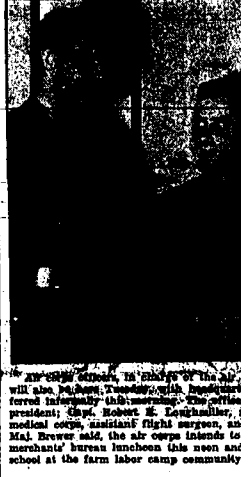

# HITLER ORDERS ALL GERMANS TO LEAVE JUGOSLAVIA VIA

## MOBILIZATION OF BULGARIA TROOPS DENIED BY NAZIS

 BERNHARD, March 31 (Special)—Authoritative sources said today the government had ordered all German citizens to leave Yugoslavia immediately.

The statement was made soon after German informants had asserted, and Bulgarian sources had denied, that Bulgaria had ordered general mobilization.

It was also authorized German sources said that the government had at last received a statement of the foreign policy of the new Yugoslav government which Germany had sought insistently for four days.

"It is similar," an authorized informant added, "we know nothing about it containing anything regarding Yugoslavia's attitude to the German-Japanese-Italian alliance."

**"Implicit Repudiation"**  
 (This might prove to mean Yugoslavia had refused to commit itself but had merely expressed a desire to maintain its neutrality and remain at peace with its neighbors. Such a statement would be an implicit repudiation of the agreement by the previous Yugoslav government to permit Germany to support its attack on Greece.)

Next informants said the order to Germans to leave Yugoslavia at once was the result of anti-German demonstrations and the beating of German citizens.

The informants said between 15,000 and 20,000 German citizens were leaving.

They said anti-German outbreaks were increasing.

"The German government cannot remain indifferent to these anti-German outbreaks at a time when the reich and the allies are involved in war," a spokesman said.

**"Endangering Frontiers"**  
 "These outbreaks seriously endanger the reich's frontiers."

"The Yugoslav government and all Yugoslav quarters must realize that our generosity must some day come to an end."

Authorized sources said Ivo Andric, the Yugoslav minister, had left for Belgrade today.

They admitted he had been in contact with the foreign office before he left but refused to say whether he carried a message from the German government.

They said Victor von Heeren, the German minister at Belgrade, might return to Berlin soon to report but that so far he had not left Belgrade.

Authorized informants said that as the result of events in Yugoslavia both Bulgaria and Hungary had been compelled to take "certain steps."

They refused to go into details.

**AROUND the WORLD**

**LONDON**—British hope increased today that all of Italy's east African empire might be in British hands before the spring rainy season and the possibility was held that the accession of crushing blows Italy has suffered might soon cause the collapse of its entire war effort.

**BERLIN**—German authorities informed today the conclusion of Italian and Danish ships by the United States may possibly even be of historic importance.

**SOPIA**—Well informed sources said today that contrary to Berlin reports Bulgaria had ordered general mobilization but they added the calling up of men continued in regular manner except that more city men were being called to replace farmers released for spring farm work.

**ATHENS**—British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and Gen. Sir John G. Dill, chief of the British imperial general staff, arrived today for conferences with the Greek government.

**LONDON**—Authoritative British sources charged today that for months French merchant ships had been carrying to French ports materials of all sorts of which a very high proportion was immediately appropriated by Germany.

**VIENNA**—The government today said it sharply warned state to London previously by British naval units on four French merchantmen escorted by a French destroyer, sailing from Algeria. The convoy carried no war materials destined for Germany, the ministry's spokesman asserted.

**BERLIN**—German bombers, in widespread operations, struck England despite unfavorable weather, pounded two air fields on the island of Malta, and attacked a large manufacturing plant in Italy, the high command said today.

**NEW YORK**—Foreign magazine announced today that its latest survey of public opinion indicated 50 per cent of the people believe "the chances are 50-50 or better" that the United States eventually will send a navy and an air force to Europe.

**BIG EARNINGS FOR FISHERMEN**

LONDON (AP)—While Lord Woolton, the minister of food, has been warning fish merchants that prices are too high, small herring drifters are earning more than \$400 for a day's fishing. Men and boys operate on the sharing-out system and many fishermen aboard drifters are making \$225 a week.

## BAN PLACED ON METAL HOARDING

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—The national defense commission today added zinc to the list of metals it seeks to guard against hoarding and potential profiteering.

A ceiling on zinc prices and secondary slab zinc prices was announced last night to become effective immediately and to be "fully enforced." Similar steps had been taken for second-hand machine tools, aluminum scrap and secondary aluminum ingot.

The commission charged that because of an insufficient supply of zinc to meet defense and civilian needs, the metal was being withheld from the market in some cases and its prices thus subjected to inflationary pressure.

The action was announced by Leon Henderson who also revealed that similar maximum prices for iron and steel scrap are imminent. He said he had been working on measures to stabilize the brass and copper markets.

## Army Traffic Hints Told to Idaho Drivers

Just what is expected of Idaho civilian drivers when encountering army units on streets or highways had been fully explained here today in a communication received by Acting Chief of Police Lee McCracken from E. T. Spencer, Boise, director of the state safety bureau.

These rules, which were outlined by Spencer, will apply to those highways which are or will be designated as military highways for the vast movement of men and equipment in convoys, particularly to the new Boise airport or across the state.

**Army Has Precedence**  
 "At a recent meeting in San Francisco of the law enforcement, highway and officials of other states, suggestions approved by the war department for the guidance of motorists in such contingencies were outlined," Spencer wrote. "It is well to remember that the army has the right of way."

"Frequently military convoys moving on the open highways will have sufficient interval between vehicles to permit civilian vehicles to pass the column provided all safety precautions, such as not passing on hills, curves, and the like, are observed. As in any other case, the

passing driver is responsible for safe clearance.

"When passing through cities, the column may be closed up and if adequately escorted by police will move at a normal speed and may attempt to break through the column or to drive alongside.

"When encountering a convoy in the city, pull off to one side of the street in the same manner as when an ambulance or a fire engine is approaching."

**Open Highway**  
 "On the open highway, even though the vehicles are somewhat spread out, the convoy when escorted by state police may go through a stop light. When approaching an intersection through which an army

vehicle is moving, slow down and determine that no additional vehicles are coming before driving through even though the light is green. This precaution should be followed both in the city and on the open highway.

"The complete cooperation of the waiting and driving public is essential to efficient military and civil traffic. The observation of good driving practices will facilitate military movements and at the same time result in a minimum of inconvenience to civilian traffic," Spencer said.

## Berg Studying Mass of Data Submitted in Power Hearing

JEROME, March 31 (Special)—Reclamation Commissioner E. V. Berg today was making a personal study of a mass of testimony given during the two-day hearing on the Idaho Power company's application for development of power sites and was expected to give a decision in about two weeks.  
The hearing, held in the district court room here, last night and Saturday afternoon. It started Friday at 2 p. m.

Wm. Sean Rites Berg indicated that he also, before reaching a decision, would make a personal investigation of the sites under consideration.  
Scores of witnesses both for and against the power development appeared before the commissioner during the two-day hearing.

For the first time Saturday afternoon it was revealed by H. L. Senger, Idaho Power company engineer, that the development was wanted as a "stop-gap" measure pending an anticipated contract to market power for government reclamation project upon which construction has not as yet started. His testimony explained the "plan" which had been referred to Friday at which time the power company claimed the developments were necessary to meet a demand for power.

He pointed out the power company is depending on obtaining the government contract to distribute power from the 80,000 kilowatt plant which is proposed on the Payette river as part of the \$13,000,000 reclamation project. As the plant is not expected in operation until about 1944, Senger explained the small developments along the Snake river would provide the company with an estimated 5,000 kilowatts needed before that time.

None Signed  
It was brought out that although the power concern expects to be given the contract, none has been signed as yet.  
Engineer Senger was questioned at

considerable length as to the additional power potentialities at sites already developed. He admitted that locations at which additional power is available include lower and upper Salmon falls, Malad, Clear lakes and Twin falls, but contended that the cost of installing the generating equipment necessary to produce such extra power at these sites would be excessive in comparison to that of developing the springs now sought.

When questioned further by Commissioner Berg, Mr. Senger admitted that more power could be developed at lower Salmon falls with the present dam. He estimated that the additional water available at that site amounted to about 1,500 second feet. When Commissioner Berg asked why extra generating equipment could not be installed to utilize this water, Mr. Senger said that a great amount of solid rock would have to be removed to provide a location for such additional equipment and that this also would involve considerable expense.

Included among witnesses heard during the Saturday afternoon session, and not mentioned in Saturday's Times, were Al Reading, Wendell publisher, who favored granting of the power sites; Vernon Sullivan, deputy auditor of Gooding county, who told of the amount of taxes which the county would realize from the completed construction; R. S.

Tofflemire, Twin Falls publisher, who told of the excellence of fishing at Box canyon; Erlie Jones, Filer, master of the Twin Falls county Pomona Grange; S. C. Orr, Bushnucker, and Charles A. Wing, operator of Thousand Springs service station. The latter testified as to the number of tourists passing his place.

**Yellowstone Matter**  
Tofflemire, answering Mr. Ray-Born's query concerning assertion by another witness who said the publisher had advocated lowering the water level in scenic Yellowstone lake, said: "I can't conceive of such a thing." He offered the opinion that the witness may have misunderstood the fact that the Twin Falls papers printed wire service dispatches concerning the proposed lowering, as urged by some state officials.

Such printing, he pointed out, represented only a presentation of facts—not an editorial opinion by Twin Falls papers.

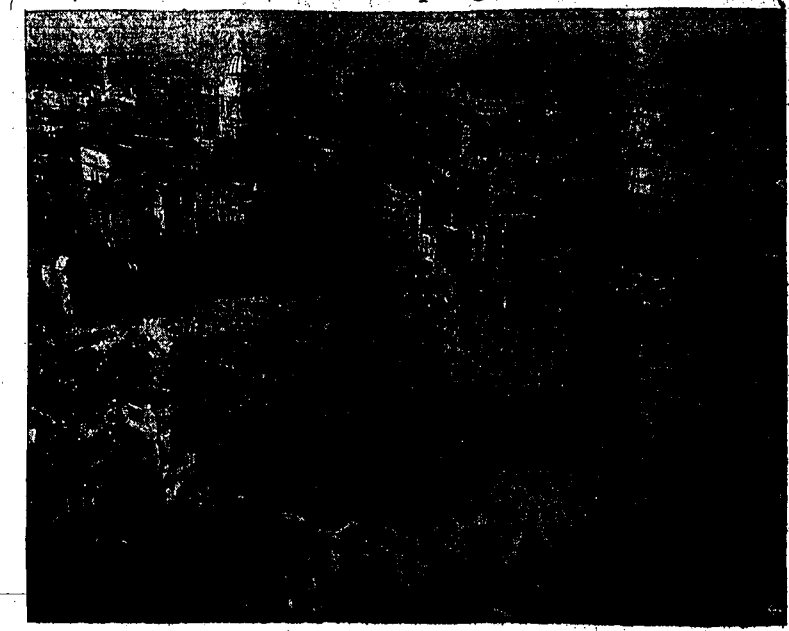

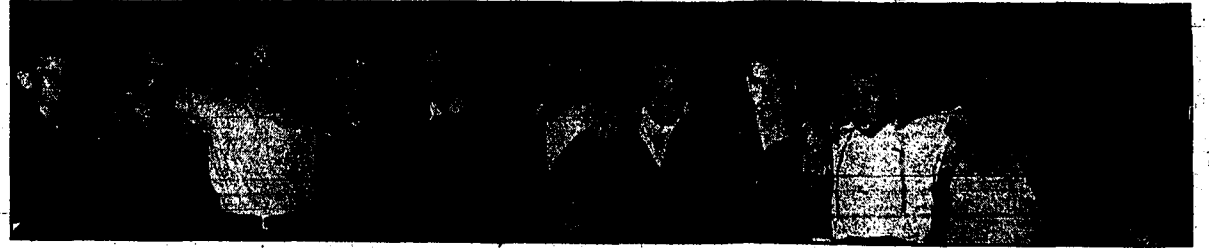

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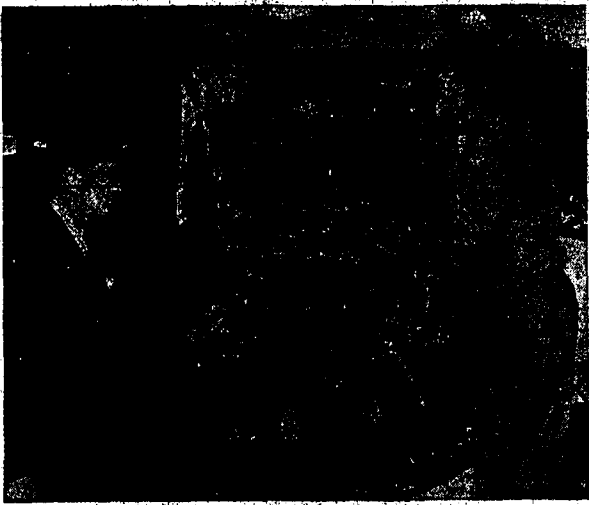

## Italy Navy Defeat Blamed on Astonishing Tactical Errors

The victory of the British Mediterranean fleet in the greatest sea battle of the war was due not only to the continual vigilance of British air and naval command but also to astonishing tactical errors of the Italians.

The error of the battle, reported from Alexandria, that the Italian admiral allowed his forces to roam the eastern Mediterranean in divided formations while Italian bombing planes do not seem to have given warning to the presence of heavy British warships.

The British account says the Italian fleet consisted of three battleships, nine cruisers and 14 destroyers. Instead of keeping its protective formation three of the cruisers and several destroyers apparently wandered away from the main body.

Spotted by British  
Those were the ships definitely known to have been sunk. They were spotted by British reconnaissance operators and three British destroyers opened fire on them out of range of retaliatory fire before the Italians realized they were in danger.

The rest of the Italian fleet does not seem to have moved to the rescue but apparently started homeward, several units being damaged en route. The unprovoked fact that no British warship was damaged and there were no British casualties resulted from the longer range of the British guns and the refusal of the Italians to close in for combat.

Must Have Purpose  
A fleet as powerful as the British also presupposes an intention to challenge whatever British warships command does not normally put to sea without a prime objective in view. The purpose can be supposed to have been an attack on British convoys passing between Africa and Greece.

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## CONTRACTS LET FOR 13 BILLIONS

WASHINGTON, March 31 (UP)—Defense contracts totaling about \$13,000,000,000 have been awarded for war equipment and construction projects and for naval and air bases on British soil in the western hemisphere since last July, a survey revealed today.

Army and navy construction plans for "Dodge" projects, defense training courses in vocational schools and loans for plant expansion.
