BRITISH PROMISE "IGHT TO DEATH" Non-Interventionists Blast Stimson's Naval Aid Plan

Speech Points to Direct Entry in War, Foes Claim

WASHINGTON, May 7 (AP)—Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson's summons for direct naval action to aid Great Britain—the most important of a number of belligerent official statements—aroused the capital today.

Non-interventionists denounced the Stimson speech made last night on two nation-wide radio networks as a proposal to go to war, recalling President Roosevelt's recent statement that "convoys mean shooting, and shooting means war."

Administration supporters in congress declined to comment publicly, but privately applauded. Stimson's sensational address startled the capital because it was by far the most direct summons to action yet heard from any official in a position of comparable responsibility, and because President Secretary Stephen T. Ely said it should be assumed that Stimson had "talked to the President about the speech."

Navy Ready to Fight Most emphasis was placed on Stimson's declaration that the navy was ready to fight. He said that the navy would be assigned immediately to an all out effort to guarantee delivery of our munitions to Great Britain. Stimson added that the army and its air force will be unprepared and would not be ready to fight for at least a year.

Stimson said: "The axis has already encircled our western hemisphere. The service agencies are being urged among the republics to the south of us to build a bridge across the Atlantic through vital portions of the continent. The Panama canal is being threatened. The forces are threatening west Africa, looking towards a jumping off place which may reach the Atlantic coast of the Americas and already vigorously active in our own population. What are we going to do about it?"

Life Line Threatened "The lifeline of Great Britain is threatened. The high water mark of the Nazi effort is at hand in the shape of an attack on the shipping which furnishes Britain with the means and nourishment to maintain her battle. Right now at this crossroads of history it is within our power if we choose to use that instrument (the navy) to turn the tide of darkness back from the another world and, while it is thus held in check, to gain the means which will prevent the Axis from attaining its full purpose."

U. S. ROUNDS UP GERMAN SEAMEN

NEW YORK, May 7 (AP)—Immigration agents and police rounded up German seamen on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts today charging them with overstaying their leaves in this country. Officials did not disclose the number taken into custody, but detectives who participated in the early morning raids on New York hotels, taverns, and rooming houses said they understood about 140 would be taken in custody here and 100 more elsewhere in the nation.

More than 100 seamen, described as former crew members of Standard Oil company tankers, were arrested in synchronized raids which began last night in New York, New Jersey, and other cities. They were taken to Ellis Island, where immigration officials said they would be taken later to a military reservation or western concentration camp.

The men were arrested on warrants charging violation of laws permitting foreign seamen who have been laid off ships a 90-day time limit in this country.

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# SCHOOLS TO ASK FOR BIRTH DATA

Because the federal government is steadily widening the net in which Americans must have an accurate record of their birth data, the Twin Falls school system decided today to ask birth certificates for first-graders who enter school next September.

The move will "insure accuracy of school records right from the start," Supp. Homer M. Davis said. He explained that school records are often regarded as official by the government in cases where other sources are not available.

Parents are asking that parents bring the child's birth certificate, at the time of enrollment in first grade next fall. The superintendent said today. The move will be applicable only to youngsters just starting school. Such children must reach six years of age at least by Dec. 1.

School officials have conferred with P.-T. A. leaders now engaged in the spring carnival, and pre-school children, and have suggested that the present is a good time to ask for registrations for the birth certificates.

If the children were born in Idaho, parents may secure such certification by writing to Bureau of vital statistics, department of public health, state house, Boise.

If youngsters were not born in Idaho, it is necessary to write either to the capital of the state in which they were born or to the county seat.

### CARAVAN BOOSTS NEW SALES YARD

JEROME, May 7 (Special)—Celebrating the forthcoming inauguration of the city's largest new enterprise, a caravan of Jerome representatives, including the city commissioners of the north side tract Friday morning, May 9, to extend invitation to the opening of the Jerome Livestock Commission yard.

The opening will be on May 13, Frank Thomas and Jim Pender are operators of the commission concern.

Jerome Chamber of Commerce will give away a thoroughbred registered Hereford bull, raised by Virgil Lickley. A fat sow will also be awarded.

**Merchandise Bargains**  
With the opening of this sales commission this month, practically every Jerome merchant will advertise special bargains for the day of May 13.

The main structure is 30 by 60 feet, housing a crescent shaped grandstand which will easily seat more than 400 spectators. Directly in front of the tier of seats will be the sales pit, which is 50 by 16 feet in dimension, so arranged that stock may be led into the arena from the west side door, placed on the sales block directly in the center of the ring, and led to the opposite end of the ring onto a permanent scales and then directly into the loading pens.

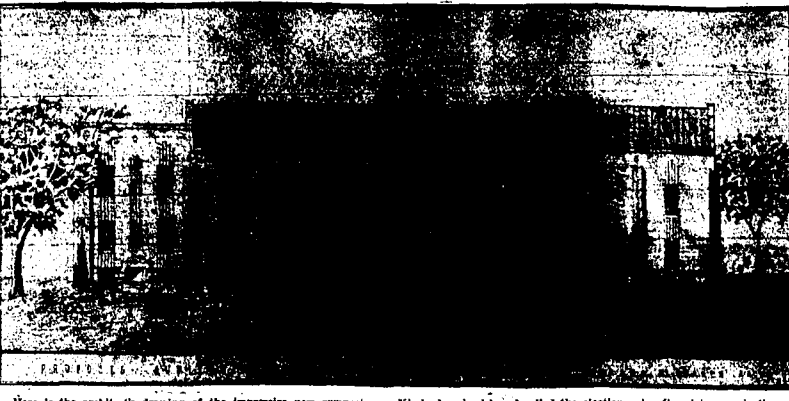

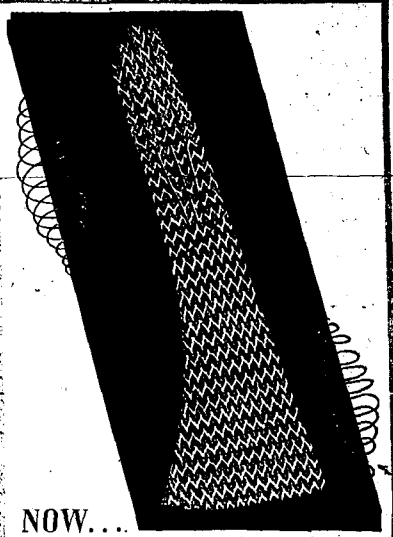

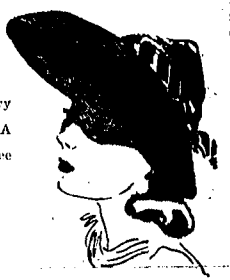
