#### No Time for Hand-Wringers

The United States has every right to glory in its strength, and to face with a serene pride and confidence whatever the future may bring. No Delilah has yet shorn the locks of the American Samson; none is likely to do.so. Yet he is having an occasional hair plucked out of his head from time to time by certain people who go about wringing their hands and lamenting that "we haven't got this, or we haven't got that," or "we can't do this and we can't do that."

The American people and the United States government are not old and decrepit. We are strong, vital, at the very height of our powers. Why this hand-wringing?

"This country, since last June, has produced more goods and services than it, or any other nation, ever did in a like number of months."

That statement is from Leon Henderson, government economist and price controller, and he ought to know. It is not the kind of a record that justifies pessimism or hand-wringing. More goods and services than we produced in 1929! More goods and services than any other nation ever produced! Should such a ration tember and services than any other nation ever produced! Should such a nation tremble and crouch, and fear the future?

There was a generation of Americans, a few years back, who may have made a nuisance of themselves by swarming over Europe and bragging that whatever they saw was pint-size compared with what they had at home.

Socially, this manner may have left something to be desired, but behind it was a rugged confidence and gestless vitality. That generation did not fear the future—it rushed out to meet it and to mold it the way it wanted it to be

Agestless value out the first way it wanted it to be.

Bragging is a bad thing. We are in no mood to brag today. But we need a little of that spirit. There is no time now to waste on wringers of hands, no time for those who would cower in a corner and hope to save what they can of the past for the future.

Strong, indomitable, determined, the American people must look the future in the face today and, feeling strength in every rippling muscle and hope in every surging thought, go forward to whatever destiny a new world holds for them.

#### Swiss Thorn in Nazi Side

No better proof of the real spirit behind Nazism could be found than recent attacks on Switzerland in the Nazi press. Switzerland, tiny country in Europe's heart, treasures its independence and its democracy. It has been most scrupulous in maintaining all the forms of traditional neutrality.

What reward? German officials and newspapers now launch attacks on Switzerland, charging "aloofness from the New Order in Europe" "without reason or provocation." "We do not understand what Switzerland wants, and why it wants to isolate itself." Behind these impatient comments runs the menacing

If Switzerland wants to isolate itself from any
"new order" in Europe, you might think that is
