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Cooperation Needed, Hull Tells Latins

WASHINGTON, May 8 (U.P.)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull today told visiting Latin American naval chiefs of staff that the Americans must collaborate "in every practical way" to increase the effectiveness of "common defense against the common danger."

Hull spoke as isolationists, led by Sen. Burton K. Wheeler, D., Mont., redoubled their efforts to block proposals for direct U. S. navy participation in the delivery of arms to Britain.

The senate commerce committee continued work on the administration's ship requisitioning bill, which the house passed yesterday 298 to 130, and isolationists acted on testimony before the committee to buttress their arguments.

Low Rate of Sinkings
Admiral Emory S. Land, chairman of the maritime commission, corroborated for the committee figures showing a low rate of sinkings of British ships carrying war aid cargoes from the United States.

Committee Chairman J. Walter Baile, D. N. C., said that Land also stood by a recent statement he made that sinkings all over the world were at the rate of 5,000,000 tons a year. This figure, Land told the committee, was an estimate based on a recent shorter period of accelerated losses.

To Senate Next Week
Baile said the committee would put the bill before the senate next week.

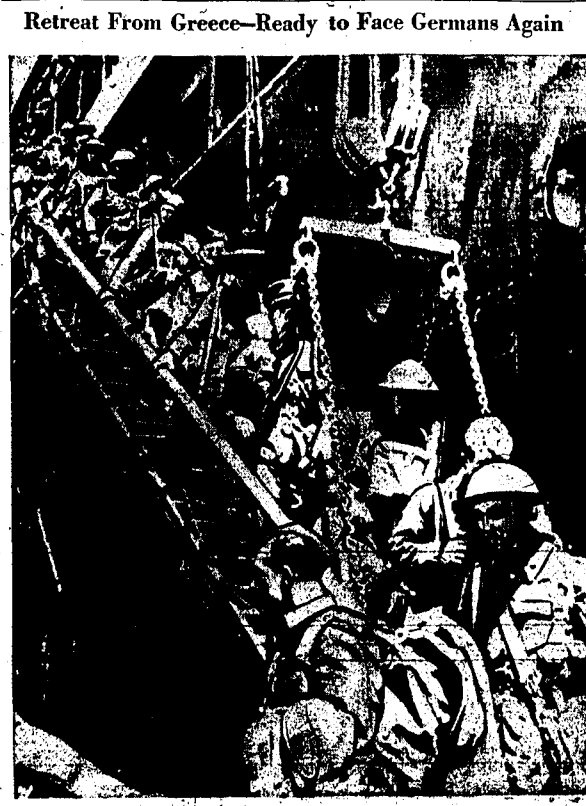

5 to 7 Year Sentences Asked on Saboteurs

WASHINGTON, May 8 (U.P.)—Attorney General Robert H. Jackson today recommended that federal courts impose uniform sentences of seven years for officers and five years for seamen convicted of sabotaging axis ships in the United States.

Jackson, in instructions to district attorneys handling sabotage cases, said the uniform sentences were sought "to avoid any unintended discriminations."

He said the officers and seamen who acted within the jurisdiction of this country must be punished although it was recognized that the sabotage was directed by Rome and Berlin.

Recognize Guilt
"We do recognize, of course, that the sabotage was directed by Rome and Berlin in a large offense against American sovereignty by the foreign governments involved," Jackson said.

The maximum penalty provided by the law under which the justice department is prosecuting Italian and German seamen and officers is 20 years imprisonment or \$10,000 fine or both. Jackson said he did not consider this appropriate.

In urging the uniform sentences, he said discrimination in treatment of Italian and German nationals would be subject to misunderstanding in foreign countries not familiar with the United States judicial system which leaves to judges in the various districts a choice in imposing sentences.

BOISE, May 8 (U.P.)—Warden Gilbert Taylor reported today the penitentiary has received fewer prisoners in the first four months of 1941 than during the same period of 1938.

400 German Craft Take Part in Big Attack on Britain

LONDON, May 8 (U.P.)—The royal air force today brought down 12 Nazi warplanes in daylight combat after scoring a record night bag of 22 in moonlit battles.

LATE FLASHES King Keeps Score

LONDON, May 8 (U.P.)—British night fighters, battling under an almost full moon while King George sat at their headquarters keeping score, shot down 22 German bombers last night, a record for any night of the war.

Anti-aircraft gunners shot down another raider, making the total 23 for the night, 78 for the past seven nights, and 91 night and day raiders shot down so far this month.

Three of last night's total were shot down over German airports in northern France, which British command has now ordered the anti-aircraft gunners to return to their bases from raids on Britain.

The roar of the night battles scarcely had subsided when coast areas of the British Isles were again attacked by the German Messerschmitt fighters.

British April Shipping Loss Hits 500,000 Tons

Great Britain reported in London today that 500,000 tons of shipping went down in April, which appeared likely to be the worst month of the war from the British viewpoint as far as the battle of the Atlantic was concerned.

Shipping losses, which the Germans had estimated at 1,211,000 tons for April and 10,917,000 tons for the entire war, emphasized the British appeal for greater and more direct United States aid in the Atlantic.

In the Mediterranean, the British reported that they had attacked an enemy convoy, possibly carrying reinforcements to North Africa, and scored direct hits on two ships.

Jan. A. Yindrich, a veteran United Press correspondent and the only reporter in Baghdad, told that he had seen the British airmen were throwing back retaliation attacks, in which they were supported by tanks (using flame-throwing apparatus), Yindrich said that enemy aircraft were being shot down by British fighters.

The German high command said that it had lost one of its bombers in the attack on British shipping. The German high command also reported that great damage had been done in Luftwaffe attacks on British shipping.

Heavy losses did not prevent the Germans from giving Liverpool one of its most severe bombardings of the war. Coming after six previous attacks, the attack on Liverpool was admitted by British officials to have been serious.

Liverpool officials said the port of entry for the vital flow of war supplies and food from the western hemisphere to the British Isles had been bombarded by the Luftwaffe.

Other points of RAF attack were Bristol, Birmingham, London, and other cities. The German high command also reported that great damage had been done in Luftwaffe attacks on British shipping.

NO OIL DRILLING
SAN FRANCISCO, May 8 (U.P.)—The Federal Reserve Board today ruled that Great Northern railway has no right to drill for oil on its right-of-way even though the oil would be used for railroad purposes.

ROOSEVELT MAY ENTER CAMPAIGN IN NEXT SPEECH

By LYLE C. WILSON
 WASHINGTON, May 8 (UP)—A national dispute set off by Secretary of War Henry H. Stimson's summons for all-out use of the navy to protect the British life line to America was continued today with a warning by Secretary of Navy Frank Knox that we live in "terrible danger" and a fervent endorsement of Stimson's stand by Wendell Willkie.

"All of the great resources of this nation," including man-power, are now committed to one supreme purpose—to see that British sea-power shall not be destroyed," Knox said in an address last night.

Non-interventionists reported that the nation was being stampeded with President Roosevelt's knowledge down the road to a war by a "verbal blizzard of deception."

Mr. Roosevelt is expected to enter the controversy, formally next Wednesday, in a address to Congress here before the Pan American union. It probably will be broadcast worldwide and may reveal whether his cabinet advisers have won him further toward an outright convoy policy.

Next Moves

Past breaking developments here and in foreign capitals are building up a situation of dramatic suspense which apparently will persist at least until Mr. Roosevelt speaks next week. Here are some developments which suggest that new moves are imminent:

1. Prime Minister Winston Churchill in London expressed gratification over extension of the United States naval and air patrol in the Atlantic.

2. We need a good deal more help and I expect that we shall get a good deal more.

Addressing the American Booksellers' convention here, Knox warned that failure to save Great Britain would mean the end of the United States with the combined forces of Germany, Italy, France and Japan.

Gibraltar Peril Seen as Hint for U. S. to Take Over Azores Islands

WASHINGTON—All through the fearful thunders of the modern Greek tragedy, alert observers here kept ears sharpened for murmurs from the western wings of the Mediterranean theater of war. They listened to hear whether Spain was about to step forth—a minor country assuming a major role in the world drama.

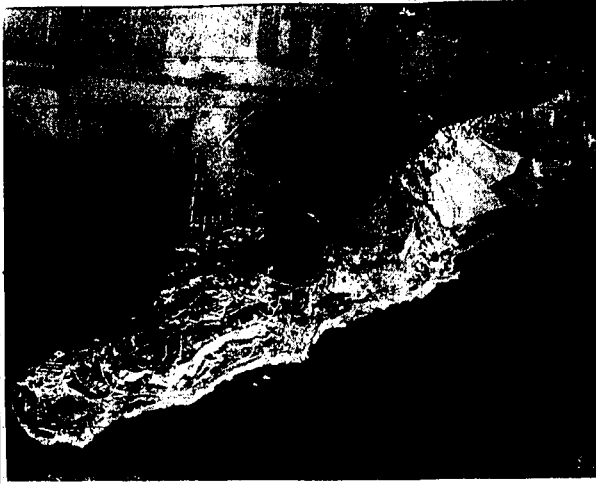
For it is one of the ironies of this unorthodox war that one move by the little power ruling this down-at-the-heels, third-rate power might put Great Britain out of the war, force the United States in. In Spain the Gibraltar strategic treasure which, in axis hands, would be a well-nigh lethal weapon against Britain.

The capture of Gibraltar by Germany at first glance sounds too hazardous even for the Nazis. But they have already paved part of the road to such a astounding coup. A Spanish acceptance of axis partnership, many fear, would be the green light for the Nazis.

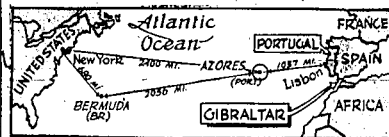
They have troops ready at the French frontier. They have a skeleton organization of officers and technicians already in Spain.

Towering 1,400 feet, thrusting 2½ miles from Spain seaward into the narrow strait between Europe and Africa, the Rock has long been a symbol of impregnability.
