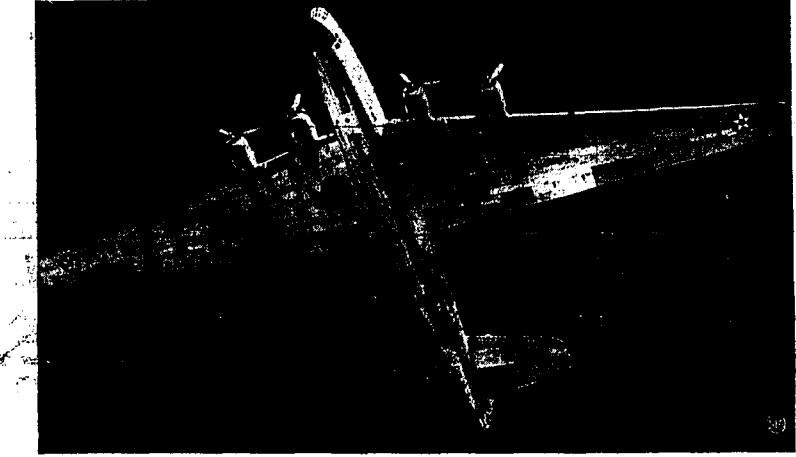

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# MEDIATION LOOMS ON EXTENSION OF ARMY SERVICE

## HOUSE EXPECTED TO BE READY TO VOTE ON MONDAY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—Administration leaders believed today that they may have to accept a short military service extension that the 18 months voted by the senate in order to get the legislation through the house.

It was feared they are ready to take any extension they can get in the house, believing that when the bill goes to conference where the senate and house versions will be reconciled, they'll be able to work out a more acceptable to the army and the President.

The house leaders were represented as feeling that a compromise fight for house approval of the senate's 18-month extension would involve the risk of defeat.

Vote on Monday

The bill will be debated an hour and a half Monday and then read for amendments. They are hoped the final vote will be taken late Monday.

The first big floor fight probably will come when Republican members of the military affairs committee seek to eliminate selectees from the entire process. They proposed reservists and regulars be retained in service but that selectees be discharged at end of the allotted year. The army would be permitted to limit to 45,000 the number of selectees discharged in any one month.

Proposals Offered

Various proposals will be offered by both Republicans and Democrats to cut the time of the extension below 18 months.

House non-interventionist Leader Hamilton Fish, R. N. Y., opened the attack on the service extension yesterday, charging it was part of a "gigantic plot" to involve America in war without the consent of congress and against the will of the people.

Chairman Andrew J. May, D. Ky., of the military affairs committee, said the bill was essential to national defense. Rep. Martin Dies, D. Tex., said the nation must be ready to make sacrifices to preserve its liberty.

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## PROGRAM LISTED AT CASSIA FAIR

An innovation this year is the family ticket, which will admit all members of a family to the fairgrounds for three days for one dollar.

Exhibit divisions include livestock, boys' 4-H club work, farm products, household department, forest department, school department and girls' 4-H club work.

John Gasthull, publicity manager, was appointed Monday when the fair board met. Also decided was that Burley men will begin wearing fair stamps regularly Aug. 20. Committees in charge of enforcing the wearing of cowboy outfits are Horace Hall, Harold Deardriff, Bill Williams, Clarence Phillips and Rodney Webster.

A grand opening dance will be held in Burley Sept. 2, at which Miss Barbara Boden, fair queen, her attendant, Miss Randa Matthews, Miss Amy Lou Skiles and Miss Rosell Sohm, will be presented at a floor show. In charge of dance arrangements are Orr Keen and O. E. Mechem.

Annual ballyhoo trip sponsored this year by the Chamber of Commerce, will occur Saturday, Aug. 30. The Garrard sound truck will head the procession around the county loop, visiting towns en route. The fair queen and her attendants will be featured on the trip.

A mammoth parade is scheduled for the opening morning. Plans by merchants and organizations of the city, the saddle stock and rodeo performers from Hilldale rodeo company will mark through the streets of Burley, accompanied by several bands.

## JULY SETS HIGH FOR BOND SALES

BURLEY, Aug. 9 (Special)—July was the best month yet as far as sale of defense bonds is concerned in Burley, according to Postmaster William Schick.

## Burley Girl, 19, Makes Solo Flight After Dad's Teaching

BURLEY, Aug. 9 (Special)—Miss Evelyn McKean, 19, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold McKean, made her first solo flight here under the tutelage of her father, Burley flying instructor. She flew her father's plane.

Miss McKean, pretty and weighing 115 pounds, was a major in art at Colorado Woman's college at Denver last year, but for several years her hobby has been flying. During the past two years she has been studying and practicing flying seriously, under four different instructors and using the three different types of planes which her father has owned.

She says she doesn't intend to make flying a career, but she will continue it as a hobby.

Her father received a flying instructor's certificate from the Johnson Flying service in Missoula, Mont., on June 25 this year and has since been busy at Burley's air school where several of his students already have soloed. Commenting on his daughter's soloing, he said he knew she had been able to fly alone for quite a long time but he had wanted until she had more than enough flying experience and confidence before sending her up.

Miss McKean was born at Buhl and has lived in Jerome and Twin Falls. The family has been in the furniture business here the past 12 years although Mr. McKean is now devoting most of his time to flying.

## Improvement of U. S. 30 Underway in Buhl Area

Work is expected to be completed next Wednesday on improvements being made on highway 30 from Burley corner at Buhl west a distance of 3.6 miles, state highway officials announced this afternoon.

While the improvement work is in progress in this particular section, through traffic is being detoured at the southwest corner of Filer, over the Clover road and then up Buhl. Local traffic is being permitted use of highway 30 with exception of the section under repair.

In addition to being widened in spots, the improvement work in that particular section includes application of a seal coat of oil and distribution of rock chips.

Bill Connor, official in charge of the work, said that through traffic would probably be permitted along that stretch of highway 30 on Sunday but that it would be blocked off again Monday and Tuesday for the "finishing touches."

Meanwhile, work is also underway in repairing several sections of highway 30 between Buhl and the Banbury grade, west of Buhl. In these stretches, Connor said, portions of the road are being torn out and entirely replaced. Heavy equipment is being used for the job and it is not known when it will be completed. Through traffic is not being held back while the work is in progress.

Connor said that about 25 men and eight or nine trucks, in addition to two big oiling trucks, are being used in the improvement work, all approved by the state highway department.

## Cassia Announces Selectee Totals

BURLEY, Aug. 9 (Special)—Totals in the different classifications of selective service men for the U. S. Army from Cassia county were announced today by George Denman, head of the local draft board.

Men registered to date number 2,069 in Cassia county. Questionnaires have been sent to 1,977 of them, nearly all of which have been returned. One fourth of this number, 584, have been classified, as follows: Class 1A, 55; class 1B, 18; class 2, 15.
