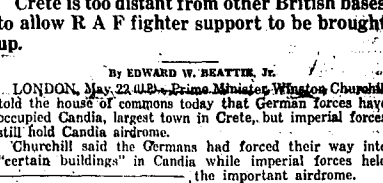

# IDAHO'S GOVERNMENT COSTS REGISTER UPWARD SWING

## \$3,884,399 GAIN FOR PAST SIX-YEAR PERIOD

BOISE, Ida., May 22 (UP)—Cost of Idaho's state government has hit a rising curve during the last five years with no signs of diminishing, a survey of state fiscal operations revealed today.

Figures compiled by Idaho fiscal experts showed the cost of governmental functions, covered by direct appropriations from the legislature, increased from \$9,618,189 during the 1937-38 biennium to \$13,502,588 for the 1941-42 biennium, or \$3,884,399 for the six-year period.

The figures were obtained by compiling a complete list of general fund appropriations granted by the legislature during the 1937, 1939 and 1941 sessions.

Part of the money expended during the years 1937-38 and 1941-42 resulted from a \$2,000,000 allocation granted from the general fund for what is called the public school income fund. This fund was created to reduce and equitize taxes needed for support of schools in various counties.

Almost an even \$1,000,000 more is to be spent during the 1941-42 biennium for state relief than during 1937-38. Most of the jump in relief expenditures came, however, during the last state administration. Appropriations for state relief to aged, blind, dependent children and for medical care were \$1,500,000 in 1937, but at the legislative session two years later the cost jumped to \$1,550,000. It increased to \$2,000,000 at the 1941 session of the legislature.

Rising Costs

The rising cost of relief has been attributed to such factors as liberalization of the social security act to broaden the base pension payments, an influx of new persons into Idaho, greater population and slightly increased administrative expenses. Also each state administration has slightly increased the monthly grants to persons on pension rolls.

Experts predict that the state will be slightly "in the red" when the 1942 biennium comes to an end. Estimated revenues for the general fund for 1941-42 are \$13,407,835, whereas expenditures for the same period are expected to total \$13,502,588. Excise taxes and other revenues will bring in \$4,500,000; 20 per cent liquor tax, \$1,000,000; and adjustments from endowment fund income, \$20,721.

The study shows some departments of state government have slightly reduced their operating expenses. The state department of agriculture and the state bureau of reclamation will both operate on smaller budgets this biennium than during 1937-38.

The state prison on the other hand will cost \$95,000 more, and operation of fiscal departments such as state auditor and tax divisions will exceed the 1937 allocation by \$180,000.

## Food Price Booms In Western Cities

SAN FRANCISCO, May 22 (UP)—Food prices in western cities have increased more than in other sections of the country during the defense boom, a survey by the research department of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce showed today.

Compared with the 1935-36 base prices in Portland are up 5.5 per cent, Seattle 4.7 per cent, San Francisco 3.8 per cent and Los Angeles 2.7 per cent. The average increase for the 22 largest cities of the nation is only 0.8 per cent.

## Parachutists to Help Battle Idaho Forest Fires This Year

BOISE, May 22 (UP)—Use of parachutists will become more prevalent in Idaho this year than ever before as the need for protecting forest lands becomes more vital to the national defense effort, forest service officials reported this week.

Unlike past years when a small blaze spotted by a lookout became a major conflagration before smoke-chargers could push their way through the brush, parachutists will be used to drop especially equipped firefighters into the hard-to-reach areas.

Sam Advantage Roy Headley, chief of fire control for the U.S. forest service, has been largely responsible for the crew of minute men firefighters. He foresaw the advantage of dropping parachutists onto a blaze because much time could be saved by air travel.

Fighters who will drop from planes into Idaho forests will be dressed for the occasion. They will wear padded suits to prevent bruises and fractures when landing in the tops of trees.

They also will wear a mask similar to a fencing helmet to prevent branches from snapping them in the face.

Heavy Equipment

Each man is equipped with a rope to aid him in climbing down from a tree and is able to keep in touch with the pilot of the plane from which he is dropped by means of a two-way radio. The radio apparatus later aids in reporting extent of the blaze and in sending directions for dropping necessary equipment.

The forest service is still trying to solve one question—how to get the men out of the forests after they have been dropped by parachute. Many times they must walk for miles carrying heavy packs and equipment before they reach a point where they can return to their home bases.

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# ROTARIANS HEAR MAYOR, COUNCIL

Twin Falls governmental leaders outlined city necessities and policies at a meeting held Wednesday afternoon of that date.

Mayor Joe Dean, finance committee chairman, public safety commissioner, Truman Greenhalgh, street and waterworks commissioner, and Carl E. Ritchey, parks commissioner.

Federal Aid

Koehler cited Gov. Chase A. Clark's assurance of improvement for U. S. 30 and realignment of part of the route. He urged that civic groups help in securing federal aid for city improvements, and suggested that groundwork be laid for a bond election.

The municipal improvements suggested by the mayor included airport, auxiliary water main, new fire station, electric city hall, or an addition to the present structure and possibly an administration building which would provide quarters for federal inspectors.

The mayor termed condition of the fire station "deplorable and dangerous."

Mr. Dean asserted the city is in sound financial condition, praised the work of his predecessor, Paul R. Tabor, and pledged continuance.

Lauds Dairy Program

Mr. Coleman, whose department includes police and fire divisions as well as meat and dairy inspection, gave high praise to the dairy inspection program. He asserted it has brought dairy here to the highest standard in the state. He complimented Ritchey as the former commissioner in charge.

Mr. Greenhalgh said that "constructive suggestions are always welcome" in the streets and waterworks department. He declared that Charles P. Larsen, whom he reappointed as superintendent, has done a fine job.

Mr. Ritchey endorsed the mayor's remarks concerning the fire station and urged erection of a new building.

Regarding the park department, he commended Supt. S. Claud Stewart, who was reappointed, and said work is speeding on the city swimming pool in hopes of opening the improved and remodeled natatorium early in June.

Mr. Ritchey was Rotary program chairman.

# Berlin Silence on Crete May Mean Battle Still in Doubt

When and if the Germans issue an official statement on the battle of Crete, it probably will be an indication that they are reasonably certain of taking the island from the British.

Berlin's silence must mean that the issue—and it is an important one—is still in doubt. If the Germans do succeed in their bold stroke, what next?

The pattern of Hitler's campaign of conquest becomes increasingly clear as he marches on. It is methodical, calculated, one step at a time. He moves up one objective, then moves on to the next.

May Over-extend Himself

Some have expressed the view that Hitler may over-extend himself. With an army of about 8,000,000 men and an air fleet of at least 20,000 planes, some experts think Hitler has over-extended himself, or is likely to. He has swept Europe from the Atlantic to the Persian Gulf, prepared to hold it, and is now moving confidently to grab the Mediterranean, Suez and Africa.

The present campaign, of which Crete is an important part, is for control of the eastern end of the Mediterranean, which of course includes the Suez canal and the oil fields of the near east.

That is the immediate objective. If Hitler succeeds, the next move would be Gibraltar and Morocco, to close the sea entirely to the British and isolate them except for the north Atlantic lane to Canada and the United States. Even that he is striving to cut with his submarine campaign.

Pattern Laid

While the active campaign is in progress in the eastern Mediterranean, the groundwork, quiet in line with Hitler's pattern, is being laid in the west for action later, either this year or next, depending on the progress of the eastern campaign.

Britain's naval strength in the Mediterranean, and the fighting ability of her empire armies in Africa and the east, make a long campaign seem likely. Hence the invasion attempt may be far off, giving Britain the grace of time to strengthen herself and get increasingly effective United States aid.

When the invasion attempt does come, if Hitler ever does feel capable of carrying it off, it may be expected to be on the grand scale.

# CANNERIES HOLD UP WAR ORDERS

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—The war department is planning to renew a request that food canneries handling army orders be exempted from time and one-half overtime provisions of the Walsh-Healey act, OPA officials said today.

Other authoritative sources said the war department has become concerned over the difficulty of placing orders for canned fruit and vegetables due to the reluctance of canners to bid on army contracts. Recently the army rejected bids for canned tomatoes as too high and said that the offer to bid would not be renewed.

The canning industry now operates under a 14-week exemption from the wage-fixing act, an exemption that covers the peak canning season. Also applying to bidders on army contracts is the Walsh-Healey act which prescribes time and one-half for overtime exceeding 40 hours a week and there are no exemptions. It applies to all contracts exceeding \$10,000.

Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson was understood to have written the American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organizations concerning the army's problem. He asked their views and suggestions.

Douglas McClench, deputy collector of the OPA purchases division, said that canners could not separate their pack into that part for the army and that to civilian use and that it would be equally difficult to determine how to apply the Walsh-Healey provision.

# SEIDEL RECEIVES TOP K. OF C. POST

George Seidel, member of the local unit Knights of Columbus, has been elected state deputy, highest post in the state organization, it was learned today.

Seidel, together with Lyons Smith and Harvey Quast, attended the state convention at Cottonwood last Sunday, Monday and Tuesday. He will assume his new duties July 1.

During the convention Smith was named secretary and will serve until July 1, thus filling the unexpired term of the former state secretary. Convention next year, it was announced, will be held at Rupert probably during May.

# BOISEAN FINED \$5 ON DRINK CHARGE

Two Twin Falls men, both charged with being intoxicated in public places, today were in the city jail and a third man, a resident of Boise, had been fined \$5 on a similar charge and released after payment of fine, records of Municipal Judge J. O. Humphrey show.

The Boise man who entered a guilty plea to the charge was Paul Coleman.

Samuel H. Jenkinson, Twin Falls, who pleaded guilty to the charge, was fined \$5 or three days in jail. Unable to meet his fine he is now serving time.

Carl Jenkins, about 45, who entered a not guilty plea had bond set at \$25. He was unable to raise the bond and as a result is in the jail awaiting a hearing the afternoon of Monday, May 20.

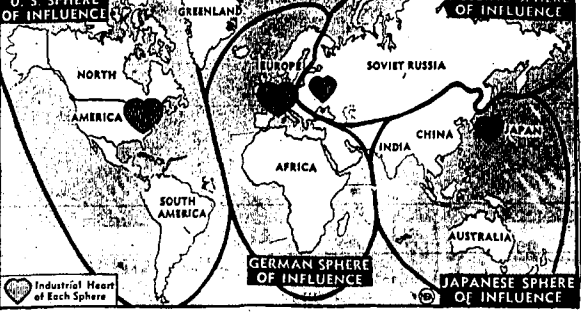

# NAZIS SLATE "COMPLETE CHECK" OF AMERICANS ON LINER

## PASSENGERS ON ZAMZAM HELD UP FOR IDENTIFYING

BERLIN, May 22 (Special)—Authorized Nazis said today that Americans rescued from the sunken Egyptian liner Zamzam would be held by German authorities until their identities have been established beyond a doubt.

All credentials of the Zamzam passengers (including 140 Germans), are being checked, it was added. Nazis have emphasized that it is necessary to determine whether the 24 American ambulance volunteers, en route to join the Free France forces in Africa, are to be treated as war prisoners.

"All of the missionaries and nurses obviously will be permitted to leave as soon as their credentials have been proved genuine," it was added.

"But it is false to assume that the others will be permitted to leave until their identities are established beyond a doubt."

(The refugees are at Saint Jean de Luz, on the French coast near Spain, where American officials have gone to interview them.)

Nazis said that it probably would require only a short time to check the credentials of the nurses and children but that the identities of all male passengers must be closely studied.

This may be more difficult, it was added, because many have lost their passports.

## Lasky Waited 22 Years To Get Sgt. York Story

HOLLYWOOD, May 22 — They turned out with the brass band and the flags today to welcome Sgt. Gary Cooper home from the war. Actually, he hasn't fought a lick yet, or captured a one of his 132 prisoners, but the cameras will shoot the big battle sequences of "Sergeant York" in a week or so.

The gray-camouflaged transport "Ohio" is docked at the pier in one of Warner Brothers' huge sound stages and a double line of doughboys in overseas caps and olive drab uniforms come tramping down the gangplank. A frantic crowd waves and cheers. An extra dressed in the long hobble-skirts and buttoned shoes, the flat-crowned derbies and high collars of May 1919.

The band plays "Dixie" and police clear the way for a delegation of silk hats that steps from a bunting-draped touring car. Behind the group is Congressman Cordell Hull of Tennessee—and even without makeup, actor Charles Foxworthridge shows a startling resemblance to the secretary of state.

After 22 years

Standing on the dais, taking in every detail and beaming behind his glasses, is a ruddy little man—Jesse Lasky, success producer of "Sergeant York." He has waited 22 years for this moment. He talks about it with pardonable pride because it was his persistence—no movie money—that finally made the scene, and the whole picture, possible.

"That's a long time to wait for anything, isn't it?" he asks. "I've been trying to get this on film ever since I saw it happen May 27, 1919. I was vice-president of the Fanover Players-Lasky then, with offices in New York, and I looked at my window on Fifth Avenue, and watched the parade go by. I knew then that I had a great motion picture—if I could get it."

"I told one of my men to see Sergeant York and sign him up; money was no object, to go as high as he needed. That night I saw Florence Ziegfeld and he said he was going to put York in an act with Will Rogers. Later, I thought I'd see him was after York, but none of us got him. My man came back and said that he had talked to the Sergeant. He had listened all right, but he said 'Uncle Sam's uniform, hit him! I could get it.'"

Wanted Land, Not Dollars

"It wasn't that he didn't need money. All his family owned in Tennessee was some poor hill acreage and he had his heart set on some good bottom-land, but the War was here turned down offers for endorsements and personal appearances that totaled a quarter of a million dollars."

Last year, when Lasky started trying to sign up the Sergeant, at least for his life story if he would not act, he found him just as stubborn.

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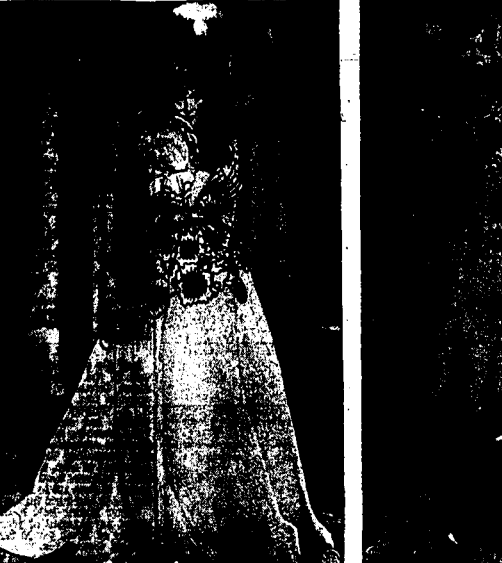

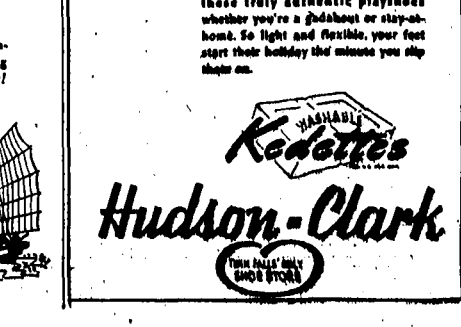

# REFUGEES ASSERT GERMANS ARE PILLAGING GREECE

## COMMANDEERING OF FOODS CUTS LIVING STANDARD

**By BEN S. AMES**  
**ISTANBUL, May 20 (Delayed)**—Greek refugees, arriving in small, but steady streams usually in boats, charged today that the German army of occupation systematically is pillaging the country.

One party of prominent Greeks from the island of Chios said the Germans were commandeering food, complete disregard of the people's needs.

"Thousands of Greeks are going hungry, but almost during the summer they will still have to gather produce secretly from their gardens and fish."

W. Winter, they said, Greece will face mass starvation.

Big stocks of British war supplies, abandoned in the mountains were gathered up immediately and stored in warehouses to await shipment to Germany, it was reported. The same disposition was made for the big made of all foreign goods found in Greek shops.

Nazi soldiers were reported to have conducted a house-to-house search confiscating all metal articles, such as copper cooking utensils and anything else useable for war purposes.

Severe penalties, it was said, were dealt out to Greeks attempting to withhold anything. The German-controlled Athens radio was heard today announcing the first execution, "a traitor to the German order."

There was no direct confirmation from American authorities, but refugees reported that Germany's army of occupation in Greece was using the American Anatolia college on the outskirts of Salonika as a general headquarters.

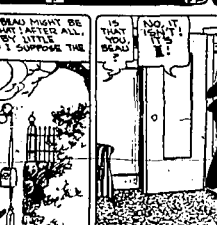

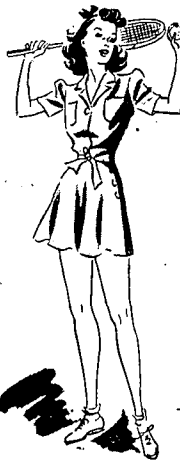

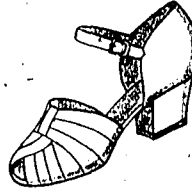
