NAZIS DRIVE FORWARD AS REDS RETREAT TOWARD MOSCOW

GERMAN PANZER DIVISIONS MOVE SWIFTLY AHEAD

BERLIN, July 1 (UPI)—The high command reported today that German armor forces had thrust back through the Red army to within 350 miles of Moscow, after smothering a Russian attempt to break out of German traps on the central sector of the long eastern front.

In a report of spectacular gains against the Red army, the Germans said that:

1. German panzer divisions had sliced through the central front in the Minsk area to the town of Borisov, on the Beresina river, which lies 50 miles east of Minsk and about 150 miles from Moscow.

Reds Trapped

2. All efforts of the big Russian armor forces to break out of the German rings of steel had been frustrated in 24 hours of desperate fighting against big heavy tanks. The Russians suffered heavy casualties and loss of mechanized equipment, the high command said.

German and Slovak forces sweeping forward on both sides of Lwow on the southern front protecting the Ukraine are "pursuing the beaten enemy," indicating that they had taken the southern wing a distance of 20 miles.

Smash Ahead

4. German forces driving into the Baltic states crossed the Buena river on a broad front in a drive on Riga after smashing "bitter enemy counterattacks," the high command said. It reported that the Germans had been occupied and that the Germans were driving on toward the Estonian border with the Luftwaffe heavily bombing the retreating Russians.

The high command reported the Russian armor forces were being driven in in mass and equipment on all three main fronts, but especially on the central front where the Red army had been ordered to retreat out of the German traps.

GERMANY, ITALY AND RUMANIA RECOGNIZE JAPAN IN CHINA

NEW MOVE WILL HELP IN KEEPING LINEUP WITH AXIS

By ROBERT BELLAIRE
 TOKYO, July 1 (UP)—Germany, Italy, Rumania, Slovakia and Croatia recognized the Japanese-sponsored Nanking regime in occupied China today in an attempt to strengthen Japan's position in the far east and keep it lined up with the axis powers.

It was announced the recognition had been received "with profound gratification."

Announcement of the recognition was made simultaneously here, at Nanking, at Berlin and at Rome.

The Japanese had set up the Nanking regime under Japanese-educated Wang Ching-wei, former Chinese premier, more than a year ago in an attempt to undermine the influence of the Chinese government.

"Officially the Nanking regime is the 'national government' of China. It purports to rule in Japanese-occupied China outside of Manchukuo.

Foreign Policy Plan

The recognition by the axis powers and their satellites, including the "state" of Croatia which was carved from Yugoslavia after the Italian campaign, was timed to coincide with adoption by the government of a long-considered declaration of foreign policy whose announcement was expected in a few days.

Newspapers predicted Prince Puyun, premier, would announce the agreement on foreign policy, reached at a cabinet meeting today, during a week-long series of speeches by government leaders in observance of the fourth anniversary of start of the Chinese-Japanese war July 7, 1937.

Because of the importance of the foreign policy declaration it was necessary for Prince Koyne to seek sanction of the emperor to it after its approval by the cabinet.

Realignment Needed

Japan had allied itself with Germany and Italy, and had negotiated a neutrality treaty with Russia when, in swift succession, the Netherlands East Indies rejected Japan's demands for big supplies of raw materials, the United States decided to increase its aid to China as well as to Britain, and Germany, Japan's ally, invaded Russia, its new friend. Thus it was necessary for the government to realign its foreign policy.

Koh Ichi, chief government spokesman, commenting today on plans to send American planes and pilots to the aid of China, said:

"Again I must say that it is not a friendly attitude toward Japan."

"Swell--And We Learned Lots," Says Boy Stater

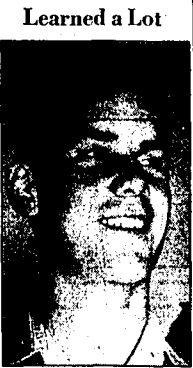

WIRE-TAPPING BY FBI IS REJECTED

WASHINGTON, July 1 (UP)—The house decided last night, 24 hours after G-men arrested 30 persons in the nation's largest spy roundup, that the government's counter-espionage system would have to operate without wire-tapping.

The appeals of President Roosevelt, Attorney General Robert H. Jackson, and Director J. Edgar Hoover of the federal bureau of investigation for wire-tapping authority in espionage, sabotage, extortion, and kidnaping cases were denied by the house.

An administration measure authorizing wire-tapping, introduced by Rep. Sam Hobbs, D. Ala., was defeated by a 124 to 136 vote that cut across party lines.

With United Press TOKYO — Japan should depend on her own power to establish a "new order" in east Asia regardless of international developments or "whatever other nations might say," Premier Prince Fumimaro Konoye said in a nationwide radio broadcast today.

BUCHAREST, Rumania — The Rumanian government announced 500 Communists had been executed in the Russian frontier region for aiding Soviet parachutists. It said all persons would be shot, along with their families, who failed in future to denounce Russian agents or fifth columnists.

VIOHY — Anglo-Free French forces, driving along the coastal road toward Beirut, were reported today in Syrian dispatches to have pushed within eight miles of the Lebanese capital.

HELSINKI — Genfire was audible today from the Hangö peninsula where a Russian garrison holds a leased coastal fortress. From points along the 1,000 miles eastern Finnish frontier.

SAN FRANCISCO — KOEI, San Francisco's powerful "good neighbor" short wave radio station, today increased its power to 50,000 watts to compete better against Berlin, Rome and Tokyo for dominance of South American and far eastern air lanes.

A SOUTH ENGLAND TOWN — A "hit" hospital was being set up here today by the American Red Cross and Harvard university under six raid conditions to study the wartime communicable disease problem. Lessons learned will be applied to the United States defense program.

ROME — Americans in Italy outside of Rome were left without consular protection of their rights and interests today. All United States consulates were closed last night so that the staffs could dispose of personal belongings in preparing to get out of the country by July 15—the date set by the Italian government.

STOCKHOLM — Swedish press reports today claimed Riga, capital of Latvia, was occupied by German forces this morning. The Swedish reports were based on a reported broadcast by radio.
