### TOP LAMBS SELL FOR \$11.75 PRICE

Exceeding all previous Idaho lamb prices for this season on the Denver market, Twin Falls country's inaugural pool sale shipment brought \$11.75 tops at Denver, County Agent Bert Bollingbrook said.

The \$11.75 Denver price for top lambs is \$10.25 per hundred weight net on full home weight.

Ewes sold at Denver for \$3.25 per hundred weight (\$4.00 on full home weight). Yearling wethers brought \$7 on the market (\$5.11 net at home).

Total weight of the first pool was 40,745 pounds for the 428 head. Shrink was only three per cent with shipping expense at 41 per hundred weight.

Next lamb pool will be May 16; after that shipment, the pools are to leave every Friday except when holidays fall on that day. In this event, the shipping will be done Saturday. That will be the case on Memorial day, which comes on Friday this year.

The inaugural pool was bought by Merrion and Wilkins.

### SURVEY SET FOR STATE PROPERTY

BOISE, May 9 (UP) — State Auditor Calvin E. Wright will soon launch a survey of state departments, buildings and facilities to determine the value of the state of Idaho's governmental set-up.

The survey will be part of a plan approved by the 1941 legislature, to set up a general ledger and a new system of bookkeeping under which a day-to-day check of expenditures and income can be determined.

The legislature provided Wright with a \$50,000 appropriation to carry out the plan. Much it will be necessary to appraise property owned by the state and place it upon the books. At present, there is no record of the value of state-owned buildings and equipment located throughout the state.

A group of experts on government fiscal systems was expected to be hired to lay the groundwork for establishing the new bookkeeping system.

### NEW DEPOT PART OF WIDE PROJECT

The new union bus depot being opened to Twin Falls Saturday is a part of an extensive modernization and new construction program by Union Pacific Stages, Inc. Superintendent R. Shalander, Salt Lake City, said today.

# College Education May Help Soose Cop Crown

NEW YORK, May 9.—It is advertised as a fight for the midweight championship of the world, but to hear them talk in leatherball land today you would think it was a debate on the value of higher education.

Middleweight Champion Ken Overlin, who distrusts any man capable of solving an algebraic equation, defends his title in Madison Square Garden tonight against Billy Soose, the pride of Penn State university—a soft-spoken young man who lists algebra as a paragon of science and the states washed by the waters of the Mississippi.

Foot the job, left hooks and the other factors usually involved in a pugilistic encounter have been ignored by the gladiators. Overlin's pre-battle statement consisted of one terse, snarling sentence, to wit: "No college bum ever lived that can lick me."

Putting a cap-and-gown expression on his face, Soose retorted: "It is no disgrace to be a college boy. I will win the midweight championship because I am a college graduate."

Overlin's antagonism toward box larnin' is a matter of long standing, and he has been extremely resourceful in avoiding exposure to it. His formula was to get into cocktail lounges and night clubs and remain there until after school was out—even night school. The only degree that ever increased him was the 30-degree tilt that is necessary in the proper execution of the cone.

In addition to being tainted with higher education, Soose has long been a fresh air, milk and nativity-boost-and-early-to-bed man. That makes him an necessary both before and after the fight so far as Soose is concerned, and when the midweight champion learned the details he took drastic steps. He decided to get up to speed on the subject that he had done enough night-clubbing in the past to keep him sharp up to college level.

So that's what he has been doing and as soon as the secret got out Soose was made a 15 to 3 favorite. The smart members of the fight mob, who are great styfs for playing angles, figure that will decide the fight.
