

PRESIDENT BRANIS PEACE RUMORS GERMAN "FALSEHOODS"

ROOSEVELT HITS DUPES FOR NAZI PROPAGANDISTS

WASHINGTON, June 6 (AP)—President Roosevelt today said he had no doubt that the peace proposals were fabricated from Nazi falsehoods.

The President said many Americans were being misled by the dupes of German propaganda.

Mr. Roosevelt declared Britain is far from collapse, and that no peace proposals were brought back from London by Ambassador John G. Winant.

Makes Accusation

Declaring he was not making a denunciation of Americans who are dupes of the President, but an accusation that Americans were being duped, the President said the peace rumors were "absolutely nothing like it—not even a tenth cousin of a peace offer or anything like that of any dupes of the President. Absolutely nothing like it—provided you use this not as a denial by the President but as an accusation by the President."

Mr. Roosevelt accused Nazi and Fascist sympathizers and spreaders of peace rumors to spread such dupes to spread such dupes to spread such dupes.

Issued Instructions

He said the propaganda office in Berlin had issued instructions to propagandists here to follow two procedures in regard to peace talk.

The first, he said, was to spread the rumor and to impress upon many had no thought of ever doing anything against any country in the world.

The second order, he said, was as soon as Winant arrived such agents should spread the story around the world.

He said the order was to spread the story Britain is talking peace.

did not consider it necessary to inspect the \$15,000 collection of rings.

Johnston, awaiting departure to Boise, re-emphasized today his innocence in the slaying of Olson and repeated that he has no "guilty knowledge" whatever. "He attacked 'politically' although," he stated, "perfidious lies which he said have permeated the entire case."

The proceedings against him have been irregular throughout," Johnston charged. "I had the burden of proving my innocence instead of the state carrying the burden of proving my guilt. That reverses the American concept of justice."

Experts Break

Asserting he knows that "break" will come eventually to prove his innocence, Johnston concluded his prepared statement as follows:

"From the beginning of the case, I have been believed, God knows I am innocent of this crime. What I am suffering is from injustice, not from conscience. I can only say now that you consider, and give me the benefit of any truth you may encounter that may someday vindicate me. I have exhausted my recourse to Idaho courts."

"Now, while I am serving a life sentence for a crime I did not commit and know nothing about, I want you to remember that so long as ignorance and prejudice blind people to truth, and political and personal animosity overrule justice in our legal system, and in the press, what has happened to me can happen to you—no matter who you are."

Special consideration is given children who are underweight or run down because of having had influenza or pneumonia during the past winter.

In the past 15 years, more than 3,000 children have had the opportunity to prove their health standards, through attendance at the various camps throughout Idaho, maintained by Anti-Tuberculosis associations throughout the state.

Deferment Is Proposed for Veterinarians

Maybe you think a veterinarian is just a "horse doctor"—but he's a lot more than that in the eyes of defense chiefs.

That's what area No. 1 draft board discovered today in a bulletin from Brig. Gen. M. G. McConnell, director of selective service in Idaho.

Urges Deferment
Gen. McConnell advised the board that it stand all other Magic Valley draft boards, 100 should grant deferment to every student who gives reasonable promise of becoming a qualified veterinary doctor.

Chairman Walter C. Musgrave said the state director instructed the board that in event it determines any specific veterinary doctor should not be deferred, the registrant's attention should be called to war department desire that he apply for appointment in the veterinary reserve corps.

Reasons listed for special treatment of veterinarians were:
1. The army regards them as guardians of the food supply because 80 per cent of them devote their skill to protection and care of livestock and 20 per cent inspect and safeguard the foods of animal origin—meat, poultry, dairy products.
2. Number of practicing veterinarians in the U. S. has been practically static for 10 years. Since there are no replacements except from graduates of veterinary colleges, there are "absolutely no replacements" for veterinary students who are withdrawn from school.

Courses in public housing now are offered in more than 200 colleges of the United States.

WOOD WORKMEN SIGN CONTRACTS

LEWISTON, Ida., June 6 (AP)—The Lumber and Sawmill Workers union (AFL) and the Portland Process, Inc., today began operations under what was termed the most important labor agreement in the history of the lumber industry.

A contract covering 4,000 employees in mill operations of the firm was concluded last night, providing an average wage of 86 cents an hour, a closed shop, 40-hour five-day week, time and a half overtime, as well as a 15-day "cooling off" period in event of a strike or lock-out threat.

E. L. Torison, executive secretary of the Inland Empire council of the AFL union, said the agreement's wage scale was the highest in the pine lumber industry.

"The national defense crisis has realized appreciation of management and labor that neither can operate the industry alone," said Torison.

New Vander Meer Better Than No-Hit Flash of '38

NEW YORK, May 3—Johnny Vander Meer looked like a flash in the pan when he returned from Indianapolis in time to win three games for the Cincinnati Reds, including the one that clinched the flag.

There is no longer any doubt about Vander Meer's complete comeback.

The Peterson Pishooter is a more solid slinger than the kid who in 1938 became the first in 100 years of baseball to hurl in successive no-hit, no-run games.

Vander Meer lost a tough one to the Cardinals when the breaks went against him in his initial outing this trip. He fanned eight, yielded seven hits. Then he struck out 12 Cubs, shut them out with four blows. Next he held the Pirates hitless for six rounds in trimming them 10-3.

Vander Meer suffered a recurrence of an appendix disorder and developed a sore arm, but it was lack of control that sent him to the mixer.

Many pitchers, especially left-handers, are a long time developing. Vander Meer was no exception, being ahead of schedule when he wrote modern history.

He had been pitching only five seasons.

Two years after his record performance, he found he wasn't properly balanced. . . released the ball too soon, which made him wild high.

Bob Grove and others strove hard to get him to the top. Concomitant with this was a billy goat in his first two campaigns with the Athletics, which he threw out before he became a highly efficient American league workman.

Jim Turner and Lou Pette were among those who came up to take 20 games apiece for the Bees in '37. Turner had been around 12 years, Pette nine.

With Wyatt and Luke Hamlin of Brooklyn and Al Smith of Cleveland pitched 11 years before cranking up headlines in the press.

When the lowly Phillies gave up on him, Smith wanted to quit the game. Steve O'Neill talked him into making it to the big time. Like Carl Hubbell, he developed a screwball and last year became a regular on a potential American league pennant winner.

His Kremer had been trying to fool hitters for 18 seasons when he helped Pittsburgh win the pennant in '34. The Pirates now have another like him. Rip Sewell was 32 years old and had thrown nine miles when he became the Buc's ace in '40.

Dutch Leonard developed a knuckle ball, which lent a knuck-



ler at all but a peculiar pitch of his own, to get back into the major league. He had pitched nine years before he took 20 games for Washington in '36.

Thornton Lee pitched as long before making his name for himself with the White Sox.

Pitchers Bounce Back

Zucky Pazzoos of the Cubs reported eight seasons to get going. Charley Ruffing pitched seven years before getting into the Red Sox which led to his being traded to the Yankees.

Rufus the Red, who won 20 or

more games for the world champions for four straight years, twice lost more games than he won in American league dealer—25 and 22 for the Red Sox in '28-'29.

Al Mullinar had been at seven years when he came through with 18 victories for Cleveland last term.

Curt Davis spent a half dozen years in the minors, but had to win 22 and 20 games in consecutive years for San Francisco before even the Phillies would draft him.

The pitcher is the one ball player who can be sent away by a major league club and bounce back with something new.

In Johnny Vander Meer's case it was control.

The equipment was always there.

PORT WORTH, Tex., June 6 (AP)—Let us pay tribute today to Mr. John J. Manion, a professional from St. Louis, who bravely declared war on a ferocious three-potter named Leopold who is der fusther of a pond in front of the ninth green at the Colonial Golf club.

This will be our chance to do an essay on Mr. Manion, for he gallantly took nine strokes during his blistering attack, and probably shot himself out of the tournament. Mr. Manion is a fine golfer and has done some sensational things in his day.

But the thing that will keep his name ringing down the ages and break him with such a famous angler as Frank Walton occurred yesterday when he devised a new technique for fishing (patent applied for). Leopold successfully stated the attack and technically was the winner of the battle, but Mr. Manion electrified the gallery by making a brilliant retreat in good order.

Manion has been lurking in the bottom of the pond for some time building a marvelous maze of subterranean caverns out of golf balls that land in the pond.

They (Gloch, former Texas foot-

ball player who is a delicate little fellow standing six feet, six inches tall and weighing 265 pounds, already has lost a decision to Leopold. The members of the Colonial club decided to remove all fish from the pond in preparation for the National Open. They got them all out except Leopold who saw the National Open as a magnificent chance to add two double ball wings to his palace in the mid.

Other and lesser men could use rod and reel, seine, gill, pole or harpoon in the battle against Leopold. Mr. Manion was going to fight it out with an eight iron and a bag full of balls.

It developed that Mr. Manion's plan of attack was to lift a high shot into the pond and try to bring Leopold up from the bottom in the middle of the pond, sending out rings of ripples.

Spectators around the green, thinking Mr. Manion was playing a game of tag, watched the attack with Leopold, gasped as the

ball disappeared. Then they fell silent as Mr. Manion approached in a flank movement from the right.

700 SUFFOCATE IN CHUNGKING SHELTER DURING RAID

VENTILATION CUT OFF AS REFUGEES CROWD ENTRANCE

CHUNGKING, China, June 6 (AP)—Officials said today 700 persons were suffocated last night in the world's largest underground dugout during a five-hour intensive raid by Japanese warplanes.

Mass deaths resulted when one of four entrances to the dugout became so overcrowded that ventilation was cut off. The entrance was only two feet above an average person's height and crowding, refugees formed a human wall which effectively sealed the tunnel.

Red Cross trucks took the dugout victims to suburban cemeteries for mass burials.

The Japanese raid was the first night one this year and came only 40 hours after an attack in which 500 persons were killed.

Seventy-five bombers in eight flights of nine planes each, bombed the old city and the modern suburbs, starting widespread fires.

Axis Drive May Cover 2,500 Miles in Mediterranean Area

By United Press

The latest war developments suggest possibility of an axis campaign spread over an area some 2,500 miles long, designed to drive the British entirely out of the Mediterranean.

The area extends from Syria, in the near east, to Gibraltar and French Africa at the western end of the sea.

The picture is not clearly defined, but by putting together a series of events, a pattern seems to take shape. Its elements include:

1. Syria. Here the German air force is reported to have taken over the chief airports, Damascus, Aleppo and Palmyra. Istanbul hears that there are probably 5,000 German technicians and service men in Syria as a nucleus for an invading force, and that axis planes are flying back and forth from the Italian Dodecanese Islands to transport war materials and troops.

2. Forces Drawn up. The clamor in London for a British invasion of Syria to beat Hitler to the punch suddenly ceased, although General Wavell's forces in Palestine, Trans-Jordan and Iraq are drawn up along the frontier, presumably ready to march in if a decision is reached. Units of the British fleet are off the Syrian coast to prevent any sea-borne invasion.

3. Suez. A heavy axis air raid on Alexandria, Britain's big naval base, and the chief defense of the canal, looks like part of a campaign to close that vital artery of supply to the British. Bombers and air-sea mines already are known to have sunk ships in the narrow canal, impeding traffic.

4. Gibraltar. The sentinel of the western end of the Mediterranean has been bombed by Italian planes, according to Rome. The bombing coincides with a sudden stepping up of British defense measures on the rock and the concentration of warships and seaplanes there.

5. Weygand in Conference. French Africa. Gen. Maxime Weygand, commander of the French

IMPORT LIMITS AID WHEAT MEN

Quotas on imported wheat have been established as another farm program measure to protect U. S. farm income against the depressed world wheat situation, Kenyon Green, acting chairman of the Twin Falls county AAA committee, announced today.

The order signed by President Roosevelt, recommended by the tariff commission under authority Section 22 of the agricultural adjustment act, placed a limit on the amount of wheat which may come into the country under the favorable prices prevailing as a result of farm program provisions.

Section 22 provided that imports may be restricted whenever shipments from foreign countries threaten to reduce the effectiveness of the farm program's supply and price-control measures.

"Invoking Section 22 indicates that the U. S. wheat grower is getting an excellent price for his wheat compared with the wheat growers elsewhere," Mr. Green said. "At present, the wheat program is holding the domestic price high above the world level. Even a slight rise might completely offset the effect of the 42-cent tariff."

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Al Smith and Herb Hoover Bury Hatchet

NEW YORK, June 6 (AP)—Herbert Hoover and Alfred E. Smith buried the political hatchet last night and raised their voices jointly in a common cause—the welfare of boys.

The rival presidential candidates of 1928 shared the platform at a banquet of the Boy's Club of America, Inc., of which Mr. Hoover is board chairman, and good-humoredly recalled their battles when the one was President and the other his unsuccessful Democratic opponent.

Mr. Hoover referred to Smith as "governor" and Smith spoke of Mr. Hoover as "the President."

In introducing Smith, the former chief executive said: "We have had our differences, but I have always admired and respected him for his ability, his integrity, his rugged intellect and his real ardor and devotion to the public interest."

To which Smith replied: "We didn't differ so much. To my way of thinking, the great difference was made by the voters."

LONDON — British officials said today there was no truth in reports that Amman, capital of Trans-Jordan, had been bombed by French planes or that any air attack whatsoever had been made on Amman.

NEW YORK — An official Dutch news agency report from Batavia said today The Netherlands East Indies reply to sweeping Japanese demands for economic concessions in the Indies had been delivered. The nature of the reply was not disclosed.

LONDON — An air raid alarm sounded in London this morning. It was the first daylight alarm since

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April 22. The alarm passed without incident.

ROME — Italian warplanes last night bombed Gibraltar, Great Britain fortress guarding the entrance to the western Mediterranean, the Italian high command said today. It was the first announcement of an Italian raid on Gibraltar since shortly after Italy entered the war.

LONDON — The foreign office said today that Sir Stafford Cripps, British ambassador to Moscow, would return shortly to London for consultations.

LONDON — British quarters believed today the United States had given a last warning to the French government against cooperation with Germany and that, as the Vichy regime had already committed itself, a break in relations was near.
