Crack 'SS' Storm Troops Turned Back In Big-Scale Fight

LONDON, April 14 (U.P.)—British empire infantrymen have defeated a picked division of the German army in northern Greece in the first Anglo-German big scale clash on the Balkan front, the war office said today.

The German attack was made Friday by the "Adolf Hitler" division of the picked Nazi Schutzstaffel or SS storm troops who had formed Hitler's own personal bodyguard before the war, it was understood.

All the war office communiques said was that: "On Friday an attack by the Adolf Hitler division of the SS was repulsed by our infantry and heavy losses were inflicted on the enemy."

The communiques said the engagement took place in northern Greece and that Nazi attempts to penetrate the Greek and British lines there had been unsuccessful.

British military informants said there was good reason to believe the German troops had captured Thessalonica, the port of Thessaly, capital of Albania.

WHEAT FORECAST DOWN FOR IDAHO

BOISE, April 14 (U.P.)—The federal agricultural marketing service today forecast an Idaho winter wheat crop of 14,320,000 bushels, based on conditions of April 1.

The crop was expected to be about 10 per cent less than the 1940 total, but about 10 per cent greater than the average for 1935-38. Conditions in northern Idaho varied after last year's dry summer, wet fall and winter, the agency reported. Winter wheat in the lower elevations in eastern Idaho was in good condition.

NAZIS REPORT JUGOSLAV ARMY TORN TO "REMNANTS"

GERMANY HOPES TO CUT CHANCES FOR BEF ESCAPE

 BERLIN, April 14 (Special)—The Nazi high command reported today that the German army has been heavy on disorganized "remnants" and indications increased that Germany hopes to turn the full power of her victorious army of the southeast against Greece as soon as the Jugoslavs are mopped up.

Head quarters admitted fragments of the Yugoslav army still are fighting with stubborn ferocity but said that no real field army remained intact.

"The fighting today is marked primarily by the complete annihilation of organized Yugoslav forces," it was said.

Hasty Ber's Troops
 Panzer troops and Stuka bombers were reported harrying the Ber's troops into the reckless mountains of Bosnia, Herzegovina and Montenegro.

German quarters said there was no evidence the Yugoslav forces were attempting any withdrawal to the Dalmatian coast where they might be taken off by ship.

"The disorganization is so severe that apparently there is no unified command to carry out such a difficult operation," the Nazis source said. "It is not clear where they would go even if embarking were possible."

All highways, railroads and traffic junctions behind the line, it was said, are being bombed remorselessly to increase the disruption of communications in the same sort of tactics as were employed in Poland.

In the vocal performances, the conductor may select any two numbers from the official music list for choral groups in the national booklet, with total length of time not exceeding eight minutes.

Bands Only
 The sight reading event applies only to bands and each band will be required to play a march and concert number chosen for this purpose by the concert judges for each class of band. Class D will play the least difficult piece and Class A the most difficult. Each director will be allowed two minutes to look over the scores, and three additional minutes to discuss any part of the compositions with his group. Each group will be strictly private; no one but the judges is allowed in the sight reading hall.

Baton Twirling
 In the baton twirling event, all twirlers must be regularly enrolled students of the high school from which they enter, and all twirlers must demonstrate the following: Beating time, wrist twirl (both hands), figure eight (twirl waist high, both hands), cart wheel, finger twirl, two-hand twirl; pass around the back, aerial work, salute. The baton twirl will also be judged on its smoothness, particularly in continuity in transmission from one movement to another.

All bands participating in the marching will be presented with a plaque indicating the division it rated.

Adjudicator for the bands is Louis G. Warren, Tacoma, Wash., who is music supervisor of the Tacoma public school system. For the choral demonstration, R. F. Gornanson, head of the department of music, University of Idaho, southern branch, will be judge. Others who will act in this capacity include Prof. Anderson, head of the music department of Ricks college, for vocal solos and piano; Isadore Shore, Logan, Utah, professor of music, as judge of instrumental solo; Major George G. Hinely and Capt. J. H. Seaver, Jr., both of Twin Falls, judges of marching events.

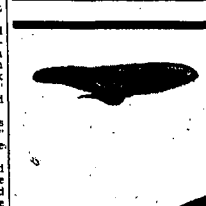

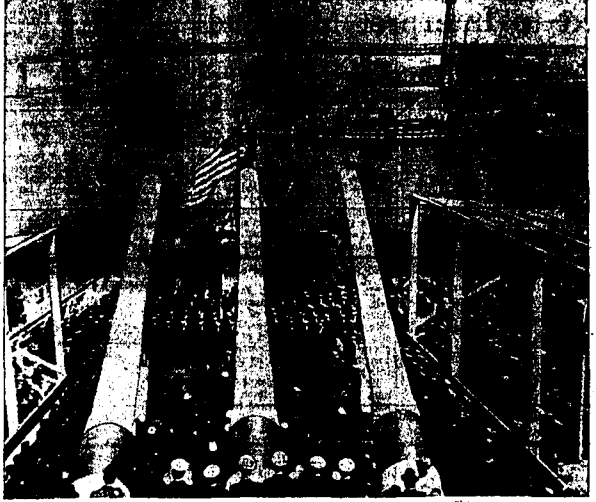

Uncertainty Marks Opening of 1941 Race for Pennants

NEW YORK, April 14 (UP)—The world champion Cincinnati Reds and the rebuilt New York Yankees were made betting favorites in the major league pennant race today by Jack Doyle, oracle of Broadway who has been making the official baseball prices for the last 80 years.

Five will get you seven if you think the Yanks will win, but five will get you only six if you like the Reds to win their third straight pennant.

Waiting until the day before the season's grand opening to announce his prices, Doyle emphasized that the pennant races were fraught with more uncertainties, doubts and question marks than any in his memory.

"Draft Hils Hard" I waited until the last possible minute to announce my prices," he said today, "even considered not quoting any prices this year because of the uncertainty." Before the year's out we may see some of our leading stars in the army camps with a riffy on their shoulder instead of a bat.

"Another important angle about the two teams is that there's not a single star in either club in attendance. Of course, the Reds have a great pitching staff but you couldn't call them a 'most' strong team."

Doyle stressed that his opening line is subject to change on a day's notice and that the pitching staffs are as soon as the public starts betting.

Public Makes Price
"After all it's the public that makes the price," he said today.

Doyle favoring the Yankees making the Indians admitted he originally had the Indians as favorites but shifted at the last minute.

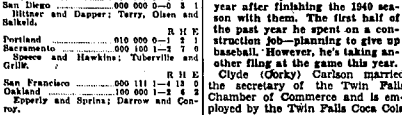

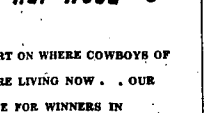

Belgrade Death Toll Set at 3,000 After Bombings

U. S. VICE CONSUL TELLS OF GREAT GERMAN ATTACKS

BUDAPEST, Hungary, April 14 (AP)—German bombers have blasted all signs of life out of Belgrade, killing an estimated 3,000 persons, destroying water, gas and electric systems, filling it with debris, water and fire and driving the whole population underground, according to Couterbridge Brown, United States consul here.

Caught just inside the Yugoslav frontier en route to Belgrade when the blitzkrieg started April 6, Horney arrived here Saturday evening reporting a scene of horror and desolation in the ancient Yugoslav capital, city of 220,000, which the Austrians bombarded on July 29, 1914, to start the World war.

The railway station was nothing but a shell; the opera house was gone; the downtown palace was scoured with hits from dive bombers; bodies had laid exposed in the street for days and there were no signs of life anywhere, he said. All Americans escaped uninjured, however, he said.

The first bombs that hit the city on Palm Sunday morning disabled all public services—light, water and gas—and piled the streets with rubble. Ambulances could not move, Horney said.

Members of the United States legation learned of several authenticated cases in which as many as 50 persons were killed in single air raid shellings by direct bomb hits.

Legation Undamaged

The residence of United States Minister Arthur Bliss Lane was unscathed by the legation, at the rear of the same building, was undamaged.

Horney reached the Yugoslav border just two hours before the blitzkrieg started. He carried diplomatic clearance from the United States legation at Belgrade. When he reached the Yugoslav capital, he found the city in a state of confusion. He was unable to fulfill his mission, since Lane had taken refuge in the basement of the legation secretaries in the suburbs. Horney then started back for Budapest.

AROUND THE WORLD

With United Press

LONDON — A Norwegian warship was torpedoed Tuesday, raided a harbor off northern Norway Saturday and landed troops which captured harbor works. It was understood today.

MOSCOW — A dispatch from Tokyo said Russian border guards had destroyed a band of German parachutes and a small plane in the central Asia frontier.

HOLYOKE, Colo. — A civil servant admitted today that he had piloted the wreckage of a private plane, which crashed yesterday into a wheat field, killing Arthur W. Neal, 35-year-old farmer, and his son, Keith, 12.

ROME — Virginia Gayda, writing in the Giornale d'Italia, informed the United States today that any American ship which ventured into the Red sea would be attacked by axis forces.

WASHINGTON — The Daughters of the American Revolution opened their 50th continental congress today with a new program. Some 4,000 delegates are expected to attend.

HOLLYWOOD — Warner Brothers announced today that so far in 1941 they have acquired film rights in 17 Broadway stage hits and best selling novels. It was explained the intensive story purchasing campaign is in anticipation of the new content decree selling program which will enable theater operators to play and choose—wedding set infatue pictures.

BERLIN, The Nazi high command today admitted German bombers with sinking 35,000 tons of British shipping and heavily damaging a British destroyer in Greek waters, and reported that a U-boat sank a 10,000-ton auxiliary cruiser off Iceland.

WASHINGTON — Officials studied the Russo-Japanese neutrality treaty today trying to evaluate its significance to the United States and to Europe in the far east. There was no official comment.

ATHENS, Greece — Greek and British troops waited restfully on their defense lines in lower Macedonia today for a German assault believed delayed by growing resistance in Yugoslavia.

Russo-Japan Treaty Seen as First Break in Triple Alliance

The new Russo-Japanese neutrality treaty represents the first break in the triple alliance, Adolf Hitler denouncing Manchukuo of Japanese troops for use elsewhere.

Berlin pretends to believe the new treaty will strengthen Japan's position as an active German agent if America were to enter the European war. However, if Russia wished to take advantage of that situation, she could do so by giving China more assistance without breaking any provision of the pact.

Anyway, a Pacific ocean conflict would be essentially a war of sea power and blockade. Thus, now as before, Japan will certainly judge the consequences to herself by naval and blockade measurements. These primary factors have not been changed by yesterday's existing exchange of documents at Moscow.

America's attitude toward the war in Europe certainly will not be altered by the new treaty. The United States has not based its possible actions in the future of the course of events in Russia. It would be foolish for Tokyo or Berlin to believe that American policy can be controlled or influenced by Stalin. Germany, however, is in a different position. A strengthened Russian policy in the Balkans, following Japan's resignation as a German ally, can cause Hitler serious German aspect of the new treaty difficulties. This fact makes the treaty the most important.

Criticism Hungary

It is significant that as the agreement with Japan was being formulated, Stalin made public his criticism of Hungary's invasion of Yugoslavia. In telling Hungary she might be "torn to bits" Stalin was interdicting Hungary's position by the removal of Japan as Germany's confederate.

In addition to freeing herself from the Russian liability under the triple alliance, Japan also has been released from direct fear of Russia in any Japanese military drive southward. Russia, however, still has a restraining influence, apart from Japan's natural hesitancy about undertaking an enterprise so potentially dangerous.

The new pact is not a full non-aggression agreement since it does not end the Russian aid to China, which has a pro-Communist, aggressive anti-Japanese purpose, by increasing aid to Chiang Kai-Shek. Russia might cause Japan to limit dispersal of many troops beyond the Chinese combat area.

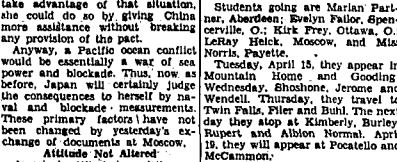
Although the neutrality treaty provides for Russian recognition of Manchukuo and Japanese recognition of the Mongolian people's republic, nothing is said about contiguous Mongolian territory where both countries have rival interests.
