. conference next month in Salt Lake City, according to word received here by J. W. Richins, president of the Twin Falls stake.

The oratorio is one of Felix Mendelssohn's masterpieces. It will be one of the features luring hundreds of Magic Valley residents to Salt Lake City.

More than 600 people will take part. The tabernacle choir numbering 250, J. Spenser Cornwall, director of the M. I. A. with 125 dramatic performers, W. O. Robinson directing; the Brigham Young university orchestra of 60 or more under the direction of LeRoy J. The oratorio will be presented on three nights, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, April 2, 3 and 4.

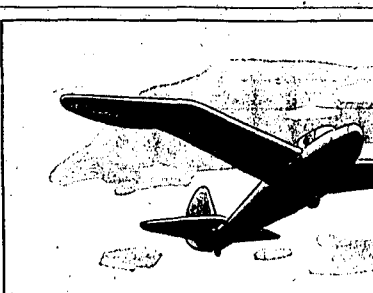

Police today reported no clues as to who entered the Medford grocery, Kimberly road, Sunday night and took \$15 in cash as well as \$20 in merchandise.

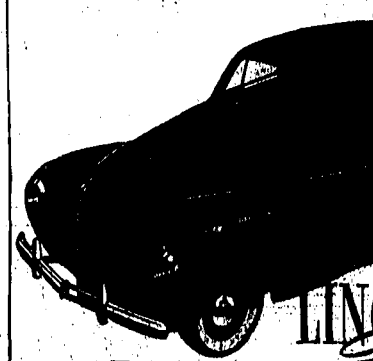

ITALIANS REPORT COUNTER-ATTACK

ROME, March 26 (AP)—Roberto Farinacci, former secretary-general of the Fascist party, said in the newspaper "Tomori" of Tirana, Albania, today that Italian troops in north Africa, supported by a German expeditionary force, were counter-attacking the British army near the Nile. Farinacci, who is in Albania, hinted German troops in Bulgaria were preparing to march into Greece.

(Informed quarters in Berlin yesterday said German armored formations had occupied El Aghetta, near the border of Tripolitania and Cyrenaica in Libya. British military quarters in London said today the reported occupation was "not unlikely." Greek reports recently said Farinacci, who is close to Premier Benito Mussolini, had been killed in action in Albania.)

Low-Flying Naval Plane Decapitates Woman in Florida

PENSACOLA, Fla., March 26 (AP)—The navy today will attempt to fix responsibility for death of Mrs. Robert Phillips who was decapitated yesterday when a naval training plane swooped down a group of turnip field workers near Robertsdale, Ala.

Held by authorities at the naval air station here as suspected occupants of the "hit-and-run" plane were Ensign J. C. Thompson and Student Pilot Paul Brown. The navy refused to elaborate on charges against the two flyers pending the formal investigation.

Fellow-workers of Mrs. Phillips, who saved themselves from the plane by falling flat on the ground, were the chief witnesses for the inquiry.

BURNING TANKER FLOATS IN OCEAN

BEAUFORT, N. C., March 26 (AP)—One member of the 40-man crew of the 9,216-ton tanker Cities Service Denver was dead today, 18 were missing and apparently dead, and 21 were safe while the ship, destroyed by explosion and fire, menaced navigation as it floated, a smoldering hulk, 30 miles south of Cape Lookout, N. C.

Oscar J. Degerstedt of Two Harbors, Minn., one of 17 crew members landed here by the U. S. Pan-New York, died of burns last night. Winfield Campbell, 25, Portland, Me., who also was hospitalized here with burns, said the explosion might have been caused by faulty wiring, "or from fumes that ignited when somebody struck a match in the crew's quarters."

In addition to the survivors landed here, five were picked up by the tanker W. W. Bruce, believed headed for Boston.

ODDGERS TO GUN FOR 1941 NATIONAL FLAG

Harmony Lacking In Spring Camp; Two Players Fined

CLEARWATER, Fla., March 26 (UP)—The Brooklyn Dodgers are going to shoot the works in an effort to win the 1941 National league pennant. If they achieve their goal, it will surprise a lot of folks. They have not been impressive in Florida and a lack of harmony on the club is evident. Already two players have been fined and another one virtually suspended. Van Mungo was fined \$200 for breaking training in Havana and Hugh Casey was fined \$25 for reporting four days late.

Babe Phelps has not reported and the Dodgers have advised him to get into condition at his own expense. If he joins the club he must pay his own room and board until he can play.

Walker in Background
Dixie Walker, who led the Dodgers in hitting last season with 206, has been relegated to the background. The Dodgers are blaming him for their failure to give the Reds a closer race last year, saying Walker let too many base hits fall in short center field.

The pressure is heavy on Kirby Higbe from the Phillies andatcher Mike Owen from the Cards. Two players for whom the Dodgers shell out \$175,000.

Catching, pitching and center field seem to be the Dodgers' biggest question marks. With Phelps sulking the catching staff consists of Owen and Herman Franks. Reserve receiver Angelo O'Donohue has been sold out. After you've mentioned Higbe, Wyatt, Curt Davis and Hugh Casey, you should be covered. The Dodger pitching squad, Fred Fitzsimons, is still around but at 40 he'll be used sparingly.

Hamlin in Bad
Luce Hamlin is in bad graces of the Dodger bosses and may be dropped.

Wyatt should be big winner, but the best the Dodgers can show in the way of a left-hander is Wyatt. Harlow Burton, young infield star who has been performing in the Oregon State league for the past three weeks.

Burton, who resides here now, played with the Bend, Ore., club in the high semi-pro circuit and hit the apple for an average well over the 400 mark. He is a former 200-foot slugger, is 24 years old, weighs 135, and stands five feet eight inches high.

I don't mean the amount of the check that Promoter Mike Jacobs handed him, but how much actually was left for Abe after his manager, Jimmy Johnson, had taken what I am sure was his sizable cut, handlers and sparring partners had been paid off, and the other 101 tabs picked up.

My guess is that it was a paltry sum, as heavyweight championship bouts go, and that considering the terrific beating he took, Abe was almost as badly underpaid as those unfortunate who Falls Cowboys and already a third of the 50 boxes have been sold.

Simon to make a Roman holiday. Yet it is difficult to feel too sorry for Simon. He didn't have to fight Louis in the first place. That's really making money the hard way. When you get a knot on your head, with every dollar, even gold goes to appeal. Abe would have been wiser had he taken one of 50 alternatives. He could have borrowed a beard and a cane and posed as a Spanish war pensioner or worked at 50 cents an hour testing used parachutes.

The best proof of what a beating Abe did take in those 13 rounds in Detroit, is the fact that he has signed to fight Louis again. The next evidence of what Louis' fists did to him will come in the next bout. He'll never go 13 again. For one thing, he will know he can't lick Louis. That will soften him some and there never was chin-soft even on one of those Guteson Borghum mountain men-of-old chins—which could take licks Abe did and be the same afterwards.

The light heavyweight elimination bout between Anton Christoforidis and Gus Lemwick was shifted from May 2 to June 12 when it will headline a Greek benefit show.

How that he has the Cubs of the mainland, Jimmy Wilson hopes Lou Novikoff will get around to playing some baseball.

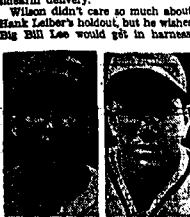
Novikoff has demonstrated that he is something of a singer and actor, but Wilson is more interested in his hitting and outfielding.
