## Kaiser Wilhelm Dies in Holland

DOORN, Holland, June 4 (AP)—Former Kaiser Wilhelm II, 82, last of Germany's Hohenzollern emperors, died at 11:30 a. m. today (12:30 a. m. MST) at Doorn house.

The once mightiest ruler of the eastern hemisphere, was lord of the last war and a figure of world power for 30 years, had suffered an embolism of the lung during the night.

Members of the Hohenzollern family were announced from Germany to join the Princes Herminie of Schoenach-Carolath, his second wife, at his bedside. But after spending the Whitsun holidays with Wilhelm, most of them returned to Germany yesterday and there was not time to call them back.

## Groundwork Laid For Food Stamps In Magic Valley

Field representatives of the federal surplus marketing administration arrived in Twin Falls today to lay the groundwork for inauguration of the food stamp program in eight Magic Valley counties.

The program which will find welfare clients receiving half again as much food without extra cost—has been set in operation in the Magic Valley by July or August. It has been urged by grocerymen, county commissioners and Chambers of Commerce throughout this area.

The field representatives who arrive today are Ray B. Schwartz and P. J. Easton. Mr. Schwartz will handle contacts with retail food dealers and will select the stamp program chairman and committee in Twin Falls, Jerome, Cassia, Minidoka, Gooding, Lincoln, Blaine and Camas counties.

His talks will explain the food stamp plan thoroughly, may be arranged by leaving or mailing request cards to the Evening Times office.

On July 1 the stamp plan opens in Twin Falls, Cassia, Camas, Blaine, Gooding, Minidoka, Lincoln and Jerome counties.

On Aug. 1 the program will become effective in Blaine, Owyhee, Bear Lake, Franklin, Power, Caribou, Bonneville, Bingham, Madison, Jefferson, Clark, Butte, Fremont, Teton, Lemhi and Outter counties.

General meetings of grocers are scheduled for June 25 in the Gooding, Lincoln, Blaine and Camas areas; Twin Falls June 23; Jerome June 21; Burley June 25 and Rupert June 26.

The stamp plan distributes commodities on the federal government's surplus list.

DEATH SUMMONS PIONEER BANKER

Buhl, June 4 (Special)—Word of the death of J. W. Paris, former Buhl resident, at Santa Monica, Calif. Sunday, June 3, was received by Buhl friends this week. Mr. Paris was one of Buhl's most prominent and most respected citizens in the early years of Buhl's history. He assisted in the organization of the Buhl Bank and Trust in the fall of 1907, purchasing the interest of the Buhl State bank which had been organized in 1906. Frank H. Buhl, for whom the town was named, was a large stockholder in the Buhl Bank and Trust, and Mr. Paris was cashier. In 1917 the bank became affiliated with the national banking system and became the First National bank of Buhl, with Mr. Paris as cashier. He held this position until ill health required his resignation in 1919, when J. H. Barker became cashier. Mr. Paris was identified with the growth and prosperity of Buhl. During his service in the bank, Frank H. Buhl dedicated a park of his land holdings to the Buhl school district, and later the city of Buhl, in conjunction with the Independent school district made an athletic park on the grounds donated by Mr. Buhl, and named the park the Paris athletic park, which is now known as the Jaycee ball park. Mr. Paris was quite ill before he gave up the banking work, and moved to Cotuit, Calif., about 1919, where he has since resided. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Anna Paris Carlsbad, daughter, Mrs. Nona Ostrander, Santa Monica, and a daughter, who resides in Michigan.

Syria Offers Difficult Test Of Germany's Invasion Power

Conquest of Syria would present a difficult problem for Hitler—more difficult than the spectacular victory in Crete—if Britain decides to make a fight for it. Hitler's problem is to get troops and mechanized equipment into Syria. Syria is approximately 500 miles from Crete, which would be Hitler's nearest strong base after he has it topped up and the airfields put back in shape. The scanty bases in the Italian Dodecanese islands are about 400 miles away. The distance makes an air borne invasion difficult, if not impossible. The British fleet stands in the way of an attack by sea, even more so than in the case of Crete because of the longer distance. Even over the short haul between Greece and Crete, Hitler was unable to use the Exposed Haul. It could be possible, as reported, that some air troop carriers, hugging the coast of Asia Minor, might slip into Syria. But that is a long and exposed haul and it is not likely any large scale movement could be effected by that route. An alternative would be to move overland through Turkey. That would imply Turkey's consent and union with the axis, which does not present seem likely, especially in view of anti-British feeling among them and while they are not fond of the French, they might cause the British trouble.

NEW LEVY PLAN URGED FOR IDAHO

CALDWELL, June 4 (UP)—Walter R. Cupp, president of the Idaho Workers' Alliance, today offered a tax plan for consideration of the special session of the Idaho legislature which would provide funds for pensions of 800 per month to persons over the age of 60. Cupp said the proposed plan would shift the burden of taxation from property to incomes. It would call for repeal of the ad valorem tax and substitution of a gross income tax on transactions—one per cent on wholesale and produce sales and two per cent on all other transactions. The sales tax would also provide funds for relief of unemployed, crippled, widows and orphans, Cupp said.

The campaign will continue throughout June with retailers, hotels, restaurants, railroads and other outlets stressing the health and economy values of milk, butter, cheese, ice cream and other products of the industry and especially the need for strengthening the national defense program by increasing the health standards of the people.

Governor Clark's proclamation, issued at the request of the Idaho dairy producers' merchandising committee, which is spearheading Idaho activities in the national drive, stressed the fact that dairy products are nature's most nearly perfect foods and urged citizens to utilize them in increased quantities as "America can be made strong by making Americans stronger."

Clies Urgent Need  
Mr. Hendrix, chairman of the campaign and president of the Idaho State Dairymen's association, emphasized to the C. O. C. here today the urgent need of Idaho's 35,000 dairy farmers for increased consumption at a time when their production is heaviest.

"Increased consumption will safeguard the purchasing power of these 35,000 farm families who make up Idaho's most important agricultural industry," he explained. "Thus the campaign is vital to the prosperity of the entire state, since a reduction in the amount these families have to spend means a loss to every Idaho business."

Idaho retailers, including members of the Idaho Chain Stores association and various independent retail groups, are seeking to increase consumer demand for all dairy products through special newspaper advertising, attractive store and window displays and other promotional efforts.
