

JAPAN PLANS BLOW IN EAST ASIA, ENGLAND REPORTS

BATTLE AGAINST FRENCH REGIONS MAY HELP AXIS

 LONDON, July 16 (UP)—Japan is about to strike a big blow in east Asia in support of its axis allies, diplomatic quarters reported today. They expressed belief the variety of reports concerning Japan's intended action might mean Japan herself had not decided just where to strike and was seeking to sound United States and British reaction before making the final decision.

The general opinion, however, here in Shanghai was that Japan was most likely to strike southward toward French Indo-China, with the great French naval base of Camranh, one of the best in the world, as her prime objective.

May Seek "Lease"

There were strong reports Japan within the next two weeks and perhaps within a few days would demand the Vichy government "lease" the Camranh base, and that if Vichy refused the Japanese would take it in a combined land, air and naval attack.

It was reported Japan would send strong naval forces to the Camranh area at the same time that it made a demand of ultimative nature on the Vichy government.

Japan was not expected to stop at acquisition of the Camranh base. Diplomats believed she would demand great concessions, military and economic, in Indo-China including a guarantee of big supplies of rice.

May Strike Siberia

There was no indication the Vichy government could defend Indo-China even if it elected to do so.

Reports have circulated also that Japan might strike at Siberia. Diplomats have heard that Germany has suggested an attack on Vladivostok would be most helpful and the Germans promised "at least 1,000,000 political prisoners" in Siberia would aid the Japanese. It was not suggested that 1,000,000 political prisoners could be in Siberia, now they would be persuaded to fight for Japan, and how they could be delivered to the Japanese end arrived.

WHEELER STILL ASKS WAR VOTE

WASHINGTON, July 16 (UP)—Sen. Burton K. Wheeler, D., Mont., leading anti-interventionist, today had challenged the administration for the second time in a week to "bring a declaration of war to congress and see what we do with it."

Wheeler, in a senate speech, said that President Roosevelt has not constitutional authority to take the United States to war without the consent of congress.

At the same time, Wheeler promised that if this country does go to war he would "take the stump from one end of the country to the other and urge national unity."

He challenge the administration to come to congress with a declaration of war," Wheeler said. "The reason they don't do it is they know the overwhelming majority of congress as well as the people are utterly opposed to war."

Because of the nation's unwillingness to enter the present conflict, Wheeler continued, administration leaders are trying to bring it in through the back door.

Wheeler referred caustically to a published interview with a British parliament member in which the senator was told to "go soak his head."

"Nobody in England or in this administration can call me any new names," he said.

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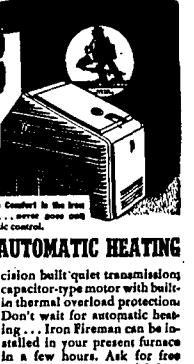

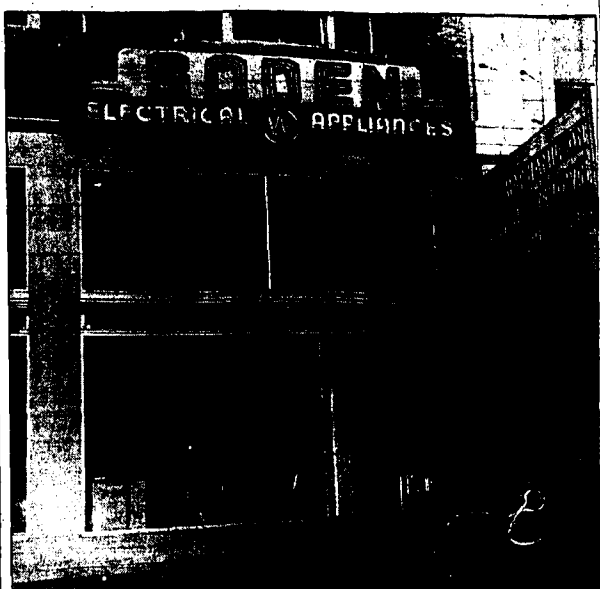

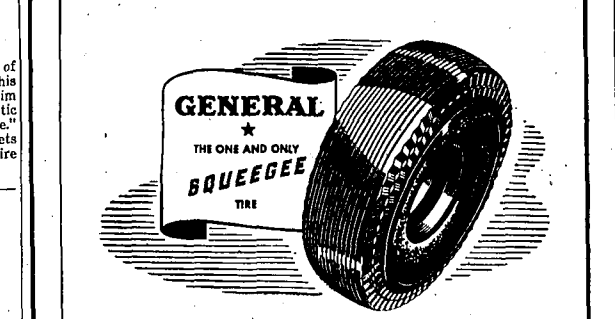

Japanese Slayer, Under Death Order For 15 Years, Gets Reprieve Chance
