## GRANGE SESSIONS CLOSE AT FILER

**DAIRY PALACE, Filer, Sept. 6 (Special)**—The series of Grange meetings at the dairy palace came to a close last night in more or less of a blaze of glory for the Grangers, with the breaking of two records for attendance. More visiting Grangers were at the meeting than on any previous night, and more visiting Grangers from one Grange were present than on any other occasion.

Tuttle with 18 members present broke an attendance record for the dairy palace, and the total membership of the Grange with 40 members present, broke all previous records, and the total of 38 visiting Grangers was far ahead of any other night in number of visitors.

Up to last night, Wendell held the record with 34 members in attendance. The Grangers are proud of their part in the dairy demonstration, and all the Granges of south central Idaho might well call the dairy show a worthwhile community project. With a few new ideas from the dairyman's standpoint and a little better understanding of just what is expected of them, on the part of the Grangers, the dairy show can be bigger and better than ever next year.

The meetings have been a fine example of cooperation on the part of the dairyman and the Granger more than advertise the dairy business. They have boosted the Grange in Idaho, and advertised the state itself.

**Bollingbroke Speaks**  
 Bert Bollingbroke, Twin Falls county agent, was the speaker of the evening, and his talk was along the lines of previous talks on the program. He stressed the economic importance of dairy foods, and the management of dairy herds for such production. Many of the talks on the subject have been similar, but this time Mr. Bollingbroke spoke in more general terms.

One statement that Mr. Bollingbroke made must be a challenge to the dairyman of the state of Idaho to produce more butterfat per cow, and that is, that the state can produce more of the best dairy cow feed in the world than any other state. That feed is alfalfa. Nowhere does alfalfa of such excellent quality grow so abundantly as in the irrigated sections of Idaho. Nowhere else must stand out as a sore thumb. Less than 50 per cent of the alfalfa service in Idaho are purchased and registered. In other words, more than half of the alfalfa in service are of absolutely unknown parentage and to use them constitutes gambling of the most dangerous type as far as herd improvement is concerned. The percentage of cow owners also own their bulls, so the development of good herds in such cases is entirely out of the hands of such cow owners.

And the 25 per cent that Mr. Bollingbroke said are using outright scrub herd sires, are even worse off, as they have absolutely no breeding program. If the dairy show, by the exhibition of good cows, along with their ability to produce twice the average amount of butterfat that is produced by the cows of the country in general, has challenged any great number of our dairymen to get better herds, then it has been well worthwhile, according to the men who have spoken on these topics. And if the demonstration has caused any great number of people to use more dairy products to feed their families, then that has also been of great value, say the speakers.

Relative values of the different farm grown feeds for dairy cattle was discussed briefly and hurriedly by Mr. Bollingbroke.

Then he again introduced the cow and told the purpose of the demonstration. Mr. Jackie, master of Twin Falls Grange, the host of the evening, presented the Grange visitors. Besides the two visiting Granges, there were five out-of-state visitors.
