GERMANS CLAIM SOUTH VICTORIES

BERLIN, Aug. 25 (UP)—Nazi sources today claimed the capture of Dniepropetrovsk and Zaporozhe power plant, virtually completing occupation of the Dnieper bend area.

Competent German handlers said German and other axis forces, pushing toward the industrial area of the Ukraine, had taken Dniepropetrovsk, Dniepropetrovsk, 20 miles to the north, and the Zaporozhe power plant, 50 miles to the south.

The report did not say that Zaporozhe, which is east of the Dnieper, was captured. Thus there have been no reports that the Germans have forced a crossing of the lower Dnieper. The power plant probably is located on the river near the Ukraine, as the high command reported operations everywhere "progressing well."

Two Armies Move Without Warning To Oust Germans

LONDON, Aug. 25 (UP)—British and Russian armed forces struck into Iran without warning today and were reported meeting resistance in the campaign to oust German agents and protect the Red army's oil fields and supply lines.

Authoritative British sources said the Imperial force, consisting of troops from the British Isles and India, had encountered opposition in the first stage of the invasion, which included the landing of forces from British ships at the head of the Iranian gulf.

Resistance has been encountered but it is not known where or how serious it is, according to the statement made here.

The forces landed from ships in the Bandar Shapur sector of the Iranian gulf were said to be advancing but it was not known how far they had penetrated from the coast.

Bandar Shapur is the gulf terminus of the railroad to Ahwaz and Tehran.

News also was lacking of progress on other sectors. The front authorities said that the entire Iranian army probably numbered 150,000 men, including one armored brigade with tanks (apparently Czech origin), and two or three well-trained and well-equipped divisions.

BRITAIN "UNHESITATINGLY" BACKS AMERICA AGAINST JAPAN

CHURCHILL SAYS GERMANS AFRAID TO WAR ON U. S.

 LONDON, Aug. 25 (U.P.)—Great Britain, by declaration of Prime Minister Winston Churchill, arrayed herself today "unhesitatingly" today alongside of the United States in warning to Japan to abandon her aggressions in the far east.

Churchill, in reporting his historic meeting at sea with President Roosevelt, warned Japan in the course of a half-hour radio address last night, to come to terms or face the combined strength of Britain and America.

Reaffirms Pledge
 He reaffirmed the pledge he signed in the Atlantic Charter in 1941, but shed little new light on their dramatic meeting.

The big question posed by Britons—how near is the United States to entry into the war?—was skirted by Churchill with the statement that only one man, Adolf Hitler, knew.

Churchill asserted Hitler was afraid to make war on the United States, although "he has murdered half a dozen countries for far less pretext." He added that Hitler's policy was to go after other countries one at a time.

Praises U. S. Navy
 He praised the United States navy as having already saved the western hemisphere from German domination.

The reassertion of the determination of Britain and the United States to "overcome all difficulties" in the way of aid to Russia, whose armies, he said, were astounding the world with their "magnificent devotion" to beating back the Germans.

He did not go beyond previous declarations that the democracies would lead Russia all possible material assistance.

Tuesday evening sees resumption of grassy nights, with Holsteiner Orange as host and Ivan Loughery, extension dairyman, as speaker.

Two Spoke Saturday
 At Saturday's session in the dairy palace fully 130 Sego Milk company employees, patrons and guests viewed the demonstration and heard talks by Carter Luther, fieldman for the company, and Ralph E. Gale, Boise, sales manager of Idaho Paper company.

A no-host picnic supper was enjoyed by the personnel of the company, after which all present were treated to servings of ice cream made by the Sego company.

Mr. Luther presented the cows taking part in the demonstration, giving their history and the history of each breed of cow. During his talk, he said the purpose of this display is to show the value of good cows and promote the dairy industry.

He described the milking machine and its operation and said that it is used to the hearts of the cow. He explained that the transfer of milk from the container to the can is done by vacuum which milk passes over cooling plates to reduce it to 50 degrees before it goes into the cans for shipment to market.

Perfect breeding and improved knowledge of feeding and care of cows, he said, have sent milk production upward almost four-fold since 1850.

Tells of Breeds
 Mr. Luther explained the Holsteiner breed came originally from the Netherlands and is popular for the quantity of milk produced.

The Island of Jersey, since 1789, has produced nothing but Jerseys and the Island of Guernsey is noted for the breed which bears its name.

SUN VALLEY, Ida., Aug. 25 (U.P.)—Members of the Idaho State Editorial association were on record today as opposed to curtailment of advertising as suggested by agencies of the federal government.

At the final sessions of their annual summer meeting, Idaho newspaper officials adopted a resolution which deplored "agitation of certain federal government agencies for curtailment of advertising, using the present defense emergency as an apparent pretext for a move we consider a menace both to the future of newspaper publishing and the livelihood of its tens of thousands of employees."

The resolution also said curtailment of advertising menaced "the future of American business whose extension depends largely upon ability to create demand for output through vigorous advertising and merchandising."

A committee was named to cooperate with other groups in combating misinformation concerning advertising.
