Senate Votes for 30-Month Duty, \$10 Wage Boost

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 (UP)—Leaders thought today the army service extension legislation is in greater danger of being defeated in the house than any major administration measure since outbreak of the European war. The senate measure 45 to 30 last night, limiting the service of selectees, national guardsmen and reservists to 30 months in all. It also adopted an amendment which raised the pay of all army men \$10 a month after they have completed their original terms of service.

BOISE, Aug. 8 (UP)—The federal food stamp plan will be operating in Idaho on a statewide basis Aug. 10 when the last eight counties join the program. Willard F. The counties had originally been scheduled to start the program Sept. 1, but preliminary work incidental to inauguration of the program was completed faster than expected.

Building Activity Shows Big Gain in Four Idaho Cities

BOISE, Aug. 8 (UP)—Building activity in four Idaho cities has increased 102 per cent in the last six months over the same period last year, a six-month survey disclosed today. Up in July 5 building permits totaling \$3,737,899 have been issued in Boise, Lewiston, Pocatello and Twin Falls. During the same period last year the total was \$1,839,807. Building permits in Boise amounted to \$2,792,281; Lewiston \$12,164; Pocatello \$333,896; Twin Falls \$352,753.

JAPAN CHARGES FOES ATTEMPT ENCIRCLEMENT

TOKYO, Aug. 8 (UP)—Japan charged today that the United States, Great Britain, The Netherlands East Indies and China were attempting to encircle her, and that it remained to be seen whether Russia was participating. Koh Ishii, spokesman for the government information board, said that despite denials by British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, Japan had received reliable information from the British Foreign Secretary that British, Chinese, the United States and the Dutch were attempting to encircle both Japan and Thailand militarily, economically and politically.

HENDERSON SEES TEMPORARY U. S. SLUMP IN WORK

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 (UP)—Price Control Administrator Leon Henderson said today economic dislocation resulting from shifts to defense production would cause temporary unemployment to between 2,000,000 and 2,500,000 workers. Henderson said the change-over might cause economic dislocation similar to that experienced in England at the start of the war. A 20 to 25 per cent unemployment increase resulted in England during that period.

GOODING SCHOOL SETS BOOK RENT

GOODING, Aug. 8 (Special)—Gooding school board at the August session fixed book rental and other special fees for the 1941-42 school year.

They are—books, grades one and two, \$1.50 with 50 cents returnable at end of school year; books, grades three and four, \$2, with 50 cents returnable; books, grades five, six, seven and eight, \$2.50, with 50 cents returnable.

Books, grades nine, ten, eleven and 12, \$3.50 with \$1.50 returnable; vocational education (agriculture shop, home economics) \$4 with 50c returnable; chemistry and physics, \$2, with 50 cents returnable; biology and general science, \$1, with 25 cents returnable; locker, \$1, with 50 cents returnable; typewriting, 50 cents per month.

A decision was made that all fees must be paid before any books are issued or before enrollment in course is allowed. The only exception to this rule will be in case of those with tuition the school board for free books, and waived fees upon whose check is a recent decision of Superintendent M. W. Tate comments that the confusion and misunderstanding that has been evident in Gooding school district during the past several years concerning book rentals will doubtless be ended by a recent decision of Attorney Bert Miller. The attorney general says that there is no doubt of the intention of Idaho school law statute to grant the independent district the right to charge book rental and special fees. This decision reverses the ruling given by former Attorney General Taylor.

Russian Planes Reported Bombarding Nazi Capital

ENEMY AIRCRAFT DROP SHELLS ON BERLIN THURSDAY

Enemy planes bombed Berlin Thursday night and there was circumstantial evidence they were Russian planes, not British, if they were it marked the first known Russian air raid on Germany proper and the first Russian blow at the Nazi capital in retaliation for reported raids on Moscow.

Foreign correspondents in Berlin were permitted to cable early today that "week-end forces" had bombed western Germany and that "a few planes" had reached Berlin. A few explosive bombs had been dropped which caused damage and killed some civilians. The German communiqué said it did not specify whether the bombs had dropped in Berlin or western Germany.

RAF raids were over western Germany during the night, the British announced. They bombed Essen, Hamm and Dortmund. The air ministry was told the Germans had acknowledged a raid on Berlin. The ministry replied: "No planes attacked Berlin last night."

There was little to indicate from the official German communiqué the extent of the Berlin raid. Foreign correspondents are not permitted to report air raids on Germany until an official communiqué has been issued and their reports must then conform in every particular to the official version.

RAF planes were over western Germany during the night, the British announced. They bombed Essen, Hamm and Dortmund. The air ministry was told the Germans had acknowledged a raid on Berlin. The ministry replied: "No planes attacked Berlin last night."

Air Corps Instructors Urge Hiring of Resort Sleet Ace

SUN VALLEY, Aug. 8 (Special)—Two U. S. Army air corps shooting instructors today recommended the hiring of a resort ace to teach marksmanship to the 23 army trainees through the west.

The two—Major Kenneth O. McNaughton and Thomas S. Power, flew to the Hatley airport from Moffett field, Calif., on instructors from the war department.

They conferred with Bradsher for two hours on a proposed war department plan to engage expert skeet instructors to speed up training of recruits. Their plan called for training to hit fast-moving targets and teaching greater coordination between the eye, target and trigger.

Major McNaughton, who with Power is responsible for pilot training in 23 western states, said the air corps was seeking greater efficiency in training combat pilots.

"We believe that proper instruction in skeet shooting will bring officers and pilots to the greatest degree of marksmanship in the shortest possible time," he declared.

Major Powers said the hardest part of pilot training was teaching the student "how to shoot and shoot fast."

"If he can't shoot properly and get the job done that he was sent out to do, you not only lose the plane but the pilot as well," he said.

The officers also disclosed experiments are being conducted near Vegas, Nev., with a model airplane turret in which two shotguns are mounted instead of machine guns. The men are taught to fire the shotguns at flying skeet targets which simulate an enemy plane.

Photographs of territory are quickly relayed from the observation squadron to the 69th engineers for development and gridding and from there they are sent to the 116th engineers for printing and distribution.

BOISE, Aug. 8 (Special)—"All non-confidential information concerning selective service registrants is a matter of public record and must be made available to any person upon request during business hours of local boards in Idaho," Brig. Gen. M. G. McConnell declared today.

He pointed out that while this record is not to be handled by the physical condition of a registrant, all answers on the questionnaire under the subject of dependency, except the names and addresses of claimed dependents, the answers to questions on previous military service, and the registrant's court record.

General McConnell said if local boards or local board clerks refuse to give out the requested information without adequate cause for such refusal, the matter should be reported to state headquarters immediately.

Information contained in selective service form 100 contains the registrant's name, age, race, classification and a complete record of any appeals and the resulting decisions. It further records the date of the order when the registrant should report for induction, if he is so ordered, and the time he is to report for transportation to the induction station giving the date and the hour. It shows also the final disposition of the registrant at the induction station and the date when he was accepted or rejected, or if he failed to appear.

The only data to be withheld as confidential are the records of the physical condition of a registrant, all answers on the questionnaire under the subject of dependency, except the names and addresses of claimed dependents, the answers to questions on previous military service, and the registrant's court record.
